LIFELINE FOR ROUGH SLEEPERS

Extra support will be on offer for rough sleepers in the North Northants area thanks to the expansion of a dedicated team.

North Northamptonshire Council's Rough Sleeping Team aims to successfully support people sleeping on the streets and help them into suitable accommodation – particularly with winter fast approaching.

Accommodation alone is not the answer however. Full support is needed to reduce the number rough sleeping and the team works closely with health, voluntary and community sector partners to identify and support rough sleepers who often have very complex needs.

The council has also set up a dedicated email and telephone number so services can be made aware of rough sleepers. If you see anyone rough sleeping, email roughsleepingteam@northnorthants.gov.uk or call 01536 464 630.

People are asked to provide as much detail as they can in terms of date, time, location and description, to help the team locate them as quickly as possible.

POIGNANT MONUMENT UNVEILED IN VILLAGE GARDENS

Working in partnership with Moulton Parish Council, the Moulton College stonemasonry department has designed and crafted a monument symbolising the sacrifices of war, and hope for the future. The monument is now on display in the village public gardens after being installed by local masonry contractor, Underwood and Weston.

The monument, which is 2m high, and sculpted from eight pieces of Ancaster hard white stone features the symbolic poppy and dove, representing new life and peace. The words 'Forever in our hearts', chosen by Moulton Parish Council, have been carved across the front.

The project, initiated by Moulton College as part of its 100-year anniversary celebrations, hopes to bring together members of the local community by providing a place for reflection.

Cllr David Aarons, Chair of Moulton Parish Council said: "It

was a joy to work with Moulton College on this project, and be actively involved in the plans for the design and installation of this monument. The sculpted piece is so intricately detailed, and is a beautiful reminder to the local community and beyond of our ability to overcome adversity. What a wonderful legacy for Moulton College to leave behind in the village, 100 years on from when the College first opened its doors."

The artist responsible for producing the monument is stonemasonry lecturer, Mark McDonnell. Mark, who has won numerous accolades in

stonemasonry, worked with the Parish Council throughout the project.

Mark said: "Rather than the monument being identified as a war memorial, the intention was for it to be a symbol of the future and hope, recognising loss but new life too. My own grandfather was lost during the Battle of the Somme in World War 1, so the project had particular significance to me."

During the planning stages, discussions considered the design of the monument, to ensure it sat well within the gardens and aesthetic of the surrounding village.



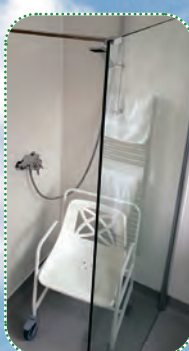

"Ancaster stone is a creamy hue and its colour and texture fits well with the stone of surrounding properties in Moulton. The lettering is raised to improve its visibility from across the gardens, and the surrounding stone

mottled to help emphasise this relief.

"I thoroughly enjoyed working on this piece for our centenary and it's a poignant tribute to those who have lost their lives, not only during wartimes but more recently too."

WILDLIFE NEWS

Winter is back with us (the Met Office has told us!) so our weather has again showed just how powerful it is.

During the year we've had days of high temperatures countered by heavy, often torrential rain causing destructive flooding. Such events tend to be fairly localised, with opposite effects being recorded only a few miles apart. The rather unexpected sight of blizzard snowfall in November was spread over much of the country (though worse in Scotland) while the destructive little storm (christened a 'tornado' by the press) followed a narrow

path from somewhere down in the south until it blew itself out off Lincolnshire, leaving a trail of damage. But the whole countryside is open to attack, adding to any other problems affecting plant growth.

Animals generally have some protection on the hunt for food (the main consideration during winter) from underground roots or by being small and sleek enough to avoid being affected by the wind, however strong. There are exceptions: night cameras show small insects still flying, though that may change in the next week or two.

Warm-blooded animals have to protect themselves not just with sufficient food, but also by ensuring they are well-insulated

by finding a sheltered nesting place or by growing a matt of short hairs next to their skin.

Creatures in watery surroundings use different tactics. Many have laid eggs before the air is cold enough to freeze the water, while others use an unexpected property of water: when the temperature drops to just above freezing it starts to cool from the top down and the ice forms a layer at the top while the water below gains solid protection (end of this week's science lesson!).

Our wildlife always needs help in this season, even if simply not disturbing the plants and animals – this is just as much a part of their life-cycles as we saw during the warmer months.

Do you make a note of your source documents when you find someone back in the mists of time? It is so easy to become caught up in the moment, following a trail and then suddenly, you cannot remember where you started. There is nothing worse than wanting to verify or explore some information further when you cannot for the life of you remember where you found it!

So... how do you keep your family history records? Scraps of paper littering the dining room table? Notebooks? Ring binders for each branch of the family? Shoeboxes? It may be that you prefer to keep all of your records on your computer/laptop/tablet etc.

I was helping someone with their tree recently and they are very organised already, putting documents such as copies of censuses etc in plastic sleeves and having a folder for each person. The next stage will be drawing out trees. Rather than

have a great big tree on lining paper that you could wrap round a room, you might find it easier to have a cluster of small trees with a key person on each one as the starting point.

I have a ring binder for each surname in my family. Yes, there are rather a lot, especially as each marriage introduces another branch that needs a file. However, I do know where to find information if I need to check something out. But what do you keep in it? I have key photographs in mine but then I also have boxes with labelled photos – where I know who they are! One of the things that I regret most is that I never discovered who they all were – most of them I know, but not all. Sadly, my father died this year and so I have no-one else to ask. So, make sure that you do ask, especially if you are having those family gatherings over Christmas – before the chance to do so disappears!

NORTH NORTHANTS GROUNDS MAINTENANCE TEAM GAINS **GREEN GLORY**

North Northamptonshire Council has won an International Green Apple Environment Award in the national campaign to find the greenest individuals, companies, councils and communities.

The authority competed against more than 800 other nominations in the Green Apple Awards for Environmental Best Practice with the project, "Pardon the Weeds, We are Feeding the Bees".

They were presented with their trophy and certificate at a glittering presentation ceremony hosted by Liz Kendall MP and sponsored by whatimpact.com and greenpixie.com at the Royal Horseguards Hotel, London.

As a result of this Green Apple Award success, they have been invited to have their winning paper published in The Green Book, the leading international work of reference on environmental best practice, so that others around the world can follow their example and learn from their achievement.

They could also progress to represent their country in the Green World Awards 2022 and have 100 trees planted in their name as part of the United Nations Billion Trees initiative.

Cllr Graham Lawman, the council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets, said: "Well done to the team for all their hard work in delivering this campaign which has allowed wildlife to flourish on a number of our grass verges. This is a great achievement for them and I'm delighted that they and the project have received international recognition."

Cllr Harriet Pentland, Executive Member for Climate and the Green Environment, said: "Protecting natural habitats and encouraging biodiversity is key to looking after our beautiful green environment and innovative schemes like this make a huge difference. Not only is the project wildlife-friendly but seeing so many beautiful flowers by the roadside is

a stunning sight – congratulations to all involved!"

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "Protecting the natural environment is a key priority for the council and this project demonstrates how a simple idea can have far-reaching effects."

The Green Apple Awards began in 1994 and have become established as the country's major recognition for environmental endeavours among companies, councils, communities and countries.

The awards are organised by The Green Organisation – an international, independent, non-political, non-profit environment group dedicated to recognising, rewarding and promoting environmental best practice.

The Green Apple Awards are supported by the Environment Agency, the Chartered Institute of Environmental Health, the Chartered Institution of Wastes Management, REHIS and other independent bodies.

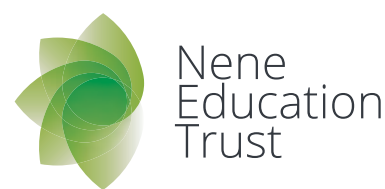

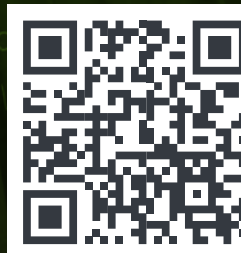
