Booster vaccines key to avoid waning Covid immunity

Eligible people in Northamptonshire are being warned not to miss out on their Covid-19 booster dose – as latest evidence shows the protection offered by two doses begins to wane over time.

New findings from the Scientific Advisory Group for Emergencies (SAGE) shows:

- For the Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine – protection falls from 65% up to three months after a second dose to 45% six months after the second dose
- For the Pfizer/BioNTech vaccine – protection falls from 90% to 65%
- Protection against hospitalisation falls from 95% to 75% for Oxford/AstraZeneca and 99% to 90% for Pfizer/BioNTech

Those eligible for a booster dose include people aged over 50, those who are clinically vulnerable and unpaid carers. They will receive letters and text messages confirming their eligibility for a booster if their second dose of vaccine was administered at least six months ago. Those eligible can call 119, book online or visit a local drop-in clinic.

NORTH NORTHAMPTONSHIRE TO HOST VIRTUAL CLIMATE CHANGE CONFERENCE

Leading local thinkers on environmental strategy, renewable energy and sustainable transport will come together to take part in North Northamptonshire's very own virtual climate change conference, NNClimate21 on Tuesday 16th November.

NNCLIMATE21 will be a showcase of activities and opportunities in North Northamptonshire on key important topics such as sustainable transport, renewable energy and environmental strategy. It will feature local keynote speakers from across the industry including the University of Northampton, Chelveston Renewable Energy Park, Electric Corby, Voi Technology, River Nene Regional Park, North Northamptonshire Council and more.

The conference will be virtual, taking place online to reduce the

carbon footprint of the event. It will be broadcast live on YouTube for anyone to watch.

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of North Northamptonshire Council, added: "North Northamptonshire Council declared a climate and environment emergency in July this year. I believe that as a Council we need to set an example and lead from the front. We need to be ambitious and not be afraid to challenge conventional thinking. We need to encourage new policies that help shift mindsets and behaviours to focus on the most important issues because

the climate emergency is too important to pay lip service.

"I hope that everyone who attends this conference virtually will come away with a better insight about the environmental initiatives taking place locally and help stimulate debate about how we can all respond more quickly to the challenges ahead."

Cllr Harriet Pentland, North Northamptonshire Council's Executive Member for Climate and Green Environment, said: "With the COP26 conference taking place, this is the perfect opportunity for us to come together to focus on the key environmental issues for North Northamptonshire.

"We want to discuss local issues and solutions that will have a positive and lasting impact on the local environment for

generations to come."

Dr Chris Holt, Senior Lecturer in water resources and climatology at the University of Northampton said: "We are already seeing the impacts of climate change around the world in the form of severe and extreme weather events. Northamptonshire will not be unaffected, and we need to be considering now what changes might occur to our weather on a day-to-day basis but also the extreme conditions and how they will affect us."

Matthew Pencharz, Voi Technology's Head of Public Policy for UK, Ireland & Benelux said: "Ahead of COP26 in Glasgow, it's important to share knowledge on how greener and convenient transport modes such as e-scooters and e-bikes can help us address the climate crisis.

"Domestic transport represents nearly a quarter of all UK greenhouse gas emissions, more than any sector across the economy, and over half of which comes from passenger cars. Micromobility is already playing a role in reducing carbon emissions by giving the local community a more sustainable alternative to short car rides.

"At Voi, we're committed to climate-neutral mobility and are delighted to be working with the council to support NNClimate21. We encourage everyone to tune in, so we can all do our bit to create better places to live." The conference will take place from 10am until 3.30pm on Tuesday 16th November and there will be three sessions held on the day focusing on the following topics: The 'Future of Energy', 'Sustainable Travel' and the 'Environment'.

WILDLIFE NEWS

Compared to some other places in the world we have rather a small list of mammals in our countryside, and some of them are so rare that they often need special projects to improve their chances of survival.

In our country most of the losses are caused by us, though increasingly we are finding many more problems affecting UK plants and animals as a result of climate change, which is now attracting social media pressure – which nowadays seems to be essential to stir people into action.

We need to use our natural curiosity to learn what the immediate examples in our own little plots (and large estates) are, to show what might be possible for us in terms of protecting species – “every little helps....”

Many of the animals will turn up unannounced, probably unseen but there are always examples which take us by surprise.

Back in the spring we set up a small CCTV in a covered lean-to shed and were surprised and pleased to find a visitor we had not forecast, though

it is one of our most common animals in fields and gardens – a wood mouse. Because mice have always had a (not really deserved) reputation as a pest, they are not generally welcome; any small furry ball running around the fields or houses can rmake anybody jump. So finding this new animal was a pleasant reminder that our countryside is a hive of activity often overlooked, or missed completely.

After several visits suddenly it stopped abruptly, suggesting that local cats had also found a new source of food – but recent sightings hold more promise.

Identifying small brown furry creatures is not always easy, though some patches of lighter colour can give the alternative of yellow-necked mouse, and comparisons between mice and voles shows the latter has a sharp-pointed head against the rounded head of the vole, and guess how the long-tailed wood mouse got its other name!

But whatever name you decide to give it, leave it alone; it is an essenital ingredient of diet for a wide range of others in the ‘carnivore’ (meateater) family.

Talking of public houses, which I did mention in passing last time, where are they all now? Before I moved here, the village where I lived had just three public houses, but history tells me that there used to be at least another five. Some of them had been converted into private houses but still bore the name of the pub – or inn – as the house name. If you find your ancestors in the census and they are running a drinking establishment, but you are unable to find that pub or inn in the present day, it could well be that the place no longer exists as such.

The Green Man in Oundle is no longer a public house, but now houses an antique shop. The Wheatsheaf in Thurning is now a private house, as is the Fitzwilliam Arms in Irthingborough. However, by looking at the buildings there are still some clues to be had of their previous use.

But what were your ancestors’ jobs? Here are some of the more unusual names that may be found:

- Ale Conner – A man who inspected the ale sold

in public houses for quality and measure (Also known as an Ale Founder)

- Ale Tunner – He was responsible for filling the barrels (tuns) with beer
- Brewster – Female Brewer
- Hush Shop Keeper – Someone who brewed and sold beer without a licence (this was usually a side-line to their normal occupation.)
- Maltster – A brewer, maker or seller of malts (beers)
- Mashmaker – He made the mash vats or mashels used for mixing malts to make the beer.

If you do find the pub where your ancestor lived or worked and it is still in use as such, it is always worth contacting the brewery to see if they have information in their archives – you never know what you might discover!

CASH BOOST FOR NORTH NORTHANTS TO HELP COMMITMENTS TO PROSPERITY AND NET ZERO

A funding injection of almost £3million into North Northants will help boost the local economy and launch innovative projects that will shift the area towards its net zero carbon goal.

A number of cutting-edge enterprises have been awarded the Government cash to invigorate initiatives, which include the development of local energy projects, delivering an app to monitor food waste and offering training and support to ex-offenders.

News of the funding from the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities under the Community Renewal Fund comes as the COP26 climate change conference has focused attention around environmental issues, and before the council's online summit, NNClimate21.

Cllr David Brackenbury, North Northamptonshire Council's Executive member for Growth and Regeneration, said: "This is great news for North Northants – I'm absolutely delighted that we will receive this funding to help boost some key projects in the area.

"These are beneficial to creating employment opportunities and boosting the local economy and there is a strong focus on initiatives that are seeking clever low carbon solutions."

Cllr Harriet Pentland, the Council's Executive Member for Climate and the Green Environment, said: "...[I]t's

clear that combatting the effects of climate change and protecting the environment is a significant piece of work for all of us.

"I'm delighted that this has been recognised in the funding from the Government for these innovative projects right here in North Northamptonshire and goes to show how everyone's focus is now fixed on reducing carbon emissions."



GUS Band spectacular concert

On 14th November, a spectacular concert, 'Brass Explosion' is being given at The Core at Corby Cube by The GUS Band and Youth Brass 2000.

The GUS Band, originally named the Munn and Felton Works Band was formed by Fred Felton in 1933 in Kettering. During their 88-year history, thousands have applauded the band in concert, and the Midlanders have dented the northern pride of Yorkshire and Lancashire, traditionally the home of brass bands, by winning no less than six national titles, the British Open Championships and being proclaimed World Champions.

Joining The GUS Band are the breath-takingly talented young musicians of the Youth Brass 2000 brass band. This band was formed in 1989 with the aim to be the "Best youth band in the world" and quickly showed that this was their true intent by becoming the Action Research National Entertainment Champions in 1991. For talented players under the age of 19, the Youth Brass 2000 band has built up an enviable reputation and is currently the reigning Champion Youth Band of Great Britain, having won this competition no less than seven times in the last nine years.

There are very close links between the two ensembles, not least because many players in

Youth Brass 2000 have risen through the ranks and have gone on to play in The GUS Band. These include current players such as Marcus Pain, who was a founding member and principal cornet of Youth Brass 2000 and whose father helped form the youth band. Thomas and James Fountain, both co-principal cornets of the band and now professional trumpet players also gained early experience as members of Youth Brass 2000. In The GUS Band's percussion section, Tim Jones and Joshua Gilding are both former Youth Brass 2000 players and Owen Yarrow, The GUS Band's most recent signing is still a member. Then there is the band's Artistic Director, Chris Jeans, who became the Youth Brass 2000 conductor a week after the youth band started and has been at their helm ever since. A phenomenal achievement and a continued inspiration to the players.

Both bands have a varied programme to perform at the Corby Cube, including The GUS Band's 'History of Pop' set, commissioned especially for the concert, featuring the Queen classic 'Bohemian Rhapsody', as well as a spectacular massed band finish with Tchaikovsky's 1812 Overture.

Definitely a concert not to be missed when the county's two premier bands join forces to present a fantastic afternoon's feast of musical entertainment.

North Northamptonshire Council steps in to save bus route

North Northamptonshire Council has stepped in to ensure that bus service W8 will continue running.

This service runs every hour from Bozeat and Wollaston to Wellingborough.

The operator of the existing commercial bus service, which runs like most other buses without subsidy, advised the council that the service was no longer viable and would cease operation with effect from Monday

15th November. The well-publicised national driver shortage has also been affecting the W8 over recent weeks.

The council agreed a funding package of just over £14,000 and, having sought tenders, awarded a contract to Stagecoach Midlands that allows the service to continue until at least April 2022, with the option to extend subject to ongoing budget considerations.

The council has been able

to work with Stagecoach to agree that the new contract could start one week earlier, meaning that normal service was able to resume from Monday 8th November.

Stagecoach Midlands will run the W8 to the same route and timetable, except that one journey that used to run from Wellingborough at 0900 and return from Bozeat at 0919 will now run 5 minutes later.

The council is grateful that Stagecoach has

stepped in at short notice and to all those, including Cogenhoe and Whiston Parish Council, which runs the Village Hopper service from these same villages to Northampton, who have worked to try to find a solution to this situation.

Cllr Graham Lawman, the council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets, said: "This is a vital route for many people, including school pupils and connecting our

communities, especially the rural ones, is essential for keeping people in touch and to help the economy. I'm delighted that we've been able to work with another bus company to help find a solution, demonstrating our commitment to bus services in the area."

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "With COP26 about to start, I'm very pleased that we've been able to step in and keep this important public transport

route alive.

"We're committed to keeping communities connected, which has multiple benefits all round for our residents and for businesses."

Mark Whitelocks, Managing Director for Stagecoach Midlands said: "We are pleased to be commencing operation of route W8 from 8th November and look forward to serving customers old and new in the Bozeat and Wollaston areas."



ANITA SETHI: I Belong Here – A Journey Along the Backbone of Britain

I Belong Here heralds a powerful and refreshing new voice in nature writing. It was chosen as one of Waterstone's Best Books to Look Forward to in 2021, a Guardian 2021 Literary Highlight, and was also shortlisted for the Wainwright Prize for nature writing.



Anita Sethi was on a journey through Northern England when she became the victim of a race-hate crime. The crime was a vicious attack on her right to exist in a place on account of her race. After the event Anita experienced panic attacks and anxiety.

A crushing sense of claustrophobia made her long for wide open spaces, to breathe deeply in the great outdoors. She was intent on not letting her experience stop her travelling freely and without fear. The Pennines – known as 'the backbone of Britain' – runs through the north and strongly connects north with south, east with west. It's a place of borderlands and limestone, of rivers and 'scars', of fells and forces. The Pennines called to Anita with a magnetic force; although a racist had told her to leave, she felt drawn to further explore the area she regards as her home, to immerse herself deeply in place. Anita's journey through the natural landscapes of the North is one of reclamation, a way of saying that this is her land too and she belongs in the UK as a brown woman, as much as a white man does.

Her journey transforms what began as an ugly experience of hate into one offering hope and

finding beauty after brutality. Every word written against the rising tide of hate speech, such as this book, is an act of resistance. "Anita Sethi invites her reader to walk, not just at her side, but in her shoes, and to feel for themselves both the exhilaration and the chagrin of travelling the backbone of her home country as a woman of colour. By turns joyous and humbling, *I Belong Here* is an urgent and necessary addition to the canon of contemporary writing about place in the island of Britain." – Katharine Norbury, editor of *Women on Nature*

Anita Sethi was born in Manchester, UK where her love of nature first flourished in childhood, in wild urban spaces. *I Belong Here* is the first in her nature writing trilogy. She has also contributed to anthologies including *Seasons*, *Seaside Special: Postcards from the Edge*, *Common People*, *The Wild Isles* and *Women on Nature*. She has written for the *Guardian*, *Observer*, *Sunday Times*, *Telegraph*, *Vogue*, *BBC Wildlife*, *New Statesman* and *Times Literary Supplement*, and appeared on BBC Radio 4's *Open Book*, *Front Row* and *Today*, BBC 5 Live and *Sky*. She has been shortlisted for Northern



Writer of the Year at the Northern Soul Awards and Journalist of the Year at the Asian Media Awards, and judged the British Book Awards, Costas and Society of Author Awards.
