Friends Life Women's Tour returns for second year



World-class professional women's cycling will return to East Northamptonshire as the county celebrates hosting the Friends Life Women's Tour for the second successive year.

Friday 19th June will see the race return to Oundle, the scene of last year's opening stage, before racing through Northamptonshire to the finish in Kettering.

In May 2014 Northamptonshire was the host of the first ever Friends Life Women's Tour stage. It created history as the world's top riders raced from Oundle to Northampton town centre, in a leg won by Sweden's Emma Johansson.

Commenting on the announcement, Northamptonshire professional cyclist Hannah Barnes, who rides for the UnitedHealthcare Pro Cycling Team said: "The prospect of racing on home roads again in the 2015 Friends Life Women's Tour is very exciting. Last year's experience was unbelievable. The media exposure that the race received was incredible and getting back

to the hotel after the stage, turning the TV on and being able to watch a full hour of coverage was amazing.

"The crowds that lined the route were unbelievable and to have so many people come out and support the event was humbling and really made me proud to be British. Here's to a great 2015 Tour. I cannot wait!"

In 2014 Oundle welcomed the first ever stage of the Friends Life Women's Tour with a three-day cycling festival in the town centre. Commenting on the 2015 race Debra Harper, Oundle Town Council clerk, said: "We are thrilled that Oundle is to be part of the 2015 Friends Life Women's Tour. Hosting the Grand Départ last year was fantastic and we were delighted with the tremendous support provided by everyone


involved, and those who came out in their thousands to watch the race. The event has left a lasting legacy in the town and preparations are already underway in order to make Friday 19th June equally enjoyable and memorable."

The second edition of the Friends Life Women's Tour takes place from Wednesday 17th to Sunday 21st June, again taking place over five stages with daily highlights on ITV4. 



Manor School awarded Sport England grant to develop Go Ride cycling club

Sport England has awarded Manor Learning Trust a grant of just under £10,000 towards the project costs of a new cycling Go Ride Club at Manor School Sports College, Raunds.

The application to Sport England was part of a wider plan to develop cycling provision at the school, building on the existing Bikeability scheme hosted by Manor School for the Wellingborough and East Northants District.

The project aims to increase participation in cycling by running a Go Ride School Coaching programme for Years 7-12, with a particular focus on encouraging girls. Three members of staff have already completed a Cycling for Schools training course to lead the development of cycling in the curriculum.

School Sport Manager Hannah Hore, who led on the application to Sport England said: "It is brilliant news for Manor School. Cycling in Northamptonshire has really taken off since London 2012 and the Women's Tour of Britain last year raised the profile of the sport further locally. I'm looking forward to seeing the development of the Go Ride Club and maximising a unique opportunity for all students at Manor and hopefully surrounding schools."

Manor School will also host the District School Games Cycling Competition on Tuesday 9th June for boys and girls in Year 7. Young leaders studying GCSE PE at Manor School have already been trained to support the delivery of the competition. In addition, a

team from Manor School has been invited to take part in the 'Queen of the Sprints Race' for schools, to mark the Women's Tour of Britain coming to Kettering on Friday 19th June.

The Sport England Award from the Small Grants programme, which is Lottery funded, will support the cost of purchasing 25 mountain bikes, helmets and a trailer to transport bikes. Initial coaching fees and costs for a teacher or coach to complete the British Cycling Level 2 Coaching Award have also been included in overall project costs.

School Principal Linda Brooks said: "I am delighted that Manor School is at the forefront of this new cycling initiative. I look forward to the programme increasing even further our sports participation rates."

Join the Chicken Challenge to halve cases of campylobacter poisoning

Let's hear it for the humble chicken. It's a healthy and versatile food and a staple of Sunday lunches and barbecues on sunny afternoons.

But there's one thing not to love about it. Chicken can cause food poisoning. The FSA estimates that about 280,000 cases of food poisoning a year can be traced to campylobacter – a germ found mostly on raw chicken. You can't see it, smell it or even taste it on food, but if it affects you, you won't forget it. At its worst, campylobacter can kill or paralyse you.

Campylobacter food poisoning usually develops a few days after eating contaminated food and leads to symptoms that include abdominal pain, severe diarrhoea and, sometimes, vomiting. Some can have lasting effects, for example irritable bowel syndrome, reactive arthritis and in rare cases Guillain-

Barré syndrome – a serious condition of the nervous system.

The FSA wants to cut the number of cases of campylobacter poisoning in half by the end of 2015. It could mean that over 100,000 fewer people will get sick next year. If everyone does their bit, including industry and consumers this can happen. Pledging to take the Chicken Challenge and to do at least one thing to help keep tummies safe and healthy will make a huge difference in helping to achieve this goal.

Nina Purcell, FSA Director says: "It's clear that we all love chicken, we just need to take the time and be even more committed to ensuring we do the little things in the kitchen to keep our loved ones safe."

Leader of East Northamptonshire Council, Steven North,

says: "Food safety involves everybody in the food chain. If we all take responsibility for ensuring we follow the simple rules, then we can all enjoy a safe and delicious dinner."

The FSA is asking you to step up to the plate and promise to:

- Bag and store raw chicken separately from other food, covered and chilled on the bottom shelf of the fridge
- Not to wash raw chicken as it splashes germs
- Wash everything that's touched raw chicken in soap and hot water – your hands and utensils
- Check chicken is cooked properly – no pink meat, steaming hot and the juices run clear

Historic Rushden almshouses transformed

Four historic almshouses dating back to 1883 in the heart of Rushden have been brought back into use and refurbished to make them fit for 21st century living by East Northamptonshire Council and Spire Homes.

Beginning in December last year, the refurbishment has transformed the four former bedsits into two spacious one-bedroom

bungalows that are specially equipped for older people. Located on Wellingborough Road, the almshouses had previously undergone a refurbishment in the 1950s but were in need of extensive work inside and out.

The work has seen both the internal and external parts of the buildings completely revamped, whilst the properties'

unique characteristics and period charm have been maintained.

The refurbishment has ensured the bungalows are specially equipped to make life easy for their older residents. On top of installing brand new kitchens, extra insulation, new roofs and doors, to bring the almshouses up to a high quality, residents will also benefit from having wet

rooms instead of bathrooms, and all steps, both inside and outside of the properties, have been removed to reduce the risk of trips and falls. Pathways have also been extended and repaved with ramps installed at the back doors.

In total, over £115,000 has been invested by East Northamptonshire Council and Spire Homes to transform the almshouses.

"This project has been a careful balance of retaining the unique features of these almshouses whilst

significantly improving them for residents," said John Farrar, Chairman of Spire Homes. "They are a fantastic example of how we can adapt homes for the changing needs of our tenants, as we're seeing more older people in need of secure, affordable housing that is suitable for their needs. It's also worth noting that the team has been careful to reuse materials where they can, like the roof tiles and boilers, to reduce the environmental impact of the improvement work and

to make this refurbishment even more cost-effective."

Cllr Gill Mercer, Chairman of East Northamptonshire Council added: "These almshouses have a significant heritage within Rushden so we were really pleased to be able to provide funding for their refurbishment. We're delighted with the results achieved by Spire Homes, Longhurst Group and RG Gill & Son. The design of the refurbishment will definitely improve the quality of life for older residents."

Prepare for summer with the East Northamptonshire Council Garden Waste Service

Summer is a busy time for gardeners and East Northamptonshire Council (ENC) can help with getting rid of your green waste.

The ENC Garden Waste Service is cheaper than other local competitors for the collection of grass cuttings, hedge trimmings, weeds, dead plants and flowers, prunings and leaves. Members are provided with a 240-litre wheeled bin which is emptied every fortnight (except at Christmas and New Year). All of the waste collected is recycled locally into compost, reducing the amount of waste sent to landfill.

Occasional gardeners can buy packs of ten 75-litre compostable sacks to collect and store their garden waste in. Use these as and when

you choose, and simply phone the Council to book the collection of a minimum of three sacks.

Cllr Steven North, Leader of East Northamptonshire Council, said: "With over 4,000 members, this Garden Waste Service is a really popular and handy scheme for gardeners across the district. Kerbside collection is convenient and 81% of those who signed up to the service in previous years have renewed their contract this year, so we know that most users value it highly."

Resident fined hundreds for fly-tipping

A Ringstead resident was fined nearly £600 at Northampton Magistrates Court recently for fly-tipping in East Northamptonshire.

The man pleaded guilty to the offence of dumping three sacks of waste on the roadside between Woodford Mill and Great Addington. The Magistrate said he had committed a serious offence which caused considerable cost to the taxpayer and ordered him to pay £595 – made up of a £75 fine, costs of £500 and a £20 victim surcharge.

Steven North, Leader of East Northamptonshire Council said: “We are pleased with this successful prosecution and hope it shows how seriously we take fly-tipping in East Northants. We will continue to take action against individuals found to be illegally dumping rubbish in our countryside and on our streets. We think this sends out a strong message that this kind of behaviour will simply not be tolerated.”

Northamptonshire County Council runs the Rushden Household Waste Recycling Centre, which allows you to recycle or dispose of waste materials responsibly. For opening times and to find out what items the centre accepts, visit www.northamptonshire.gov.uk and search for HWRC or call 0300 126 1000.

If you see someone fly-tipping, report it online at www.east-northamptonshire.gov.uk/flytipping or call 01832 742026. The more information you can give the Council, the better chance it has of prosecuting so, if you can, please note:

- time and date of the incident
- location of the incident
- description of the person/s involved (e.g. sex, height, age, build)
- description of the vehicle used (registration number, make and model, colour)
- description of the waste being fly-tipped (quantity and type of waste)



Rushden Academy's Team Phoenix invited to conference at the House of Commons

It's not every day that an invitation to the House of Commons is received but for an inspiring group of students at Rushden Academy, an Education Fellowship academy, this has just become a reality.

Team Phoenix, comprising seven of its students aged 12 to 15 years, are the only students in the country who have been invited to attend the National

Food Poverty Conference on 18th June in recognition of the extraordinary volunteering they do.

Jo Steele, Admin Officer at Rushden Academy who was the original inspiration for Team Phoenix, said: "Delegates at The National Food Poverty conference will be part of a select few who will help identify strategies to combat food poverty

just six weeks after the new government has been elected. It's tremendous that Team Phoenix will be at the heart of where key decisions are made and they may be able to influence policies and legislation towards reducing food poverty.

"These youngsters selflessly give up every Saturday, plus days in the school holidays, to work in the Food Hub at the

local charity Phoenix Resource Centre in Wellingborough.

"Each week between them they sort through an average of two tonnes of food which is enough to feed a family of four for a year. Donated by the distribution centres of supermarkets, this usable and in date food would otherwise have ended up in landfill because it was surplus to requirements, branding on packaging had changed, it had damaged outer packaging and casing, or tins and boxes are dented or ripped.

"The food, once sorted, is given to local food banks, night shelters and organisations that provide lunches for the elderly and sick. It's also made into parcels for vulnerable and needy members of the Rushden local community. Energy drinks and food are also supplied to Northamptonshire Police, so they can give them to homeless young adults living on the county's streets."

Team Phoenix is getting to the conference thanks to the generous sponsorship of Taylor Shaw, the education

sector catering specialist who are suppliers to The Education Fellowship academies in Northamptonshire. Taylor Shaw are paying for the transport and tickets for the seven students to attend this important conference. The two staff supporting the team are being sponsored by The Education Fellowship.

Emma Satchell, Business Development Manager of Taylor Shaw Limited, said: "We're delighted to be supporting Team Phoenix. To us, a successful partnership is one where we are not just the provider of great food but one where we're an integral and valued support to the whole school. We're all so impressed by the amazing work and initiatives Team Phoenix are responsible for and look forward to hearing about the conference from the students – the discussions, current thinking and way forward."


Johnson Kane, CEO of The Education Fellowship, said: "We are inordinately proud of these students whose selfless volunteering each week throughout the year is

Empty homes given a new lease of life

Empty homes that were once a blight on the streets of East Northamptonshire have been given a new lease of life thanks to East Northamptonshire Council, with support from a local housing association.

Since March 2011, 196 homes in East Northamptonshire have been transformed, regenerating local areas and providing much needed extra affordable homes for those in housing need.

Paul Palmer, Empty Homes Officer for East Northamptonshire Council, Corby Borough Council and Malvern Hills District Council, is responsible for identifying empty properties

and working with owners to return them to use.

He said: "Most empty homes are privately owned and when they fall into disrepair, the owner often lacks the funds or the skills to repair and manage the property. By talking to the owner, we can help set up an action plan for restoring the property and establish ways in which it can be funded.

"For example, we identified an empty home on St Martins Close in Rushden. We approached the owner and offered them the chance to work with us. They were really keen and I explained that grant funding

was available through Housing Association partner, Rockingham Forest. An action plan was set up and work began on a new kitchen and heating system. The property has now been let through the Keyway rental scheme to some very happy tenants."

Paul explained plans for the future of The Empty Homes project: "It's great to see so much good progress being made on empty properties but we acknowledge that much remains to be done and we will continue to work with property owners and help them recreate much needed homes.

"Each property brought back into use

qualifies for New Homes Bonus funding – £6,000 per property based on a Band D average rating. So with the 196 properties returned to use in East Northamptonshire, the district has received £1.1m of funding. We've spent £40,000 over four years, making the project a success, so we feel this is a good return on the investment.

"Having worked successfully with willing owners, we are now turning attention to the more problematic cases, and will be looking at our range of enforcement tools for the more long-term empties in poor condition with reluctant owners."

Full steam ahead, virtually

For all railway enthusiasts and especially for those who remember the line from Peterborough to Northampton there is a treat at Oundle Museum.

David Wilkinson, as part of a larger project, has created a computerised simulation of a postwar journey from Tansor to Barnwell station, including a stop at Oundle station. Using photos, maps, GPS and various documents he

has produced a remarkable experience of travelling on the steam engine in the period of steam.

Details of the countryside and landmarks are easily recognisable, such as the Oundle church spire, the river and the gasometers (only the cattle and sheep are not original).

This simulation enables visitors to travel back in time and reflect on the changing face of local transport.

The Paradox of H E Bates

A special meeting of the H E Bates Discussion Group was held at the end of April, when the group's invited guest was Professor Dean Baldwin from the USA.

Professor Baldwin is the author of a biography of H E Bates written in the 1980s, and his previous research in the UK has given him an in-depth knowledge of H E, his characters and the locations where a lot of the novels were based.

Professor Baldwin was introduced by the Mayor, Councillor Richard Lewis, who was an invited guest with the Town Clerk, Viv Prodger. The talk given by Professor Baldwin was entitled 'The Paradox of H E Bates', and he described H E's struggle to support his family in the early

years of his writing and the novels based locally – Love for Lydia based around Rushden Hall; Spella Ho based around Knuston Hall; and The Poacher written with help of his grandfather, George Lucas, and dedicated to a friend, Sam Smith, who lived in Prospect Avenue. H E presented Smith with a signed copy of every book he had published – which were bought, after Sam's passing, by Peter Eades, another biographer.

Professor Baldwin drew comparisons between Bates and some of his contemporaries, such as T S Eliot and Aldous Huxley.

A vote of thanks was given by Bates's granddaughter, Victoria Wicks.

Another visitor, Neil

Anderson from Yorkshire, together with one of the Group's founders, Eric Fowell, organised a display of 'Bates Ephemera' – photos etc with connections to the author.

Mr and Mrs Baldwin, with the Group Chair Mrs Ann Harris, were given a tour of the Hall and the American guests were presented with a facsimile of a painting by Charles Leaver portraying Rushden in 1875, signed by all members present.

Refreshments were supplied by Elaine Buckby of Mrs B's Sandwich Emporium.

The Group's next meeting will be on Wednesday 9th September at 2pm in Rushden Town Bowls Club when Victoria Wicks will speak about H E's days in the RAF.

Leader of East Northamptonshire Council, Steven North, said: "It's unfortunate that continued breaches of the law at this location have led to the council having to take court action and a dog walker has now received a criminal record. These orders are in place so that everyone can enjoy the recreation ground in comfort and safety."
