RAF Air Cadets join forces for 75th anniversary parade

The sound of drums could be heard right across Rushden on Sunday 7th February, as cadets from neighbouring squadrons joined together to celebrate the 75th anniversary of the Air Training Corps.

Over 50 cadets and adult staff from Rushden's 858 Squadron and 378 (Mannock) Squadron, which is based at Spring Gardens in Wellingborough, joined together to mark ATC Sunday, an annual anniversary event celebrated right across the country.

Leading the parade was Flight Lieutenant Colin Harmer,

Commanding Officer at 858 Squadron, based on Victoria Road in Rushden.

Fit Lt Harmer said: "Bringing the two squadrons together to mark ATC Sunday gives us the opportunity to show just how committed and passionate our cadets are, as well as how we cooperate locally as an organisation. I would like to say thank you to the people of Rushden for

taking the time to watch our cadets parade through their town and for continuing to support the work of the Air Training Corps locally."

Following the parade through Rushden, the cadets, along with their volunteer staff, and local parishioners, gathered at the Mission Church on Wellingborough Road where the Squadron Chaplain, Rev Ian Fall, led a service marking ATC Sunday.

Flying Officer Philip Warr, Officer in Charge at 378 (Mannock) Squadron, said: "As well as the 75th anniversary of the Corps as a whole, this is an exciting year for Mannock Squadron as we celebrate our 75th anniversary too.

"For the last 75 years the RAF Air Cadets has worked with and supported many young people. We are incredibly proud of our history and the organisation will be hosting a series of events and activities over the year to officially mark it."

The Air Training Corps was formed by Royal Warrant on 5th February 1941. Initially the ATC was only open to boys, but this changed in the 1980s and now the RAF Air Cadets, which also incorporates the RAF sections of the Combined Cadet Force, is open to boys and girls aged from 12 to 17. In December last year HRH The Duchess of Cambridge became the ATC's new patron and honorary Air Commodore-in-Chief, a role previously held by HRH The Duke of Edinburgh for over 60 years.

Editor's notes

Life at our house has recently been far too heavily influenced by visits or non-visits to hospitals, obviously a feature of advancing age. There is one particular piece of wisdom to be had from these activities and it concerns someone who has lost just about all the sight in one eye because of a small and apparently otherwise almost imperceptible, stroke. Without being alarmist, it seems that the best way to deal with such an incident, where the obvious symptom is at least a partial loss of sight, is immediate attendance at hospital A&E to take advantage of the so called "Golden Hour", the period during which some injuries can cause a patient to deteriorate extremely rapidly; if the delay between injury and treatment can be kept to a bare minimum, which has come to be specified as no more than 60 minutes, apparently the survival rate is significantly improved.

Our piece on page 8 about the Business Start-Up course is worth consideration by those contemplating striking out on their own,

particularly relevant bearing in mind the recent spate of redundancies in the local area; the course offers the opportunity to learn from others who have already been down the same path, successfully or otherwise, at minimal cost.

Having been heavily involved with the development of the Oundle Neighbourhood Plan (hopefully more of that in the next edition) it's good to hear that Higham Ferrers are holding the referendum on their Plan on 18th February. I do urge all the affected residents to get out and use their vote, hopefully to support the Plan; it follows that you will need to have studied the Plan's contents to understand just what's being proposed but this is a real opportunity to influence local planning which should not be missed.

Finally, there are more opportunities to engage in voluntary work in this edition. For instance, the Beanstalk charity is seeking help with their literacy programme for youngsters who are falling behind with their reading; go for it!

Genealogy jottings

What did your ancestors do for a living? Were they agricultural labourers (Ag Labs) as many of our forebears were or did they have other skills? During the latter part of the 18th century and into the 19th, the number of those involved in the transport industry increased dramatically. Not only was this the time of the railways blossoming but canals also played a large part in transportation. Although the canal system had been in existence for many years, the River Nene also played an important part, linking Northamptonshire to the Wash, where goods could be unloaded onto ships.

Of course, with Northampton being at the heart of the shoemaking business, many cottage industries sprung up with people working from their homes and earning money for piecework. By 1850, nearly 15% of the male population were employed as shoemakers. Other areas of the clothing industry were also coming into being. Have you ever come across the term 'slop maker'? No, it is not someone who prepares food for animals, but a 'slop' was a cheap, readymade piece of clothing. Materials

were cut out, often by machine, and people (mainly women) would sew them together to make 'off the peg' clothes as opposed to the expensive, tailored outfits that were beyond the reach of most people. Again, workers were paid 'piece' rates for work completed, and these rates were notoriously bad.

However, there were many other trades and occupations that our forefathers undertook: blacksmith, butcher, baker, carpenter etc – the list goes on forever! One thing to look out for though, is the occupation of dressmaker or seamstress. Usually it is what is says: a person who makes clothes. However, sometimes, especially if you find a number of women in the same house in a census with this occupation, it may be a euphemism for prostitute, as that is the term that many women used in order to disguise their 'trade'!

What is the most unusual occupation that you have found in your family so far?

Feathered family fun at Stanwick Lakes

Families can enjoy a week of bird themed activities this February half term and learn about why the nature reserve at Stanwick Lakes is such an important haven for wildlife.

The Rockingham Forest Trust looks after the habitats on the site to make it the perfect home for birds such as oystercatchers, reed buntings and pintails. But it's not just nature reserves that can look after wild birds; everyone can play their part by making their garden a haven for our feathered friends.

Visit Stanwick Lakes during the half term, on Wednesday 17th and Thursday 18th February between 1pm and 4pm, and you can build a bird box or a bird feeder to take home to your garden. Natural nest sites for birds such as holes in trees or old buildings are disappearing fast as gardens are tidied up and old houses are repaired. Making a bird box and putting it up in your garden will play an important part in bird conservation, whilst also giving you the pleasure of watching the

birds that are attracted to your bird box.

Professor Jeff Ollerton (University of Northampton and Northants Local Nature Partnership) commented: "Birds are such a familiar aspect of our everyday wildlife that we often take them for granted. But formerly common species such as starling and house sparrow have suffered serious declines in numbers over the past few years and need all the help we can give them. Events such as this are great for raising awareness of bird conservation amongst children and their families, and are warmly welcomed by the Northants Local Nature Partnership."

The bird boxes can be easily made by children and adults without any previous woodwork experience and friendly volunteers will be on hand to help. Once you

have made your bird box, drop into the visitor centre to meet owls, thanks to bird rescuers Owls to Behold.

There will also be other fun, family, bird-themed activities at Stanwick Lakes during the half term holiday. On Monday 15th February, between 1pm and 4pm you can make a bottled bird out of recycled materials and throughout the week, 11am-4pm, follow the Birdy Trail around the visitor centre lake to win a prize. It will cost £1.50 to make a bottle bird and £1.50 to follow the Birdy Trail. Council supports food hygiene campaign

East Northamptonshire Council (ENC) is supporting the Food Standards Agency's (FSA) latest food hygiene campaign.

The campaign, called 'Where's The Sticker?', encourages customers to look for the green and black Food Hygiene Rating Scheme (FHRS) stickers at food outlets and reminds food businesses to make sure their

stickers are on show.

The FHRS provides information about the food hygiene standards found by the local authority's food safety officers when they inspect food outlets. Officers check businesses are meeting

food hygiene law, which is in place to protect people's health.

Many businesses that already display their rating say it has made a huge difference by improving reputation, increasing customer confidence and attracting more customers.

One East Northamptonshire food business that proudly displays its sticker is Eastern Spices in Oundle. The owners achieved the top award of

level 5 under the FHRS in December 2015. Shakeel Arif and Safdar Hussain have owned the business for the last eight years and during this time have worked closely with the Environmental Health department at ENC to maintain standards of hygiene and undertake structural improvements to their business.

Shakeel explained: "We recognise how important it is to maintain good food hygiene standards to protect the health of our customers. We have recently benefitted from attending a food safety course at ENC along with a workshop on new legislation on key food allergens."

Steven North, Leader of East Northamptonshire Council, added: "A good rating is good for business. It's something to be proud of, so please display your sticker and don't leave potential customers guessing how seriously you take food hygiene, or worse, assuming



that you have something to hide. If you'd like to improve your rating, speak to one of our food safety officers who are on hand to offer advice and support. They are happy to share information on specific issues or more general council services

which may benefit your business."

Drivers wanted for home to school transport service

Taxi and minibus drivers who are interested in Home to School Transport contracts with Northamptonshire County Council can go along to an information roadshow this month.

The council is about to establish a new 'transport framework' which is an approved list of drivers and businesses contracted by the council to complete journeys.

Once the framework list is established, other firms and drivers are unable to join the register until it is renewed.

Having been established

in June 2013, the current transport framework is due to expire in June this year.

Cllr Michael Clarke, county council cabinet member for transport, highways and environment, said: "We want to invite operators and drivers to come and meet us and talk to us about the opportunities available.

"The roadshow is so people can understand the extent of our provision, our pride in the service and to ensure our priority of customer safety is achieved in every journey we make."

Rushden Unit of the Maritime Volunteer Service

For members of the Rushden Unit of the Maritime Volunteer Service, 2016 began with a navigation exercise across Charnwood Forest and Bradgate Park in north Leicestershire that blew the holiday cobwebs away with lashing rain and howling wind in early January and continued with flood and water rescue training on the River Nene. On Saturday morning 30th January those out jogging or dog-walking along the embankment at Wellingborough would have noticed a group of strangely-dressed people clad in orange dry-suits, helmets, buoyancy aids and draped with ropes practising their specialist water and flood rescue drills. Rushden Maritime Volunteer Service is a voluntary member unit of the County Council's 'Northants Emergency Response Corps' (NERC) and joins other volunteer groups in supporting the professional emergency services in their rescue and resilience duties. Volunteer Chief Petty Officer Paul Mills, Rushden MVS's Water Rescue Technician and Trainer oversaw members of the unit engaged in rescue raft practice, survival

swimming, setting up rescue rope rigs and rescue techniques using throw-bags and ropes. Although good exercise and fun, this training had a serious purpose as members of the unit honed their specialist skills in providing an essential service to the local community. Unit commander, Volunteer Officer Andy Smith, reported that: "I'm very pleased with the skills which the members of the unit are developing and the weather doesn't put us off either; however, the river is cold and we've been in and out of it all morning so we're all looking forward to bacon sarnies and gallons of hot tea now!"

The coming year for the Rushden MVS includes further water/flood rescue exercises, search-and-rescue

activities, emergency/first aid, powerboat and safety boat training, formal parades, an annual visit to Ypres in Belgium to take part in the remembrance services at the Menin Gate and attendance at Rushden's Armed Forces Day on Saturday 18th June.

Northamptonshire will host the final stage of the 2016 Aviva Women's Tour, with the proposed route starting in Northampton town centre and finishing in Kettering.

The last stage of the five-day international women's cycling event will take place in the county on Sunday 19th June and attract some of the world's best female riders.

Last year's race saw a massive 67,500 people line the streets to cheer on the cyclists and saw a £1 million boost to the local economy. The event also inspired 65% of spectators to cycle more often, according to an independent report.

"Northampton and Kettering have both hosted the finish of the race before, Northampton in its first year in 2014 and Kettering last year, so we're very much looking forward to the prospect of working with them again.

"I would urge people across the county to come along and support the riders on what is sure to be a fantastic day – and hopefully the crowds will be inspired to get cycling too!"

Northampton Borough Council leader Cllr Mary Markham, said: "We are pleased to welcome the Aviva Women's Tour to Northampton which is a fantastic opportunity to not only encourage more women and girls into sport but also raise the profile of

Northampton and encourage visitors to the town."

Northamptonshire County Council will now work with event organisers SweetSpot to finalise the details for the route through the county.

Mick Bennett, Race Director of the Aviva Women's Tour, said: "Having hosted the first ever stage of the Aviva Women's Tour in 2014, it is fitting that Northamptonshire will now have the chance to host the final stage of this year's race.

"The final day will be an undulating stage taking in some new climb areas of Northamptonshire that we haven't visited with the previous two editions."

Northamptonshire rider Hannah Barnes, who will compete as part of Canyon SRAM Racing team, said: "I travel all over the world racing, so to be able to race along roads I train on is a privilege. All my friends and family can come and watch, which is a real treat."



Northamptonshire County Council has also agreed with SweetSpot that a stage of the Aviva Women's Tour will be held in the county next year.

As part of the agreement, SweetSpot will also hold a

mass-participation cycle event in the county this year and next year to encourage

people, in particular women and families, to become more active and get cycling.

Butter

Wrap each onion in its own parcel of brown paper and tie up the end with string. Put in a small roasting tin and bake in a low oven for around 1 to 1.5

Ranger Cadets group gets off to flying start

As a cadet back in the 1960s I always felt I owed a debt of gratitude to the cadet movement. The Cadets helped me recover from a long childhood illness, encouraged me to become physically fit, and gave me confidence, skills and a direction in life. I was taught good manners, to be clean and tidy, to be self-reliant and was taken camping, which was wonderful. After I got married, I rejoined as a leader and after many years, retired from the cadet movement – or so I thought. In all that time my only reservation was there was nothing for younger children, as most cadet organisations do not accept anyone younger than 13 years.

When it was suggested Irthlingborough and surrounding villages needed a cadet unit, an opportunity to fill the gap was seized and the Ranger Cadets was born, complete with a junior section for 7–12 year olds.

Setting it up was not easy, but with the help of a wonderful organisation called Waterloo Performing Arts, local Councillors and parents, we established our first unit in Crow Hill late last year and have plans for two more over the next couple of years.

The Ranger Cadets, which is an independent charity, encourages youngsters to get involved in adventure training activities from as young as 7 years old. It is also one of the goals of the organisation to provide cadet activities for children living in rural locations. We meet each Thursday evening at Crow Hill Community Centre, Irthlingborough, from 6.30pm–8.30pm. The Squadron is run by experienced volunteers and activities, which take place at weekends too, include sailing, bushcraft, camping, field cooking, navigation, and signals – radios, drum corps plus sports and games.

We are recruiting new cadets as well as adult leaders

and would like to hear from anyone who may be interested. The Ranger Cadets are less formal than most other organisations, we loan uniforms and weekly 'subs' are only £2.50 per member. The Rangers are totally independent; we have no paid staff and raise all our own funds. The Rangers are particularly keen to hear from anyone who would like to help as a leader. Previous experience is not necessary although a DBS is, which we can arrange. We have two sections: junior cadets 7–12 years and cadets 13–17 years.

The Higham Ferrers Neighbourhood Plan Project Group produced a Neighbourhood

Plan, sponsored by the Town Council, which is now at the referendum stage.

The question will be: **"Do you want East Northamptonshire District Council to use the Neighbourhood Plan for Higham Ferrers to help it decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area?"**

To vote in the referendum you must live in the Higham Ferrers area and be registered to vote.

Are you an absent voter?

If you're unable to get to a polling station to vote, you may have an absent vote where you either vote by post or someone else votes on your behalf, by proxy.

Every January, East Northamptonshire Council is legally required to write to all absent voters (either postal or proxy) in the district whose signatures are more than five years old on 31st January, asking them to provide a fresh signature. This is to reduce the possibility of electoral fraud.

What do I need to do?

If you receive a postal vote refresh form, please help the council save money by replying promptly; this will save us having to send you a reminder.

You have six weeks from the date the notice is sent to return the completed and signed notice to the council.

If the deadline is missed, you will be removed from the absent vote list and you'll be sent a letter to confirm this. Anyone whose absent vote is removed and who wishes to vote by post in the future will have to complete a new absent vote application.

Absent voters who have a special arrangement are not affected by the refresh provisions as a signature is not held for them.

Changes to your details?

If your name, address, the address for your postal ballot papers or the details of your proxy have changed, please amend the relevant details on the form, sign it and provide your date of birth before sending it back to us in the prepaid envelope provided. In some cases, we may need to send you an additional form to complete.

Problems completing the form?

If you have a disability/illness which means

that you either cannot provide a signature or sign in a consistent and distinctive way, please indicate this on the form and return it to the council. Our Electoral Registration Officer may grant you a waiver of the requirement to provide a signature, subject to an additional form being witnessed on your behalf.

No longer require your absent vote arrangement?

If you no longer want to vote by post/proxy you must tell us by ticking the relevant box on the form, signing the form and then returning it to us as soon as possible so that we can cancel your arrangement and avoid any unnecessary reminders. We will contact you in writing to confirm that your arrangement has been cancelled.

What will happen if I do not return the form?

If you do not return the signature refresh form by the deadline, your existing absent vote facility will be cancelled and you will have to vote in person or make a new application.

I have a postal/proxy vote arrangement but I haven't received a refresh form

The signature refresh exercise will happen every year, but we will only send refresh forms to those voters who applied over five years ago. You will not need to provide a refresh of your identifiers until five years have passed since your original application. You will only need to update your record when you receive correspondence from us.


