New affordable homes in Yarwell

The offers received were for a cross-section of subjects, and this success is a credit to the diligence of Oundle's pupils and the dedication of their teachers.

Prepare for lift-off as Kettlebell championship comes to Higham Ferrers

On Sunday 4th February, over 70 Kettlebell athletes will descend upon the Ferrers School in Higham Ferrers for the GSU English Open Championship hosted by local lifter, Del Wilson.

Kettlebell lifting competitions, basically endurance weight lifting, are rapidly gaining traction within the UK and one of the reasons for this is their accessibility. Anyone can enter


providing they have a basic grasp of the techniques required and have followed an appropriate training plan. Lifters have three options: biathlon, involving two lifts each lasting 10 minutes; a long cycle where

the lifter does a single 10-minute lift; the third option is a far more recent addition to the Kettlebell lifting scene here in the UK and it's the marathon which involves either a 30 or a 60-minute lift. The Higham Ferrers event is also a qualifier for the English team and is the route to international competition.

An organisation called The Grassroots Federation has been set up to encourage others into Kettlebell sport and Rushden held their own Grassroots competition last year with another to follow in 2018. Grassroots competitions have lifters lifting for five minutes for each of the lifts and we have judges who are less strict on the form of the lifter. There are also experienced lifters amongst the beginners so there is always lots of advice and encouragement.

On 4th February, the competition will run from 10am until 5pm. A local sandwich shop, Mrs B's Sandwich Emporium, will be providing snacks throughout the day. So, why not pop in anytime to see what it's all about; you never know, this time next year you may well find yourself on the lifting platform.

Genealogy jottings

My four times great grandfather was a chap named Thomas Terry. On his daughter Caroline's marriage certificate, he is shown as 'deceased'. Aha! I thought, with a name that was not exactly common, this would not be too difficult to find. How wrong I was.... I found a death certificate for a Thomas Terry in 1840 and, with my geographical knowledge at the time not being as good as it is now, blithely ordered what I thought would be the right one. But, no. It was for a 7-month-old child, whose father was Samuel and no relation whatsoever. Back to the drawing board. This was back in the 1990s and Thomas has haunted me on and off ever since.

The other day, whilst having a rummage through my motley ancestors, I dug his details out again and realised that I had no record of him in the 1841 census. In fact, I had no record of his daughter Caroline either – just a vague note that she was a servant in a house in Kent. Sleeves rolled up, coffee at hand, I set to work and found Thomas, his wife Mary plus sons Thomas and James along with Caroline, running a farm in Worth, Sussex. Knowing that it

would be rather unlikely for Thomas to move to another area of the country as he was recorded as being a Farmer (not just an Ag Lab), I then started searching for his death in the enumeration district that covered Worth – East Grinstead – and found three! One was 1847, the next in 1849 and the third in 1850.

Until recently, ages at death were not available in the indexes unless it took place in 1866 or after. I could have ended up sending for three certificates, not knowing which was the correct one but the GRO has recently started recording the age at death on their ordering service. All you have to do is make sure that you are registered and you can check – if it is not the correct age, you do not have to order!

Meanwhile... is the death certificate for a 7 month-old Thomas Terry of any help to anyone?

Editor's notes

There's advance warning for motorists travelling between Rushden and Irchester that they will be required to use a diversion for some seven months between April and November. The B569 Station Road, between the east side of Irchester and the Knuston on the west side of Rushden, will close to allow the railway bridge to be reconstructed for the electrification of the line.

The closure is necessary: 'As part of the railway electrification works requiring reconstruction of the existing bridge. The only safe option during the reconstruction is that the road is closed and a diversion route put in place. It is expected that the works will commence on 9th April and continue until 2nd November 2018.'

A signed diversion will take people wishing to travel from Irchester to Rushden along the B570, A509, Junction 14 of the

A45 and then into Rushden via the A5001. Those travelling from Rushden to Irchester will join the A45 at Junction 16 before leaving at Junction 14 and going through Little Irchester.

Network Rail's principal programme sponsor for the Midland Main Line, Spencer Gibbens said: "We are currently carrying out the biggest upgrade of the Midland Main Line since it was first built in 1870 with an investment of more than £1bn that will create a bigger, faster, more reliable network which will bring significant long-term benefits."

A busy bridge in Corby will also close for seven months for similar works.

Elsewhere in this edition there is news of more funding available from East Northants Council (ENC) for a variety of community based activities. So far the Member Empowerment Fund has seen ENC Councillors

pass on over £200k to local organisations. If you have a project which fits the scheme's requirements get in touch with your ENC Councillor.

It's good to see the senior students at Prince William School in Oundle benefitting from the prizes donated by local businesses for many aspects of the school's curriculum. Special praise should also go to the staff, parents and friends who must have worked extremely hard to persuade local commerce to support the scheme. Their challenge now will be to keep the project in place for the future!

So, who knew what Kettlebell Lifting was all about before reading our article on the sport? It sounds like one of the most extreme forms of exertion ever devised! If you want to find out more, get along to the Ferrers School on Sunday 4th February.

Mayor and Chair of School Council officially open new Multi-Play Unit

The Mayor of Higham Ferrers, Cllr Peter Tomas, officially opened the new multi-play unit in the play area at the Saffron Road recreation ground on Tuesday 9th January.

He was joined at the opening by members of the School Council from the Higham Ferrers Junior School. The Town Council consulted with

the School Council last year on the type of unit they would like to see installed at the play area. Members of the School Council were asked to vote for their preferred unit from a number of designs.

The opening ribbon was pulled jointly by the Mayor and the Chair of the School Council, Freya Lack. Freya said she had "voted for this unit... and is glad it is being used and is popular and attractive to lots of children". The School Council felt the park looked very exciting, that the new play equipment was bright and colourful and that it will improve play at the park.



No decision yet on the future of Higham Ferrers Library

Saturday 13th January was the deadline for responses to the consultation on the future of the Library and Information Service currently delivered by Northamptonshire County Council. Option 1 allowed for the delivery of the Library services in Higham Ferrers as a community managed service. Option 2 and 3 mean that Library will close. The final decision will be made on 22nd February.

The Town Council has undertaken its own consultation, which has had 423 responses. Ninety-five per cent want the Library to stay open and 80% support an increase in the council tax to facilitate this. Comments included "It is about more than books, it is a

community hub and is a great place for children and parents" and "this service was very important in my recovery from depression..."

At their meeting on 19th December the Town Council agreed to express an 'Informal Expression of Interest' in taking over the library. This does not mean it is certain that the Town Council will manage the library, but the decision was taken to keep the door open to the possibility. This decision had to be made without all the full facts including the market valuation for the library which was only received recently from the County Council. The

valuation is £367,500 to buy or £33,000 to lease. Just to lease will be a 9.4% increase on the current budget without any running costs. Over the next few weeks the council will be gathering more information and costs on taking over the library and building. The Town Council is also conscious that the building will require works, as it has not been proactively maintained, which will be another strain on resources.

The Town Council understands that should the County Council agree to Option 1 a Formal Expression of Interest will have to be submitted by 31st March.



Making time to exercise: new campaign to get Northamptonshire workers more active

Are you finding you don't get time to exercise in a busy working week? Do you go long hours without even standing up from the desk, even over lunch? A new campaign seeks to tackle inactivity amongst workplaces across Northamptonshire – and this is your chance to get involved.

Alarming statistics show the average Brit sits down for 8.9 hours every day and one in four of us do fewer than 30 minutes of physical activity a week – contributing to around 131 million working days lost to sickness in England each year.

Now Workplace Challenge, in collaboration with Northamptonshire Sport, is tackling the issue head-on with the launch of its latest campaign designed to break down the culture of a desk-bound lunch. It is designed to help address and break down the barriers we all face in fitting physical activity into busy work/life schedules.

The 2018 Active Workplace Challenge includes a series of initiatives, events and advice provided for local people by Northamptonshire Sport over an eight-week period, which started on 8th January.

Sign up to the campaign and you can track physical activity online, easily comparing activity levels to other participating individuals and organisations.

The focus this year will on bitesize chunks

of activity, encouraging workers to step away from their desks and out of the office during the lightest and brightest part of the day. Northamptonshire Sport has set a target for everyone to walk, jog, run or cycle one mile each day during the eight-week period.

There is also a series of workplace offers from National Governing Bodies of sport, available on the Workplace Challenge website to support physical activity in and around the working day.

Jackie Browne for Northamptonshire Sport said: "It's all too easy to stay at the desk over lunch, or to work late in the office to meet a deadline, but this is contributing to a worrying trend of inactivity amongst the working population. Too many of us aren't getting the recommended 150 minutes of exercise in a week – and it's having a serious impact on our mental and physical health, not to mention the productivity of workers.

"The 2018 Active Workplace Challenge is about giving people the support and inspiration to get up on their feet and bring physical activity into and around their working day."

Panto with a difference is on its way to Thrapston – thanks to the talents of a cast and backstage crew of more than 50 children and young people.

We have just entered 2018, but how I wish children of today could know what we encountered and be allowed to be children and enjoy life and not be pressured by social media into being something they have determined to be correct and if you do not comply you are not normal.

Maybe I am getting too old, but what I do know is the pressures of life were not as great and we all enjoyed it. I sometimes question whether progress is always for the best.

£206k of council funding for East Northants residents so far

East Northamptonshire Council (ENC) is helping more communities in the district with funding for local projects, from King's Cliffe to Rushden.

Each district councillor is allocated £1,000 per year to award to parish/town councils, community groups, voluntary organisations and charities working in East Northamptonshire.

Thanks to ENC's Member Empowerment Fund (MEF) which began in June 2011, communities have benefitted from over £206,000 of grant funding to support their projects so far, including most recently:

- Installation of entry gates to Great Addington to improve speed reduction measures
- Replacement of artificial playing surface for Thrapston Cricket Club
- Purchase of wildflower plants and seeds to improve the new pond area on Maltings Green in King's Cliffe
- Funding towards the purchase of a memorial bench to be placed at the War Memorial in Irthlingborough
- Replacement uniforms for Rushden Town Band for their performances in Rushden and the surrounding area
- Purchase of junior beginner archery kits for the Archers of Raunds club

Councillor Glenvil Greenwood-Smith, district councillor for Raunds Windmill, supported the Archers of Raunds.

He said: "I was very pleased to be able

to support the club with a portion of my MEF. The money helped fund the purchase of complete junior bow sets to facilitate the growing uptake in juniors joining the beginners course which runs all year round. At present the club has 54 members and welcomes everyone from the age of 10 upwards. They also offer taster sessions so people can try before they buy, so why not give it a go?"

- Community events, fayres and carnivals
- Community/Neighbourhood Planning activities
- Activities that promote participation in physical activity/healthy lifestyles
- Environmental improvements e.g. tidying up, new planting schemes

Healthy but child-friendly food

Do you struggle to get your children to try new things or eat more healthily? Children often like individual portions, like their own pie, for instance. You could make an adult's meal and just make up a couple of portions in smaller dishes, like my 'funny face fish pie'.

Just make a fish pie and make some child's servings out of it, e.g. in greased ramekins, and decorate the top to look like a face (or get them to do this bit). How about shredding cabbage or spirals of carrots or courgettes for hair too? The ramekins can be frozen for quick but healthy children's meals that just require putting in the oven.

Here's a child-friendly fish pie recipe that serves 6 adults or 10-12 children. Peel and dice 5 large potatoes, or sweet potatoes. Boil until soft. Soften chopped onion, carrot and celery in 2 tbsp butter or olive oil. Sprinkle over 3 tbsp plain flour and stir to spread evenly. Add 200ml milk, a



little at a time, stirring well. Season and add a grating of nutmeg, a bayleaf and a handful of sweetcorn. Cook until thickened. Add 3 tablespoons crème fraîche, the juice of half a lemon, 1 tbsp chopped parsley, 100g grated cheddar cheese and 400g skinless, boneless fish chunks (salmon, cod and smoked haddock make a nice combination). Stir through the sauce. The fish cooks very quickly so take it off the heat while you mash the potatoes with milk and butter.

Spoon the sauce into greased ramekins or other oven-proof dishes followed

by some spinach leaves, then top with the mash.

For a crunchier topping, sprinkle breadcrumbs that have been mixed with a splash of olive oil. Make a face out of vegetable pieces, such as carrot, celery or peppers (anything that will hold its shape while cooking). Bake at 220°C for 20-30 min until crisp, golden and bubbling throughout.



Settlers of the Nene Valley: a new community heritage project

The Rockingham Forest Trust has just announced an exciting new Heritage Lottery funded project based at Stanwick Lakes. Settlers of the Nene Valley will work with the local community to explore, recreate and celebrate the history of this ever-changing landscape.

Sound investment brings added magic to the movies in Oundle

Over the past 18 months Oundle Cinema has invested money and time in improving the quality of the sound at its screenings at the Stahl Theatre. Following suggestions from a technical evaluation by the Independent Cinema Office and with the kind permission of Oundle School (the building owners), sound panels have been installed on the internal walls to reduce reverberation and improve acoustics. (The very positive results from sound tests done before and after the installation can be found on the Cinema website.)

Additionally, the speakers have recently been upgraded and amplifier settings have been fine-tuned to give the best sound quality for the audience members. The committee also try to avoid programming films where diction is not particularly clear – no one enjoys trying to decipher a mumble!

This has led to a marked improvement in the clarity of the sound. Whilst Oundle Cinema cannot offer the lounge seats and surround sound of mainstream auditoriums, it is a friendly set up showing enjoyable, award-winning films and is run by local people for local people. Anyone who has previously had an unsatisfactory experience or perhaps hasn't been before is urged to attend a screening soon – there are a variety of films to choose from. These include the star studded *The Party*; *My Life As A Courgette*; *Victoria and Abdul* starring Judi Dench; *Goodbye Christopher Robin* about the early life of the 'real' Christopher Robin (the son of AA Milne); *Breathe*, about a polio sufferer's refusal to give in to the disease (screened in support of the Rotary Club's polio eradication campaign) and two films which need no introduction:

Paddington 2 and *Murder On The Orient Express*.

In Fletton House, new projection and sound equipment funded through the BFI Neighbourhood Cinema Equipment Fund mean the dOCs+ screenings are of the highest quality, absorbing and interesting. The informal discussion on the topic of the documentary after each screening adds to the experience, as the increasing audience numbers prove.

Help find descendants of WW1 soldier

Nina Wilson of local solicitors Wilson Browne recently unearthed medals from WW1 awarded to Captain E J Eccles; they were found in a strong room and the Company are keen to reunite them with the Captain's descendants.

So far, it has been discovered that Captain Eccles became a 2nd Lieutenant in the Royal Irish Fusiliers on 4th March 1915 in Belfast and there is evidence of him serving as a 2nd Lieutenant in the 5th Battalion of the Royal Irish Fusiliers on 2nd Nov 1916. He then transferred to the Royal Fusiliers (City of London Regiment) before becoming a Captain in the Princess Victoria's (Royal Irish Fusiliers). He was awarded the medals at the end of WW1 and left the Army on 7th March 1930.

The medals concerned are the 1914-15 Star, the British War Medal and the Victory Medal and should be worn in that order. Together they form the British Campaign Medal Set, known affectionately as 'Pip, Squeak and Wilfred'; they were primarily awarded to the Old Contemptibles, or the British Expeditionary Force, and are the

most likely medals to be found among family heirlooms. The issue of the medals in the 1920s coincided with the publication of a popular comic strip in the Daily Mirror. It was written by Bertram J Lamb, known as Uncle Dick, and drawn by the cartoonist Austin Bowen Payne. Pip was the dog, Squeak the penguin and Wilfred the young rabbit. It is believed that Payne's batman during the war had been nicknamed 'Pip-squeak' and this is where the idea for the names of the dog and penguin came from. For some reason the names of the three characters became associated with the campaign medals and they stuck.
