Continued success for the East **Northamptonshire** College

Unmarked HGV joins fight against dangerous driving in Northamptonshire

Drivers breaking the law on Northamptonshire's roads are being identified thanks to an unusual police vehicle - a lorry.



he unmarked DAF is the country's biggest undercover police vehicle and is currently in action with Northamptonshire Police's Safer Roads Team.

Its elevated position enables officers to easily spot, record and photograph motorists breaking road traffic laws. Drivers are then pulled over to be dealt with.

PC David Lee, of the Safer Roads Team, said: "Drivers may be tempted to look at their phone when it pings, or distracted by other things inside their vehicle, but when you're driving your attention should only be on the

"Using this lorry gives us an ideal vantage point to see just what drivers are up to behind the wheel, and helps us take action to address dangerous driving on our county's roads and motorways.

The vehicle is on loan from Highways England and is made available to police forces nationwide through the National Police Chiefs' Council (NPCC).

Although magnetic placards allow it to be badged up when required, when in covert use it simply looks like any other heavy goods vehicle.

PC Lee said: "Although this is an unmarked vehicle, we want people to know we are out there looking for dangerous and illegal driving. We're being upfront about our use of it in the hope people read about it and change their behaviour behind the wheel.

"We work to keep people safer on our roads and this lorry is a great way to support that aim."

The penalty for using a handheld mobile phone while driving is now a £200 fine and six penalty points.

One of my great aunts was always known as Nell. This is how she appears on the various censuses, in birthday books and was what I called her when I was a small child. Could I find her birth registration? Nope! Hardly surprising really. When I eventually found her, I discovered that her real name was Florence Mary Helen. One of her sisters I always knew as Ada - but this was her middle name, her first one being Harriet. Even my own father is known as Gerald and his first name is Frederick! It certainly does not help the family historian, does it? I wonder how many of you are known by a name that is not your given name... If you are having problems in nailing someone down, if you are able to, ask friends and relatives if they are aware of any other names by which the person was known.

However, if John junior was given a second name, he may well have been known by that so as to differentiate between the two. My Grandfather was Frederick as well, which is why my father has always been known as Gerald. Remember – a person can call themselves any name that they want to as long as it is not for fraudulent or other illegal

Oh yes – please don't get too hung up on the spellings of those names. Spelling did not really settle down until as late as the beginning of the 20th century and so you may find Phoebe spelled as Febe, Frederick without the letter 'k' and Alice as Alyse.


their annual canvass forms in the next few weeks. East Northamptonshire Council (ENC) is sending a letter, known as a Household Enquiry Form (HEF), to every home in the district. The letter will contain the details of all those in the household who are registered to vote. Residents are being asked to confirm that these details are correct, either online or by text, telephone or post. If the details on the form are incorrect, you need to let ENC know. The guickest and cheapest way to reply is online. Prepaid envelopes will not be included with the

The HEF is vital for local authorities, enabling them to keep their electoral registers up to date. Not being registered can affect your applications for loans, mortgages and even mobile phone contracts. You will also lose the right to have your say at the ballot box. Steven North. Leader of East Northamptonshire Council said: "The annual canvass is an essential part of local democracy and we urge residents not to ignore the letter when it comes through their door. Anyone in the household can respond and it's easier than ever to do so.'

The requested information is required by law and not responding or providing false information on the form can result in a £1.000 fine. For more information about the electoral register visit www.gov.uk/electoral-register/ overview.

It's good to have a couple of letters from readers in this edition and nice to see them using the Nene Valley News to thank local authorities for their efforts to improve our towns. The subject of litter, which is mentioned by one of our correspondents, has become a bigger nuisance and a more expensive problem for our Councils over the past several years with the advent of the takeaway food culture and the general acceptance of eating in the street. For those of us of a certain age, eating in public is fine as long as you are sitting where food is served or perhaps where a picnic can be spread out, maybe even a park bench; eating on the move, in the street, does not fit within those categories. This was a standard set for us at an early age; too often it seems those standards have not been adopted by today's parents and many are only too happy to drop their litter in the street.

There should be cause for a small celebration this weekend as the A605 between Barnwell and Elton is unveiled in its pristine resurfaced state. Thanks go to the Northants County Council Highways team for managing the repairs with what seems to have been the least possible disruption. It will be interesting to see how long it is before the heavy traffic on the road, both in the sense of weight and volume, chews up the new surface. Perhaps it's time for some serious consideration of a weight restriction on this stretch of road.





in the library garden. The hour-long classes start at 10am on Friday mornings and will be led by personal trainer, Eddie McDonald of Embrace Fitness.


"Circuit Training is a form of group exercise in which strength, endurance and cardiovascular exercises

are combined in one session to provide a full body workout," says Eddie. "Everyone works to their own ability so it doesn't matter how fit you are. The most important thing is to have fun and enjoy it."

The Oundle Outdoor Gym has three pieces of fitness equipment: a Chest Press & Pull-Down Exerciser Combo, a Skier, and a Hand & Pedal Cycle. Suitable for young teenagers (from age 14) to adults of all ages, it's easy to operate and can be used by complete novices as well as experienced athletes.

Funding for the equipment was obtained by the Friends of Oundle Library through a successful grant application to the Northamptonshire Community Fund. And keeping things local. everything was supplied by Wicksteed Playscapes in Ketterina.

"The library is such an important part of our



community, but we felt the garden was under-utilised as a public space," says Ann Guy, Chair of the Friends group. "The fitness equipment is available to use 24/7 and people can

Diamonds sitting pretty courtesy of concrete donation from Mick George Ltd

t was a memorable occasion for everyone connected with Rushden and Diamonds FC as the club moved to their new Hayden Road ground, with a 2-0 victory against Hanwell Town, in the opening fixture of the Evo-Stik League South season.

Formally playing at the Dog & Duck, home of Wellingborough Town, the 'Diamonds' recently made the decision to up-sticks back to more familiar territory. Originally planned to begin the new campaign at Kempston Rovers with the intention of an autumn homecoming. thanks to a tremendous effort from the club and volunteers, they managed to reach the appropriate ground standards set out by the league from the outset of the new

Manager Andy Peake, is most definitely accustomed with the surroundings, having played at Hayden Road for Rushden Town earlier in his career, and has certainly welcomed the return. He said: "The players are getting a good feel for the place, it's improving all the time." Peake was privileged to witness in excess of 1,157 supporters' lining the pitch for a fixture back in 2012, a feat that he "hopes to observe again in the future."

If the opening performance of the season is anything to go by, then the move is already paying dividends, but it has come at a substantial financial cost. In fact,

£40,000 was the total sum for achieving the necessary playing conditions.

Whilst many of the tangible assets were transported from the old facilities, such as the terrace, turnstiles, club shop and bar, additional costs were allocated to upgrading dressing rooms, toilets, perimeter boundaries, electrical provisions and additional seating.

One of the substantial charges was for the concrete base permitted to relocate the Peter De Banke Terrace, but fortunately local business Mick George Ltd made a generous donation, to supply complimentary materials and services to a value of £4,000.

In recognition of the company's support, the club has named the new-seated stand at the Peter de Banke end of the ground as 'The Mick George Stand' for the 2017/18



Wildlife news

Nature does not like 'scars on the landscape', so whenever a bare patch appears plants do their best to repair the damage. One of the first is a shrub which produces a well-known fruit, which is at its best just about now. There may be a little less enthusiasm for 'blackberrying', but that shrub, filling in the scenery gaps, is the bramble.

f you like accuracy (or even to show off your knowledge!) its Latin name is rubus fruticosa, but 'bramble' is much easier to remember! The best spots were often kept secret, with only a privileged few knowing where the best could be found, though the differences were in the plants, not the soil.

Many (some surprisingly estimate over 300) varieties differ in size, colour, leaf shape, or even ripening time (this year is claimed by some to be a "good" year). They are not hard to spot in countryside

hedges, though getting at them is not always quite so simple; the branches knit together, giving a stout defence against creatures like mice, voles and a range of different birds tempted by the juicy prospect. That attraction is, of course, essential, because the little seeds in each berry pass straight through the body in the droppings, producing those seedlings in unexpected places. Experts know the different shapes or leaf colours, or different shades of white on the petals; but what matters to us is the taste

they give (often combined with apples) to the delicious pies and crumbles which autumn offers. Years ago a book was published with the title Food For Free, and the blackberry is surely a major challenger for any award of that nature.

Outside the harvest season brambles have other uses. The protection offered by those fearsome thorns make bramble thickets ideal spots for many birds to nest, and the large number of flowers from each rooted plant adds to the supply of nectar for many different insects. The bramble. despite the inconvenience of its thorny runners across our paths, is an important parts of nature's jigsaw. An old saying warned against eating blackberries after Saint Michael's Day (October) because the devil had spit on them; but by that time there is little left anyway.

Your Health – The kid that broke the camel's back

I know, it's a straw that breaks the camel's back, but children can be back-breaking work and there are things you can do to protect yourself.

hether the kids are your own, your grandkids, or the ones you're minding for someone else, the little blighters are heavy and wriggly.

So how can you stop these creatures messing up your muscles in the same way that the lawnmower does (more on the lawnmower in a minute)?

I've seen a lot of child-related injuries over the years. Here are my thoughts on how to prevent those injuries:

- Do not twist as you are lifting. Lift first, then turn.
- Keep your legs slightly

apart, with one in front of the other, as you lift.

- Bend your knees! A child counts as a heavy object. So bend your knees when you lift one.
- If you've cut down on exercise think of lifting as a leg workout.
 Bending your knees will make you use your thigh muscles!
- Alternate which hip you put a child on when carrying.
- When handing things to kids on the floor squat down, don't just lean forwards.

Remember that by the evening your discs have less fluid in them so you're more vulnerable to injury.

Try to think about the list above before you lift – it could save you from weeks of back pain.

Top Tip: All of the advice above can be applied when lifting any heavy object, so if you've got to lift the lawnmower to take it to be serviced because you've mowed a rock and broken the blade (I still maintain that the lawnmower was trying to kill me by throwing the blade at me) you now know how to lift it correctly to put it in the car.

being encouraged to reuse and recycle their barbecue food this bank holiday.

According to research by Sainsburys, Britons are set to throw away a staggering £428m worth of barbecue food this August. It is thought that around half of all barbecue hosts over-cater and serve up a larger spread than they need to.

The most likely items to be wasted were found to be salad leaves, burger rolls, coleslaw and potato salad, amounting to an average value of £36.47. Planning ahead can reduce this.

In the last year we have collected about 2,600 tonnes of food waste. This is recycled locally to produce biogas which is used to generate electricity and produce an agricultural

Housing group overcomes challenging climate to achieve best ever financial results

A housing group that owns and manages thousands of homes across Northamptonshire has posted record financial results.

onghurst Group, which has over 21,000 properties across the Midlands and East of England, cut operating costs by £4.62 million during the 2016/17 financial year, while generating value for money savings of £1.8 million.

An overall surplus of over £17 million before tax was also achieved, as well as an underlying operating margin of 36.38 per cent; a seven per cent increase on the last financial year.

The Group, which has regional offices in Rushden, also added 400 new homes to its portfolio and invested more than £30 million into its affordable homes programme. This was achieved with minimal grant funding.

At a time when housing associations across the country are feeling the pinch due to a multitude of challenges, these results exceeded targets that were set to adjust to the impact of the rent reductions introduced by the government.

Rob Griffiths, the Group's Deputy Chief Executive and Chief Financial Officer, said: "Improving the lives of our customers is at the heart of everything we do. To be able to achieve that vision it's crucial that we are financially stable and well-prepared for the future.

"Being able to continually improve the way we operate as a business helps us ensure longevity and ongoing success, as we aspire to deliver 3.000 new homes over the next five years

"The Group is committed to achieving and maintaining the highest standards of corporate governance to help deliver the objectives set out in our business plan and to manage risk. These results show that our new streamlined governance structure is helping us to realise these ambitions.

"We still have a lot of hard work ahead to ensure we can deliver on our growth targets but being financially resilient and through strong leadership, we can continue to provide great homes and highquality care and support services."

Although the Group's turnover reduced slightly, sales performance was strong with the margin on new sales increasing

from 19.9% to 29.9% and generating a surplus of £2.8 million.

Other highlights during the last financial year include a reduction in rent arrears from 2.50 per cent to 2.16 per cent, a six per cent reduction in void repair expenditure and supporting 11 customers into employment.

The Group's work through the Blue Skies Consortium also delivered 175 new homes into management for consortium members with a further 541 started on site and a grant take up of £4,969 million.

An increasing portion of new build homes programme were for low-cost home ownership; in 2016/17, around 50% of the homes built were for sale (including shared ownership), with the reminder for rent. It is still expected that the split between rented and low cost home ownership will move towards 40/60% in the future.

Structural changes in the last financial year include the introduction of a coterminous Board, known as the Homes Board, which brings together the Boards of all three Group member companies. L&H Homes, Friendship Care and Housing and Spire Homes, which is based in Rushden.

This structure creates an improved

platform for collaborative working, driving good practice, innovation and efficiency across the Group, whilst respecting local need and priorities


