Scheme to help protect people with dementia

Northamptonshire Police is introducing a scheme to help keep people with dementia safe.

The Herbert Protocol encourages families and carers of people living with dementia to compile key information about them on a form, including their description, a current photograph, medical information, favourite locations, hobbies, routines and more.

The Herbert Protocol form can be downloaded from the Northamptonshire Police website and completed electronically or by hand. Stored securely in the home of the person it relates to, the form can be handed to police if they are reported missing.

If the person it relates to goes missing, relatives or friends are advised to call 999 and tell the call handler that a completed Herbert Protocol form exists. It is then emailed or handed to police officers, and returned when the person is found.

2018 Northamptonshire Council of the Year

At the annual general meeting of the Northamptonshire County Association of Local Councils (NCALC), the CEO Danny Moody announced that the winner of the 2018 Northamptonshire Council of the Year is Glapthorn Parish Council.

Danny Moody said to the delegates: "As the debate on devolved services, as a consequence of Local Government Reorganisation, gathers pace I hear

the county and district councils talking about how larger town councils could perhaps take on more but that most small parish councils don't have the ability to do much more than they

are already doing. I tell them not to confuse ability with capacity.

"It's true that most parish councils are very small – 50% of our members have fewer than 500 electors – but if we can build capacity there is no reason at all why small councils should be discounted in any devolution programme.

"The winner of the 2018 Council of the Year is small but perfectly formed. It has fewer than 250 electors and a precept of less than £10,000. But that doesn't stop it being the best it can be. Its size doesn't stop it being run in a proper and business-like way and aspiring to deliver more for its community.

"Last year it took out a loan to upgrade its street lighting to modern and energy efficient LED. Many parish councils across the county are

following suit. And earlier this year the council completed a Neighbourhood Plan with 88% of votes cast in favour of adopting the plan with an incredible 61% turnout. The Neighbourhood Plan was delivered within budget and in under two years from start to finish proving that at least some councils in Northamptonshire are capable of good project management!

"Of course, at the heart of the council's successes are its people. The council has a highly professional, organised and diligent clerk, who is supported by the council. The council's chairman is a through-and-through communitarian, and he is ably assisted by a full complement of six other councillors....

"...This small council demonstrates that even with limited capacity a great deal can be achieved with the right ingredients: an able clerk and chairman, a strong team of councillors... a desire to make the community a better place to live, work and play and, above all, a passion to be the best it can be."

Genealogy jottings

Subscriptions. Which one to get? Well, it really does depend upon what you are searching for. No single online subscription is going to give you access to all of the records that may be useful to you. The Library does have free access to Find My Past and the British Newspaper Archives, so I would suggest that you try those first of all to see if they might help. If that is not possible, always keep your eye out for offers such as free access to online records over Christmas or Bank Holidays. Most subscription sites will ask you for credit or debit card details, which you must remember to remove before the offer ends. Otherwise, you could find yourself paying out for an annual subscription that you did not want! Alternatively, paying for a one-off weekly or monthly subscription could also give you either all of the answers that you were searching for or, at the very least, a taste of what that site can offer. Do you have a lot of military ancestors? Do you need access to foreign records? Does one particular website hold the parish records in which you are interested? Dipping your toes in the water of the various websites is the best way to

decide. I have a couple of subscriptions and, so that it does not cost me too much, ask for contributions towards them as Christmas and birthday presents.

However, there are also lots of free websites that can help: FreeBMD is great for searching for birth, marriage and death records. Once found, you can use the references to order certificates from the General Register Office (GRO); FreeREG covers many parishes with transcriptions of their registers; FreeCEN – as it says, free access to census records. These are not 100% complete but are certainly excellent places to start.

If you are just starting out on your genealogy journey – or even if you have not ventured far into the internet and would like a list of helpful websites, please contact me via the Nene Valley News with an email address.

Editor's notes

Miracles do happen!
Northamptonshire County Council have found the money to fund repairs to the Oundle North bridge. Until a few days ago it seemed that there would be a very long-term weight and width restriction on traffic using the bridge but there is now a plan to have the necessary work begin early in the new year and be completed by the end of 2019. It seems the key to this change has been an agreement with central government for in-year funding to be reserved for use during the following accounting period. A couple of elements of the work plan have yet to be resolved: these are the routing of Stagecoach's X4 bus, and the imposition of a one-way traffic system around the town to ensure that large vehicles don't clog up the town centre. Oundle Town Council are working on these issues and are optimistic that both can be brought to satisfactory conclusions. The Council deserve credit for the determined manner in which they have pursued this matter; thanks must also go to local MP Tom Pursglove for his support.

Staying on the subject of roads, NCC's programme of works on major routes will come to a temporary halt for the Christmas and New Year period. Work on strategic routes ceases on 3rd December for a month, beginning again on 3rd January 2019. Councillor Ian Morris, County Council Cabinet Member for Transport, Highways and Environment, said: "We all know that

in the run-up to Christmas the amount of traffic on our roads increases enormously as people head to shops all over the county and head towards festive social events. Because of this, we take a decision each year to stop any planned highways works on major roads as this would make traffic congestion much worse. This makes complete sense, not just to people enjoying the run-up to Christmas but to the businesses in the county."

Work will still be taking place in response to emergencies and on minor routes where traffic flows are lighter. Check on your travel plans or parking arrangements at: www.smartmovenorthamptonshire.net

Although it's not strictly in our District we want to note the closure of the Rockingham Speedway. The final races at the Corby circuit took place last weekend and the site, including the race track which was opened by the Queen in 2001, will now be put to other commercial uses. A brave venture which didn't excite enough interest in a fairly crowded and specialist market.

Finally, congratulations to Glapthorn Parish Council on being voted the 2018 Northamptonshire Council of the Year by the Northamptonshire County Association of Local Councils. The full logic behind the award is reported elsewhere in this edition but we need to recognise the hard work of the Councillors and others in this small Parish which has culminated in this award – congratulations.

Local schools' collaboration launched

Six schools in the local area have signed up to a collaborative venture, the Oundle, Peterborough and East Northants Learning Partnership (OPEN LP) which will see pupils and teachers given the chance to share and enrich the educational experience. The schools involved are Kettering Buccleugh Academy, Laxton Junior, Oundle, Oundle CE Primary,

Prince William and Thomas Deacon Academy (TDA). The aims of the partnership are: first, to offer opportunities and experiences that individual schools could not, allowing pupils to work with, and be challenged by, others of similar ability or interest; then, to raise aspirations and outcomes for all pupils considering their prior attainment, interest and background; and finally, to

share resources and best practice among staff.

Although the formal launch of the project was on 14th November, a number of events have already taken place and they provide a taste of what's to come. These included: Mathematical Enrichment Conferences, providing challenges for high-attaining pupils and Continuing Professional Development for

teachers; an annual Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths Challenge with 40 Year 9 children from Oundle and 40 from TDA working over two days on a scientific project.

The Greenpower Engineering Project was launched for eight children from OPS who attended weekly sessions in the Patrick Engineering Centre to build an electric motorcar, which was eventually raced at Rockingham motor speedway; and another science week in which

545 participants passed through the Imperial College Planetarium or built rocket cars with a team from Swansea University's team of ambassadors connected to the Bloodhound land speed record attempt.

At the launch event, which was attended by over 60 Heads and staff of participating schools, there was a palpable enthusiasm for the scheme. Speakers addressed not only the opportunities for improved learning in an academic context but also stressed the

potential for producing "fully grounded young people... having a broader impact on the community... and providing a force for social good... demonstrating the need for more than pure attainment to achieve."

Looking back from a personal perspective on the education process of 50-plus years ago, one can only envy today's pupils, supported as they are by such enthusiasm and energy and confronted by such opportunities. Follow the project on Twitter via the handle @OpenLPLearning.

Council carries out waste inspections

We're all too aware of the negative impact poor recycling can have on our environment, and East Northamptonshire Council is appealing for residents to think about what they're putting in with their recycling.

The council's waste team carried out an in-depth inspection of the quality of recycling being collected from across the district and here's an example of what the team discovered:

- Black sacks and carrier bags
- Food waste
- Nappies
- Textiles and clothes
- Wood
- Green waste

When these items are placed in the green-lidded bins for recycling they can potentially spoil otherwise recyclable items. The recyclables are mostly sorted mechanically. Some contaminants can damage the sorting equipment or block sensors, while clothing

can get trapped in conveyor belts and cause a jam. There is also an increased disposal cost passed on to East Northamptonshire Council by the sorting facility if the contamination level of a load we deliver exceeds the acceptable level.

Leader of East Northamptonshire Council, Cllr Steven North, said: "The majority of people take the time to recycle responsibly; however, it is disappointing that some people put non-recyclable items such as nappies and food waste into their recycling, especially when we provide a weekly food collection. This causes the bin load to be unnecessarily contaminated.

"If anyone is unsure about what can and cannot be recycled, please check our website or contact a member of our waste team who will be able to offer guidance."

Open water swimming comes to Sywell Country Park

Local people will get the chance to try one of the UK's fastest-growing sports as open water swimming comes to Northamptonshire.

Delivered by Northamptonshire County Council, open water swimming will take place at Sywell Country Park next year offering the chance to swim in a safe and controlled environment.

The scheme is being organised by Northamptonshire Sport with strict safety management from British Triathlon and The Royal Life Saving Society.

In the first event of its kind for the county, trials are open to swimming clubs, before public sessions start in June 2019.

At least two qualified lifeguards, session leaders and two spotters will supervise sessions to make them as safe as possible for swimmers.

The initiative is being launched with a swimming festival where participants can get expert coaching to ensure they swim safely with a positive introduction to the sport.

Following the festival, a summer-long series of swimming sessions are planned and will be open to all.

County Council deputy leader and cabinet member for public health and wellbeing,

Cllr Cecile Irving-Swift said: "There are very few venues for open water swimming locally and the clean waters of Sywell Country Park provide an ideal venue for this to happen in a safe and controlled way.

"It is just the kind of sustainable programme we like to support as part of our legacy at the park and we work with clubs and groups across the county as part of our ongoing mission to get people active in Northants.

"I would emphasise that this permission is for managed open water swimming under strictly controlled circumstances and does not open the park up for swimming outside of scheduled events."

Director of Northamptonshire Sport, Chris Holmes said: "Open water swimming is a great way to explore the outdoors from a totally different perspective, it's freedom, adventure and fun all rolled together.

"As well as those chasing an adrenaline rush, outdoor swimming is also luring existing swimmers looking for something different, often after growing bored of their regular swimming pool experience.

"While you'll need to be a competent swimmer, you don't have to be a superstar to take on open water – it's a fairly simple transition from the pool."

Don't take shortcuts as the darker nights draw in

Northamptonshire Police is issuing safety advice to the public as the days get shorter and the nights get darker. Crime Prevention Team Leader, Paul Golley said: "Darkness really is a criminal's best friend and I would strongly encourage the public to arm themselves with the safety tips below in order to best prevent themselves from becoming a victim of crime during the darker nights.

"I know we all want to get to our destinations quickly when the nights are dark and the weather is cold, but please think twice about taking that shortcut and consider that adding an extra five minutes onto your journey time and staying in well-lit, busy areas may just be worth it to avoid opportunistic criminals waiting in more isolated areas.

"I'd also like to take this opportunity to say that it's a common misconception that women are the only ones that need to take extra care during the winter months. That is simply not the case. Men are also susceptible to being attacked and should also take a look at our safety tips."

- Plan ahead before you go out. Know where you're going, how you'll get there, and how you'll get back. Let someone know where you're going, and be prepared for a change of plan. Keep your purse or wallet and keys close and secure. Only take out essential items, and if you can leave valuables at home, do.
- When you're out, always walk with purpose, and stick to well-lit, busy areas, using the route you know best.

- Don't be tempted to take shortcuts that require you to stray from busy areas.
- Avoid quiet or badly-lit alleyways, subways or isolated car parks. Walk down the middle of the pavement if the street is deserted.
- Remain aware of your surroundings – don't walk along texting, making a phone call or listening to music. As well as being distracting, this advertises your valuable to criminals.
- Be a good friend and stay safe by sticking together. Encourage each other to avoid walking alone at night.
- If you regularly walk home in the dark, get a personal attack alarm approved by Sold Secure – they are widely available and inexpensive.

This new book takes a nostalgic look at the imaginative world of William Heath Robinson, one of the few artists to have given his name to the English language. According to the Oxford English Dictionary, the expression Heath Robinson is used to describe 'any absurdly ingenious and impracticable device'. You will find plenty of them here. Very Heath Robinson is full of quirky contraptions for lighting cigars, making coffee, extinguishing candles and generally making everyday life easy. You can even mow the lawn in comfort thanks to the super deluxe

Ransomes' motor mower, complete with wireless, drinks cabinet and tiffin table.

A dozen collections of Heath Robinson's work have been published over the last 80 years, starting in his lifetime, but most have been compilations of pictures with minimal text. Very Heath Robinson is the first to explain the technical and social background out of which the pictures grew and to weave art and history into a connected story. It portrays Heath Robinson as the visionary he was, foreseeing technical advances decades before they occurred

and commenting wryly on urban issues such as traffic jams, litter and flat living that regularly niggle us today.

Adam Hart-Davis is the perfect person to set the artist's mechanical fantasies in context, to tell the stories of rapid technological and social change that lay behind Heath Robinson's idiosyncratic brand of satire and to laugh along with the jokes. He has even built his own Heath Robinson-style machine.

Adam is a scientist, author, photographer, historian and broadcaster, well known in the UK for presenting the BBC television series Local Heroes

and What the Romans Did for Us, the latter spawning several spin-off series involving the Victorians, the Tudors, the

Stuarts and the Ancients. He was also a co-presenter of Tomorrow's World, and presented Science Shack.

Wildlife News

The little CCTV camera in our garden was put there to find what animal life comes with the hours of darkness, but when recording time inevitably runs into daylight hours it also pictures what goes on when we are not watching. That extra trip into the garden world may not always be quite what we hope for, but reminds us that everyday happenings make or spoil its value for all. That became clear when the daily inspections proved that visits from magpies were increasing; up to six at once is quite a crowd for a small plot. They obviously like the food we provide, but their reputation is rather shady.

This is one of the easiest birds to identify; the 'pie' in the name comes from the black-and-white plumage of this large bird, and the long tail makes up much of the shape we see outlined against the sky; allied with the harsh "chack-chack" call it is almost impossible to mistake it for anything else. But although it is a common feature of our countryside (and now gardens) its habits do not endear

it to many naturalists, and feeding is a major factor. If it was mainly clearing up the remains of dead animals, which would be unpleasant and could harbour disease, we would all be thankful. Unfortunately we find that at some times in the year it likes fresher food, like eggs unprotected by sitting parents, and even worse when nestlings become the 'meal of the day'. Other film shows that they can be quite aggressive against other birds, both their own species and other visitors, even when there is plenty of food to go round.

Because magpies have been part of the country scene for so long they take their place in local folklore, especially about the numbers seen at one time, but the words are not always the same, so what you remember may depend on where you grew up. One example starts "one for sorrow, two for joy, three for a girl and four for a boy" but other versions are available; I wonder what reply covers the six outside our window a couple of days ago!

Rules for business growth

Many a company's inability to adapt to the Internet has been the blame for their downfall. But how realistic is it that online shopping could be the culprit? Following a recent project with an online wine retailer, research indicates that 50% of consumers buy online, however of that, 43% also buy offline, so what does this tell us?

In this highly competitive world where we are prompted to purchase products multiple times throughout the day, sometimes the most convenient option is also the closest option. Although promoted as a timesaver, online shopping still requires a thought process and a convenient delivery slot. So if the Internet is not the sole reason for a company's collapse, what other factors could be involved?

In his book, *How Brands Grow*, Byron Sharpe makes several

observations to help companies achieve success. He states that customer defection rates for companies with a small market share will be higher than for companies with a large market share. Something many business managers might assume is to do with customer loyalty or ineffective sales people. Sharpe goes on to say that all companies suffer around 50% customer defection, therefore there is a much greater opportunity to increase market share by picking up competitors' customers, than if you only focus on loyalty.

Take the business manager who thinks it's a sales issue. They go out and find a sales trainer and spend the next year wondering why profits are not rising. Little did they know that increasing sales by 1% would only provide

3.3% more profit? If instead they had looked at reducing variable costs, by 1%, they would have made 6.5% more profit. But it is increasing the selling price that provides the greatest profitability – with 1% increase comes 10.3% more profit.

Discounting however is the number one killer of profitability. Reduce the price by just 10%, and you need to make 50% more sales to achieve the same amount of money. So, the next time you go searching for bargains, please remember the loss of some of our most loved retailers and the impact that prices have on a business' success or failure.




