Behind the scenes with Northamptonshire Police

Genealogy jottings

Last time, I told the tale of great uncle Walter and that family stories are not always 100% correct and can miss out important facts. However, they can also be embellished over time as imaginations fill in the gaps.

Some of you may remember Sue Thomas, former Head Teacher of Laxton Junior School, who died last July. Her parents lived in South Africa when she was small and Sue went to boarding school in Devon, staying with her grandparents when she was not with her parents. Sue's grandparents were Grandma Lil and Grandpa George. A lot of information was known about Grandma Lil's family but nothing was known about Grandpa George. Even on their marriage certificate there were no clues – the witnesses were Lil's parents and George's father was noted as deceased. With the name George Thomas, this was not going to be easy.

The known facts were that George was a Captain in the Merchant Navy and sailed between Britain and Poland. Sue and her

cousins were convinced that George was Polish, had a family in Gdansk and had changed his name to something more British. However, after a lot of detective work, we discovered that George was in fact born in Chippenham, Wiltshire in 1895. Sadly, his father died in 1899 and his mother in 1900. The 1901 census found young George in an orphanage in Bristol. After contacting the orphanage archivist, she copied all of George's paperwork to us, which then gave us a trail to follow him first to the Royal Navy and then to the Merchant Navy. George worked on the Baltic Line, but was not Polish, did not have a family in Gdansk and was always George Thomas. A rather romantic theory was shattered but at least the truth was now known – and a whole new background to the family discovered.

Editor's notes

Our focus in this edition is on weddings, which at their most simple are ceremonies where two people are united in marriage. However, in many cases the event itself can be a lavish affair and most couples at least seek to make their wedding an enjoyable and memorable day. Our contributors will be able to offer a range of ideas to make your wedding a very special event. It's interesting to note a few statistics on marriage which, although somewhat dated, tell us more about the institution today: in 2016, there were nearly a quarter of a million marriages in England and Wales, a total similar to each of the preceding two years; almost all marriages were between opposite-sex couples but of the just over 7,000 between same-sex couples (an increase of 8% from 2015) just over half were between female couples; marriage rates for opposite-sex couples in 2016 were lower at all ages compared with 2006, except for men aged 60 years and over and women aged 50 years and over; for the first time ever, less than a quarter of all marriages in 2016 were religious ceremonies; finally, 30th July was the most popular day to get married in 2016, with 4,742 marriages on that day.

While researching this topic one item popped out of the national news concerning a couple's wedding which was postponed after the groom's father and bride's mother both disappeared in a suspected elopement.

Relatives believe the missing parents vanished after rekindling a childhood romance. The young couple to be married, from India's westernmost state of Gujarat, were looking forward to tying the knot in February after a year of planning. However, the ceremony has been put on hold after the 48-year-old man and 46-year-old woman vanished. There is no indication of the marital state of the couple who disappeared.

There's one piece of local good news concerning a kitten which disappeared from its home last Saturday. Club runners out near the A45 early the following day heard cries from a lay-by near Stanwick Lakes. It turned out to be the missing kitten tied up in two bin bags. The animal was subsequently taken to the vet, where it was recognised as one reported missing, and was later reunited with its owner. A spokesman from Northamptonshire Police said: "This is obviously a very concerning incident and we are investigating it." One very fortunate little cat but it's beyond belief that anyone could attempt to dispose of it in such a way.

There is an update from a senior engineer at Northamptonshire County Council Highways about the Oundle north bridge. Work on arches 1 and 2, those closest to the town, is expected to be complete next week after some delays because of flood water. Work will then progress to arches 3 and 4. Completion is expected in late May or early June.

Enterprise Centre, East Northants reaches new heights

A pioneering project in East Northamptonshire, which will provide high-quality business accommodation and support to small and micro enterprises, is attracting international interest.

Enterprise Centre, East Northants will open its doors this spring. While construction is underway with the completion of the external fascia of the building, the centre has already received interest from more than 30 businesses, including one from France.

East Northamptonshire Council (ENC), South East Midlands Local Enterprise Partnership (SEMLEP) and ASHE construction are working in partnership to deliver the centre, which will provide small and micro enterprises with a

space for their business to start and grow.

Businesses will be offered support from a range of business support organisations including Enterprising East Northants, the council's economic development arm, and the SEMLEP Growth Hub.

Tenants will also be able to make meaningful connections with their neighbouring businesses through a variety of network events and the provision of a number of informal meeting and collaboration spaces within the centre.

Cllr Steven North, Leader of East Northamptonshire Council, said: "We are just a few months away

from opening our flagship project - Enterprise Centre, East Northants and we are pleased that we have already received interest from more than 30 businesses.

"We will soon celebrate having an operator on board who will work with us to drive this project forward ready for its official opening this spring."

ENC, which is delivering the £8 million project, received £1.69 million funding from SEMLEP's Local Growth Fund towards the project and is working with industry specialists ASHE construction and Total Project Integration to deliver the centre as part of Enterprising East Northants.

Spotlight on Weddings

"For richer, for poorer, in sickness and health, until death do us part." When citing these popular wedding vows the last thing the happy couple is likely to be considering is their Will and their new tax position. However, marriage can have a serious impact on individuals who already have Wills in place. Did you know that marriage automatically revokes a Will, unless you have included a clause which states your intention to marry your beloved? Marriage also has an impact on the rules surrounding Inheritance Tax and Capital Gains Tax.

Inheritance Tax (IHT)

Sadly, for cohabiting couples the tax system is wholly unsympathetic. Married couples and civil partners benefit enormously from an unlimited IHT exemption on transfers between them, whether on lifetime gifts or on death. The only exception is where the couple have a different residence status and the transfer is to the non-UK domiciled spouse or civil partner. In that case, the exemption is limited to £325,000.

Where the unlimited IHT exemption applies and the main asset is the family home, it means there's no need for the survivor to sell it to pay the tax. That's

the main risk for unmarried cohabiting couples. However, a suitable life insurance policy that pays out a sum equivalent to the likely tax on the second death can offer a cost-effective solution, particularly if the couple is in good health.

Capital Gains Tax (CGT)

There are also significant CGT benefits for married couples and civil partners who make lifetime gifts to each other. The gift avoids an immediate CGT charge and instead the recipient takes over the spouse's original purchase cost. Transfers on death, however, are treated the same for all cohabiting couples whether or not they are married or in a civil partnership. The deceased's historic gain is simply wiped out and the recipient can then sell the asset without a CGT charge.

One area where unmarried couples have a better tax treatment is CGT main residence relief. If they each own their own home (one of which may very well simply be a holiday home), they can continue to claim the exemption on both whereas married couples and civil partners can only claim one relief between them.

Northamptonshire residents with long-term health problems urged to get flu jab

People living with long-term health conditions are being encouraged to have a flu jab, because of the life threatening risk caused by the flu virus.

The flu jab is free to people with certain health conditions including asthma, diabetes, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, bronchitis, heart disease, kidney disease, liver disease, Parkinson's disease, motor neurone disease or weakened immune system due to HIV or chemotherapy and damaged/no spleen. Carers who receive carer's allowance can also get a free flu jab – speak to your GP.

Councillor Ian Morris, Cabinet Member for Public Health Northamptonshire, said: "Around 87,000 people in Northamptonshire qualify for a free flu vaccination every year because their health is at risk, but not everyone takes up this offer of protection against a serious viral threat. Currently, only around 35,000 have received their free vaccination. I would urge everyone who is vulnerable to infection who has not yet had a vaccination to have the flu vaccine – it's the best way to protect your health."

Dr Azhar Ali, GP and Respiratory Disease Clinical Lead for NHS Northamptonshire, said: "Vulnerable people with long-term

health conditions are more likely to develop complications from flu, such as:

- Flu can worsen a lung condition and aggravate breathing problems in people with COPD, asthma and other chronic lung diseases which can even lead to respiratory failure
- Flu can make liver disease worse and increases the risk of rejecting of liver transplants
- People with neurological disease may find it more difficult to cough and clear fluid from their airways. Flu can give them very high temperature and make symptoms worse because neurological conditions can make it difficult to regulate body temperature
- A third of people with Multiple Sclerosis (MS) will have a relapse within 6 weeks of getting the flu
- Flu puts added stress on your body, which can affect your blood pressure, heart rate and overall heart function. That can raise your chances of having a heart attack or stroke."

Anyone in doubt about whether they qualify for a free vaccination should contact their GP. You can visit a local pharmacy for a vaccination.

Vintage Festival wants you to 'Love Oundle'

Following the runaway success of the inaugural event last year, Oundle Vintage Festival is set to return this spring with the 2020 main event being held on Saturday 16th May. As well as providing another memorable day out for thousands of visitors and residents who enjoy all things yesteryear, the organisers

have found a new fundraising focus, having recently launched the 'Love Oundle Fund'.

With the fundraising element agreed, the organising committee are now busy lining up plenty of vintage inspired displays and entertainments, which will all be contained in the central streets of Oundle from 10am to 4pm on 16th May. These will include: steam engines, vintage tractors, classic cars and motorbikes, a cycle rally, a vintage market, an old-style fairground, children's entertainers, a mini-railway, as well as an artisan food and drink area, and Festival

Stage which will buzz to the sights and sounds of vintage inspired acts. Also, the organisers have confirmed a repeat of the 1950s Dance on Friday 15th, the night before the festival day, at St Peter's Church. The main event on the Saturday will remain totally free to enter.

Chair of the Festival Committee, Philip Amps commented: "With all the hard work required to put on an event of this scale it was

not certain that we would be repeating it so soon. However, the Vintage Festival proved to be such a hit in so many ways that it was the obvious thing to do. This time around we are looking to raise the bar with even better quality vintage attractions. For example, there will be many more steam engines and classic vehicles on the streets of Oundle, and we are looking to invest in the sound stage acts."

John Gibbs, a Kettering musician, set out on 19th July last year to cycle from Land's End to John O'Groats.

He decided to solo cycle this challenge with minimal arrangements put in place for his "home comforts" as he did not want to create a "carbon footprint".

He calculated his daily miles to achieve getting to John O'Groats within his target of 14 days.

Before starting he set up a JustGiving page, aiming to raise a £1,000 minimum to support three Kettering charities: Johnny's Happy Place, Green Patch, a Groundwork-run community garden project, hosting volunteer days, children's clubs, education sessions and family events, and Equata, based in Grafton Underwood, who provide equine therapy for injured horses.

He successfully arrived at John O'Groats within 11 days 23hrs, completing the challenge and covering a distance of 1,048 miles.

En route he caused quite a response from several of the places he managed to "bed down" for the night with one landlord giving him a donation of £15, along with two others.

His target of £1,000 is just short of £103!

To ensure he reaches this target many well-known local musicians have agreed to hold Febfest, a special evening of music across a variety of genres at Ringstead Village Social Club, to be held on Saturday 1st February, starting at 5.30pm and continuing through till midnight.

John is asking for a donation of £5 – which includes 5 raffle tickets for the Grand Raffle, to be held on the evening – as your admission.

Wildlife News

When you drew back the curtains this morning what did you see? More precisely, what wildlife did you see? There are not too many places, particularly round here, without any plant or animal life, but not everyone takes the trouble to look (especially early in the morning, and before breakfast!). For those who do show an interest in knowing a little more about what is 'out there', the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB) have for quite a few years now been running a scheme which has several targets. Known as the Big Garden Birdwatch (and possibly some other unofficial names when conditions are not too comfortable), it collects loads of information from anyone who asks to take part.

It is not just a question of counting birds to see how many we can get into our little plot and see if we can beat the neighbours – imagine just how difficult even that could be. The information collected includes where and when the watching was done, and results are compared with past years to build a picture of whether a species is doing well or losing numbers, to determine what (if anything) could cause the problems, and whether

agricultural use could mix with the demands of housing an increasing human population, unemployment and leisure activities.

It's a change from the 'mud and wellies' brigade stumbling (falling?) around the countryside, but when statistical experts and their inevitable computers (an impossible task without them) have finished juggling those returns from hundreds of thousands of us amateur watchers then land can be better used for the lives of everyone, town-dwellers or 'country bumpkins'. Recent tragic news from Australia emphasises very frighteningly what can happen if we get it wrong.

Some see this 'birdwatch' idea as a sort of league table of results for birds we can see every day without knowing whether they are dying out. The information flowing back to headquarters, though, is not just about birds, but also many other aspects of the countryside affecting future generations. Counting sparrows on a cold wet January morning may not be very appealing but those reports are important and there is still time (just!) if you act now. Visit rsppb.org.uk/birdwatch

Annual drink/drug drive campaign figures released

As part of Northamptonshire Police's Christmas drink and drug drive campaign, officers across the force carried out more roadside tests than in previous years – resulting in an increase in arrests.

Over the past month officers conducted 2,552 breath tests – an increase of 66 per cent on 2018, when 1,798 were carried out – while the number of roadside drug wipes rose by 90 per cent from 20 to 38 respectively.

The rise in the number of roadside checks is a direct result of the increased patrols and the various operations held across the Force throughout the festive period to tackle drink and drug driving offending over the festive period.

During the campaign, a total of 84 motorists were caught behind the wheel while under the influence of drink or

drugs. Sixty-seven were charged with drink driving, and 17 were arrested for failing a roadside drug test, pending the results of blood tests.

This was a small increase of 24 and 30 per cent respectively from 2018, when a total of 67 drivers were arrested and charged with drink (54) and drug (13) driving related offences.

As part of the campaign, all those charged with drink driving were publicly named on the Northamptonshire Police website and its social media, which included two drivers caught on Christmas Day and eight on New Year's Day.

Recruitment and finance focus for North Northants Joint Committee

Councillors progressing preparations for a North Northamptonshire unitary council have backed a plan of action to recruit senior managers that will head the new shadow authority.

At their first meeting of 2020 in the Corby Cube on the evening of Thursday 16th January, Members of the North Northamptonshire Joint Committee also welcomed the robust and transparent financial process put in place for the Future Northants unitary programme, which is working to create two new unitary councils in the county by 1st April 2021.

The Committee supported proposals for appointing the chief officer roles required by law to be filled when the new North Shadow Authority is created in May this year. These arrangements include putting in place a series of 'caretaker' positions for a Head of Paid Service, Chief Finance (Section 151) Officer and Monitoring Officer from May, then appointing permanently to the posts later in the summer.

Members also endorsed a report that set out the programme's financial baseline position – the starting point of assumed costs for creating the new councils and potential savings that could be made.

The baseline figures estimate required investment of £43.5m, which includes £18m of Business Rates Pilot funding, to transform and move across their services to form the two new authorities, which could achieve a possible yearly budget saving of £85.9m. Members heard these were being used as benchmark figures to monitor and report future financial progress and are therefore likely to change.

The Committee also received updates from the Joint Committee's working groups that have been progressing key pieces of work on governance and other arrangements needed to set up a Shadow Authority for North Northamptonshire, which would deliver the new unitary council.

Chairman of the North Northamptonshire Joint Committee, Councillor Martin Griffiths said: "It's clear from the reports and updates received by the Committee that work is really gathering pace towards the creation of a new unitary council for North Northamptonshire on 1st April 2021.

"This is a huge task within a very tight timescale so it's reassuring to see the robust and transparent processes that are already in place to manage and monitor the progress being made. I would like to thank all councillors and members of staff and councils for their hard work on the programme so far and look forward to the positive journey ahead towards shaping an exemplary new authority."

The North Northamptonshire Joint Committee is made up of 15 councillors representing Kettering, Wellingborough, Corby and East Northants councils and the County Council. The next meeting of the Committee will be held on Monday 10th February at 6.30pm at East Northamptonshire Council in Thrapston. Planning approval for new leisure centre

A proposal for a new leisure centre in Moulton to serve residents in the east of Daventry District has secured planning permission.

Daventry District Council (DDC) wants to convert the Chris Moody Centre into a public leisure centre for use by the wider community.

And work is expected to start in the spring after a planning application was approved by the Council's Planning Committee on Wednesday 15th January.

The new-look centre will make use of the existing 25-metre swimming pool and two hydrotherapy pools, and will also feature a state-of-the-art fitness suite/gym, a group exercise studio, a spin studio and a health suite with steam room, sauna and spa pool.

The car park will also be increased in size to 190 spaces, in order to accommodate the increase in its use.

Work on the new fitness suite/gym could start in the spring with a view to opening by late summer. The remainder of the works could then be completed by the end of this year.

Plans for a new leisure centre in the eastern part of Daventry District were identified as the top priority in the Council's Sports Facilities Investment Strategy, adopted last year following

public consultation. The area is experiencing major population growth and more leisure facilities are needed.

Councillors agreed last month to use £8.5m of funding from local housing developer contributions to buy the Chris Moody Centre from Moulton College and convert it for this purpose.

The new facility will be run by Everyone Active, which also operates Daventry Leisure Centre on behalf of DDC.

The Council hopes the new plans for the centre will make it financially sustainable so it can be used for a wider range of health and fitness activities for the whole community.

DDC is keen for community sports activities to continue at the centre and discussions about the changes continue to take place with existing users, including Northampton Swimming Club.

Councillor Alan Hills, DDC's Community Culture and Leisure Portfolio Holder, said: "The new leisure centre will meet the needs of the growing population in the east of our District while providing a sustainable long-term solution for the site.

"We are very pleased to have secured planning permission for this exciting project and I look forward to working with our partners to bring it to fruition."

Stay warm this winter with the Northants Warm Homes partnership

Residents across East Northamptonshire are urged to check if they are eligible for a helping hand to reduce their energy bills through the Warm Homes Fund.

In 2019, East Northamptonshire Council on behalf of the Northants Warm Homes partnership secured nearly £4 million to provide fully-funded central heating for homes across the district for the first time. The money awarded is matched by grants and contributions from landlords and local authorities to ensure that eligible homes are fully funded.

Leader of East Northamptonshire Council, Cllr Steven North, said: "As a council, we are always looking for ways to work with partner organisations to help residents across

East Northants and this scheme is the latest example.

"The Warm Homes Fund provides help to those in need, and with winter setting in, we urge everyone to check to see if they are eligible and stay warm for years to come.

"If you are not sure whether you can apply for the Warm Homes Fund do not hesitate to get in contact with a member of the Warm Homes Fund

team on 0800 038 5737 who will be happy to advise and talk you through eligibility."

Households eligible for the Warm Homes Fund are those most in need of support and include low income earners that have high energy bills, and those individuals who are vulnerable to the cold because of health conditions. Home owners and private tenants can apply for the Warm Homes Fund, but tenants will need permission from their landlord.

The scheme will run until 2021 and aims to fit efficient central heating in around 1,400 fuel-poor homes across the county.

New WEEE collection scheme gets off to a flying start

Approximately 13 tonnes of Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment (WEEE) have been collected across East Northamptonshire in just 6 weeks since a new collection was launched.

Following a successful pilot in Raunds, the Waste team at East Northamptonshire Council rolled out a weekly WEEE collection scheme in mid-December and have already seen a brilliant response.

Cllr Steven North, Leader of East Northamptonshire Council, said: "As a council, we are committed to helping residents with their recycling in the

district and are delighted that there has been such a high uptake of the WEEE collection scheme in a short space of time.

"But the work doesn't stop here and we encourage East Northants residents to carry on putting out their unwanted electrical items for collection, so we can maintain these high figures and avoid electrical products being sent for disposal

unnecessarily."

Since December 2019, electrical items including kettles, speakers, microwaves, printers and other small electrical items have all been collected from neighbourhoods across the district and will now be sent to a dedicated facility for sorting and recycling.

Residents across East Northamptonshire who have unwanted small electrical items should place them out for recycling on their usual collection day in a carrier bag, next to recycling or refuse bins and a full list of items which can be accepted is available on East Northamptonshire Council's website.


