Denford to miss out on superfast broadband rollout

On 16th August 2014 our lead article concerned the introduction of superfast broadband in Northamptonshire.

The article was based on a press release by NCC and BT. A good news story you might have believed, but it hasn't been good news for everyone in East Northants.

In particular, the residents of Denford are peeved that speeds there will not be improved. They have consulted BT and have received the following comment: "At the time of writing, there are no plans to deliver BT Infinity to your area. However, in the future there may be developments which allow us to connect customer(s) over a longer distance. I'm very sorry if this comes as a disappointment."

Since Denford was mentioned in the 16th August press release as one of the areas to benefit from superfast, local residents are certainly disappointed.

Since we need to keep you informed about issues like this, and not least because we had published the original press release, we asked the team at The Big Idea, who are leading the countywide installations, for their comments. Is there a formula which can be used to illustrate the loss of speed over the final connection to premises via 'copper wire'? How else might greater speeds be achieved?

Their response was as follows: "[T]he majority of premises which are fibre enabled will be able to access superfast speeds – however, the project website is clear that this does not apply ubiquitously to all premises in the areas mapped and that not all parts will benefit at the same time. Reasons for this are provided.

"The first stage of the Superfast Northamptonshire project being delivered with BT will roll out fibre based broadband (mostly Fibre to the Cabinet [FTTC]) to over 56,000 premises by the end of 2015, of which over 50,100 will benefit from access to superfast broadband (download speeds above 24Mbps). This information is available on the Roll Out page of the project website.

"FTTC can reach speeds of up to 80Mbps (download). The available speeds experienced by any householder connected to the same cabinet is dependent on a range of variables – including distance from the cabinet, the quality of the copper line from the cabinet, potential for 'noise' or electrical interference, the quality of the wiring internally within the premise, the age of your PC etc.

"Because there are so many variables, there is no


formula as such that we can share with you but in general terms the speeds available will gradually lessen the further away a premise is from its connecting cabinet and when approaching a distance of about a mile, the speed impact is likely to start to drop off more quickly – however, it is not an exact science.

"Around 90% of premises which will be fibre connected through the first stage of the project will benefit from access to superfast line speeds of more than 24Mbps, whilst many others will see significant speed improvements (note that the general minimum requirement to support higher performance broadband services (like BT Infinity) is a speed of at least 15Mbps). Only a few will not experience any benefit at this stage but this is not the end of the story.

"The County Council remains focused on securing full coverage through the next stages of the Superfast Northamptonshire project. The largely FTTC solution for the first stage of the project will ensure as many people and businesses can benefit from superfast broadband as soon as possible (over 50,100), whilst not everyone connected to an upgraded fibre cabinet will see the same speed benefits.

"The few localities which will not see a speed uplift benefit from the project's first stage and largely FTTC rollout will remain within our considerations as we seek to secure full coverage. We will be looking into solutions through further stages of the project. Moreover, BT is continuing to improve on the speed performance achieved over its copper network."

So... if you're thinking of changing to superfast broadband it's best to check that it's going to deliver a real benefit to your property.

The following letter was received in response to Margaret Fone's letter published in the last issue:

Dear Sirs,

Like Margaret Fone, all my garden birds have gone. They were absent last winter but reappeared in the spring, including blackbirds, sparrows, robins, woodpigeons, collared doves and other supposedly common species.

There were not many of them but the sparrows and blue tits began to breed, obviously taking away food to feed their young, but the young never appeared. The parents also disappeared. It took several weeks for the larger birds to go, along with the predators like the local sparrowhawks and magpies.

It is perhaps significant that these disappearances appeared to coincide with the post flowering spraying of oilseed rape. I can't prove this but not only did the birds disappear but the insects that they might feed on too. The greenfly on my roses didn't need me to spray them. The wasps, bees and hoverflies have gone, as have the ants and midges. There were no thunderflies this year and butterflies have been very scarce.

I'm waiting to see how many rooks return to their traditional rookeries later in the year. There are very few in the local fields. They seem to have been replaced by jackdaws which are town based birds. The birds that feed on insects high up in the air, like swifts, were not affected and did well this year.

Telling the BTO and RSPB resulted in replies that might as well have been 'You are an idiot, don't bother us.' Andy Sawford, our MP, was much more helpful and passed my concerns to the Environment Minister. I hopefully await some further action.

It's impossible for me to prove that the birds etc were poisoned as I can't produce any bodies. They don't just drop out of the sky, so it's all very circumstantial. But something is killing birds and insects on this side of the town nearest the rape fields. Could this wildlife

catastrophe affect people too? Are the local children in danger?

Health and nuisance risks for residents of Rushden – Objection to Planning Application 14/01772/FUL

We want to make the people of Rushden aware of the health and nuisance risks of Planning Application 14/01772/FUL at Norris Way Industrial Estate.

A local garage has erected three industrial chimneys on the roof of their unit without planning permission. The garage is using those chimneys to vent industrial spray paint and solvents into the air next to local houses and Alderwood LLA (a care home for young adults with autism and learning difficulties).


Planning Application 14/01772/FUL, for the chimneys, was only submitted after complaints were made to the Council about the development.

The people of Rushden are impacted by the development in the following ways:

- Potential Health Risks (toxic solvents and paints are being sprayed into the air that may carry asthma and other health risks).
- Noise Pollution (the ventilation system is built next to homes in Saxonlea Close).
- Odour (the fumes carry across Saxonlea Close, Kensington Close, Wellingborough Road and beyond).
- Loss of property value.
- Loss of amenity (local residents cannot use their gardens when the spray shop is in use).
- Visual pollution.

Anyone with concerns or comments should contact the Council immediately.

Tom Wand and John Stimpson of Thrapston completed a 100-mile fundraising cycle ride around Rutland Water, Leicestershire recently.

Both men were sponsored by AJ Cycles of Higham Ferrers. Also taking part some of the way was Phil Ashton of Kettering. The men's efforts raised £1,300 for the Action for

Asperger's autism charity of Barnwell, Northants.

Mr Wand said that the training for the ride was more hard work than the ride itself. The ride took the men seven hours and 15 minutes to complete and the total mileage covered was 108 miles.

Local artist captures spirit of aviation

Rushden based aviation and railway artist Keith Hill will be holding his 23rd Annual Exhibition in the historic setting of Rushden Hall for nine days during November.

The exhibition, which is a 'Mayoral Event', will be opened by Rushden Town Mayor Cllr Richard Lewis at 11.30am on Saturday 15th November in the presence of local Second World War Veterans. As in previous years the Veterans will be escorted by the young people of the Rushden ATC Squadron. On the opening day there will also be a small display of military vehicles.

The exhibition will feature all of Keith's latest work including, for the first time, his

new WWI Commemorative Collection, a series of ten paintings depicting aviation scenes from the First World War.

Also new this year will be two paintings marking the 70th anniversary of the disappearance of American band leader Glenn Miller.

Many of the paintings and prints on show will be those that depict local aviation and railway scenes, in particular RAF Chelveston and the Rushden branch line.

The exhibition runs from Saturday 15th until Sunday 23rd November and is open daily from 11am until 4pm. Parking and admission are both free.



Old skills offer new opportunities for young people

Unemployed local youngsters are really benefiting from a new Heritage Lottery Fund project, which lets them try their hand at traditional crafts and learn valuable new skills.

Two have obtained apprenticeships in shoemaking and bricklaying, while others have gone on to further education and employment. So far more than 20 young people have taken part in a programme of six courses, including green woodworking, basket making and dry stone walling.

Last year Rockingham Forest Trust was delighted to receive funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund to breathe new life into the heritage skills and crafts of the Nene Valley. As well as establishing the training courses in a new green oak barn at Stanwick Lakes, the 'Trading Places' project has also been busy working with communities along the Nene Valley.

One young person who recently spent three days as a blacksmith said: "I had an awesome time; it's an experience I will never forget."

The training has raised awareness of traditional trades and has provided practical experiences and skills for young people. The shoemaking course has direct employment links to local industry, while others such as dry stone walling and blacksmithing

develop skill sets that are relevant to modern employment opportunities – such as bricklaying and metal fabrication.

'Trading Places' is funded for another three years and as well as training many more young people, the project aims to open up occasional courses to the wider public. If you are interested, contact 'Trading Places' Project Manager, Stuart Taylor by emailing stuart@rftrust.org.uk

Inspector Ian Wills, from the force's Roads Policing Unit, said: "It's great that we can use our vehicles to raise awareness of Movember."

"The whole Movember movement was created to highlight the issue of men's health and encourage people to talk more openly about the issue.

"Having moustaches on our cars will hopefully encourage men across

Northamptonshire to take part by growing their own moustaches and raising money."

Since 2003, Movember has raised more than £340 million across the world and funded more than 800 programmes in 21 countries.

The money raised helps to improve the lives of men affected by prostate cancer, testicular cancer and mental health problems.

As well as the cars in Northamptonshire, police vehicles in Derbyshire, Leicestershire, Lincolnshire and Nottinghamshire will also wear moustaches during November.

The forces have challenged residents who spot any of the cars parked by the side of the road to Tweet pictures of them using the hashtag #MoPo. Motorists have been warned, however, not to take pictures of the vehicles while driving.

That came home to me last week when I attended the AGM of the Northamptonshire Association of Youth Clubs (NAYC). This is an umbrella organisation that helps nearly 400 clubs and youth groups.

We heard a performance from some marvellous young people who won the NAYC's fifth annual anti-bullying song competition. We also heard about the excellent facilities run by the Association, including Whitemoor Lakes activity centre in Staffordshire, the King's Park Conference Centre and Tennis Centre in Northampton and the Pioneer Centre near Kidderminster.

We also attended the Northamptonshire Courts Service. This was like a civic service, but much grander. It is organised by the High

Sheriff, an annual post held this year by Anne Burnett who comes from East Northants. It was a splendid occasion. The procession consisted of several High Court judges, district judges, circuit judges, members of the bar, Chairmen of Benches of Magistrates, other High Sheriffs from neighbouring counties, the Lord Lieutenant and many clergy including the Bishop of Brixworth.

High Sheriffs wear a distinctive dark navy or black velvet uniform with neck ruff. They also wear a hat with a feather. If the High Sheriff is a man he also carries a sword. Lady High Sheriffs do have a sword, but it is carried by their cadet. It is not considered ladylike for them to carry a sword! Tradition and ceremony is something that the British do exceedingly well.

I also attended a conference in Kettering. I was particularly proud of the work

of the charity Groundwork Northamptonshire, as I am a board member appointed by East Northants Council.

One of their groups described the value of a regular half-hour walk each day, which can help with many ailments and is thought to prolong life by around five years. The volunteer walkers were especially enthusiastic and inspirational. Health Walks already take place at Stanwick Lakes in our area, but I am hoping to extend this to Rushden in the future.

Groundwork youth workers also enthusiastically described their Talent Match project. This helps young people to get into employment. Some of these young people have low self-esteem and do not have the skills or personal circumstances appropriate to get into employment. The Groundwork workers help them to overcome these difficulties using group sessions and one-to-one

mentoring.

On 24th October we raised the new Northamptonshire flag for the first time at the Council building in Thrapston. This was to coincide with the County Day, which is on 25th October. We held a small

ceremony and Reverend Peter Baden blessed the flag. This flag was recently unveiled for the first time in Northampton, after a competition was launched to decide on a design.

I have attended two interesting and very different

fundraising events. One was a Remembrance talk at Burton Latimer, where we heard about music during the First World War. The other was a race night in Rushden, in aid of the charity Mind.

Ferdi's Kitchen

Risotto alla Milanese
Prep time: 20 mins
Cook time: 20 mins
Serves: 4

Ingredients

- 350g carnaroli rice (alternatively Arborio rice)
- 50g butter (1 knob 30g and 1 knob 20 g)
- 40g beef or veal bone marrow
- ½ onion (finely chopped)
- 100ml white wine
- 1.5L hot veal or chicken stock (add extra if needed)
- 0.10–0.20g saffron powder (usually 1 sachet)
- 60g Parmesan cheese (finely grated)
- Salt and black pepper

Instructions

- Before you start cooking prepare the stock so that it is readily available when required.

- Have the stock just simmering.
- Melt 30g of butter in a large pan and add the onion.
- Gently cook over medium heat for about 2 minutes being careful not to brown.
- Add the bone marrow and continue cooking for another 3 minutes, breaking the marrow with the spoon while stirring.
- Once the onion is soft, add the rice and stir until the rice is completely coated with the fat. The rice will start to become translucent. Keep stirring and gently cook the rice for another minute or two.
- Add the white wine, keep stirring and let the wine evaporate (it will probably take a couple of minutes).
- Add the stock and turn

the heat to medium/low. The stock, which is kept simmering, should be added a couple of ladles at a time. When this is absorbed, add more stock. Carry on in this way for about 15 minutes. During this stage do not leave the pan alone and stir regularly (gently).

• After 15 minutes, you will probably need an extra 3 to 5 minutes to complete the final stage of cooking (this time depends on the type of rice you are using). From now on, taste the rice every minute until the rice is cooked al dente (this means that the rice is tender outside, but still slightly firm to the bite in the centre). At the same time, the tasting will tell you if you need to adjust the seasoning. Regular but gentle stirring is required for the last minutes in order to avoid the risotto sticking to the bottom of the pan.

- Put the saffron powder into a glass and add half a ladle of stock. Stir until the saffron dissolves and then add to the pan. If using saffron strands, steep for 2

minutes before adding to the pan.

- In these last minutes, if the stock is completely absorbed, you can gradually add a bit more (say half a ladle at a time) because at this final stage you do not want the risotto becoming too watery.
- Stir until all the rice is uniformly coloured (golden yellow). Continue cooking and adding stock if required.
- When the rice is perfectly cooked al dente, add the Parmesan cheese and stir for few seconds until the Parmesan has melted.
- Remove from heat and add all the remaining butter (cut into pieces) and stir until completely melted.
- Cover the pan with a lid for about 1 minute and allow the risotto to rest before serving it.
- Risotto should be served all'onda (like a wave). This means that when you serve it on to the plate, it should still flow a little.
- If you want a vegetarian option leave out the marrow and use vegetable stock.
- Buon appetito!

Discovering the hidden treasures of Rome

The start of the October holiday saw forty four very excited children from Year 5 and 6 at Laxton Junior School, and the First and Second Forms (Year 7 and 8) from Oundle School on their way to Rome for a study trip of the Classical World. A night-time stroll around the Colosseum set the tone for the trip, with the warm evening air of Rome in October heralding some very hot weather.

The first day was spent in the ancient port of Ostia where the pupils experienced a day in the life of the ordinary people of Rome, visiting baths, temples, houses of both the wealthy and the poor, bakeries, fulleries, fish shops and markets. Highlights included the superb mosaics found all over the city and going down into the depths of a dark Mithraic temple, complete with the statue of the god killing a bull, eerily lit by a skylight.

On the Monday, the group was fortunate to be guided round the Forum and the Palatine by Professor Christopher Smith, Director of the British School at Rome. As it was the 2000th anniversary of the death of the Emperor Augustus, the pupils were able to see buildings hitherto closed to the public,

such as the House of Livia and the House of Augustus which both house magnificent frescos.

Trip organiser and Classics teacher, Mary James commented, "Our guide brought the seemingly random stones of the Forum to life and gave the pupils a real feel for the days of imperial power and wealth. The highlight of the afternoon was the Colosseum itself."

The final day focused on the legacy of Rome and how the ancient buildings are still so much part of the modern city. The group visited the Pantheon, the Hadrianic temple now part of a bank, and saw the new displays bringing the sculptures of Trajan's Column down to ground level.

Pupil Pip Pearson (12), commented, "Our trip to Rome was four days of non-stop laughing and seeing some amazing sights. The Colosseum is one of the most incredible places in the world and this was for me an absolute trip of a lifetime. The only annoying thing was the mosquitos which were everywhere!"

Pupil Harriet White (12), commented, "I thoroughly enjoyed my time in Rome, as it was an amazing trip looking at the history and evidence still

in existence today. There were many highlights which included a talk by Mr. Christopher Smith from the British school in Rome, on Augustus's house and looking inside the incredible Patheon, which has a hole in its roof to let light in. But my favourite highlight from the whole trip

was standing inside the vast incredible Colosseum, as I could imagine gladiators fighting for their lives with the crowds of spectators roaring in approval or disapproval. All in all, the Rome trip was inspirational and I am definitely going back to continue the journey."
