Irthlingborough Business Forum to help local companies

Formed six months ago, Irthlingborough Business Forum has become the voice of local businesses.

Formed by Cllr Roger Powell, managing partner of RSP Promotions and a distinguished author,

the Forum has attracted over 35 attendees from the community and works closely with the Federation of Small Businesses, who are co-partners. Roger decided to create the forum to help create more business opportunities in the community.

Roger said: "The Forum was set up to help raise funds for local businesses."

The Forum has set out the following aims:

- To enable members of the business community to come together for networking and support;
- To facilitate an exchange of ideas and information between local businesses, local authorities and other organisations and to promote a greater understanding of the local economy;
- To promote Irthlingborough as an attractive location for business;
- To raise awareness of the needs of local businesses and the factors affecting

local economic growth and prosperity.

"We want to be intermediaries between employers and local and national government," Roger continued.

In the short term the Forum also plans to raise funds to help the local community and protect the leisure facilities in the town including the football stadium, which could be used as a leisure and conference facility thus benefiting the town and the wider community.

One of their long-term aims is to see a business park in the area.

Paul Garcia, Director of Salon Serve based in Waterside House, said: "We want to raise the profile of the community, and give businesses a voice."

Working with local schools and colleges the Forum also hopes to help promote apprenticeships in the town. They hope that by working with students they will be able to keep talent

in the community, to fill positions some of the larger companies offer as well as vacancies within the smaller businesses.

To raise funds, Roger has a few plans for events, one of which will include a re-enactment of the Battle of Waterloo. Roger is currently working with the Waterloo 200 committee for the event. Other ideas include having an outdoor cinema during the summer months and brass bands amongst many others.

Collyweston residents celebrate completion of affordable homes

Northamptonshire Rural Housing Association (NRHA) has completed six new homes in Collyweston and celebrated the achievement with the new residents and partners during Rural Housing Week.

The celebration tied in with the launch of Rural Housing: Countryside in Crisis, a new publication from the National Housing Federation. The publication highlights the challenges faced by those living in rural areas, including the lack of affordable homes for young people in rural locations.

Recruitment account manager Daisy and Mathew, who works in retail, were both living with parents but wanted their own space. Daisy explained: "We really wanted to be in Collyweston, as it's close to our families, and easy for us both to get to work, but the minimum rent in the village is over £900 a month and we just couldn't afford it."

Mathew has lived in Collyweston his whole life, and when they realised that NRHA was building a small development with priority for local people, they found they were eligible to apply for a home. The homes included two bedroom homes for affordable rent, and they applied to become the tenants.

Daisy and Mathew moved into their new house in May, and already it feels like home.

They have also made great friends with their next door neighbours.

Daisy said: "We were so pleased to be allocated one of the two bedroom houses. We've been really lucky to find such a great new home in our village. I'm really pleased we can afford to stay in Collyweston and hope we will be here for many years!"

NRHA Chairman Christopher Sparrow said: "It's always a pleasure to talk to new residents and find out what a difference their new homes are making to their lives. Whilst it is vital to build new homes that are a sympathetic addition to an existing community, this is just the start. Enabling residents like Daisy and Mathew to get their first home is a very important part of the work we do."

"There is a real need for more affordable homes in the county's villages, so we are pleased to be officially opening this development in Collyweston during Rural Housing Week. This gives us a chance to celebrate the excellent services delivered by housing associations in rural areas and highlight the housing challenges people in rural communities face."

Shelagh Busby is the Chairman of Collyweston Parish Council. She said: "We are

really pleased to have been involved with this development from the beginning. The design and materials fit in very well with our rural area.

"Thanks must go to all the people that have worked so hard to complete the houses and to make the landscaping look as if it has

been here a long time. May I welcome the new residents, I hope they enjoy being part of the Collyweston community."

The development was part funded by the Homes and Communities Agency. The developer was emh homes and Whiterock Homes was the contractor.

Irthlingborough resident Dean Swain, who was diagnosed with skin cancer, sadly passed away in June, but not before his final wish was granted.

Swain, a mechanic, had his wish to sit in his beloved Ford Sierra, which he had sold three years previously, after friends and family took to the Internet to track down the 1991 RS Cosworth.

Searching on specialist Ford sites and using social networking, they found the car just six hours later in Mansfield, Nottingham. Before selling the car Dean had taken care of it for 11 years, and in 2006 it took pride of place when he married his wife, Kara.

Since Dean passed away his family and friends have raised over £4,000 for Macmillan Cancer Support and they are now raising money to buy the

car from the current owners, who have agreed to sell it to Kara for £10,000. Since 'Get Daddy's Car Back' was created on Facebook there have been donations of over £3,400 from the UK, the USA and Australia.

The family plans to turn the car into a fundraising tool for

Macmillan, to be known as the Macmillan Cosworth. It has already been invited to the national Ford show and Beaulieu National Motor Museum in Hampshire.

Dean's cousin, Dennis Munden said: "It would mean so much to all the family if we could get Dean's car back.

"Hopefully in years to come, his son can take it out to car shows and raise even more money for Macmillan."



Post, which once stood on Thrapston Wharf and St James' Church with the tomb of Sir John Washington, relative to the American president. 

Vital restoration work continues at nature reserve

This summer there will be lots of important restoration work taking place at Irthlingborough Lakes and Meadows nature reserve, which is owned and managed by the Wildlife Trust for Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire and Northamptonshire.

Although there will be some temporary disruption on site over the next few months, these improvements will enhance the reserve for both wildlife and visitors.

Works will include path resurfacing, improvements to areas of grassland, the installation of bridges and the creation of

water channels and scrapes to help connect the grassland and lakes in areas which are important for over-wintering wetland birds.

There will also be fencing installed along the cycle path, in preparation for the introduction of cattle grazing on the site. Islands will be created on some of the lakes where there are existing spits of land by cutting channels across them to help encourage wetland birds to breed, such as lapwing and snipe.

Ian Wilson, Reserves Officer at the Wildlife Trust, said: "The work we are doing should reduce flooding of the cycle path and improve habitats for wetland bird species at this internationally important site."

Culture Week: 'The Bohemian Life'

Do schools encourage conformity? Is original thought frowned upon? Can one be a genuine individual at a school such as Oundle School?

Pupils in the Second Form (Year 8) at Oundle School could perhaps give a better answer than most, having just spent a week exploring 'The Bohemian Life' as part of Culture Week, an annual event which this year took place from 23rd–26th June.

A cross-curricular initiative, Culture Week links areas such as literature, music, art, drama, movement, film, philosophy, science and the world around us all.

A bohemian is typically defined as 'a person with artistic or literary interests who disregards conventional standards of behaviour.' Through the theme of 'The Bohemian Life', time was dedicated to counter-culture, rebellion and the concept of living for one's art.

Director of Studies, Ben Evans, commented: "We hope to break down the barriers between individual subjects and instead allow the pupils to explore and learn within a framework that is unconstrained by syllabi and exams."

Culture Week 2014 intended to challenge conformity, to promote originality and to provide a learning experience like no other.

Diverse bohemian figures such as Henri Gaudier-Brzeska, Alan Turing, Lytton Strachey and Giacomo Puccini took centre stage for a week of education that looked to 'sow seeds' for each one of the 64 participants.

During Culture Week, Second Form pupils did not attend school lessons but were instead split into groups and enjoyed a variety of activities including:

- **FILM:** Pupils watched and reviewed Baz Luhrmann's musical *Moulin Rouge*, set in a fantasy CGI Paris of the 1890s.
- **LITERATURE:** Drawing upon the bohemian outlook of challenging traditional values, pupils looked at a selection of texts which challenge traditional approaches, ranging from comic books to *Private Eye*, to Lytton Strachey's *Eminent Victorians*; with opportunities for them to write for themselves in one

of these 'challenging' styles.

- **ART:** Flower Power originated in Berkeley, California, as a symbolic action of protest against the Vietnam War. Pupils created their own flowers using a variety of paper folding methods; some simply cut, others more complicated using origami techniques. Many of these were added to the 'Flower Power Jacket' whilst others became part of a large decorative bouquet.

One of the other highlights of Culture Week was a visit to Cambridge.

In the morning, pupils joined an experienced artist at Kettle's Yard to look at the work of Henri Gaudier Brzeska; they heard an introduction to his work before having an opportunity to create masterpieces of their own, by carving images from art soap using a range of tools. After lunch, they moved to the Fitzwilliam Museum where they were treated to the museum's collection of 20th Century Art.

- **MUSIC:** Puccini's famous opera *La Bohème* was first staged in 1897. Music and History teachers brought to life the story with the aid of musical excerpts from the 2009 film version, to take pupils through the dramatic unfolding of events in this most tuneful of popular operas.
- **DANCE:** The Dance and Movement sessions looked at ways in which strong emotions can be expressed through movement; the session drew upon operatic scores and the soundtrack from *Moulin Rouge*, forming connections between this and other aspects of the Culture Week programme.
- **DESIGN TECHNOLOGY:** Using 'hippy' and 'punk' as two counter-culture starting points, pupils were each given a plain chef's

jacket. They were then asked to decorate them with paint, plastics and anything else they can find to individualise the jackets before wearing it as a statement of their own translation of non-conformity at Oundle School.

- **PHILOSOPHY:** Will hiding our differences help us to be more tolerant of each other? Is freedom of expression more important than community? Do some people deserve not to be listened to? Based on the pedagogical methods of the Philosophy Foundation, the philosophy sessions explored themes surrounding democracy, tradition and change.

Pupils engaged in dialogue with one another to question and critique the leadership of today's society by exploring preconceptions about the British government. Invited to challenge the status quo, pupils had the opportunity to think dialectically and ensure they understand what is meant by 'normal'.

- **SCIENCE:** Science sessions explored the lives and work of those scientists who evoke the spirit of the bohemian. Scientific genius with a touch of bohemianism could well be applied to the following names: Richard Feynman, Galileo Galilei, Alan Turing, Isaac Newton, Robert Hooke, Richard Owen, Charles Darwin, and Ernest Rutherford.

Pupils had the chance to learn about some or all of these individuals during the week; their contribution to scientific understanding, and what marked them out as bohemians across the ages. At a higher level, pupils were also introduced to the concepts and themes of the Michael Frayn play *Copenhagen*, about the meeting between Niels Bohr and Werner Heisenberg.

Please don't spoil your recycling bin

Residents are reminded to check that the contents of their green lidded recycling bin only contains items which can actually be recycled.

The contents of the green lidded bins are sent to Pure Recycling's Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) for sorting into the separate materials so they can be recycled. Whilst the vast majority are acceptable and good for recycling, some of the contents cannot be recycled through the bins and in some cases this can cause significant problems.

Materials are sorted at the MRF using the latest hi-tech sorting technology. Adding a new material to the sorting process, without the proper machinery to sort that material, can cause significant problems. This can sometimes result in the MRF having to be shut down for a while so that the machinery can be cleaned or repaired. Contaminants also affect the quality of the end material.

The main items that shouldn't go into the recycling bins because they can damage MRF machinery or spoil recycling are:

- Clothing and bedding**
- Material in black sacks – it is assumed

they have rubbish in them, so they are removed rather than risk the contents spoiling other materials. Black sacks should only be put in your grey lidded refuse bin.

- Metal items other than cans (cutlery, venetian blinds, saucepans etc.)*
- Electrical goods and cables (toasters, kettles, DVD players etc.)*
- Plastic toys and plastic film
- Plastic housewares (washing up bowls, brushes etc.)
- Plastic bags
- Crisp packets/sweet wrappers
- Pouch type food/drink containers
- Food
- Expanded polystyrene
- Cigarette butts

*Electrical items and metal items can be taken to Northamptonshire County Council Household Recycling Centres.




Arthingworth Walk



Lomo de Cerdo Adobado con Salsa de Pimientos y Chorizo / Marinated Pork Loin Steak with Bell Peppers and Chorizo Salsa.

INGREDIENTS

6 pork loin steaks – de-boned about 2cm thick (I bought the pork loin steaks from my local butcher, Trendalls in Oundle, who cut them to perfect thickness. Supermarket loin steaks tend to be too thinly cut. Reduce cooking time if using a thinner steak.)

1 tbsp white wine
Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

For the Marinade (Dried herbs are used. If you use fresh, double the quantities of the herbs.)

2 tsp Spanish smoked sweet paprika (or the piquant if you prefer a little heat)
1 tsp oregano
1 tsp thyme
1 tsp rosemary
½ tsp black pepper – freshly ground
1 tbsp olive oil
1 garlic clove, crushed
1 tbsp white wine
1 tbsp sherry vinegar (or red wine vinegar)

For the Peppers and Chorizo Salsa

2 red bell peppers – cut into strips
2 shallots diced (or 2 small red onions)
2 tomatoes diced
1 garlic clove – crushed
10 black or kalamata style olives – pitted and quartered
12 capers (optional)
30g Spanish chorizo – thinly sliced and cut into strips
2 tbsp olive oil
1 tbsp sherry vinegar (or red wine vinegar)
Zest of 1 lime or ½ lemon
2 tbsp flaked unsalted almonds
2 tbsp parsley – finely chopped

For the Bell Pepper Salad

4 bell peppers – mixed colours: 2 red, 1 green and 1 yellow or orange
1 red onion
Extra virgin oil for dressing salad
Cider or white wine vinegar
½ cup flat leaf parsley chopped (extra if serving with boiled potatoes)
Salt
Black pepper

METHOD

- Mix all the marinade ingredients in a large glass bowl. Rub into the pork steaks, ensuring they are well covered with the mix. Leave out for about an hour or 3 hours in the fridge.

- Lightly toast the almonds in a dry pan and set aside.
- Add a splash of olive oil to a low-to-medium hot pan. Add shallots (or onions) and garlic and sauté gently for 1 or 2 minutes until softened.
- Add chorizo and peppers and continue cooking for 2 minutes.
- Add tomatoes and vinegar. Cook for 3 minutes or until tomatoes start to break down.
- Add olives, capers, zest and 1 tbsp parsley and cook for 3 minutes.
- Add ½ the toasted almonds.
- Taste for seasoning and add salt or pepper if needed.
- Turn the heat right down and cover with the lid to keep warm and stop the sauce from reducing any further.
- Remove steaks from the marinade and scrape off the marinade mixture. Season lightly with salt and pepper.
- Heat a large pan to medium-high heat.
- Add olive oil to pan. Fry the steaks for 2 minutes (or a bit longer if you prefer well-done) on each side. If your pan is not big enough for all the steaks, do them in two batches. Try not to overcrowd the pan as the steaks will 'stew' rather than fry; frying caramelises and adds flavour.
- Remove steaks and cover to keep warm. Rest for 3 to 5 minutes.
- Pour off any excess oil from the pan. Turn the heat to high and pour in wine to deglaze the pan, stirring to blend in any tasty bits left in the pan. This should take about 30 seconds.
- Pour the reduced wine into the sauce and stir.
- Plate the steaks and ½ cover the steaks with the sauce. Sprinkle the remaining parsley and almonds over sauce.
- Serve with the Bell Pepper Salad and boiled potatoes (peeled and tossed with olive oil, salt, pepper and chopped parsley) or a pile of crispy potato chips.

CHEF'S NOTES

Traditionally the sardines are left whole, un-gutted, but they must be very fresh. If you are using defrosted sardines, or if you are only going to use the fresh sardines a day or two after purchase, then it's best to gut them. Take extra care when turning them, as they will be more fragile when gutted.

An ice cold bottle of Vinho Verde from Portugal's northernmost province, Minho (on the border with Spain), is the perfect accompaniment. Or just a well-chilled beer.

Legal order gives effect to parish boundary changes in East Northamptonshire

Following a year-long review of parish arrangements in the district, East Northamptonshire Council has now made the legal order which will bring the changes into force.

The changes affect parish boundaries and the way that a small number of parish and town councils are set up. They will come into effect on 15th

October 2014, but for practical purposes the first time things will change will be at the local elections in May 2015. The council will now ask the Local Government Boundary Commission for England to make the corresponding changes to the district ward and county electoral division boundaries.

To change the lives of young people by showing them God's love through what we do. Also to provide them with a safe environment where they can express themselves as they wish.

The Club's Goals are in a similar vein:

- To build relationships with the young people of Rushden
- To try and provide a Christian message where we are able
- To give the young people freedom of choice within the youth centre
- To have a building for the youth of Rushden, somewhere they can go and chill out and have time for themselves
- Judgement Free Policy (Never Say No)

The whole concept is the idea of 18-year-old Sam Perkins, a young man who had a Christian upbringing, attended Rushden Community College, leaving at the age of 16 to join Rushden Park Road Baptist Church as their Intern Youth Worker. This involved him in the organisation of the 'Worship 4 All' events, helping with the youth groups and organising the 'drop in for a heavenly cuppa!'

After a year at the church, Sam left to spend four months in Nottingham with the 'Youth for Christ' organisation returning in 2014 to "answer God's calling to set up the Youth Centre."

The Centre, which is open from 7.30pm to 9.00pm every Monday and Wednesday night, currently has around 50 members with more young people joining each week. The Club runs weekly drop-ins, quiz nights, band nights, a members' parents' group and has a regular 'Live' spot on Wednesday nights on the local Rushden based radio station Radio Northants.

Northants man appointed Chairman of The Leprosy Mission England and Wales

The managing director of local joinery manufacturer Scotts of Thrapston once crossed the road to avoid people with leprosy while backpacking in India in the 1990s.

But now Peter Waddup, who was born and bred in Northampton, attending Northampton School for Boys, has been appointed Chairman of The Leprosy Mission England and Wales.

After his backpacking experience, thoughts of this most marginalised group stuck in Peter's memory. After he found out that the late National Director of The Leprosy Mission England and Wales, Rupert Haydock, attended his church, he would "corner him" every Sunday to ask more about the work of the mission.

In 2009, Peter was asked to join the Board of Trustees at The Leprosy Mission England and Wales and one year later became the Treasurer and Chairman of the Finance and Planning committee.

On the day he became Treasurer, Peter was advised by Rupert that he should visit one of The Leprosy Mission's projects. Rupert suddenly died the following week and Peter, remembering his final words, arranged to visit projects in Kolkata and West Bengal, India, in February 2011. In December 2013 he travelled to Ethiopia with Ann Widdecombe, Vice-President of The Leprosy Mission England and Wales, to witness first-hand the Woreda 1 slum transformation project in Addis Ababa.

Peter, who lives in Oundle, said: "I had travelled as a backpacker through Rajasthan in India back in 1993 and must confess to crossing the road to avoid people with leprosy. How little I knew then, and how fortunate for me to be able to compensate now for those actions that were so wrong and misguided."

"I was thrilled and humbled when the outgoing Chairman, Colin Osborne, asked if I would consider becoming the new Chairman. My hopes for the Board during my term are to see the passion for this amazing cause sustained by the trustees and to support and assist the new National Director, Peter Walker in any way I can. I love to visit the offices in Peterborough and see the dedication of the staff for this amazing work."



A visit to the Somme

A few weeks ago my eye was drawn to the colourful, flower-filled troughs around the Oundle war memorial and the carved names of the local men who lost their lives during World War One.

As my husband and I were planning to spend a few days on the Somme, I decided to find out whether any of the men listed were buried in the Picardie region. Fortunately I discovered an excellent publication in the local bookshop which helped enormously with my research, 'Shadows of the Past: The Oundle War Memorial Men' by Ray Rundle. The Commonwealth War Graves Commission website was also a useful source of information and helped us find some of the more remote cemeteries.

The Péronne communal cemetery extension was the first site we visited. We found the headstone of Sergeant B L Siddons amongst those of his comrades in the Australian Imperial Force; Siddons having emigrated to New South Wales before the Great War, according to Rundle. In order to locate the graves of other Oundle men, we travelled to several cemeteries in the Somme area, the smallest containing 100 burials and the largest with 2,758 headstones.

In Bazentin-le-Petit we discovered special memorial stones for 59 men – mainly 1st Northamptonshires including Private Frederick Phillipson – whose graves had been destroyed in a subsequent battle.

The most poignant memorial we visited was the Lutyens-designed building at Thiepval, dedicated to over 72,000 missing British and

Commonwealth servicemen. We found the names of seven Oundle men inscribed on memorial panels for the Northamptonshire and London Scottish Regiments.

As a result of our trip we were able to make a connection with the following young men and their final resting places or memorials on the Somme:

Nene Valley Time Trail

THE TRAMPS PALACE
On 18th December 1933, the Joint Committee and Assistance Board opened a new 'Casual Ward' at Irthlingborough. The site was near to what is now the Diamond Centre and is now office accommodation.

However, back in 1933, this was a very forward-thinking plan and a wonderful building designed to provide for those who spent "hours of wearying journeying on the roads" and needed comfort at the end of the day (in other words – for tramps).

Such was the accommodation provided that plans were made for the immediate closure of overcrowded Casual Wards in Kettering, Thrapston, Wellingborough and Oundle.

The contract for the building was awarded to Messrs W Thompson of Irthlingborough, whose tender of £14,000 was the lowest estimate out of 19 firms. The cost caused great resentment among local people when they learned of the facilities provided.

Under normal circumstances a vagrant was allowed to stay for two nights, though no one was discharged on Christmas Day. After registering, vagrants would be passed to the bathroom where they would put their clothes into a cupboard or a drying

room if wet. After that a male tramp would be sent to a dormitory containing 20 beds and then given a supper which invariably consisted of 8oz bread, 1oz dripping and a pint of tea. Women and children went to their own room with up to 15 beds, where they were cared for by a matron.

In the morning, the Casuals would find their dried clothes outside their door and would then be given a breakfast of 8oz bread, 1oz margarine and a pint of coffee. Work would then be required of all inmates. This would usually be in the gardens surrounding the building. After a second night's rest they would be sent on their way with a meal of 8oz bread and 2oz cheese.

In the five weeks leading up to Christmas 1935 a total of 2,899 tramps were sheltered and fed at Irthlingborough and these numbers led to a feeling that too many tramps were being attracted to the area.

During the war, the building was used for a variety of purposes, including a hospital for Blitz victims from London and a Girls' remand home. In 1948, it was leased to Richard Thomas and Baldwin as a hostel for foreign workers in the local ore mines.

In 1965 both the mines and the hostel were closed and the building remained empty until 1972, when it was converted to a records store by British Steel.

Where food is served, look out for the green and black food hygiene rating stickers displayed on windows and doors. If you can't see a sticker, ask staff inside for the rating or check online at: www.food.gov.uk/ratings

Julia Smith, Health Protection Manager at East Northamptonshire Council, said: "The summer holiday season is a busy time for our cafés, restaurants and pubs. With the majority of food businesses here rated 4 or above, it's easy to choose

to enjoy your meal in an eatery where food hygiene is taken seriously."

Catriona Stewart, Head of the Food Hygiene Ratings Team at the Food Standards Agency said: "The Food Hygiene Rating Scheme is a great tool when choosing where to eat out, particularly when you are in a place that you haven't visited before. It tells you what's going on in the kitchen and behind the scenes. A good rating will be good for business during the holiday period, so if you are a local eatery, make sure you remember to display your sticker!"

Their team leader will be Archery GB's Performance Coach, Songi Woo. She said: "Nanjing 2014 is going to be a fantastic

experience for our juniors. And hopefully it will be a big stepping stone up to the next level and the Olympics."

Bradley said: "Nanjing is going to be a fantastic experience for me and I'm so proud to have been selected to represent Team GB at the Youth Olympic Games. It's a big multi-sport event, which is rare for archery, so it's a chance to meet and learn from so many other athletes. Hopefully it can be a stepping stone for my dream to, one day, compete at the Olympics."
