GENEALOGY JOTTINGS

My father was born in 1927. He is still going strong at the age of 92 and still drives - albeit not very far. He always said that his great grandfather, George Frank Hills, threw himself off the Sandridge Road railway bridge in St Albans, Hertfordshire. Dad was born in St Albans and the family had lived there since 1909.

Upon further investigation, I discovered that George was in fact killed by a train – but at Smarden in Kent. He had walked out in front of the main Ashford to London steam train. This happened in 1922 - five years before my father was born but the family were still talking about it years later when Dad was old enough to understand.

However, Dad put 2 and 2 together but did not make 4. He used his own local knowledge and made the assumption. This is why it is so important to check out facts and not take things for granted.

Have vou ever discovered in a census a mother of 53, for example, having a child aged 5? Not impossible, but not usual. You might discover an older sister to this child who is aged about 22. Could this be the "sister's" child? It is worth considering and finding out more. Rather than let the enumerator know of a possible illegitimate child, the grandparents claimed it as their own

Always find out corroborating evidence. I have the death certificate and coroner's report for my great, great grandfather. A rummage in the parish records might throw some light on the possible illegitimate child – parish clerks were very fond of recording such facts! There could be a baptism of John Smith, son of Mary, a single woman - or even mentioning the name of a purported father! If there is just one single piece of evidence without corroboration, it is up to you to decide whether it is enough for your family tree. but do find others if you can.

EDITOR'S NOTES

There's good news for those in Oundle who have been campaigning to retain the open space near the town centre known as Fletton Fields. At their meeting on 11th February, East Northamptonshire Council's (ENC) Planning Committee rejected Northamptonshire County Council's (NCC) proposal to build on the Fields which were previously the playing fields for the town's primary school. The scheme, which would have involved building and then selling off or renting one and two bed apartments, would have included communal facilities and 24-hour support staff.

Oundle Mayor, Tony Robinson accused the County Council of trying to use the asset to help solve their well documented financial problems. Councillor Robinson said: "This is the last piece of green space in Oundle town centre. It is being sold by Northamptonshire County Council to raise funds to cover its deficit. It was originally part of the workhouse then the infirmary and has always been used by the people as public land. There is no land registry record of them (NCC) taking the land, just an assumption. We have the moral case - this is the only piece of green space left in the town centre of Oundle and it should remain this way.

Officers had recommended the plan be refused on the grounds the County Council had not submitted sufficient evidence that the site was surplus to requirements and had not put forward an alternative area of open space. The

District Council's senior conservation officer also had strong objections to the plan because heritage assets need to be protected.

There is less good news for Oundle on the housing front. After the rejection of the Town's Neighbourhood Plan at Examination, ENC Councillors are to consider applications for developments at Cotterstock Road and St Christopher's Drive on 26th February and 23rd March respectively. These two sites are in the District Council's Local Plan but it was once again abundantly clear at a town meeting on 13th February that they are not what residents want; the well-attended meeting once again voted unanimously against the two developments and in favour of those in the Neighbourhood Plan. There are opportunities to lobby the local MP, as well as County and District Councillors on this topic; attending the two meetings mentioned above would also demonstrate the weight of local opinion.

Finally on Planning matters, the decision on whether or not to add 14 units to the Rushden Lakes retail site has been referred to the Secretary of State because it's beyond the initially planned area of the site. ENC's planning committee voted that it was 'minded' to approve the scheme, counter to officers' recommendations which were based on the loss of open countryside. The scheme by Crown Estates is on green land to the west of the popular shopping complex and will see more business units and leisure units added.



East Northants Council litter picks major road routes across the district

Roads across East Northants have had an early spring clean as the Waste team from East Northants Council have collected nearly three tonnes of waste from major routes, with more litter picks planned for the coming months.

Over a two week period, rubbish was collected along stretches of the A14 and A45, and now the Waste team are planning a litter pick along a section of the A6, whilst the road is scheduled to be closed. Due to safety reasons, litter picking can only take place when the road is closed or under repair.

Councillor Steven North, Leader of East Northamptonshire Council said: "As a Council we have a duty to ensure that our district is kept tidy and we are pleased with how much rubbish was collected by the Waste team during these recent exercises. "A small team worked hard over the course of the litter picks, and during the A45 tidy up, it is estimated that they worked for a total of 120 hours.

"We are grateful for the work that the Waste team did, however we would prefer that this resource, and the cost associated, was used elsewhere to further benefit the residents of East Northants, especially as it is important to remember that the rubbish could have been dropped by people travelling through the area, and not necessarily residents."

During the A45 clean-up, a weight of roughly 1.6 tonnes was collected by five people over the course of three days and current costs suggest that to dispose of this rubbish will cost approximately £90 per tonne - a cost which will be covered by East Northants Council.

Dedication of NEW CHURCH ORGAN

Hargrave is 'alive with the sound of music' following the installation of a superb new church organ. It replaces a 100 year-old, £160 secondhand instrument which, with its developing quirks and rotting woodwork, has now been pensioned off after amazing regular service.

The church was full when the rector Reverend Jon Aldwinckle led a service of dedication to the new organ, and expressed thanks to the many people (particularly Grace Farrington, whose legacy began the organ fund) whose hard work and generosity to the project made this day a reality.

As well as playing hymns for the dedication service, the congregation were delighted when Nicholas Pollard, the talented All Hallows church organist demonstrated the amazing range and musicality of the new organ when he performed music from many genre, including opera, musicals from yesteryear, jazz and pop, and the classics, with Toccata and Fugue as his magnificent finale.

Nicholas explained that a digital instrument (the Viscount Envoy 350) was chosen, rather than a pipe organ, for several reasons: the lower initial cost, and minimal maintenance needs; its excellent and extensive musical range; its attractive appearance, and smaller size. He also pointed out that removal of the old pipe organ has exposed a beautiful window which had not been seen for the past 100 years, and the church is also much lighter now. Nicholas enjoys playing the new organ, and sharing with his listeners the wonder of the sound it produces.

THE CHARTER PROJECT SCHOOLS PLAY THEIR PART

The Heritage Lottery Funded Charter Project in Higham Ferrers is another step closer to meeting its objectives and local schools are playing a key role in this.

To help raise awareness of the existence, significance and purpose of the Charters, schools in the town have received on loan, until September 2021, a framed copy charter.

Higham Ferrers Nursery and Infant School now proudly display a copy of the Charter of Charles II 1664. The Higham Ferrers Junior School were presented with the Charter of Charles II of 1684. Henry Chichele Primary School hold the Charter of James I of 1604 and the Ferrers School were delighted to receive the Charter of Victoria of 1887.

To accompany the charters the schools have been presented

with the interpretative exhibition boards for their charter and a copy of the book 'Higham Ferrers 1251-1914, A Portrait of the Town and People through its Historic Charters'.

Further to the schools receiving copy charters, Carol Fitzgerald, the Chair of the Charter Project Group said: "We await permission from Historic England to hang a copy of the very first Charter of 1251, listing the names of the freedmen and women, in the Chichele College, which is a Scheduled Monument. We also await permission from the Diocese of Peterborough to hang the Charter of Philip and Mary of 1556 in the Bede House. It seems fitting that both these buildings, well used for public events and due to celebrate their 600 year anniversary in 2022, are to display the oldest Charters."

I was assured the Triple SSI (Site of Special Scientific Interest) will be carefully protected and the whole project is within the current boundary. I also took the opportunity to speak to the Highways Authority Project manager and asked about having traffic lights at the roundabout on the A45 by Stanwick Lakes. He assured me that it is on the list for consideration and that the theme next year is helping pedestrians, cycles and horses crossing our highways which may help it move up the list.

number of parents for food prepared and served by the children who had done a great job cooking a delicious selection of dishes. By way of contrast we represented ENC at the March Civic Dinner which was a pleasant occasion.

Residents HAVE THEIR SAY

Residents and stakeholders are able to submit their views on three new planning documents following the launch of a public consultation by East Northamptonshire Council on Monday 10th February. The council is consulting on three planning documents, due to be finalised in the coming months. This is in advance of the proposed changes to councils in Northamptonshire, coming into effect on 1st April 2021, when two new unitary authorities are formed.

The three documents available for the public to view and comment on are:

- Rushden East Sustainable Urban Extension Masterplan, which was approved for consultation by the council on 27th January 2020
- District-wide Local Plan Part 2 additional site specific proposals at Rushden and Higham Ferrers
- Householder Extensions Supplementary Planning
 Document (SPD)

The Rushden East SUE Masterplan is a 20-year strategy to build at least 2,500 dwellings, balanced by job opportunities, community facilities, greenspaces, and improved infrastructure. This strategic development will work alongside the district-wide Local Plan Part 2 and Householder Extensions SPD, which when finalised and adopted, will cover the remainder of the current Local Plan period to 2031.

The documents are now available for consultation with all responses to be received by 4.30pm on Monday 23rd March.

Leader of East Northamptonshire Council, Steven North, said: "The three documents will help the council to deliver sustainable development across the district. The Rushden East Masterplan is a significant milestone in delivering the largest single development scheme within East Northamptonshire and will provide much needed new homes, as well as complementing the wider area, which will benefit from enhanced connections to Rushden. We are pleased to be continuing work on The Local Plan Part 2 and the latest proposals will help deliver additional housing, jobs and educational facilities in Rushden and Higham Ferrers, whilst The Householder Extensions Supplementary Planning Document will provide detailed guidance for householders looking to submit planning applications. We value our residents' and stakeholders' feedback and I would encourage the community to have their say."

Residents in the area will get an opportunity to comment on the Rushden East Masterplan and the additional site specific proposals for the Local Plan Part 2 at public exhibitions held at Canoe 2, Rushden Lakes on 27th February between 10.30am-6.30pm and 28th February between 10.30am-3.30pm.

WILDLIFE NEWS

The farming year is inevitably closely linked to weather patterns, and with or without climate change we know that farming has altered greatly in the last century.

Timing of routine actions has shifted with different sowing and harvest dates, with new plants and new machines designed for maximum yield. This shows in country sayings like that for the Church festival called Candlemas (2nd February), which reads: "If Candlemas be fair and bright winter will have another flight; but if Candlemas brings cloud and rain winter is gone and won't come again." That is too kind to winterthere are probably some cold nights still in store at this time of year, and in ancient times the heaviest snowfall of the year was expected to come on Saint Dorothea's Day, 6th February; it remains a cold (cruelly so at times) month, still called the 'Gateway to the year'

The main factor for our plants and animals is temperature. A layer of cloud over the sky at bedtime may help to avoid a frost, but clear skies

lower the temperatures. We humans ease problems with more clothes or more fuel, but wildlife must cope without artificial help, and most vulnerable are those choosing any form of hibernation. Trouble can start with a warm spell or, like this year, with warmer-than-usual autumn temperatures. Higher temperatures can tempt all into thinking that spring is on its way ("time to get up"), affecting any creature relying on a long winter sleep. Our CCTV stood outside through the winter, rarely switched on until a random decision to look on the monitor showed a hedgehog crossing the grass in the early hours of a January night - far too early in the year.

Hibernation is timed for the months when food is scarce, without enough nutrition for a "midnight snack" – lack of food can prove fatal if the warm snap does not last. The question really was "to feed or not to feed?", because extra food lying around can attract rats and other unauthorised thieves. More filming suggested that this was a one-off visit (remembering the summer, perhaps?), so hopefully we guessed right. But it is a reminder that wildlife does not always win every battle of the elements.

David Starkey: Boris Johnson – Churchill, Charles II or Coco the Clown?

Enjoy an intriguing and entertaining talk by David Starkey, an engaging and often controversial speaker and one of the country's most respected and colourful historians.

Who is our most unexpected prime minister? Is Boris Johnson Churchill reborn, as he seems to believe? He is a winner of the WHSmith Prize for Biography (for Elizabeth), and the Norton Medlicott Medal for Service to History presented by the Historical Association.

In 1984 Starkey was elected a Fellow of the Royal Historical Society and in 1994 a Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries of London.

He was also given an Honorary Fellowship at his Cambridge College, Fitzwilliam College.

He was appointed Commander of the Order of the British Empire (CBE) in the 2007 Birthday Honours for services to history.

There are few more stimulating thinkers, and few who understand better the way the most powerful have thought throughout our history.

"Once again the schools were great in facilitating our visits and provided their full support. Although they were not expecting us, the students were very positive as PD Charlie and PD Flint searched their classrooms.

"The visits weren't designed to scare students or make them feel like they were in trouble, but instead to educate them at a time of life when they are making choices which will determine the rest of their future.

CORBY FLY-TIPPER FINED OVER £3,900

On Monday 10th February a man from Corby received a fine of over £3,900 for fly-tipping in East Northamptonshire.

East Northamptonshire Council received reports of fly-tipping on Benefield Road, Deenethorpe in March 2019. The dumped waste consisted of a large skip bag filled with bathroom renovation material and related plumbing waste.

East Northamptonshire Council's Waste Management Team identified Mr Ndlovu as the individual who disposed of the waste. Mr Ndlovu offered his services for waste removal and deposited the waste where it was discovered without holding a valid Waste Carrier Licence.

Magistrates found Mr Ndlovu guilty and ordered him to pay £3,925.97. Mr Ndlovu advised that he would be pleading guilty to the offence. He accepted full responsibility, and advised the Court that he cares about the environment, expressing remorse for his actions and also informed the Court that he has since applied for a waste disposal licence. Steven North, Leader

Steven North, Leader of East Northamptonshire Council, said: "Officers will investigate all reports of illegally dumped waste and take action, where necessary, to prosecute flytippers.

"Fly-tipping has a negative impact on our environment and there is no excuse for ruining our countryside. I would encourage all waste traders to ensure that they have the relevant licences and dispose of waste appropriately, avoiding a hefty four-figure fine."


