Mission to Mars for young students at Tresham College

Schoolchildren from across Northamptonshire spent a day at Tresham College in Corby during half-term, being inspired to become the scientists and engineers of the future.

As part of a Routes Into STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and

Mathematics) programme organised by the Engineering Development Trust, Tresham College developed a unique

programme of experiences for the students with a 'Mission to Mars' theme including: building a robotic



Mars Lander; UV protection; and building habitats on the red planet.

The Bedford College Group Director of STEM, Jo Baxter said: "This has been a fantastic opportunity for Tresham College to work with EDT and local schools to raise student awareness of the STEM options in Further Education. These students have been able to experience our state-of-the-art computer, science and engineering equipment here at Corby Campus and hopefully they will return to study with us in the future."

The Routes Into STEM programme is part of the EDT Industrial Cadet Scheme where young people can progress through a series of awards from age 9-21 years. The aim is to encourage students to study STEM subjects and support them with innovative courses,

gaining first-hand experience of life at college, university and in the workplace.

Routes into STEM Co-ordinator Steve Ross said: "EDT are very grateful to Tresham College for hosting day 1 of a three-day course called Routes into STEM. Tresham College arranged a packed agenda of hands-on science, engineering and computing activities, which were arranged to show students different aspects of STEM learning. The course itself is designed to highlight to students that FE colleges, as well as universities, can provide the education necessary for exciting and diverse career options in the STEM arena."

Genealogy jottings

The year 1752: a very important year in history and one that needs to be borne in mind if you are researching your family history. Why? Well, it was in that year that the calendar changed from the Julian system to the Gregorian system. In previous years, the method for calculating leap years had come adrift and so dates were mismatched with the seasons. Most of Europe was already using the Gregorian calendar by this time and so there was the added confusion of travelling abroad and finding that you had travelled further through time than you thought!

It took an Act of Parliament two years earlier to put the mechanisms into place for the changes. There were three main adjustments: The formula for calculating leap years changed, New Year's day moved from 25th March to 1st January and 11 days were shelved in order to help bring things in line. These dates were September 3rd to 13th 1752 inclusive – so don't try looking for events during those dates!

If you are looking at records before 1752, remember... New Year's Day was 25th March and so the dates would be 24th March 1745 followed by 25th March 1746... This is especially puzzling if you find that someone appears to have died before they

were born. A babe might arrive on 12th November 1747 and be buried on 14th February 1747, but they would be three months old. Confusing, eh?

This is why you will find some dates transcribed as January 1731/32 for example, showing that it was still 1731 in the Julian calendar but would be 1732 if using the Gregorian calendar. When recording your own family's dates, it would be as well to follow suit as then it would be a gentle reminder to bear in mind that from January to March before 1752, the year could do with a second look.

Editor's notes

Citizens Advice has revealed statistics showing that 72% of the population have been the target of scams in the last two years. These figures were released ahead of Scam Awareness Fortnight which runs from 10th-23rd June. To coincide with the event, East Northamptonshire Council (ENC) has issued a warning to residents across the district to be wary and to report anything suspicious.

Councillor Steven North, Leader of ENC, said: "With nearly three-quarters of us having been victims of scams, it is important that the public are vigilant and report anything suspicious. The elderly remain the most vulnerable, with criminals still using the more traditional techniques, alongside the recent rise in cyber scams."

Citizens Advice has put together the following advice: if unsure, say "no" and don't be pressured to make an instant decision; be aware of the potential of encountering rogue traders or postal scams and always keep your personal details safe; if possible, research the credentials of the company you're dealing with and be online savvy by checking who you're communicating with; finally, if you're suspicious talk to someone you trust and if necessary report a scam.

If you think you or someone you know might have been the victim of a scam, contact Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040.

Meanwhile a motion of no confidence in the leadership of Northamptonshire County Council's Matt Golby is to be debated at a full council meeting on 20th June. The motion reads: 'This Council calls for the resignation of Northamptonshire County Council leader Matt Golby due to his inability over six years to deliver improvements in our children's services.'

This situation has arisen because of the failings of the Council's Children's Services and in particular the high-profile murders of two Northamptonshire children; the serious case reviews found that mistakes had been made by Council professionals and that opportunities had been missed.

The matter was also raised in Parliament, with Philip Hollobone, MP for Kettering, saying responsibility for the failings must rest with Conservative-run Northamptonshire County Council. He said: "The public in Kettering want to know who is going to take responsibility for this appalling tragedy and I'm afraid the answer must lie with the local councillor in charge of children's services at the time. That individual now happens to be the leader of Northamptonshire County Council. He is a good man and he is working very hard to transform the council into the two unitaries, but I believe that the buck most stop with the person at the top." Last week Cllr Golby said he would not be stepping down.

Cllr O'Rourke said: "It is an honour for me to be elected as your Mayor of Higham Ferrers, a role which as far as I know, has been around for about 700 years.

"I have lived in Higham Ferrers for over 50 years, growing up here along with

my nine siblings and parents, firstly on the farm which is now the Queensway estate. I went to the infant and junior schools and for some years worked in the High Street, so I have seen the town grow over the years.

"It promises to be a very busy and exciting year

for me, and my Mayoress Kathleen Meredith and we are both looking forward to it.

"This year we have lots of events, with the opening of the Memorial Garden in the Churchyard on 15th June, the Charter Celebration Day on 29th June, the visit of our friends from our

twinning town Hachenburg in Germany from 18th-22nd July, as well as a horticultural competition in Chichele Gardens on 14th September. There will also be a community Christmas Carol Concert on the market square on Christmas Eve, organised by the Swivel Club.

"These events, along with our other annual town events, would not be possible without the help and support of all our local groups, who give their time freely working in conjunction with the Town Council to make them successful. That is why I have decided to nominate 'Higham Ferrers Community' as one of my good causes/charities. It is important to me to help those who help our town.

"The other charity I am supporting is the Encephalitis Society, which is a lesser-known national charity.

"Encephalitis is inflammation of the brain caused by infection and can lead to memory loss and epilepsy. It is something

Raynor Winn: The Salt Path

Saturday 22nd June at 7.45pm, St Peter's Church, North Street, Oundle

The remarkable and life-affirming true story of one couple's 630-mile journey around the South West Coast Path. The Salt Path is a beautiful, powerfully honest and deeply moving memoir about overcoming adversity, the redemptive qualities of walking and nature, survival, the meaning of 'home' and above all, love.

In one devastating week, Raynor and her husband Moth lost their home of 20 years, just as a terminal diagnosis threatened to take away their future together. With nowhere else to go, they decided to walk the South West Coast Path: a 630-mile sea-swept trail from Somerset to Dorset, via Devon and Cornwall.

This ancient, wind-battered landscape strips them of every comfort they had previously known. With very little money for food or shelter, Raynor and Moth carry only the essentials for survival on their backs. They live wild in the ancient, weathered landscape of cliffs, sea and sky. Yet through every step, every encounter and every test along the way, their walk becomes a

remarkable journey.

Unitary programme re-designed to include transformation of services

Following the announcement that two brand new unitary councils will be established in Northamptonshire on 1st April 2021, the eight councils involved have agreed a way forward to deliver a programme that will see better quality service delivery across the county.

A transformation programme has been agreed now that Vesting Day has been set for 2021, allowing time to create much more than just two 'safe and legal' authorities.

In a joint comment, the council leaders of Corby Borough Council (Tom Beattie), Daventry District Council (Chris Millar), East Northamptonshire Council (Steven North), Kettering Borough Council (Russell Roberts), Northampton Borough Council (Jonathan Nunn), Northamptonshire County Council (Matt Golby), South Northamptonshire Council (Cllr Ian McCord) and Borough Council of Wellingborough (Martin Griffiths), said: "Now that Vesting Day is later than originally anticipated, we've

revisited our programme and built in transformational work that will ensure we can deliver better integrated services from day one, rather than after the creation of the new councils.

"Sustainability is key to the success of the two new unitary authorities and part of that is creating services that provide what residents need when they need it most and are flexible. We're working with health, the voluntary sector and other key stakeholders to make it easier for residents to access the services they need and make sure the right people are working together to deliver that service.

"The programme will be delivered by a team made up of

staff from all eight authorities as well as some external programme management support. A Chief

Executive from each current authority will lead each of the projects that make up the

programme, making it a plan that is owned and delivered by all Northamptonshire councils."

Organisations are working together to provide homes for homeless households

Wildlife News

Seasonal events happen in the countryside so quickly that we cannot rely on the calendar, but must look for the life-cycles of the plants and animals out there, or in our own gardens.

For example, a few days ago we decided that we were on the feeding route of a hedgehog almost every night, until suddenly a second one showed up on the CCTV. Everything suggested that this was a pair, but grey pictures on a monitor are not very helpful even if the two sexes look different. Of course we had to look for a supply of specialised food, remembering that bread-and-milk is at best only an emergency standby.

Summer visitors are now here, sitting on clutches of eggs or even feeding the babies. Early comers, and those with us all year round, get a head start on the feast and young sparrows and starlings have been flying, and 'learning the ropes', for two or three weeks, threatening to take all available space on the feeders or waiting for a gap big enough to squeeze into – no room for good manners!

Young frogs and toads are crawling out of their ponds and setting off into the undergrowth; a dead-looking specimen on a mat of water plant turned out to be a toadlet sunning itself, and after examination it made its way slowly into hiding. Our local reserves help species

like newts which need suitable safe spots to keep up their numbers.

Plants show similar patterns of behaviour, but at a steadier pace, covering more months in the year. Yellows and white of early spring give way to deeper reds and oranges to attract help from the insects, but then the plant will feed on nutrients in the soil to produce their seed, just like growth and development in the animal kingdom.

For wildlife this is the busy time of year so don't be surprised if birds stop singing to get on with their jobs. Even the cuckoo, with no domestic chores, will soon be quiet before setting off on its travels to leave us in peace.

Your Health – Which chair is best?

I've been asked by a patient which chair to buy. It's something we get asked a lot when treating people with back, shoulder, wrist and neck pain.

One thing is very clear to me, and I need you to pay attention to this: you cannot rely on a 'good' chair to stop your pain.

You see, we are not designed to sit for hours on end. Our bodies want to move around. They want to walk, run, play and pootle. Some of them even want to walk up and down gardens pushing a lawnmower (personally I'd

rather do three marathons up mountains, while carrying a small donkey.)

But, most of us do have to sit for part of the day. When we sit for long periods of time our postural muscles fatigue. And then we slouch in the chair. This is the time when a good chair is important: when you're tired of sitting still, but you're not prepared to get up and move. A good chair will support you when your postural muscles have had enough.

You need a chair that is comfortable, shaped well for your back, adjustable and with arm

rests, but not with long arm rests. Long arm rests stop your hands reaching your keyboard.

In my experience gym balls, knee chairs and other strange posture gadgets have their place, but none of them will support you when you're tired. Use the gym ball or wobble cushion for short periods of time to exercise your core, back or buttock muscles. If you're starting to fade then get a proper chair.

Of course the best thing to do is take a rest or Movement Snack. Get up, move around and then get back to work. And no,

a sit-on lawnmower does not count as a Movement Snack!

Top tip: A Movement Snack can be something as simple as rolling your shoulders around.

Notice is given, that on 14th May 2019 Warmington Parish Council submitted a draft neighbourhood development plan (the Warmington Neighbourhood Development Plan 2011-2031) to East Northamptonshire Council, under Regulation 15 of the Neighbourhood Planning (General) Regulations 2012 (as amended).
The 'plan proposal'
In accordance with Regulation 16, East Northamptonshire Council is now consulting upon the draft Neighbourhood Plan. Comments are invited, regarding whether the 'plan proposal', as submitted under Regulation 15 (the draft Warmington Neighbourhood Development Plan and supporting documentation), fulfils the "basic conditions", as required by paragraph 8 (1) (a) (2) of Schedule 4B to the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 (inserted by the Localism Act 2011). The plan proposal, as submitted, comprises the following documents:
a) A map identifying the area to which the proposed neighbourhood development plan relates;
b) A consultation statement;
c) The proposed neighbourhood development plan;
d) A statement (the "Basic Conditions Statement") explaining how the proposed neighbourhood development plan meets the requirements of paragraph 8 of Schedule 4B to the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.
The "basic conditions"
Representations received under Regulation 16 regarding the plan proposal will be forwarded to an appointed examiner, who will assess the Warmington Neighbourhood Plan and supporting documents against the "basic conditions". These require that the plan:
1. Has regard to national policy and guidance from the Secretary of State;
2. Contributes to sustainable development;
3. Is in general conformity with the strategic policy of the development plan for the area or any part of that area;
4. Doesn't breach or is otherwise compatible with EU obligations – this includes the SEA Directive of 2001/42/EC; and that
5. The making of the Neighbourhood Development Plan is not likely to have a significant effect on a European site (as defined in the Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations 2010(d)), either alone or in combination with other plans or projects.
