Government says yes to two unitary councils for Northamptonshire

Two brand new unitary councils will be established in Northamptonshire on 1st April 2021 (Vesting Day), the Government has confirmed. The North Northamptonshire unitary will cover Corby, East Northants, Kettering and Wellingborough and the West Northamptonshire unitary will cover Daventry, Northampton and South Northamptonshire. The existing district and borough councils and Northamptonshire County Council will all be abolished.



The Secretary of State James Brokenshire has reviewed all the evidence and representations received, and has now decided that replacing the eight councils with two unitary authorities is in the best interests of the residents of Northamptonshire.

Parliamentary Orders will follow later this year and there will be elections to the Shadow Authorities in May 2020. Shadow Executives for the two unitaries will be selected from those elected and will determine the structure, budget and service delivery models for the new councils.

Services which complement one

another but are currently divided between the district, borough and county councils – such as bin collections, waste disposal, planning and roads – will be brought together under each of the two unitary councils.

Leaders of the current authorities said that now that a decision has been made, the preparations to build a better future for Northamptonshire's residents and businesses, providing more responsive, innovative services, could continue with certainty.

In a joint comment, the council leaders of Corby Borough Council (Tom Beattie), Daventry District

Council (Chris Millar), East Northamptonshire Council (Steven North), Kettering Borough Council (Russell Roberts), Northampton Borough Council (Jonathan Nunn), Northamptonshire County Council (Matt Golby), South Northamptonshire Council (Cllr Ian McCord) and Borough Council of Wellingborough (Martin Griffiths), said: "We have been working hard towards an anticipated 2020 Vesting Day but that was always going to be a tight timetable to meet if we were going to transform services as well as ensuring that they were safe and legal on that date.

"We therefore welcome the announcement that Vesting Day will be 1st April 2021. That gives us more time to plan carefully and confidently for the future to ensure that we create two sustainable unitary councils that, while being very different in nature, will be exemplars of how to provide excellent services for our residents."

There will be elections to the Shadow Authorities in May 2020, so those newly-elected councillors will be able to work with officers to design and implement the new councils for several months ahead of Vesting Day.

Council scheme to fund more community projects

Community groups across the district are invited to apply for funding towards delivering their projects as East Northamptonshire Council's (ENC) Community Facilities Fund (CFF) opens for the seventh year.

The initiative was introduced by ENC in 2013 to support the development of public facilities throughout the district, and is funded by the money it receives from central government through the 'New Homes Bonus' as new homes are created in the district.

The council is committed to supporting as many community projects as possible and this round will be managed slightly differently to previous rounds. For round seven community groups will be able to apply for up to £10,000 with no requirement for match funding.

Constituted community groups including voluntary organisations and charities, as

well as town and parish councils, can submit one application for a grant of up to £10,000 for capital projects, with no requirement for match funding, which aim to enhance the district and benefit the whole community.

Previous recipients include Islip Parish Council, awarded £9,975 towards new play equipment; Thrapston Bowls Club, which received a grant of £10,000 towards maintenance equipment; and Different Direction Choir which benefitted from a new PA system and amp after securing £3,000.

Genealogy jottings

Last time, I mentioned that if you can visit Record Offices or Archives to see original documents – or at least copies of them – it is better than relying on someone else's transcript. When looking for my 'Bailey' ancestors, the transcripts showed that there were rather a lot of them living in Theberton, Suffolk. So many, in fact, that further investigation showed that births and baptisms to the same couple, Thomas and Ann, were happening every few months – rather unrealistic timescales were discovered! On reading the originals I discovered that there was a family named 'Barley' with parents Thomas and Ann. The parish records were rather faded and so the transcriber had misread the 'r' in Barley to be a letter 'i' but without the dot over it. Easily done, but it does show how you should not take anything at face value.

But... if you are unable to make the journey, do contact the Archives or Record Office as they are practised in such matters and should be able to look information up

for you. However, do keep the information that you give them concise and relevant. If you are wanting to know if there is a baptism for your great, great grandfather Albert, they need to know approximate dates and even the names of siblings and parents if you have those details. What they don't want to know is that Albert had a dog and was a bit of a lad about town! Keep waffle to a minimum and state clearly what it is that you want to know about your ancestor. Then, ask how much it would cost for a member of their staff to look up such details. You never know – if you provide clear information that enables them to look up the entries easily, you might even get away without being charged, although most charges are reasonable.

Editor's notes

Perhaps it's because the better weather is encouraging more outdoor activities but there seems to be a proliferation of date-expired posters around the District. It may be just about acceptable for event organisers to advertise at the roadside, although not everyone takes such a relaxed view and it's generally acknowledged that there are road safety implications, but when events are over please would organisers take responsibility for removing the bills!

The announcement on our front page of the decision to adopt a Two-Unitary-Authority structure in Northamptonshire is being broadly welcomed. What hasn't been so widely broadcast is the associated decision to make Children's Services across the county a standalone Trust, delivering services for these new authorities. The Children's Commissioner tasked with resolving the problems in Northamptonshire has said: "The service is still very fragile and there remain unacceptable risks in the system."

Malcolm Newsam's report was published by Local Government Secretary James Brokenshire at the same time as his long-awaited announcement about the Unitary Councils. Among other things, the Commissioner's report highlights: a prevalent culture of complacency within management and the lack of accountability or consequence for poor performance; unacceptable risks in the system which need to be addressed quickly; and a shortfall in

the very basics of professional social work standards with some teams demonstrating poor compliance. It adds that this situation has been exacerbated by the levels of remuneration for social workers which have been significantly less than many other councils in the region.

This is our last opportunity to remind you to exercise your vote in the elections to the European Parliament on 23rd May. The need for the UK to participate is based on the assumption that Parliament won't have approved a Withdrawal Agreement by 22nd May. East Midlands voters must choose between 40 candidates from eight different declared political persuasions, plus one independent candidate. This election is not based on the 'First past the post' (FPTP), but a form of proportional representation considered more representative but which may still result in many wasted votes, as it tends to favour larger parties.

Many commentators, and tellingly the bookmakers, believe the results will be heavily in favour of the new Brexit Party because of voters' disillusionment with the two main Westminster parties and the failure of the Remain parties to form a credible alliance. Voting across Europe won't be complete until 26th May. The new parliament sits for the first time on 2nd July; then there is an August recess and so, with Brexit due by 31st October, the new MEPs could have a very short working life.

Uncertain future for Wicksteed Park Dragon Boats event

The popular event will not take place this year, but it is hoped that the successful fundraising will continue in the future.

In 2009 six local Rotary Clubs agreed to work together to organise a Dragon Boats Festival. It would be professionally run by Gable Events and Rotary would provide the venue, the teams and the finance. Sponsorship of the boats and the teams would raise the funds which would be distributed to local charities.

The first Dragon Boat Races were held at Lilford Lodge lakes in 2010 when £8,500 was raised for our Air Ambulance, Lakelands Hospice and Cransley Hospice. The following year

was a test of character: everyone arrived safely but by the time the races had started so had the rain and it continued until it was a total deluge and racers and supporters struggled to escape from the site.

The move to Wicksteed Park was a good one. The course was better and the venue more accessible. Local Rotary Clubs under the Chairmanship of Alan Armson from the Rushden Chichele Club and local businesses continued their support until the event was putting 40 teams onto

the water. Local traders and charities brought their stalls and amusements to make it a family event and most important of all the weather held good for the next five years.

Nene Valley Dragon Boats has raised over £200,000 during its lifetime with last year's event achieving a record £35,435. Cransley and Lakelands Hospices each received £9,524, and the organising Rotary Clubs received £1,632 each to distribute to their own special charities. The event also provided the opportunity for other charities to raise funds for themselves: Kettering Home Start raised £1,982, Northants Association for the Blind £1,647, Zachary's

Shack £1,912, SERVE £1,980 and Ramsey Rotary Club £800.

So it is particularly sad and disappointing that there will be no Dragon Boats Event in 2019. Chairman Alan Armson, with his committee, has nurtured the event and ensured its success but he is now unable to continue. Alan has given exemplary Rotary Service and regrets that no other individual or organisation is willing or able to take up the reins. The recipe for success is in place but it needs a committed individual or team to take up the challenge.

This is not necessarily the end for the Dragon Boats but there will be no event this year.

Charity swim



The Nene Valley Swimmers recently took part in the Cransley Hospice (Kettering) swimming challenge with not one but two teams. They decided to field a team of boys and another of girls, with each team challenged to swim as many lengths as possible in just one hour.

The winners were the girls, who completed 862 lengths to the boys' 848 – a close run thing. The more impressive result was that the teams raised £860 for the Hospice. Nene Valley Swimming Club is based in Thrapston and they train all their swimmers to a high standard in a very friendly and caring atmosphere.
