# Garden Village plans unveiled

The Deene Park Estate and their colleagues in the Tresham Garden Village Project have officially unveiled their plans for the site and, by the time you read this, they will have undertaken their first round of consultations with local residents.

t the launch event the Project Team revealed their Masterplan for the delivery of an exemplary site, aiming

to provide a community that is truly inter-generational and almost completely self-sufficient. The launch was attended by Lord

Matthew Taylor, the parliamentary guru on green development, who delivered the keynote speech; he reflected on



the need to release land for new communities but not giant new towns, rather small market towns and villages to meet local needs.

Charlotte Brudenell, who currently lives at Deene Park with her husband Robert, explained that they wanted the development to be known as Tresham Garden Village, to commemorate the historic links between the Brudenell and Tresham families. Sir Thomas Tresham's daughter Mary married Thomas Brudenell in the early 1600s and spent many years living at Deene Park.

The key details of the proposal are: the provision of up to 1,500 sustainable homes which cater for, and appeal to, a diverse community including affordable housing;

outstanding green space, including the addition of 100,000 trees along with an array of recreational facilities; a wide range of local jobs within easy distance of the homes and integrated and accessible transport systems aimed at making walking, cycling and public transport the most attractive choices; onsite education including a nursery and primary school. with the aspiration for an allthrough secondary school.

The delivery of all this will take place over 15 years through five phases and will involve a variety of homebuilders, including a self-build option. The landscaping of the village will be carried out with due respect for the former wartime airfield from which B17s of the USAF 401st **Bombardment Group** carried out some 255 missions commencing in late 1943; it is intended to preserve part of the paved runway to demonstrate the scale of their operations.

# Council Tax increase Editor's notes

Council (ENC) has decided to increase its share of Council Tax due to the uncertainty about future Government funding.

At the budget meetings on 26th February and 5th March, a number of options were discussed to safeguard services in the future. The increase agreed unanimously will be an extra £5 per year for a Band D home, or 10p a week.

The Council takes only around 8p in every pound

collected, with the rest of the money going to Northamptonshire County Council, Northamptonshire Police and Crime Commissioner and town and parish councils. Only 8% of what is collected goes to ENC to run the services for

which they are responsible. Cllr Steven North. Leader of ENC, said: "We currently have the lowest Council Tax of any council in Northamptonshire, and almost the lowest in the

"Investment in our communities is a priority as shown by our £1,750,000 commitment to local projects through our Community Facilities Fund.

"We will continue to look for savings but due to uncertainty about future government funding and because we want to continue to invest in our communities, we propose a very small increase, which for a Band D property works out over the year at £5.'

Northamptonshire Police aimed at finding criminals wanted for burglary, robbery and vehicle break-ins. The Force is seeking the help of the public, initially in finding five men whose pictures have been released because it's believed they can help with enquiries into a number of burglaries.

Superintendent Chris Hillery, who is leading the operation, said: "Op Crooked is all about being on the front foot in preventing serious acquisitive crime in Northamptonshire. Most offences happen as a result of insecurities, so something as simple as always locking external doors and windows is a really effective prevention tool." He added: "I'm very interested in people trying to sell property door to door, on social media and in other locations maybe pubs, clubs, supermarket car parks."

Information about crime, suspicious activity or the suspected handling of stolen goods can be reported via 101, citing Op Crooked, and you can remain anonymous if vou wish. Information can also be reported free and in confidence to Crimestoppers on 0800 555111.

There's a sign that the Rushden Lakes development is denuding local High Streets as Union Clothing closed its shop in Rushden last week. The store's owners have said that they will now be able to redirect their efforts towards improving their

shops in Wellingborough and at Rushden Lakes where they trade as Robert Goddard. There has been an enthusiastic response from customers to the opening of the store at Rushden Lakes. Thus, decisions have been taken to invest in doubling the size of the Rushden Lakes outlet and starting a new menswear department downstairs in the Wellingborough branch. The Managing Director at Robert Goddard, Oliver Tookman, said: "We've been overwhelmed by the response to our opening and we're very grateful that we have gained what is already proving to be a loyal customer base. Whilst we're sad to see the High Street store close, we hope that our customers will continue shopping with us."

We wish the store good luck with their plans but we do earnestly hope that a new venture in Rushden High Street can flourish too. Perhaps the change related above opens the way for a short-term 'Pop-Up' shop of some sort. These were advanced with great enthusiasm a while ago but seem not to be so popular now. Perhaps there is reluctance on the part of landlords to open up premises under short-term commercial arrangements and it seems likely that there would be insurance issues, but from the perspective of local residents it would be vasly preferable to have something in a retail outlet rather than nothing. It would also provide would-be entrepreneurs with a chance to test the water with their ideas.



# Your Health – The hazards of housework!

Housework may not be an extreme sport, but you'd be surprised how many injuries it causes!

e've seen injuries from hoovering, bed-making, dusting and even mopping. However, the biggest culprit for injuries is cleaning the bath. In fact, last year I think we saw more bath-cleaning injuries than skiing injuries!

So, what can you do to stop yourself getting hurt by the housework? Don't worry, I'm not going to suggest you go for a fourmile run to warm up, nor am I going to tell you to leave the cleaning!

The trick is to be careful. Sounds obvious, doesn't it.

 Hoovering – keep the hoover close to you. Don't stand still pushing it out further and further away from you. Walk with it and stay next to it.

- Making the bed stand and face the corners as you lift them to tuck in the sheets. Don't twist at a strange angle.
- Mopping as with the hoover, don't push the mop miles away from you. Pretend it's your dance partner and you don't want it to leave you for someone else.
- Dusting get a duster with a really long handle so that you can reach the high areas without straining your neck and shoulders.

• Cleaning the bath – once you've crouched down to clean the bath it is tempting to stay in that place and reach all the way around the bath to clean it. DON'T do this! Do half of the bath from one end and the other half from the other end. Your back is precious - if you don't clean the bath carefully you could end up unable to clean it at all for weeks on end.

Top tip: Using the lawnmower is similar to using a hoover. As the grass starts to push through the last bits of snow, remember to stay close to the horrid lawnmower if you use it!

### The fallen heroes of WW1



y last 'Where am I?' picture was at Irthlingborough, which is a town on the River Nene with a population of 8,535 and was the smallest town in England to have had a Football League team.



# Smoking still a major cause of house fires



irefighters in
Northamptonshire
last year attended 17
accidental house fires in
which smoking was named
as the cause.

Officers from
Northamptonshire Fire and
Rescue Service (NFRS)
are asking smokers to take
extreme caution when using
and throwing away smoking
materials.

This April sees the National Fire Chiefs Council concentrate on smoking as their focus in the countrywide Fire Kills campaign.

Across the country, smoking remains a major reason why fires break out in the home.

In the financial year 2016-2017, NFRS attended 17 accidental domestic fires linked to smoking and, so far this year, 16 have already been attended.

Tina Collett, NFRS District Liaison Officer said: "The best advice to minimise risks would of course be to stop smoking completely, but for continuing smokers, we would urge them to make sure they keep safe.

"Smoking becomes such a part of people's lives, it is too easy to forget how dangerous it can be if cigarettes, matches and other items are not used and disposed of safely. We hope people will take notice of our advice and really think about the smoking practices they use in their own homes."

- 1 Stub cigarettes out properly and dispose of them carefully. Put them out, right out.
- 2 Use a proper ashtray, never a wastepaper basket.
- 3 Make sure your ashtray can't tip over and is made of a material that won't burn
- 4 Don't leave a lit cigarette, cigar or pipe lying around. They can easily fall over and start a fire.
- 5 Take extra care if you smoke when you're tired, taking prescription drugs, or if you've been drinking. You might fall asleep and set your bed or sofa on fire.
- 6 Never smoke in bed.
- 7 Keep matches and lighters out of children's reach.
- 8 Consider buying child resistant lighters and match boxes.

Support Northamptonshire were awarded £9,586 to develop a community-led safety network to help prevent crime, including hate crime and fear of crime across Wellingborough.

Stephen Mold, Police and Crime Commissioner for Northamptonshire spoke of the recent funding decisions: "I'm really pleased to be able to award this money to three fantastic organisations that are helping to make Northamptonshire Safer.

# Warmington School Ofsted Report

The pupils, staff and governors of Warmington School are delighted to announce the outcome of their recent Ofsted inspection on 30th January: 'This school continues to be good'.

the report outlines the successes of the school in maintaining the 'good quality of education' since its last inspection four years ago, stating that 'parents and carers are overwhelmingly positive about the school. They said that their

children are happy, well cared for and make good progress'. The inspector wrote that the 'pupils are exceptionally well behaved. They are kind and polite to one another and play happily together'.

The report also looks at the leadership of the

school, saying that the Executive Headteacher, Mr Ed Carlyle 'has quickly established his vision for Warmington School' and that he 'and the other staff have successfully identified the areas for development' with the impact of the Literacy and Maths leads clearly recognised.

The report notes that the 'governing body is committed to ensuring that the school is the best it can be. It is aware of the current priorities of the school, and of what actions are being taken to develop these'. Safeguarding was also highlighted as being effective.

The Unity of Warmington School with Titchmarsh Primary School 'has enabled your staff to work together on cross-school projects and developments, such as the implementation of the new approach to the teaching of mathematics. It has also provided opportunities for staff to carry out joint training and to share good practice

between staff at the two schools'.

Since we last lived in this area changes in the countryside have included the chain of nature reserves, giving the chance to see at first hand some results of a very successful national project of recent years. A long time ago we took our daughters over into Wales, to a spot called Gigrin Farm, because that was where we were most likely to see increasingly rare birds of prey – red kites.

enturies ago these birds were common even in the centre of London; they are even referred to by William Shakespeare, suggesting that they were well known to potential audiences of that time.

Then various changes started to drive them away from areas of human population; these included increasing spread of farming practices taking more and more land and less desirable activity by gamekeepers eliminating

any birds of prey which might feed on game birds used for shooting. Most damaging was probably increasing and uninformed use of toxic agricultural compounds; the net result was a drastic reduction in numbers, and the birds were almost extinct in this country (40 years ago one estimation put the total in the wild at no more than 50 pairs).

Then the authorities woke up and steps were put in place to correct the problem, including

introducing birds from overseas. We did not see them from our new house; it was not a case of none around – I saw several in the surrounding area – but we had hoped to see them regularly.

A few days ago – bingo! Over the garden a large bird was circling for one or two minutes at little more than rooftop height, giving plenty of chance to see clearly what makes it such an attractive member of our wildlife: magnificent plumage, impressively large wingspan giving delicate control while scanning for food, not too frightened of human activity, and finally the clearly forked tail which is a good identifying feature, even when the light is not too good.

Above all, it is increasingly plentiful on local reserves, proving that conservation really can work. Why not make an extra effort to find one (in the next month, say)?


