Editor's notes

A recent return trip to north Wales, which Satnav suggested would be three plus hours each way, turned into a very extended day because of roadworks, accidents and collapsed drains! It's not unnatural to have an aversion to going anywhere near the M25 because of the potential for delays, especially on Fridays, but in this case the M6 in Staffordshire on a Tuesday was just as bad. This leads to conjecture about the state of the nation's infrastructure and in particular the cost to the economy of delays on our roads.

Reputable studies have put the cost of vehicle delays caused by congestion in London alone at between £2bn and £4bn per year, with up to £750 million of this due to roadworks, around £2,000 per road work per hour.

Obviously, the works are necessary for longer-term improvements but the 'jam tomorrow' seems to be a long time coming. Perhaps we should reconsider increasing the use of waterways, and rail, for freight and do our bit towards reducing the number of vehicles on the roads by not shopping on the web! Any

I've been struggling with my finances for a while, and now it's got to the point where I can't afford bills like council tax or my mortgage. I'm worried that

if I can't find a solution soon, I might have to sell my home. What can I do?
 The month after Christmas can be particularly tough, with extra expenses over the festive period putting even more pressure on household

budgets. If you are facing New Year debts don't panic. With the right help there are ways to get on top of your outstanding bills.

Firstly, the earlier you get help with debt problems, the easier it is to get them sorted. Trying to carry on as if everything is normal can make things worse, as debts can pile up quickly. Letting your creditors, like your mortgage company or local council, know if you will be unable to pay them is key. Creditors should consider reasonable repayment plans and may be able to offer you more time to pay.

It is important that you prioritise paying certain debts, such as the rent, mortgage or energy bills, first to keep a roof over your head and the heating on. Depending on your circumstances, you may be able to get support through benefits, so it is worth checking this with the Department for Work and Pensions. If you are unable

to pay your council tax debt the local authority may agree to let you pay a reduced payment over a longer period or even in exceptional circumstances write off the debt, but you will have to keep paying your ongoing bill going forward.

Drawing up a proper budget of your expenses can help identify areas you can cut down on. Before you turn to a loan to cover

costs, think carefully and find out what this means for any future repayments and interest that will be due on the loan. Citizens Advice Bureaux offer free, confidential and independent advice, can help work out costs and negotiate with your creditors, and may be able to help you get debt-free by looking at appropriate options available for you.

Collyweston to stage new survey

A survey is gathering ideas and support for the future of one of our most historic villages.

‘Shaping Collyweston’ is at the first stage of a two-year project aiming to create a robust Neighbourhood Plan that will give planners, residents and people who work there clear guidelines for future development in and around the home of Collyweston stone slates.

Fiona Cowan, who leads the project, said: “We’re asking people to think in a bit of detail about where they live and how they feel about it. Not everyone can have strong feelings about absolutely everything – but it would be great if people can share what they do care deeply about.

“In the past, it has felt as if the people who

actually live or work here don’t have any real say in what can or can’t be built in Collyweston. Over the years we’ve lost bus services, our primary school, shops, youth club, the post office and a number of public houses. There have been threats to remove grit bins that people rely on in the worst weather, and we expect to be told soon that our red telephone box isn’t cost-effective.

“But we’ve also gained a village shop run by volunteers, playground equipment and a multi-use sports area, a mobile library, a pocket park and a regular Wellbeing Bus – and recently a toddlers group has sprung up, running

alongside our Friday Café in the village hall. The hall itself was extended and refurbished by volunteers, who worked hard to find sponsorship and grants, as well as doing a lot of the work themselves. And we have Permissive Footpaths and a Right of Way, opening up safer walking routes in the area.

“Looking back further, it was local craftsmen who funded and built our stone bus shelters, and who have looked after many of the traditional drystone walls that surround our public spaces. Today, it’s volunteers who keep our church and village hall going, despite the never-ending pressures of modern life.”

Welcome to my December business column, the last one of the year. This month I am featuring one of our local high street shops, which is based on High Street South in Rushden and will be of particular interest to our dog loving readers.

We all need to support our precious high streets and town centres, which offer a variety of goods and services often within walking distance, and also play a key part in keeping the community together, especially in these internet times. So it really is a case of 'use it or lose it'.

Asian Fusion grooming is a mixture of conventional and traditional styling with Asian styles and techniques, which will give your much loved pooch a different look.

I also asked him how I keep Kira's white beard free from staining. Ashley advised to check that what you are feeding your dog doesn't contain food colourings, which can cause staining.

To end a busy year celebrating the 300th Anniversary of the birth of Lancelot 'Capability' Brown, the Northamptonshire Gardens Trust were delighted to have gifted trees to all those groups from Wellingborough and East Northants who visited the wonderful Brownian landscape at Castle Ashby in July. These visits were part of an ambitious project aiming to encourage a wider, more diverse audience to visit, learn about and enjoy Brown's landscapes as part of the Capability Brown 2016 Festival. This festival was managed by the Landscape Institute and funded with a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund.

On a beautifully sunny morning on Monday 28th November, five trees were delivered to a variety of sites and in the very capable hands of 'Capability' Brown two Rowan trees were planted at Rowangate

School and the Warwick Academy in Wellingborough and a Hawthorne at Southwood House for adults with disabilities, also in Wellingborough.

Owing to limitations of space, Rowangate School in Rushden and the SERVE Therapy Centre in Higham Ferrers received crab apple trees in pots to brighten their urban environments. Each tree was ceremoniously planted with the help of pupils, residents and of course, 'Capability' Brown.




