In Brief

Music in the Park

There's music in Barnwell Country Park on Sunday 17th July. Starting at 11.30am until the late afternoon four local brass bands, from Raunds, Stamford, Thrapston and YNBB will be playing with a Massed Band Finale. There will also be a bouncy castle and artisan stalls plus a BBQ and local Digfield Ales. The event is sponsored by Waitrose, Geneva Instruments, the Roe Group and PRS Oundle School Community Action.

Schools success

The winner of this year's Northamptonshire County Schools Challenge Grand Final is Lodge Park Academy in Corby. Teams from eight schools presented their social enterprise ideas to a Dragons' Den style panel of judges. Also commended were Manor School Sports College in Raunds, who won third place, and Brooke Weston Academy in Corby, who came second. The other schools taking part in the Grand Final included: Elizabeth Woodville School (South) in Deanshanger; Huxlow Science College in Irthlingborough; Prince William School in Oundle; Northampton School for Girls and Northampton Academy.

Course kick-starts teens futures

A group of Northamptonshire students are kick-starting their career by swapping their summer holidays for a community-focused work experience programme where they could get an apprenticeship on completion.

Kick-start is a five-week course, that will see 12 local students aged 16-18 taking part. The programme is delivered by Spire Homes, a member of Longhurst Group. Each student will shadow three national contractors

who Spire Homes work with – Aaron Services, Burleys and Keepmoat, as well as receive professional training and workshops on employment skills. On completion, each contractor will invite the 12 to apply for an

apprenticeship with them to start full-time this September. Last year the House of Commons reported that the number of younger people taking up apprenticeships had dropped significantly, with just 25 per cent of

apprentices in 2014/15 aged 19 or under compared to 42 per cent in 2009/10.

Sharon Boot, Resident and Community Involvement Officer at Spire Homes, said: "With so many young people still struggling to find opportunities when they leave school, we decided we wanted to do something to help.

"Kick-Start isn't just about finding a job, it also focuses on career development and finding something that you really enjoy doing.

Whilst youth unemployment rates in Northamptonshire are improving, last year more than 1,100 young people were recorded as not in education, employment or training. According to the Department for Education, that accounts for 4.6 per cent of 16-18 year olds living in the county.

Ms Boot added: "Apprenticeships are proving to be a really

effective way of securing long-term employment prospects as, according to the Skills Funding Agency, 90 per cent of apprentices stay in employment after they complete their training.

Although we're only able to offer a limited number of apprenticeships, the skills we focus on during the course will be really useful when applying for any job in the future."

Keepmoat Community Liaison Manager, Julie Baker, said: "At Keepmoat, it's not just about bricks and mortar. We recognise that it is hugely important to support local people and encourage employment in the construction industry.

"We hope that the kick-start students will enjoy their time with us and be encouraged to consider an apprenticeship, which we are proud to offer in partnership with Spire Homes."

The students will also be giving back to the community too, as the programme will cumulate in a community refurbishment at a recently converted community centre in Higham Ferrers.

Editor's notes

I recently joined the Higham Ferrers Business Forum for their monthly meeting and very friendly they were too. I was struck by the enthusiasm of those attending for joint efforts to promote the town; however, the turn-out was low and it seemed that not all the local businesses subscribe to the "stronger together" principal.

This reluctance to band together to develop joint solutions has been apparent in other places, even where someone else is prepared to do the donkey work. There can be little doubt that our town centres are under threat and need to do all they can to promote themselves. However, it does seem to be the case that there is less trade than commerce in

most of our small towns; more people delivering services than making or selling things. And it's easier for the people delivering those services to do so in comparative isolation while the true "shopping" experience needs a more tangible presence providing real social appeal and diversity, as well as value for money, for those who choose to take it.

The commercial development at Rushden Lakes, which is expected to include a raft of well known shops including M&S, Primark and House of Fraser, is due to open in the spring of next year and will surely be a real source of competition for the local High Streets. It's difficult to be convinced by the argument that visitors to the Lakes development, which

looks like it will be a typical modern one-stop shopping experience, will bother to find their way to the local towns such as Higham and Rushden. None-the-less, there will be a significant number of new job opportunities at the new site which must be a significant bonus for the area.

Of course the other major detractor from the High Street is online shopping which is immensely convenient and seems to be more and more popular. So, while we should pay tribute to those brave souls who venture into the retail sector with business plans which often represent triumphs of hope over wisdom, perhaps we have to accept that the High Street will be consigned to the status of museum!

Access to Rushden Lakes
I would be grateful to know of plans for pedestrian and cycle access to the new development at Rushden Lakes. Crossing the A45 to gain access to the site is virtually impossible for anyone not using a car. And yet it would be such a shame if non car users were in effect excluded from the acres

of nature reserve that will become available.

At present the Rushden and Higham Greenway stops at the Rushden end of Crown Park. It would be a simple matter for this to be extended along the pre-existing paths through the industrial estate as far as the A45. But without a bridge over the A45 Rushden Lakes would still be inaccessible. The bridge that does exist between Irthlingborough from Higham is too far away for local residents.

It may be that a plan to build a Rushden bridge exists. If not, it seems to me that it is an essential part of the development.

Genealogy jottings

There will come a time when you are presented with a document that at first glance you are unable to read.

A cross between Egyptian hieroglyphs and the Russian alphabet is staring straight back at you, expecting you to understand it! Not only will you have to contend with some shocking handwriting from the census enumerators, but those old, faded documents that you will find in County Records Offices and Archives will also set out to confuse you. Even though transcriptions may be available on commercial websites, errors still occur, so it is always best to read the original document yourself wherever possible.

Here are some tips to help:

- 1 Read the complete document first of all to see if you can get a feel for what it is all about.
- 2 Run your eyes over it to see if the same word appears in a context where you do understand its meaning.
- 3 Be aware of common abbreviations plus symbols used to signify missing letters.
- 4 Practice. The more you try, the easier it becomes.
- 5 Until recently words were spelled as they sounded, with spelling only really settling down at the beginning of the 20th century. This applies to names as well so expect to

find the name Phoebe recorded as Febe, for example!

- 6 Familiarise yourself with place names and names of people which might occur in the document. The letters in these names may help you to work out what another word is saying.
- 7 Transcribe as much of the document as you can then re-read, comparing the original with your transcript.
- 8 If you are visiting a Record Office or Archive, take a digital camera with you if at all possible. There might be a charge for using it, but then you will be able to examine the document at leisure.
- 9 Little and often is the key. Do not spend hours poring over the same document, but give your eyes a rest. It is amazing what fresh eyes can see!

A collaboration between High Street businesses and Thrapston Town Council has resulted in some eye-catching changes in Thrapston town centre and entrances to the town.

A communal area close to the library on High Street has been updated to include two beautiful new themed benches and a renovated flag stand, also home to the town's Christmas tree in winter. Thanks to funding from Longhurst Group (the property group behind the Castle Court over 55s development on Chancery Lane), Thrapston Farmers' Market and East Northamptonshire District Councillors, the area is now much more user friendly and welcoming. 
following weeks the children had so many questions that two members of staff decided to develop a space club.

love to try it again."

The late Field Marshal Slim, who commanded 14th Army – British and Indian, in the hard-fought Burma Campaign in the Second World War, made the value of military service very clear when he said: "Discipline will bring a soldier into the front line; discipline will keep him there; but when the going gets severe, it is the commitment, morale and loyalty to his comrades that count in winning the battles." Slim knew what it was like.

Our Armed Services now enlist women as well as men. British Services, in action, fight tenaciously and fairly in accordance with the rules. This helps win the wars; it will also help achieve a secure peace. As Clausewitz famously wrote: "War is the conduct of diplomacy by other means."

On 30th June, I presented awards for long service to East Northamptonshire Council's staff. Councils are partnerships of councillors and officers. Councillors rely on the commitment and professionalism of our council's staff because people will fairly form their opinions about our council in light of their contact with officers and the effectiveness of our services – like the weekly collection of our household rubbish; food safety inspections; and the challenging work in operating the planning laws. We should



not take these services for granted.

Three of our officers to whom I presented awards have served our council for 20 years: two have served for 25 years. From time to time individual staff members will leave when they are ready for promotion to higher posts because, as a relatively small district council, we do not, at the time, have the higher post vacancies. That is fair and reasonable. Officers wanting to progress to higher posts should be free to move onwards and upwards, to the advantage of all of us! Equally, we value staff who stay with us, giving us all the value of the experience they have gained in their work.


Volunteer Action launches Enhanced Referral Service

Council calls on residents to 'freeze not throw away' during Food Safety Week

East Northamptonshire Council (ENC) supported this year's Food Safety Week (4th–10th July), which aimed to help people understand how to waste less food, by making more use of their freezers.

New research from the Food Standards Agency (FSA) has revealed that 68% of UK adults report they have thrown food away in the past month.

This contributes to the seven million tonnes of food that is wasted in the UK each year which, according to the Love Food Hate Waste campaign, costs each household around £470 annually.

ENC backed the FSA's campaign to encourage residents in East Northamptonshire and across the UK to help tackle the problem of food waste by planning ahead and, if necessary, to freeze food within its use by date if there is a chance of throwing it away once the use-by date expires.

Cllr Steven North, Leader of ENC, said: "Reducing waste is a key priority for East Northamptonshire Council and by supporting this campaign we recognise the importance of keeping residents and businesses well informed and healthy, with

the added bonus of helping them to get better value from their weekly shop."

ENC Environmental Health Officer, Anneli Tattersall, added: "Lots of people believe food can only be frozen on the day of purchase, but the freezer is like a pause button and you can safely freeze most foods right up to the use by date. Although we recommend you freeze it as soon as you know you aren't going to use it, before its use by date expires.

"With so much food being thrown away in the UK each year, we want East Northamptonshire residents to think about how they can use their freezers to their full potential, rather than putting food in the bin."
