900 Voices – Stories from The Nene

Friday 7th December saw the launch of a remarkable online archive relating to the stretch of River Nene from Northampton to Peterborough as part of Peterborough Celebrates 900.

The launch was held in the Knights' Chamber at Peterborough Cathedral and was the culmination of nearly a year's work involving meeting people and collecting their stories from all the way along the Nene. One to One Development Trust gathered stories, created film and devised an installation about the River Nene for the Heritage Lottery funded Nenescape. The launch event included film, audio, photography and the spoken word in celebration of our wonderful river. It was followed by showcases of

900 Voices for the public at two other local venues.

The interactive installation will soon be downloadable from the website (900voicesofthenene.co.uk) and the archive is now live and searchable at the same address.

Subject to further funding, Nenescape aims to take the installation on tour back up the valley to Northampton, sharing it with lots of people on the way and extending the content of the archive.

It's a memorable project which is well worth a viewing.

New scheme launched in Oundle

East Northamptonshire Council (ENC) has teamed up with Lakeside Healthcare and Volunteer Action to provide residents in Oundle and the surrounding areas with access to a wide range of services all in one place.

The new scheme, Connecting Services, aims to assist members of the local community and provide residents with access to advice and a host of different services, without having to travel.

Residents will be able to speak to ENC's

customer service team about a number of council services, including planning applications, council tax, benefit maximisation, debt advice, food banks, pest control and waste.

As well as Volunteer Action, who can offer advice on blue badge and attendance allowance applications, provide community transport and a befriending service.

These organisations are located in Fletton House which is next door to the Oundle surgery, making

it easier for residents to speak to various organisations in one place.

The scheme was established to support GPs – who are seeing an increase in the number of appointments that aren't solely health-related.

Through the scheme, GPs and reception staff within each service can assist directly and navigate residents by identifying which service can best offer support.

Residents will be given a referral card and directed to the right place.

Genealogy jottings

It is all very well finding names and dates of your ancestors but how about the lives of those folk that you are finding? What were their living conditions like? Did they do anything that was reported in any newspapers? What did they do in the wars?

Various websites can help you to get a flavour of their lives. Have a rummage for any that cover the villages and towns in which they lived. One branch of mine came from a village in Essex which is rather spread out along a road – in fact it is almost like two small villages. It was only whilst looking into the history of the place that I discovered that, during the Great Plague, many of the villagers moved up the road so as to be away from infection. Therefore, one part was full of plague whilst the other was free of it. A couple of houses have since been built between the two communities, but it does have two distinct settlements!

Another helpful place to have a poke around in is Trade Directories, as well as on pay per view websites – there are also a number of free ones available. They can help you chart the fortunes of your folk over the years as their businesses and homes

change from one to another. A great, great grandfather of mine ran a greengrocer's in Eastbourne and it was interesting to discover where those premises were in the town. It was also interesting to find him mentioned in the newspaper in later years – as a bankrupt! If you suddenly find yourself researching an area with which you are not familiar, it is a good idea to have a map of the area to hand. But remember – what was once a village with green fields and countryside could now well be part of a throbbing metropolis!

Have you heard of the Booth Poverty Maps at all? They are marvellous at telling you what living conditions were like in London. The classifications range from Lowest class (vicious, semi-criminal) through to Upper-middle and upper classes (wealthy). The blocks of houses are marked in different colours so that it is easy to differentiate. Fascinating stuff!

Editor's notes

This will be the final edition of the Nene Valley News for this year; our next edition will be published on 12th January. One other notable event in the intervening four weeks, apart from anything to do with Christmas, the New Year or our departure from the EU, will be the passing of the winter solstice and the shortest day, which will occur on 21st December and we can look forward to the longer days of spring!

Another thing you might be doing ahead of our next edition is making a New Year's resolution. If so, you would be following a tradition which has roots in ancient history. The Babylonians used to promise their gods they would pay off their debts and return anything they had borrowed, while the Romans began each year with promises to the god Janus. In the Medieval era, knights took the 'Peacock Vow' at the end of the Christmas season each year to re-affirm their commitment to chivalry. Whatever you choose, the secret is to make it something which you can achieve; it's estimated that around a third of resolutions aren't kept because people set unrealistic targets.

The mention of a miracle in the last 'Notes' obviously had an adverse effect on the improvements to the Oundle North bridge; it seems that although the money is in place, some of the essential preliminary works have not been done and the programme, if there is one, is already slipping to the right. The immediate problem appears to be in gaining

access to land from which to effect some of the work. The land in question is owned by a charity and, while their agent would deal with the required contract, their trustees will need to vote on any arrangement and they meet only infrequently; thus, it's expected that it will take at least 2/3 months to bring to a conclusion. Add Christmas and New Year into the mix and that's a further month of delay.

Those of you who rely on the Stagecoach bus services in and around Oundle will need to keep a close eye on their website at www.stagecoachbus.com for alterations to routes and timings because of the bridge width/weight restrictions. It's expected that changes will need to be implemented early in the New Year. Alternatively, if you can't find the timetable information you need on, or don't have access to, their website contact Traveline. They're open from 7am to 10pm on weekdays and 8am to 10pm at weekends and their number is 0871 2002233.

Don't forget that you have until 17th December to register your views on the East Northants Council Local Plan which seeks to set the framework for development in the District from 2011 to 2031. To view the consultation documents, including an online response form, visit www.east-northamptonshire.gov.uk/localplan2.

GP Extended Access is here

NHS Nene Clinical Commissioning Group is ensuring access to primary care services, including GPs and nurses, is much easier with an extra 334 appointments per week now available.

Under the GP Extended Access Service patients registered with Nene Member Practices will be able to make appointments at times that are more convenient to them, including evenings until 8pm, weekends and Bank Holidays.

Benefits of the GP Extended Access Service include:

- Appointments at more convenient times
- 334 additional appointments per week for patients
- Wide range of appointments available with different healthcare professionals

Dr Naomi Caldwell, Clinical Primary Care lead said: "We understand our patients are leading increasingly busy lives and there is now much more demand to be able to see a GP or nurse outside normal working hours.

"The GP Extended Access Service has been commissioned to make it much more convenient for patients to book an appointment at a time which suits them, including evenings and weekends. Patients needing a primary care appointment will still contact their GP practice in the usual way but now may be offered an appointment with the GP Extended Access Service, if this is right for them."

The service is being delivered by a collaboration of GP practices in the area and is exactly like an appointment at a patient's GP practice. The service can see babies and children, and nurse appointments for certain treatments may be available where required.

Patients needing urgent care when their practice is closed should continue to call NHS 111 in the usual way.

Fermynwoods Contemporary Art

What happens when nature

and industry mix? Artist Justin Carter answers this in his new exhibition Blood From Stone. As part of his residency with Fermynwoods Contemporary Art, Justin researched the area as a site of ancient industry, iron smelters having been fuelled by the abundance of wood fuel from Rockingham Forest. Transforming this historic relationship between Oak and Ore to the visual, Justin combined oak galls and bark from the landscape with rust removed from local ironstone quarries' dragline buckets to make iron gall ink. Prints made from this ink will be exhibited alongside the detritus of his own creative industry.

As part of the exhibition launch, Justin will be in conversation with Susannah O'Riordan, Roots of Rockingham Project Officer for the Back from the Brink project.

Work underway to transform derelict site

A derelict row of terraced housing in Irthlingborough, Northamptonshire, which was plagued by anti-social behaviour, is to be transformed into a collection of affordable new homes.

Spire Homes and Higham Ferrers-based developer Snowdon Homes have recently finished clearing the

site on High Street to make way for the construction of six new properties for affordable rent.

The project, which has received a £300,000 grant from Homes England, comprises three two-bedroom and three three-bedroom homes.

Work to demolish the existing century-old buildings

finished earlier this month, in preparation for the next phase of the development, which is due to be completed in April 2019.

Help to combat puppy smuggling this Christmas

With Christmas just around the corner, you might be thinking about buying a puppy to join your family, but there are puppies being illegally transported into our country each year and it is important to make sure that you buy from a licensed breeder.



New legislation came into effect in October 2018, overhauling current animal licensing laws and providing East Northamptonshire Council (ENC) with more powers to combat puppy smuggling in the district.

Dog breeders operating as a business, must now apply for a licence from East Northamptonshire Council. Adverts selling pets must include a photograph of the pet, the country of origin and residence of pet, licence number and the name of the local authority issuing the licence.

Officers at ENC are able to suspend, vary and revoke

licences where conditions are not being complied with, where the law is being breached or where it is necessary to protect animal welfare. If the council becomes aware of dog breeding taking place without a licence, officers are also able to investigate with a view to prosecuting the individuals concerned.

Steven North, Leader of East Northamptonshire Council, said: "The recent changes in legislation will enable our officers to help stop puppies being sold illegally in our district, and ensure residents have the essential information to make sure that they are buying pets from a responsible breeder."

"If you're looking to buy a puppy this festive season, it is important that you check that breeders hold the relevant licence, to make sure that the person selling is doing so legitimately."

Oundle Museum celebrates its 25th Anniversary

Oundle's award winning museum recently celebrated its 25th birthday at the Hub with many of the voluntary Stewards and Friends who have tirelessly and diligently supported the museum throughout.

Over the years the museum has undergone many changes. Starting life in the upper room of the Drill Hall with no experience but plenty of enthusiasm, the staff of the entirely volunteer run museum have managed to produce a new themed exhibition each year with most of the material provided on loan from local people and organisations.

In 2000 the museum, with the aid of a Heritage Lottery grant joined

Oundle Town Council in the refurbished Courthouse and was able to expand its scope with new display equipment.

There is a permanent gallery and areas devoted to the current theme as well as parts of the old courthouse including the 'prisoner' in the remand cell.

In recent years the museum has gained six successes in the County Heritage Award scheme, including Museum of the Year in 2009 and this year the award for Best Volunteer Display came to Oundle. It was also one of the first in the county to become a fully Accredited Museum.

Scotts of Thrapston hands over the keys to second pavilion for Oxfordshire cricket club

A Northamptonshire company has handed over the keys to a much-anticipated second pavilion which marks a historic turning point for a long-established cricket club located near Banbury.

Scotts of Thrapston, specialists in the manufacture and installation of bespoke timber framed buildings, is behind the new pavilion which has been created for Cropredy Cricket Club.

The club, based in Williamscot Road, was formed in 1927 and has been based at its current home since 1995. It boasts excellent facilities, including a purpose-built score box, practice nets, full pitch covers and site screens.

After a lengthy two-year planning process and continued in-depth consultation with Cherwell District Council, full planning permission was granted in January 2018. Working closely with consulting

structural engineers, M&E engineers and energy assessors, Scotts has produced a high-performing tailor-made building.

The club worked closely with Scotts' in-house architect and design manager, Bryn Lee, to create a building that will meet all the club's future needs.

Peter Cooling, Chairman of Cropredy Cricket Club, said: "A little over five years ago, we began our first conversations about the feasibility of a second ground and changing facilities adjacent to our existing ground.

"I don't believe any of us involved in those initial conversations would have foreseen or even dared to

dream that we would have ended up with the state-of-the-art facilities that we now have. The new pavilion massively exceeds what we first envisaged and will provide cricket and social facilities that will be the envy of clubs for miles around.

"We now have additional capacity and facilities to provide cricket for the village of Cropredy and surrounding areas that will enable us to continue our growth and our aim to be both the Premier and Stand Out village club in North Oxfordshire and beyond."

Bryn Lee, from Scotts, said: "Scotts of Thrapston has designed, engineered, manufactured and installed the pavilion providing a club room, with kitchen and bar facilities, new changing rooms with showers, an umpire and officials' changing room and large raised verandah for watching the game in play. We are delighted to hand over the keys to a project that will bring a

real benefit to the local community."

The building is designed as a 'hybrid', using a traditional panelised timber frame with a cantilevered glulam beam supporting the main roof structure in the club room, to create a natural aesthetic and volume.

The superstructure was

manufactured in-house at Scotts' factory in Thrapston and was delivered to the Cropredy grounds in kit form being craned into place on site. All machining and plate connections were carried out in-house by Scotts' joiners to millimetre accuracy prior to assembly.

Second major sports award for Oundle primary school

Oundle Church of England Primary School is celebrating after winning the prestigious Northamptonshire Sports Premium Award at a recent prize ceremony. The school was singled out by the judges for demonstrating exactly how sports premium money has affected teaching and learning beneficially and, specifically, proving that PE and sport is successfully embedded in the curriculum and the ethos of the school.

Oundle Primary fought off strong competition to secure the award while they were also finalists in the overall Northamptonshire Sports School of the Year category. Strong commitment by teachers assisted

by coaches from outside agencies, including Peterborough Football Club, ensured that 77 per cent of Key Stage Two children and as many as 90 per cent of pupils supported by sports premium took part in active or healthy after-school clubs. Sports premium funding is vital in order to give some of the children a better chance in PE and sport and I guess we have used that opportunity to the full."

Oundle Primary is also bidding

to win the national government-led School Games platinum mark next year after securing a gold mark in 2018 for the fourth consecutive

year. This was to reward their commitment to development of competition across the school and into the local community.



Plans to tackle crime in Rushden

Retailers throughout Rushden will soon be signed up to the latest information on prolific shoplifters following agreement from Rushden Town Council to fund membership for High Street retailers and many outlying stores to an intelligence gathering scheme.

Rushden Town Council has pledged to support retailers across the town to enrol with Northamptonshire Business Crime Partnership (NBCP), a non-profit organisation aimed at clamping down on retail crime.

NBCP provides some 500 retailers across the county with the latest information and intelligence around prolific shoplifters and allows retailers to report crimes online to Northamptonshire Police. It also runs an exclusion order scheme that targets repeat offenders and bans them from member stores for a minimum of 12 months.

The ethos of the NBCP is to PREVENT, DISRUPT and DETER retail crime offenders. This is achieved

by working together with member stores and the police to make shopping areas a no-go area for those persons intent on committing retail crime.

Northamptonshire Police and Crime Commissioner Stephen Mold supports NBCP, and he praised the actions of Rushden Town Council in ensuring that retailers in the town

can access their services. He said: "I congratulate Rushden Town Council on their proactive approach to creating a safer town. Teaming up with the Northamptonshire Business Crime Partnership will help to tackle shop crime and prolific offenders and I am confident it will promote a better environment for both shoppers and staff."



Wildlife News

A topic discussed by many people over many years has hit the headlines again recently, though with a changed name. Once called the "greenhouse effect" it is now more often named "climate change" or "global warming". It reminds us that the effects affect all of us, not just the animal and plant life outside.

There was once disagreement about whether any changes were real or just short-lived, but most experts now accept that our climate is being altered, though causes are far less clear. This was not just because of the hot summer in 2018, with all kinds of records being broken, but because historical records now show what is happening, and the signs are that we may be getting close to a 'point of no return' when the changes have gone too far to be turned round – an idea held by many experts throughout the world (including one of the best-known naturalists, Sir David Attenborough, who paid a visit to the county recently). Some changes may appear welcome, but it is

easy to forget that the effects can spread out like ripples on a pond and cause unexpected results in different places.

We can argue that given time nature always sorts itself out to hide changes, and we can see evidence of that when we pay a visit to any of the local reserves where humans have caused changes; this is not just in the lakes in the Nene Valley itself after gravel or ironstone quarrying, but in many other areas scattered round the county. But recovery depends on the climate still providing conditions that the struggling wildlife needs; if that climate changes the remaining wildlife may not succeed in patching itself up, and animals and plants can disappear – forever, in the worst cases. This reasoning is used in the current campaign to save forests where orangutans live, now being destroyed in the world's demand for palm oil. The big danger, which might only be tens of years away, is that it could happen if we do not do our own bit before it is too late.

There are an estimated one million cases of food poisoning in the UK every year, and without attention to food hygiene, this doesn't stop during the festive season. East Northamptonshire Council is sharing top tips from the Food Standards Agency.

Top Tips

- 1) When Christmas food shopping, take sufficient bags with you so that you can separate out raw and ready-to-eat foods to avoid cross-contamination.
- 2) Check the guidance on your turkey to ensure you have enough time to fully defrost it – it could take as much as four days.
- 3) Don't wash raw turkey; it just splashes germs onto your hands, clothes, utensils and worktops.
- 4) To work out the cooking time for your bird, check the instructions on the packaging. Check: the meat is steaming hot throughout; there is no pink meat visible when you cut into the thickest part and meat juices run clear.
- 5) Whether you cooked your turkey from frozen or fresh, your turkey leftovers can be used to make a new meal (such

as a turkey curry). This new meal can then be frozen, but make sure you only reheat it once.

Leader of East Northamptonshire Council, Cllr Steven North, said: "East Northamptonshire Council is supporting the Food Standards Agency's Season Eatings campaign, to help you relieve some of the stress of preparing your Christmas meal and to keep your family safe during the festive season."

Adam Hardgrave, Head of Foodborne Disease Control at the Food Standards Agency, said: "The four Cs of food hygiene: Chilling, Cleaning, Cooking and avoiding Cross-contamination are important throughout the year, but especially at Christmas..."

"...An average-sized turkey can take four days to fully thaw in the fridge, and it is vital to thoroughly cook a turkey so that the meat is steaming hot, there is no pink meat visible, and that the meat juices run clear."
