In Brief

Help is at hand for Northamptonshire communities at risk of flooding

Areas of Northamptonshire at risk of flooding could secure preventative measures to help reduce the likelihood of surface water flooding through an initiative from Northamptonshire County Council.

The county council is inviting communities to submit applications explaining how the initiative could be of benefit to them.

The two-year project aims to help up to 30 communities, which can either be based in urban or rural settings.

Successful applicants would need to identify community members who can be flood wardens and someone who will be the main point of contact for their area.

Any community can apply, with the scheme aimed at geographical areas. These can be villages, residents' groups, industrial estates or a group of town centre businesses.

Genealogy jottings

There is an oft repeated story that a message was sent on a battlefield saying, "Send reinforcements, we're going to advance." By the time that it had arrived at the end of the line, the message had turned into "Send three and fourpence, we're going to a dance"! This illustrates how stories can change in the telling. If you hear a family story from one member, try to find out if it is known by others. You might be able to discover different or additional details.

Recently, I bit the bullet and decided to find out about my great uncle Walter Goldsmith. I had been told that he fought in the Great War, but suffered injuries that affected his mind. This caused a rift in the family so Walter upped sticks from Surrey, moved to Blackpool and changed his name to Smith – never to be seen again. That was all I needed – another Smith in the family! After a bit of digging around, I discovered Walter's Army record. He signed up on 29th February 1916 – but was discharged on 19th May, less than three months later, as it was discovered that he had epilepsy. This was a far cry from what I had been told.

However, he did disappear after this. As I knew his date of birth, I was able to search for Walter in the 1939 Register and found him with the surname of Goldsmith, not Smith, and with a wife named Sarah. Aha! I was now on the hunt for a marriage. There should have been one between 1916 and 1939 but no way could I find it.

Looking at directories of the time, there was a guest house at the address for 1939 run by a Mrs Smith. Could this be Sarah? To cut a long story short, a member of my family history forum found a marriage between a Walter G Smith and a Sarah A Ralph in Fylde, near Blackpool. I ordered the certificate and discovered that yes, it was the correct couple. So, the part about Walter moving to Blackpool and changing his name to Smith was correct but not the story about his WW1 service. Don't you just love family stories?

Editor's notes

It's just three weeks since the winter solstice and already the days seem to be getting longer! This is of course most noticeable when the weather is brighter, letting our thoughts turn to spring and the prospect of bright new growth in our gardens and hedgerows; primroses are already blooming and soon it will be the turn of the snowdrops which always seem to mark the advent of better weather.

The longer days only partially resolve a problem which seems more prevalent lately, at least if you read the letter pages of the national newspapers: that is the glare from car headlamps which dazzles oncoming drivers. Doubtless, this problem is experienced more by older drivers who perhaps anyway have minor problems with their sight and certainly there are laws about the positioning and the intensity of car headlamps. Of course, that doesn't prevent drivers loading the rear of their vehicles so that the lights pitch up, even when dipped, or being slow to dip their lights when another car approaches. There must also be some doubt about the efficacy of modern automatic dipping systems, which don't seem to work sufficiently quickly.

One more problem related to driving is the misuse of 'Baby on Board' signs. These were introduced in an attempt to encourage other drivers to be more careful around cars carrying small children and as

a means of alerting the emergency services to the presence of a child in the event of an accident. However, they are now being blamed for obstructing drivers' views and thus causing accidents. It must also be a worry for the emergency services that parents don't take the signs out of their cars when the child is not present, needlessly risking endangering the lives of fire fighters, ambulance crews and the police.

As reported in this edition, it's good to see the efforts being made, at least in Higham Ferrers, to combat the ongoing litter problem, not just picking up the rubbish people drop but educating children about the need to keep our towns litter-free. Similarly, the large fine imposed on a man from Rushden sends the right signal to other would-be fly-tippers. We shouldn't forget that there is a degree of responsibility on anyone generating rubbish to ensure that it is properly disposed of.

Ending on another positive note, there is money to be had for local community projects from the East Northamptonshire Council's Community Facilities Fund, which was opened again in December. Nene Valley Astronomical Society – 10th Anniversary Year

The Nene Valley Astronomical Society was started in April 2009 by Steve Williams, in order to provide an astronomy club for people living in the area. In 2020 the Society will continue to welcome guest speakers and host other informative astro events for all.

Steve set up the Society with the aim to enable members to learn about the 'Night Sky' and to have opportunities to observe the cosmos. The first meeting was held in Wellingborough before moving to the present location at Chelveston Village. The society owns two telescopes that can be used by members for observing.

The society now has over 50 members and usually welcomes a visiting speaker on the third Monday of the month, and hosts a Club Night on the first. Despite many of the visiting speakers being university professors, talks are kept

If the weather is clear there will be an opportunity for observing. Steve will be giving a talk on the 'Winter Night Sky'.

Admission will be £3, including a hot drink and biscuits. If the weather is not kind, a display of telescopes and details of useful websites will be available inside, as well as Steve's talk.

Wildlife News

You may not have noticed yet, but the days are just starting to get a little longer. Sunset times are coming slightly later, though the sunrise times change a few days later. Now we can hopefully look forward to the soil drying out after what seemed to be a continually rainy autumn when even many plants were starting to suffer from waterlogging.

But poor weather does not mean that the local wildlife has gone, and in the dark hours one night we heard a call which had not been heard for some time, though not the fault of the poor weather. It was a sound used by film producers and directors to remind us that the dark screen is intended, not a transmission break. The fox is often chosen, but this time we were listening to the hooting of a tawny owl.

Why do those sounds so easily remind us of night? The simplest answer is probably best – they are often tucked up in bed during the day, waiting for the time to find the next meal. That is not always reliable; foxes out in broad daylight are increasingly common now they are much

more used to the noise and bustle of urban life and the life-saving art of traffic-dodging, while we humans conveniently put out food (unwanted delicacies in waste disposal bins) at all times, night or day.

Tawny owls are less affected by our lifestyle and are more likely to be found, and heard, in rural areas, where they can find the small mammals like voles and mice, or even rats. Another hindrance for owls is the danger of collision with vehicle traffic. Even in more open countryside with less likelihood of an accident, the continual passage of headlights can make their eyes less responsive. (Remember they are looking for a mouse in the dark perhaps 50 yards away – try it for yourself sometime!)

It may seem silly to add noise to the disturbance, but those hooting calls tell each other where they are. Which one does the calling is a topic for the experts – for us the important point is they are still there, whether on the reserves or elsewhere.

Your Health - Is it all in your head?

The presence of pain often means that something is wrong. Does that sound obvious? Well, the thing is that sometimes the presence of pain doesn't mean something is wrong, it means the body is over-reacting. That's not to say that you're imagining the pain, it's just that for some reason it continues even when the injury has healed.

This over-reaction to pain is pretty common, but it's not very helpful. In fact, as designs go, I'd rate it up there with the lawnmower for lack of usefulness.

Having pain makes sense, but the brain over-reacting to pain can cause anxiety and fear, particularly about moving or exercising. Which, ironically, can slow your recovery.

So, what can you do when this sort of pain takes over? The Chartered Physiotherapist

in Higham who specialises in chronic pain tells me there are very specific exercises that can help reprogramme the body so it stops over-reacting. Appropriate exercises can also help you overcome that fear that the area is going to hurt if you do too much. Over the next few weeks I'm going to talk about this more, but in the meantime, while the grass isn't growing, perhaps I should see if exercises can help improve relationships with lawnmowers.

East Northamptonshire Council officer is the first inspector in England to receive leading qualification

Licensing Compliance Officer at East Northamptonshire Council, Emma Matthews, has been awarded the animal establishment inspector training certificate by the Pet Industry Federation (PIF).

Building on the knowledge and training Emma obtained after successfully passing her initial exam with 93%, she completed a five-day course at Heathrow Animal Reception Centre in March 2019 and received the accreditation in September.

The new Licensing of Activities Involving Animals regulations (AAL), which came into force on 1st October 2018, requires those carrying out inspections to be appropriately trained.

Emma joined the enforcement team in April 2018 and became the first officer to obtain this qualification. Until October 2021, officers with more than 12 months' experience of inspecting animal premises can continue effectively with Grandfather Rights.

On passing her course, Emma commented: "I have loved every minute of this training – the five days at Heathrow Animal Reception Centre gave me a wealth of knowledge, and I have learnt so much through my own personal

development, and considered things in my animal licensing work that I hadn't considered before.

"The more licensing officers who achieve the certificate can only be positive as it directly benefits the standardisation of the regulations across the country, thereby instilling more confidence in licensed businesses."

Leader of East Northamptonshire Council, Cllr Steven North added: "Following the changes in legislation in October 2018, it is important that East Northamptonshire Council ensures we continue to upskill our officers so that they hold the relevant qualifications.

"Emma worked really hard to achieve this qualification and we are all proud of her for being the first inspector in the country to be awarded the certificate."

Hefty fine for Rushden fly-tipper

A Rushden resident has been fined more than £3,000 for dumping waste on private land in Wellingborough, following a successful prosecution by the Borough Council of Wellingborough and its partners, Wellingborough Norse.

A vehicle belonging to Mr Darren Edwards was caught on CCTV arriving at allotments off Finedon Road, Wellingborough carrying a load of building waste and leaving empty.

Wellingborough Norse investigated the matter, interviewing Edwards who claimed that a colleague dumped the waste using his vehicle. Following further investigation of the former colleague this proved inconclusive.

As registered keeper of the vehicle Edwards was prosecuted under section 33 of the Environmental Protection Act 1990. Failing to attend a court hearing on 3rd September a warrant without bail was issued.

Edwards surrendered to the warrant and claimed that he hadn't received the summons at his new address. Edwards was re-bailed to attend court on 16th December and he pleaded guilty to the offences of fly-tipping and was issued with a fine of £1,354 plus £1,700 costs and a £135 victim surcharge.

The Leader of the Borough Council of



Wellingborough, Cllr Martin Griffiths, said: "This is an example of blatant disregard from someone who did not wish to dispose of their trade waste at a licensed disposal site, and dumped this at an allotment.

"Where we find evidence we will prosecute those responsible for fly-tipping. We would like to thank all residents and businesses who help us to reduce waste in our borough and dispose of their rubbish appropriately.

"We are fortunate to live in a borough that has beautiful countryside and large areas of open space. We will not tolerate this despicable crime."

Community groups across the district are once again being invited to apply for funding towards delivering their projects following the launch of East Northamptonshire Council's (ENC) Community Facilities Fund (CFF), for the eighth year, in December.

First introduced in 2013 and with over £2 million worth of projects supported so far, the fund supports the development of public facilities throughout the district and is funded by money received from central Government through the 'New Homes Bonus' as new homes are created in the district.

Each year, the council supports as many community projects as possible, and the fund is for capital work, such as building and construction costs, refurbishment works, large items of equipment etc.

Community groups can apply for up to £10,000 with no requirement for match funding. Previous projects which have been awarded include Stanwick Community Gardens who were awarded £6,876 for a new summerhouse and thanks to £3,000 from the fund, Thrapston Plaza now has new audio visual equipment and is able to put on

more events.

Steven North, Leader of East Northamptonshire Council said: "Thanks to the funding we receive from central Government through the 'New Homes Bonus', we are proud to support local community projects and look forward to receive lots of applications for the next phase of the scheme.

"Over the past eight years, we always have a wide variety of groups apply and would urge anyone who is considering a project to apply to help us make East Northamptonshire a better place to live."

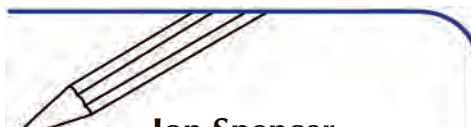

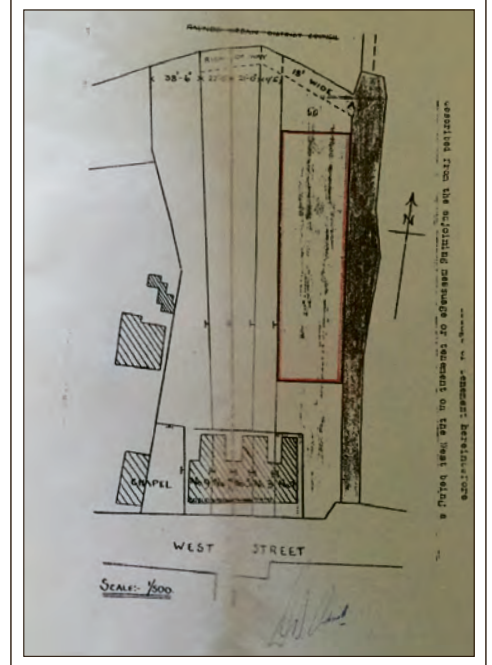

East Northamptonshire Council crackdown on illegal alcohol sales

The Licensing Enforcement team from East Northamptonshire Council (ENC) has been working with Northamptonshire Police Licensing Department to cut down on illegal alcohol age-restricted product sales across East Northamptonshire by conducting test purchasing.

A test purchase is when the Police, local authority or Trading Standards employs a child aged between 15 and 16 to visit a bar or shop and try to purchase age-restricted goods, in this case alcohol, to check that the law is being complied with. Test purchases can happen at any time that a premises is open and if a business fails a test purchase, it is likely they'll

receive another within three months.

Between 15th April and 30th October 2019, 28 test purchases were conducted across East Northamptonshire, with nine businesses failing. All the sellers who failed were issued with a Penalty Notice for Disorder fine for £90.

This operation has also resulted in three reviews of premises licences and one premises surrendering

its licence prior to formal action being taken, meaning no alcohol sales can take place and conditions being added to the licence.

Cllr Steven North, Leader of East Northamptonshire Council said: "These figures show, sadly, how common illegal alcohol age-restricted sales are in East Northamptonshire and we will continue to work with Northamptonshire Police to keep residents and, in particular, young people, safe."

"Unfortunately if a seller is found to have sold an age-restricted product to an underage customer, the individual is fined and may have to appear in court, rather than the business owner."

PC David Bryan,

Northamptonshire Police Licensing Officer added: "We would always recommend that Challenge 21 or 25 is adopted by businesses – this means that if the customer does

not look 21 or 25, then the seller must ask for a valid form of ID to prove the person is over 18.

"In addition it is always useful to have an ID policy, detailing which ID you

and your employees are going to accept. Typical ID accepted includes photo driving licences, passports, HM Forces ID cards and ID cards with the PASS hologram."
