Celebration event commemorates Police's four-legged friends

Two-legged and four-legged Northamptonshire Police officers came together at Force Headquarters recently, to celebrate the work of the Northamptonshire Police Dog Section and remember those who have died whilst in active service.

Eight of the Force's general purpose and specialist search police dogs and their handlers attended the event on

28th February to cheer – or bark – on their colleagues.
PD4 Mac, PD3 Olly, PD11 Socks,

PD7 Kez, TPD Alfie, TPD Milo, TPD Ebby and TPD Bryn all attended alongside their handlers PC Ian McDonald, PC Sam Clark, PC Steve Thorpe, PC Ash Price, PC Lucy Sculthorpe and PC Benjamin Rowell.

To open the event, Paul Nicholls QPM presented two K9 Memorial Medals – the first to PC Lucy Sculthorpe for retired PD2 Harper, who left the Force in November 2019 as a result of developing bicep tendonitis, an injury which would have been worsened by continuing to work.

The second medal was for PD Billy, a specialist cash, drugs and firearms dog who sadly passed away in November 2018 as a result of cancer.

His award was presented to PC Ian McDonald in recognition of his valued service at Northamptonshire Police.

Following this, Chief Constable Nick Adderley and Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner Stephen Mold awarded a cheque to Paul Nicholls QPM, founder of K9 Memorial UK, which will contribute towards the commissioning of a formal K9 memorial and roll of honour in memory of the service of police dogs across the country.

As a further commemorative act, a plaque was unveiled within reception at Force Headquarters to formally pay remembrance to each police dog that has retired in the last year, each with a collar tag inscribed with the police dog's name and years of service.

At the unveiling, the names of three former police dogs who have passed during their service were announced: PD Billy (2015-2018), PD Joe (2011-2018) and PD Nesi (2016-2018).

Boost for **sensory garden development**

Bozeat Primary School is in the process of developing an overgrown, neglected garden area of the school into a sensory garden. Once completed the area will incorporate different areas designed to stimulate the senses including a caterpillar planter, willow trails and a sheltered reading area.

As part of the initial phase, each class has been given its own purpose-built garden bed where pupils will be gardening, relaxing and learning skills that can be used at home. Gardening will begin after the school returns from the half-term holiday with a growing competition between classes. The final designs will be judged at the end of term.

This donation will be a huge help in making this a successful chapter in the school's history."

GENEALOGY JOTTINGS

It has been said that "too much learning will make you mad!" We have information coming at us from left, right and centre – emails, television, radio, mobile phones – so that it is very easy to suffer from information overload.

How many times have you researched something, only to discover that you had already done so? Even if you are just starting out on your family's history, the chances are that you have photographs, letters, notes, certificates, etc and you cannot possibly remember it all. So, what do you do when you are looking for a specific piece of information that you know you have seen but are

not sure where in your ever-expanding collection of data?

Putting your information into some sort of logical order will make things simpler. When I say "logical" I mean logical to you. Some folk keep their records in geographical area, others in family groups or even just by surname. It may be that you use a numbering system, the most well known of which is the Ahnentafel system, from the German meaning "Ancestor Table". This would mean that you would be number 1, your father number 2, your mother number 3, your paternal grandfather number 4, your paternal grandmother number 5, your maternal grandfather number 6 and

so on. Additional number variations could also be given for siblings; for example, your paternal grandmother's oldest brother could be 5(i), the next child 5(ii) etc.

Whichever way you choose, it needs to work for you. I have folders that follow each family line – my father's line is at one end of the shelving in my office and my mother's at the other!

It is also a good idea to have a good look at photographs again from time to time as you may have gathered knowledge that helps to identify unknown people. You may have discovered the name of Uncle Walter's wife but had only had a picture of her up to that point.

EDITOR'S NOTES

There was a disappointing result for the residents of Oundle on 26th February, though perhaps not a surprising one, as the East Northants Council (ENC) Planning Management Committee approved an application for a housing development off the Cotterstock Road. Overflow facilities were brought into use to accommodate the large number of members of the public attending the meeting. It was a long night for the Committee because two earlier unrelated applications gave rise to considerable debate. One issue impacting all the applications was the apparent absence of a 5-Year Land Supply within the District.

It was stated that this appears to have the potential to disrupt the Council's planning process and to make all their "made" Neighbourhood Plans redundant. So far as the Oundle application was concerned, a factor in the Committee's deliberations was the absence of a "made" Plan for the town. However, this fails to recognise that the residents have stressed on a number of occasions that, for a variety of reasons, they want the Plan's arrangement for several small developments rather than ENC's imposed solution of larger blocks of housing. Oundle has one further hope: the Secretary of State for Housing has received a request, presumably through local MP Tom Pursglove, to "call in" the application for his own determination.

Northamptonshire Police aims to be the first force to arm every frontline officer with a Taser by 2021 after the Home Office pledged £132,000 of additional funding. In order to deter attacks on staff, the force applied for Government cash to help cover the cost of training and equipping 300 extra officers with Tasers after Home Secretary Priti Patel invited applications for a share of £10million central Government money. The most recent figures from 2018 show that 380 Northants Police staff were injured during attacks. UK police officers have been armed with Tasers since the early 2000s. The device works by firing two barbed darts which deliver an electric current to incapacitate targets and provide a non-lethal means of stopping law-breakers.

There is advice from the Department for Environmental, Food and Rural Affairs for anyone thinking of taking on a cat or a dog. It's important to be aware of deceitful sellers who mistreat animals to line their pockets; they convince unsuspecting buyers that the puppy or kitten was raised in a happy home whereas they may have been reared in a low welfare environment. You should research the charity or other organisation you are getting your cat or dog from and ideally, get the animal from within the UK. Dogs and cats are sometimes imported illegally and might carry diseases that could end up harming other pets. If you do buy or adopt from abroad, animals should be fully vaccinated (including against rabies). For more essential advice, go to getyourpetsafely.campaign.gov.uk.

DB Shoes – 100 Not Out!

In 1918, two war-weary young soldiers and former POWs returned to Britain at the end of the First World War. Identical twins, Jack and Bill Denton had come back to their Northamptonshire roots, having survived the tumult of a war-ravaged Europe.

They were keen cricketers and opened for Northamptonshire, but as Jack said, "there was not a living to be made out of cricket," so on 11th February 1920, DB Shoes was formed, manufacturing men's shoes and boots, in a region of the country renowned for its thriving footwear industry.

During the 1930s, the business grew and moved to larger premises in Rectory Road, Rushden. The Second World War saw DB Shoes devote much of its production to manufacturing footwear for the war effort.

Then, in the early 1960s, Jack's sons, Hugh and John Denton, took over the running of the expanding business. Sales soared to 25,000 pairs per week as the company embraced the new manufacturing technologies of PVC and PU direct injection moulding, but by the 1990s, the business declined considerably due to increased import

penetration, with the resultant closure of two out of the three factories.

In 1997, Charles and David Denton, from the third generation and also identical twins, bought the other shareholders out and started the substantial task of changing the business from a loss-making manufacturer with no clear direction,

to the successful specialist wide fitting manufacturer it is today.

In 2004, the hard work of turning the company around was recognised with the winning of the British Chambers of Commerce National Award for Outstanding Business Achievement. Further awards have followed, with DB Shoes winning the Comfort/Wellness

Footwear Brand of the Year in 2017 and 2019 at the Footwear Industry Awards ceremony.

DB Shoes Ltd opened the doors to its factory shoe shop in March 2013. Based at the company's headquarters at 19-21 Irchester Road, the shop features sizes 3-8 in ladies footwear, sizes 6-12 in men's shoes and a range of children's styles. Store opening hours are from 10am to 5pm, Monday through Saturday and from 10am until 4pm each Sunday. For further information you can call 01933 410305.

Over the last 100 years the shoe world has changed considerably; in the first 50 years it was the change in manufacturing technology; in the latter years the change in computer technology and the way shoes are sold. Many manufacturers failed to embrace that change and for DB there were some very close calls, but the company has kept running and is now 100 not out!

Secondary school places allocated to Northamptonshire pupils

More than 8,800 secondary school places have been allocated to pupils across Northamptonshire.

The proportion of families securing a place at their first preference school has risen to 79% from 77.3% in 2019, while the number of families being offered a place at one of their preferred schools is 96%.

Families who applied for their secondary school place online and within the deadline are able to check their offer on the council's website at www.northamptonshire.gov.uk/admissions.

Cllr Fiona Baker, County Council cabinet member for children's services, families and education, said: "I'm pleased that this year we have been able to offer more families (96%) a place at one of their preferred schools and 79%, that's almost 7,000 children, have received a place at their first preference school."

"Our growing county means that we are continually faced with the challenge of providing more school places in the future and

we will continue to work with our partners to make this happen."

Any parent has the right to appeal (through the independent appeals process) against refusal of a place at any school for which they have applied.

The increase in the number of families managing to secure a place at a preference school has been achieved through the County Council either providing or working with schools to commission the following additional places:

- 230 temporary places in Northampton
- 90 temporary places in Corby
- 90 permanent places in Kettering

The County Council is continuing to work with schools across the county to provide further additional capacity in areas of high demand. Further places may be added prior to September to ensure the council continues to fulfil its statutory obligation of providing sufficient school places.

The next round of secondary school place allocations (for late applicants) will take place in April. Primary school allocations for September 2020 will be announced on 16th April.

Go-ahead for Northamptonshire's new unitary councils

Parliament has passed legislation to replace Northamptonshire's eight existing councils with two new unitary authorities on 1st April next year.

The Northamptonshire Structural Changes Order has now been approved by the House of Commons and House of Lords, enabling the creation of a new North Northamptonshire Council serving the areas of Corby, East Northants, Kettering and Wellingborough and a new West Northamptonshire Council serving Daventry District, Northampton and South Northants.

The two new unitary councils will start providing services to Northamptonshire's residents and businesses on 1st April 2021 when the eight existing district, borough and county councils will be abolished.

Now the legislation is approved, the next stage will be to set up two new shadow councils to lead the work to create the two new unitaries. Elections will take place countywide on Thursday 7th May where residents will be able to vote for the

councillors that sit on these new North and West shadow councils.

Councillor Martin Griffiths, Chairman of the North Northamptonshire Joint Committee said: "We welcome the certainty that the approval of this legislation brings as we focus our efforts on creating two new councils to deliver more efficient and joined-up services for the people of Northamptonshire. We are working hard to create two sustainable unitary councils that, while being very different in nature, will be exemplars of how to provide excellent services for our residents."

Councillor Jonathan Nunn, Chairman of the West Northamptonshire Joint Committee said: "Our councils have a strong track record of working together and we have already made encouraging progress towards shaping the new unitaries whilst we awaited this formal confirmation of the government's reorganisation plans. There is still much to do between now and next April but we are confident these new unitary councils will

deliver improved services that will make a positive difference to people's lives."

The West and North shadow councils will run alongside the county, district and boroughs until the existing councils are abolished on 1st April 2021. The new councillors to be elected by residents on 7th May – 78 in the North and 93 in the West – will initially sit on the shadow councils then automatically become elected members of the

new unitary authorities from 1st April 2021.

Until the new shadow authorities are established, preparations for the new unitaries are being led by North and West joint committees.

The eight existing councils are working together to prepare for the new unitaries as part of the Future Northants programme, which is currently in the Design phase – to begin drafting how the services for the new unitary councils might be designed.

YOUR HEALTH – You're not on the scrapheap

There are so many things you can do to help yourself when you've got chronic pain, but it's hard to know where to start.

The first thing is to know whether movement will make it worse. This doesn't necessarily mean you need a scan, it means that you need a good understanding of what is causing the pain. If you go about your normal daily business or resume activities you enjoy doing, will they aggravate it? Rest may be the first thing to do, but in chronic pain you will normally need slow, gradual increases in activity. Many chronic pains, including a lot of back pains, will improve with movement. It's helpful to know which category you're in.

Remember, the amount of pain you're experiencing might be out of proportion to the amount of damage you have. Please don't assume you're on the scrapheap.

Having found out whether movement is dangerous or helpful, you need to find out exactly what movements are good for you. It's no good suddenly trying to run 50 miles a day if your knee injury has been rested for 10 years. Higham's chronic pain specialist, Pierre Bonnaud says: "You need to move, but you also need to understand how much, and how to pace yourself. It's easy to get carried away when you have taken that first step to doing activities that are dear and meaningful to you."

Lastly, don't celebrate your improvements by doing too much! If mowing the lawn is too much for you... well, you already know my thoughts about that!

WILDLIFE NEWS

Anyone considering a career involving meteorology might have had the odd doubt this year. Many long-term forecasts struggled, and comparisons with previous years' records have just said that this was a "record-breaking year" for so many reasons.

Once again Northants has fared pretty well, though there could be plenty to come yet. As I write there are forecasts of snow – further north at present, but who knows what could arrive (and even disappear) before being read?

For our countryside all is not lost, and the signs are just appearing, as if wildlife has remembered the old song 'Love is in the Air' and what they should be doing. After months of absence both male and female blackbirds are turning up for breakfast; birds like blue and great tits, having probably found enough food in the reserve in the milder weather, can now pop over the fence for the extra supplies they will soon need. Our

friendly neighbourhood robin is visiting again, and will hopefully soon be joined by a partner (they can obviously tell the boy/girl difference, though I can't). And finally the reports of a hedgehog coming out for a quick refreshment break in the middle of its sleeping were wrong; they have shown up on at least half the nights since then, another sign that the temperatures are higher than expected.

So take a quick look out of the window, or a brisk walk in the open fields and reserves, and you will be reassured that all is well, and if we humans don't interfere too much it will continue. This is the start of nature's year. Fresh homes will be needed, not only for birds but also mammals like mice, and the vast number of creatures too small for us to see but vital to the system.

In many areas a huge amount of water must drain away before the plant life can grow normally, and until then insects for young birds could be in short supply, and in extreme cases trees and shrubs could drown (really!). Even the 'kinder' weather brings its own dangers.
