Isham Bypass

Consultation is underway for the A509 Isham Bypass scheme and community feedback is encouraged.

This is a priority project for North Northamptonshire Council as it seeks to provide a range of benefits to the local community and road users, including reducing congestion, traffic noise and pollution.

Councillor Graham Lawman, the Council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets, said: "The Isham Bypass is part of the Major Road Network and this scheme is a much-needed project for the region, which local residents have been campaigning for over many years."

HIGHAM FERRERS SHOWCASES ITS SECRET GARDENS

Visitors to one Higham Ferrers garden were so impressed by what they saw recently that several popped "thank you" notes through the gardener's letterbox.

"They wrote that their visit had been so enjoyable. I got some really good feedback," recalled Julie Carlton, who welcomed 160 people into her showcase garden in Linnetts Lane recently.

She was taking part in the town's annual Secret Gardens event which was organised by the Higham Ferrers Tourism Committee.

Two hundred garden lovers from across the region made a beeline for the town, buying programmes in the Market Square and then settling on their own route around the 13 private gardens and four community gardens.

The town's new Mayor, Councillor Nigel Brown and Mayoress Jackie Brown also popped into some of the

show gardens, both declaring that what they had seen had been "impressive."

Over at Julie Carlton's garden, there was a constant stream of visitors, some who wanted to sit a while and others wanting to talk about her vision.

Others told her that they had heard about her garden after last year's Secret Gardens and were determined to see it for themselves this year.

Many said they believed she was a professional gardener or designer, but she explained that she had always kept a decent looking garden.

"I have always had a love of design and plants and more so in later life and now that I'm retired, I have more time to do what I love," she said.

Nowadays she tends to specialise in tropical and traditional plants, explaining that she calls her garden "The Jungalow".

One visitor who raved about her rare lemon-scented geraniums was rewarded with a cutting.

"She said they reminded her of her Mum and she had not been able to find them anywhere. I got my own lemon-scented geraniums from my Mum's garden when she passed away 20 years ago, so the visitor got one of the same cuttings," Julie said.

Ninety-two-year-old gardener Rosie Marks of Mill Fields was delighted to welcome 70 visitors to her red-white-and-blue themed Jubilee Garden.


And the town's "Hedgehog Mother" who takes in abandoned and rescued hedgehogs and whose garden contains a hedgehog hospital, was kept busy giving advice on a range of hedgehog queries.

"It was a busy weekend. I had eight new hedgehogs in on Saturday and 160 visitors on Sunday," she said.

Summer cocktails and plants were also on sale in the town's Duchy Barn Garden and there was also music and an art exhibition.

The Higham Ferrers Tourism Committee Chair, Liz Barnett, said that all the proceeds raised from the event would go towards the summer and winter flower displays in the troughs around the town.

WILDLIFE NEWS

There are some creatures in our countryside which we think we know quite well though their lifestyle and behaviour hide them at times. This is the season when one group of mammals makes an appearance for a few months before hiding away to sleep off the winter – bats.

There must be few readers who cannot give some kind of description of these mammals, even if it is only that we sense them fluttering around in the dark, feeling rather than seeing them. They are literally 'creatures of the night', though in this case there is nothing to fear, because the ones on our list do not include any blood-sucking types!

They are insectivores and so are vital in controlling increases of small creatures which appear as the sun sets and darkness strikes; their performance will determine first whether they locate their prey and secondly, a difficulty for all wildlife, whether enough of what they need is found.

Their targets are almost entirely small, insects like midges, and some bats will be looking for well over 1,000 little insects per night, to provide enough for themselves as well as the youngsters in the nest. This might mean many miles of physical activity every night.

If bats had to hunt in the daylight we can imagine some of the problems, since bats "illuminate" their surroundings with sound.

They have a built-in transmitter which sends out sound waves. Then, just as light waves are reflected during the day, these sound waves will bounce off the target insect, recording where the fly is. In other words, their system replaces light with sound, and bats have that 'magic' accessory to do the job.

If they could also 'colour code' their fur it would be even more convenient, but that is out of the question. We have to rely on size and "squeaks" to help us with that – and that is a different story.

Last time, I mentioned that I had visited the museum in the village where one set of my ancestors came from. There is nothing like local knowledge! On the same train of thought, have you considered joining a Family History Society (FHS) – or maybe even more than one?

If you are following your family and you live at the other end of the country from where your ancestors hailed, you might have thought that, as you were unable to attend any meeting, they would not be able to assist. However, this is a misconception.

Although I live in Northamptonshire, I have ancestors from the bottom right-hand corner of England: Suffolk, Essex, Kent, Surrey and Sussex. The FHS in each of those places has been invaluable to me, putting me in touch with others who are researching my family names as well as those who are able to undertake research on my behalf. Not everything is online!

If your ancestors were more local and from Northamptonshire, then the Northants FHS is certainly the place to investigate. Although things have changed somewhat since before Covid struck,

meetings have recommenced. They are now in the form of two online (Zoom) meetings a month for members plus two branch meetings: one held in Weston Favell and the other in Kettering. But not only are there opportunities to meet face-to-face with others, the societies have access to a wealth of other information. Not a bad investment of £12 a year for membership! Take a peek here: <https://www.northants-fhs.org/>

Another thought is social media. If you belong to Facebook, it is worth looking for the names of your towns and villages and see if there are any social history groups in there. I belong to one for Tenterden in Kent, where my lovely ancestors had the sense to stay in the same place for over 400 years. Most helpful of them! Some of the members have posted photographs of the place in days gone by, which give me a sense of what it was like back then instead of relying on Street View.

Charity awards over £347,000 to 90 community projects

Leading grant-making charity Northamptonshire Community Foundation has awarded £347,470 to 90 community projects since April 2022.

The county-based grant maker has delivered a combination of grant programmes to best support urgent local needs including a rolling programme of awards meaning that community groups, organisations and charities can apply for funding at any time, with a maximum

grant award of £3,000. The Foundation also manages a number of grants and programmes with regular closing dates for funding applications and which are advertised on their website.

Northamptonshire Community Foundation is the leading grant-making charity in the county, providing vital, often life-changing grants across Northamptonshire. Last year the charity awarded over £1.2 million to support some of the most vulnerable people in

Northamptonshire.

Recent awards across the county include:

The Never Alone Project - £3,000: To offer peer support groups for the parents and carers of bereaved children covering East Northamptonshire.

Anxiety and worry seem to be on the rise in our society, or perhaps we are just getting better at admitting how destructive they can be. In the UK, anxiety disorders are thought to affect up to one in 10 people during their lifetime.

A few things that worrying does to your health:

- Your brain releases stress hormones like adrenaline and cortisol into the bloodstream
- Your heart rate increases, your breathing becomes heavier

- You may experience digestive problems
- Muscle tension might cause you to feel aches and pains. Here are a few things you can do to help yourself:

- Practise making more small spur of the moment decisions – even something as simple as changing your usual takeaway order! This will help to build your confidence that even if you make a different choice, the world won't end.
- Be kind to yourself when you make a mistake – they are part of the universal human experience.
- Set aside a weekly "power hour" to tackle small tasks

that don't have a fixed deadline and that you'd usually allow to build up.

> DISCOVER A ROMAN ARMY IN NENE PARK WITH NEW APP

The new 'Artis Trail App' accompanies a circular walk along the River Nene, through Normangate Field and Castor Village uncovering the unique heritage of the Nene Valley from the Bronze Age, the Roman period and up to World War II. The app has been imaginatively created by One to One Development Trust. Their fun and creative approach brings to life the history of the area through augmented reality, audio tours, aerial views and information about the plants and wildlife.

By using the app, visitors can try on a virtual Roman Helmet as they walk across Ermine Street, the main route connecting the north and south of the Roman province, or create a miniature Roman Army on Normangate Field – within

the site of the industrial suburbs of the Roman Town of Durobrivae. The walk passes through the beautiful village of Castor and walkers can uncover a virtual Praetorium – the impressive Roman administrative building that once stood on Stocks Hill, the foundations of which can still be seen in the wall opposite St Kyneburgha Church.

The activities are easy to access on a mobile phone via QR codes located along the walking route.

Judi Alston, Creative Director of One to One Development Trust said: "The area is so rich in heritage, and it has been very rewarding creating an interactive digital project about its exciting history. We ran community consultation days testing out the concept ideas with visitors to Nene Park and local families. These have helped inform the digital trail."

The Artis Trail is produced in partnership with the Nene Valley Archaeological Trust and is part of the Nenescape Walking In Time project – a series of four self-guided walks exploring the heritage of Nene Park and the landscape of the lower Nene Valley, West of Peterborough. The trail is named after Edmund Tyrell Artis (1789-1847).

Artis' archaeological investigations along the Nene Valley uncovered some outstanding discoveries including a Roman mosaic, and the remains of Roman pottery kilns and grand villas. Artis lived and worked on the nearby Milton Estate between 1813 and 1826 and during that time produced a beautifully illustrated publication of mosaics and excavated building remains. His gravestone can be viewed in Castor churchyard.

Once the robot arrives, they receive an alert and can meet and unlock it through the app. The robots are lightweight and travel at the speed of a pedestrian (no faster than 4mph). They use a combination of sensors,

artificial intelligence and machine learning to travel on pavements and navigate around any obstacles, while computer vision-based navigation helps them map their environment to the nearest inch.



Problems with Japanese knotweed

Japanese knotweed is a large herbaceous perennial plant that can seriously damage property if left unchecked.

Its wide-ranging root system can extend up to 3 metres in depth and 7 metres in all directions and may have devastating consequences for building foundations and drains causing structural damage. It is best spotted during

mid-summer and early autumn when the reddish purple shoots rapidly form into dense strands of bamboo like stems that develop green heart or shield shaped leaves.

If you find Japanese knotweed in your garden there are companies that can give you the knowledge and skills necessary to control and eradicate it from your garden at significant cost.

If your neighbours have allowed knotweed to enter their property into yours you may have a claim for damages for the costs of eradication and possibly for the reduction in value, if any, to your property.

If you have purchased a property and the previous owners deliberately or negligently failed to disclose the existence of Japanese knotweed, you may have a claim for misrepresentation.

A surveyor who has negligently failed to notice the presence of Japanese knotweed at the time of a pre-purchase survey may be liable for the losses caused.

Changes proposed for councils' school swimming service

The way the councils' school swimming service is run across Northamptonshire may change. Accessing swimming lessons would become more streamlined for schools and cost-effective for the councils.

In recent years there has been a decline in demand for the council school swimming service from schools. Currently only 33% of schools utilise the council swimming service, the rest – the majority – booking directly with pools and leisure providers.

If the recommendation is approved, North and West Northamptonshire Councils will no longer be providers of school swimming lessons, effective from 31st December 2022.

The change would:

- Allow schools to deal directly with pool providers to negotiate pool space and times that are accessible to them.
- Ensure schools are able to access pools that are nearest to them.

- Improve communication between schools and pool providers without having to go through a council managed system.
- Ensure that the service does not run at a deficit for NNC and WNC.

The school swimming service is a traded service that was scheduled to disaggregate by 1st October 2022.

It is a non-statutory function for local authorities as it is the responsibility of each individual school to provide swimming services for its students.

Schools decide how they secure their curricular school swimming either via direct arrangements with local pools or otherwise outsourcing from the countywide school swimming service, which links schools with pools and swimming instructors, to deliver swimming lessons at a pool in their area.

With fewer schools using the service, it has not always broken financially even and in 2021/2022 it ran at a forecasted deficit of £32,474.
