Oarsome Oundle rowers win

Once the details have been updated a service of re-dedication must be held at the memorial. It would be wonderful if all this could be complete before 11th November 2018.

Genealogy jottings

I was undertaking some research for a chap the other week on a family in Cornwall. I found an ancestor aged 16 recorded in the census as the daughter of a couple – who were aged 70 and 67. Hmm... I think not!

Upon researching further, I established that she was in fact the granddaughter of the couple and her mother was not with them. The mother had been sent away to have the baby – in fact, out of the county – and the girl was raised as the couple's own child. This was probably so as to avoid the shame that an illegitimate child could have brought upon the family. I think that it would be different nowadays, but not nearly 200 years ago.

One clue as to whom the father could have been was the child's middle name. I have seen this many times – my great grandmother, whom I mentioned a couple of weeks ago, was Ann Mascall Cowling, Mascall being her father's surname. I also have another great grandmother by the name of Mary Ann Dean Scott – the name Scott being that of her mother and Dean being the surname of her father. These clues lurk nicely

in those names. If you are lucky enough to lay your hands on copies of the original baptism registers you may even find that the parish clerk has recorded the 'purported father to be...'

By the way, don't just assume that because more than one family in an area have the same surname that they are related – tempting though it may be! On my Smith side of the family, I am grateful that they stayed in the same village for over 200 years. However, so did another family called Smith. The other family were farmers – mine were Ag Labs! You might want to look into DNA testing and there are many companies around that offer this facility. They will match yours against their database and then you might, just might, find a connection perhaps as many as 10 generations earlier. Happy hunting!

Editor's notes

Northamptonshire County Council's Cabinet is set to start consultation on budget savings totalling £9.6million. Unprecedented demand for local services coupled with reducing levels of central government funding mean the authority is facing a severe financial challenge. Last month, the County Council launched a campaign calling on the Government for a review of the funding model for local authorities to better reflect today's population data and demand pressures.

The budget savings due to be discussed by Cabinet include a review of Northamptonshire libraries and exploring opportunities for increased community involvement, changes to the highways maintenance programme, a reduction in funding for Trading Standards and Corby children's centres, and the removal of bus subsidies.

Council leader Councillor Heather Smith said: "There is no denying that there are difficult decisions to be made, and the proposals we have before us will undoubtedly have an impact on local communities. Therefore, what we are looking to do with some of these proposals is gauge what role local communities themselves could have in the running of these services. Like all public sector organisations in Northamptonshire, we are finding it increasingly difficult to protect frontline services and, without an increase

in government funding, we are faced with no choice but to review some of our discretionary services as we work to deliver a balanced budget."

With Bonfire Night approaching there is some timely advice from East Northants Council (ENC) about bonfires in general. Although there is a common misconception that there are bylaws restricting when someone can have a bonfire and that they can only be lit at certain times, this is not the case. Nonetheless we should recognise that garden or domestic bonfire smoke can cause problems for those who are exposed to it. The smoke could potentially contain gases and particles which can be prejudicial to health and can also affect the environment. Smoke caused by garden bonfires could be a statutory nuisance, and you could be fined up to £5,000.

So, if you must have a bonfire you should observe the following advice: don't burn household rubbish, plastic, rubber, furniture, foam or tarred felt and don't light a bonfire if it is wet or windy; never leave a bonfire unsupervised or leave it to smoulder, douse it with soil or water if necessary; site the bonfire so that it causes the least disturbance to your neighbours and do take into account the wind direction; finally, only burn dry material so as to reduce the amount of smoke produced. 

When the Oundle Friendly Darts League begin their 20th season this month, one of their first duties will be to decide which charity to support through their Fun Nights.

If you enjoy evenings in good company and a jovial atmosphere, with a leisurely game of darts thrown in, then the Oundle Friendly Darts League is for you. RBL unveils new plaque

The Royal British Legion Rushden Branch and invited guests attended an unveiling of a plaque at Alfred Street Junior School to commemorate the 77th anniversary of the bombing of the school on 3rd October 1940.

Some of the guests had been present at the time of the bombing and there was a brief report published at the time, read out by Mr Craig Butler, Deputy Head Teacher, alongside the names of the children who'd lost their lives.

The school choir performed three

WW2 songs that they had been learning from their music lessons. Newly appointed Head Teacher Mrs Kelly O'Connor then invited guests to witness the unveiling of the plaque on the school building parallel to Alfred Street by Mr Harry Graham MBE, RBL Rushden Vice President and former Governor of the School.

Finally, children from Years 3 and 4 (the age of the pupils who died), planted two new shrubs in the school's Memorial Garden.



Sing your pain away!

Sounds flippant doesn't it? Or if your singing is anything like mine it sounds blooming awful! But it works. Research last year showed that people who liked singing had a significant drop in cortisol levels after doing so.

What does that mean?

Well, cortisol is often called the stress hormone. It is released when you are under pressure and it can make your brain think your pain has got worse.

The singing research shows that if you like singing you are likely to feel less pain after singing. Currently there is no research into whether you'll feel better if you don't like singing, but let's face it, when you're in pain you'll try anything.

More importantly the research would suggest that if you are doing something you like there is a real possibility you can decrease your cortisol levels, which can then decrease your pain.

So, what do you like doing? Are you making time for your hobbies? If singing is your thing, are you

able to sing on your way to work? Or in the shower? Or while you make dinner?

Of course singing isn't actually going to fix an injury or cure the common cold. But if you're in pain from an injury, or worse, if you suffer from chronic pain, then this is still great news. Singing is free, needs no equipment and providing you don't have a sore throat it cannot cause any damage.

So, if you're in pain start singing if you love singing. Dance, if you want to. Try to make sure that you're doing something that makes you feel happy to reduce your cortisol levels.

And before you ask, no, I couldn't find any research into lawnmower use and cortisol. My own experience would suggest that mowing the lawn raises stress levels and cortisol levels.

So it increases pain.

Top Tip: Remember that singing uses muscles. Do a gentle bit of la la before you belt out your favourite pop song.



The Battle of El Alamein

This October is the 75th anniversary of the Battle of El Alamein, one of the most decisive battles of the Second World War. El Alamein marked a watershed for the Allies – before it they had lost every campaign, and after it they won every campaign.

To mark the occasion Oundle U3A Military History groups will be giving a talk at Oundle Library on Wednesday 25th October at 11.30am.

"This will be the third year we've given a talk at the library, and it's good fun for our groups to work together on a project," says Graham Evans.

"Our planning involves a lot of discussion about what are the critical things to include and how to structure our presentations. We don't ever just cover military tactics because

battles don't happen in isolation. We enjoy looking at the background and aftermath, as well as considering the wider political and military implications."

This year's talk will cover why the Battle of El Alamein was so critical to the Allied cause, as well as the leadership and logistics challenges faced by both sides. The team will describe how the battle unfolded and explain how the Allies used Ultra secret intelligence to gain the advantage. They will also discuss the use of Special Forces (the Long Range Desert Group and the Special Air Service).

The talk will take place at Oundle Library on Wednesday 25th October. Admission is free and refreshments will be available.

Wildlife News

What kind of creature do you think of to fit the word 'daddy long legs'? (clue: it is not a childish word for farmer!).

Strangely there are two common creatures which have gained that label, one an insect and the other a spider. The experts will argue however that scientifically there are too many differences from proper spiders to put it into that class. These should be called harvestmen, linked in folklore to spiders because of their appearance.

At times they are found in our houses, where its greyish-brown pea-sized body is supported on the eight very long legs. A closer look can show that the second (from the front) pair is noticeably longer than the others, but the spread of those long legs gives it the mysterious spidery look. It feeds on fungus and minute insects, which it kills not by injecting venom, like true spiders, but by grabbing its prey in its powerful jaws and squeezing it to death (odd to think of that small body crushing anything!).

The other little creature given that name from its appearance is the crane fly, which we are most likely to meet when out for a walk in late summer, and they annoy us simply by fluttering their long legs around our faces. A few days ago I saw one round the edge of one of our local lakes, though it probably came from the coarse grass alongside the path; almost certainly it was in the last days of its life, as it is highly unlikely that it would live through the winter cold. They lay eggs in the grass roots, and they will hatch into greyish-white grubs whose tough skin gave them their own special name: leatherjacket. Anyone whose job involves caring for lawns will not want to see them because they feed on roots of grasses, killing the plants. Luckily some predators, such as rooks, find them tasty titbits, helping lawnkeepers at the same time.

But whichever of these you meet you will soon see how they get their nickname!

childcare.


The room was well organised with different areas of activities which are changed on a regular basis to inspire the children. Every week is different, with well planned activities that aim to achieve the seven goals as set by the Early Years Foundation. The focus for this week was

'Sharing our Ideas' which teaches the children to interact with each other, hold a conversation and express their own ideas, which the children were really enjoying on my visit and did so with much enthusiasm.

On Tuesday afternoons the children are taken out and about for adventures to places like the Lakes and Meadows for countryside walks to learn about the wildlife, or taken to

the High Street shops in Irthlingborough to learn about money and how to buy items.

There are also trips to the library where the children learn how to use the facilities and are taught the joys of reading. These trips teach the children all about road safety and how to behave in community environments. Along with the specially designed indoor activities these make up

Each child has an allocated carer who assists them in achieving their early learning goals in preparation for the move to infant school. Development and growth is a priority for JAK's who also encourage independence, caring for each other and good manners. The children are also taught sign language as adults speak quite quickly and signing slows down speech so children can learn speech more effectively. JAK's also cater for special needs children along with children in the age range from 2 years to school age. All parents receive a welcome pack which lists the goals set out

for their child.


