HIGHAM FERRERS TOURISM CELEBRATES MILESTONE ANNIVERSARY

HIGHAM FERRERS TOURISM SHOOTS **COMMEMORATIVE MOVIE**

Six Higham Ferrers schoolchildren are set to become YouTube stars, with the premiere of a new film about Henry Chichele.

The seven and eight-year-olds, who attend Henry Chichele Primary School, appear and speak in the movie that is currently in production to mark the 600th anniversary of the Henry Chichele College.

The 15th-century college and The Bede House in the arounds of St Mary's Church were founded by the town's most famous historical figure. Henry Chichele, who became one of the country's longest serving Archbishops of Canterbury.

The college site is owned by the Duchy of Lancaster, King Charles III and is under the guardianship of English Heritage. Higham Ferrers Tourism manages the day-today events in partnership with English Heritage and via The Chichele College Committee.

To celebrate the special 600th anniversary, the Tourism Committee has obtained a grant from the Nenescape Festival Fund to make a film about the milestone celebrations and to tell the world the story of Chichele College and its famous founder.

The film, which was shot by Gareth Hughes of HGA Studios, will be available to stream on YouTube and will be aired on the Higham Ferrers Tourism website.

Some 500 children from Higham Ferrers Junior School and the Henry Chichele Primary School visited the Chichele College in the run-up to filming to learn about Chichele and to turn back the pages of history to learn how to scribe with swan and goose-feathered quills. Then six children from the Henry Chichele school were given permission by their parents to be filmed for the commemorative movie, to explain what they know about Archbishop Chichele.

They had learned their lines well - and got a round of applause from onlookers - with one seven-year-old saying afterwards that he could not wait to see himself on YouTube

Viewers will learn that

Chichele College was originally a place of learning for monks, who were self-sufficient, producing their own food and medicines from the plants they grew. They grew vines for making wine and had a licence from the king to grow saffron, the world's most expensive spice.

The college is still a place for the community and this year the Tourism Committee has aimed to share it with as many people as possible.

WILDLIFE NEWS

Holidays over? Or are you one of those dedicated workers who feels they should not leave their desks or workbench for too long? Plants and animals in 'our' countryside have no fixed times to book the weeks to be away "if we can be spared" because they all rely directly or otherwise on each other.

There is very little choice, and they must follow others depending on whether they have starring roles as predator or prey. One job which arises at times governed by the growth or otherwise of the actors starring in this rural drama, but often without enthusiasm, is stocktaking.

What we can see in garden or field changes literally minute by minute. We cannot simply count numbers. But to know what activity is going on we need checks on comings and goings. Experts will do this as seasons change – figures, from gardens and elswhere, can only be a infinitesimal part of the overall picture, but can still help with specialist studies, often by individual enthusiasts watching

butterflies or birds or other restricted areas. Working with a survey can be made more personal, with spots we visit regularly - even negative results can help. For example, since moving house we have seen no birds of the swallow or swift families (insect-eaters) overhead, though we live by one of the local reserves. But unless that information is recorded, it is of little use in knowing what is really happening.

Similarly, last year we had regular visits from a family of hedgehogs, continuing well into the colder months, but this year we can only feel that the visits suggest a sequence coming from, probably, just one. Why? We cannot be sure (especially as we had some reliability problems with the equipment), but it does highlight a local problem, which might vary next year. These visits, even if reduced in number. remind us that even in 'protected' areas all plants and animals need our awareness, especially as the harsher clouds are ahead (we must assume the worst, as the past summer has shown!).

Last time, I mentioned that I can disappear into old newspapers - especially the advertisements. They certainly help to find out what was

happening in your town or village at the time -what sort of shops were there? Are any still in existence? Are the pubs still there or have they changed their names? Some towns and villages also have guided walks where you can discover the history of where your ancestors once lived. In my old home town of St Albans there are regular tours that take place - including Historic Tours and Crime & Punishment!

There is also an app that can be downloaded to your smartphone named 'The Love Oundle Walking Tour'. This gives an audiovisual account, the pictures being of where buildings once were - it works with the magic of GPS. However, if you are not technically minded or do not have a smartphone. the 'Oundle Town Trail Guide' is available from the Oundle Bookshop.

It is certainly worth doing a bit of research before vou set off to visit your ancestors' towns and villages to see if there are any guided tours of the place. At

least there might be a guide book!

I was looking into a family history for a friend of mine this week. Her husband's family came from Camberwell in London and, as I went through the censuses to find out where they lived, at the same time I was trying to find the addresses on a map. However, some of them were missing. Aha! The London Blitz took them out I thought. But this was not the case for all of them. Some had changed their name – and this happened more than you might think

As I was researching London, I remembered this wonderful website: https://www.maps. thehunthouse.com/Streets/Street_Name_ Changes.htm You can enter the name of the street as it once was and, if it was changed rather than destroyed, it will give you the name as it is now. It is worth checking to see if there is similar help (internet or published book) for your towns and villages

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An exhibition about Henry Chichele as well as the town's historic timeline (featuring the two visits that the late Queen Elizabeth II paid to the town) was also on display at the time of filming and helped form a backdrop to some of the shots. Archbishop Chichele

founded The Bede House as a home for 12 poor men of the town, with a Bedeswoman to cook, clean and care for them and viewers will learn that the tradition of having Bedesmen and a Bedeswoman continues today. They still attend civic functions in their unique black cloaks

Three Bedesmen, Chris O'Rourke, Stephen Tuffnail and Terry Hart were filmed explaining their roles.

The camera then moved outside to feature the volunteer gardeners who have planted and cared for the medieval style gardens for the past 11 vears

Volunteer amateur archaeologists Rachel Smyth, Mary and Angelica, who along with other members of HiFARS (Higham Ferrers Archaeology and Research Society) have made some fascinating historical finds at the ancient

site, were also interviewed. Moving on, the camera captured members of the Gateway Club for adults with learning difficulties who use the grounds and the neighbouring Duchy Barn Garden.

Shots of three ancient bee boles - recesses in the stone walls used for harvesting honey – which were recently

uncovered in the Chichele College Garden and the Duchy Barn Garden helped complete the 600-year anniversary story.

Director for the day, Carol Fitzgerald, a member of the Tourism and Chichele College Committees, said: "We had a very busy day shooting the film and we can't wait to see the finished movie

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TREES TO COMMEMORATE THE LIFE OF PRINCE PHILIP, THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH

There has been another green bonus for Rushden following the decision of the town's two Rotary Clubs, after the Duke of Edinburgh's funeral, that they would like to commemorate his life with a lasting tribute – after all he was an honorary Rotarian of two clubs, one in Scotland and the other at Eton.

The clubs also recognised the wish of the Queen that the planting of trees would be an ecological way to mark her Jubilee. The two clubs therefore combined the two events and sponsored the purchase of four well-grown trees to be planted in Rushden's Hall Park with Rushden Town Council's blessing. This project has now been completed. The president of the Chichele Club said: "We bought trees that will provide all year round interest with different colour foliage and as the year goes by the structure of the trees themselves will be of interest – some multibranched with others plainer." The tree types are:

- Acer Palmatum Bloodgood
- Acer Palmatum Fireglow
- Sorbus Aucuparia Multi Stem

• Tilia Cordata x mongolica – Harvest Gold There will be a plaque on the trees with a commemoration to Prince Philip. Visitors to the park will be able to follow the progress of the trees for hopefully hundreds of years to come.



Digital showcase event

School pupils aiming for a future career in the digital and technology industries will have the chance to network with local sector leaders at a showcase event later this month.

Tresham College, part of The Bedford College Group, working with North Northamptonshire Council, will host the invitation only Techspo event at the Kettering campus on Friday, 21st October.

Tresham College will have a series of exhibition stands on their technology courses – from digital marketing to game design and software development.

Your Health -**Tendons in Paradise**

On one of the live OsteopathyTV shows we stream from Higham Ferrers we were told the following: "A tendon's day in Paradise is when nothing changes."

The reason tendons don't like change is that it takes them a while to adapt to it. If you make changes too fast they become inflamed and painful. The trick is to increase or decrease activity slowly enough for them to get used to it. Slowly enough for them to stay close to Paradise.

- Common areas of tendinopathy:
- Lateral & medial epicondylitis (elbow)
- Patellar tendon
- Achilles tendon
- Rotator cuff

The pain is usually quite localised, sometimes with an ache that radiates around the area. It can be very sharp on certain movements and is usually aggravated by increased activity.

If you have recurrent tendon problems it's worth getting a professional opinion as they

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Survey to understand North Northamptonshire's shopping, leisure and town centre requirements

Research into the shopping and leisure habits of people in North Northamptonshire will help shape future planning policies and strategies for town centres.

North Northamptonshire Council has commissioned specialist consultants Nexus Planning to carry out a Retail Capacity Update, which is a study that will give a better understanding of how and where people like to shop, spend their leisure time and use their town centres.

As part of the study there will be a telephone survey which will involve about 1,300 households in the area over the next few weeks.

The survey should take approximately six or seven minutes to complete and will be conducted by NEMS Market Research. Most approaches will be made outside normal working hours to make sure working households can take part. Cllr David Brackenbury

the Council's Executive Member for Growth and Regeneration, said: "Producing strategic planning policies is essential, in fact it's a statutory requirement for the council to do so and it's vital we have the most up-to-date information possible to help inform this process and ensure town centres are supported to adapt and respond to changing trends in shopping, leisure and living, as well as helping them to level up and recover strongly from the pandemic.

"Understanding how people spend their leisure time and how they like to shop will play a part of this so that future plans can be based on up-to-date, robust and reliable evidence "

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "In developing planning policies and strategies for town centres in North Northants we need current information

More vulnerable residents in the North Northamptonshire Council area will be given a helping hand through the Government's extended Household Support Fund 3 scheme.

The council will use the £2,465,491 grant, provided by the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP), for these payments.

A report before the council's Executive will recommend the money is used to target three specific areas. These have been identified as those which will provide the most effective support during the winter and up until March 2023

- School holiday food support scheme
- Those working but receiving a low wage
- Community engagement, foodbanks and emergency funding

The school holiday food support scheme will operate by providing a £15 voucher in readiness for the October half term, as well as Christmas break to families of eligible children (those receiving free school meals).

Up to 4,000 households of people who are working, but receiving a low wage, will be able to apply for further financial relief via an online application process. Details of eligibility terms and how to apply will be released soon.

The council will also work with community groups to identify where best to target funds which would benefit up to a further 1.750 families. This assistance will either be in the form of direct payments, payments to charities, or assistance to foodbanks.

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of North Northamptonshire Council, said: "I am delighted that the Government has made another round of this funding available so that we are able to offer assistance to vulnerable residents in our area.

"The first two rounds of the scheme were



very well received and brought much needed assistance for some of the people in our area. "This round of funding specifically targets

people who are working and on a lower

income as well as families with children. It also allows us to work with community groups so we can ensure that the funds are there for those that need it most."

HIGHAM FERRERS TOURISM CELEBRATES MILESTONE ANNIVERSARY

Higham Ferrers Tourism, **Business and Community** Partnership, which has helped shape life in the town, has just celebrated two decades of community service.

Millions of hours of volunteer work that members have devoted to their projects have entertained, educated, and played a key role in preserving the town's unique history.

And when members and their guests gathered at The Duchy Barn Garden for their 20-year anniversary party, there was one name that they paid tribute to.

That was founder, the late Councillor Anna Sauntson, one of the town's longest serving councillors with more than 35 vears' service and who was the Mayor for three terms.

"The Tourism Committee was the brainchild of Anna. Anyone who knew Anna knew that she was interested in heritage," said founder member. Pam Whiting.

Anna researched what Higham Ferrers-born Archbishop of Canterbury Henry Chichele meant to the town and "she wanted people to visit, and we have to thank her for putting Higham Ferrers on the map.'

The Reverend Paul Needle, a member of St Mary's Church ministry team, said that anyone who knew Anna would have known that she would have achieved what she set her mind to.

The gathering raised their glasses to the memory of the founder, who was also the first chairperson, who died in Mav 2021

Chairpersons past and present outlined their achievements down the years, which included some notable projects such as raising funds to restore the town's five ancient

charters and bye laws, which had fallen into disrepair. They are now restored and held in The Northampton Record Office, with replicas in local schools, the Bede House, Chichele College and the Town Hall

Liz Brown and her daughter Alison Wilkinson were the only co-chairs in the committee's 20-year history, while Pat Bird has been the secretary since the start. Her son, Kevin, is the treasurer

While Alison is no longer a member, she is still a "friend" and is called on to make special cakes, including the 20th birthday cake, which was cut by the Mayor, Councillor Nigel Brown.

Higham Tourism's string of projects include funding play equipment for the Saffron Road play area, providing the Christmas trees for retailers as well as the High Street flower troughs throughout the year. They also hold popular events such as the Secret Gardens, the Garage Sale, the August Bank

Holiday Weekend of Activities, quiz nights and provide refreshments at various events.

And their Sparkle event with its elves and Santa is a "must see" for local children.

The town's historic dovecote was also renovated after a massive "Invest in a Nest" campaign.

Chichele College Garden and the Duchy Barn Garden have also been transformed with the help of a team of dedicated volunteer gardeners, who even kept weeding and planting during the Covid pandemic months.

Ancient woodland practice provides forum for team bonding sessions

North Northamptonshire Council's Corby Woodland Project has welcomed in the new coppicing season in Hazel and Thoroughsale Woods in the town.

Coppicing is a traditional method of woodland management that has been practised for more than 1,000 years to regenerate forest and provide fuel and materials for many crafts. Young tree stems are cut down to near ground level to encourage the development of new, vigorous shoots.

Cllr Harriet Pentland, the

council's Executive Member for Climate and the Green Environment said: "This is a fantastic opportunity for people to dedicate some time to reconnect with their team while at the same time [helping] to conserve our valuable green spaces.

"The sessions take place in a beautiful ancient woodland in Corby and will motivate teams to work together, develop their strengths and encourage collaboration. "In turn, they will be supporting the continued improvement of a unique piece of history."

All equipment and risk assessments will be included, and those taking part will be provided with a tool safety brief upon arrival by a parks and woodland ranger. Northamptonshire Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust raise awareness and offer support during Baby Loss Awareness week

Northamptonshire Healthcare Foundation Trust's Maternal Mental Health Service joined SANDS (Stillbirth and Neonatal Death Society), MIND, and Kettering and Northampton General Hospitals raise awareness and offer support during this year's Baby Loss Awareness Week which ran from from 9th-15th October.

Sadly, some families lose their baby during pregnancy, birth or shortly after birth. For many people, grief comes in stages. Grieving is unique to each person and will experienced in different ways. Some will have had a baby loss experience and not have been able to discuss this, some are not sure where to turn for support and there are many more people who know someone affected but don't know how to talk to them about it or where to signpost them to for help.

NHFT's maternal mental health service organised a day of activities on the 12th October, bringing together both public sector services and charities who specialise in providing support to parents and families who have experienced baby or child loss during the perinatal period.

On Wednesday 12th October, NHFT's Maternal Mental health team, SANDS and specialist bereavement midwives were in the Grosvenor Centre, Northampton, delivering free workshops raising awareness of baby loss. In the morning, SANDS delivered a presentation on "Supporting and Talking about Loss". This was followed by a session on "Pregnancy after Loss" by the Maternal Mental Health service and bereavement Midwives.

The teams were on the 1st Floor, The Gathering Space (opposite Claire's Accessories), Grosvenor Shopping Centre, Northampton for people to pop along and speak to them either side of these sessions. Anne Rackham, Director of Mental Health Services at NHFT said: "We were delighted to be working in partnership with experts from specialist charities and our acute hospital midwife colleagues to be able to support members of the public during this year's baby loss awareness week.

"The events planned on 12th October gave members of the public a unique opportunity to hear from specialists from a range of local services together in one place.

"One in eight pregnancies end in miscarriage and many others will sadly experience loss of a baby, which can leave parents and families grieving and unsure where to turn or when to seek help.

"Our Maternal mental health service provides support to those who are experiencing prolonged or intense mental health symptoms because of baby loss. If you or someone you know is struggling with any of these issues in the 12 months after experiencing a loss, I would recommend that patients talk to their GP, midwife or other medical professional and ask to be referred to our maternal mental health service".

Grieving is a normal reaction to a loss. Even after a long period of time, many people grow to manage the feelings that come with grieving. However, some people need support with their mental health, particularly when the symptoms of grief:

- feel continuous and become harder to cope with over time
- become so intense and overwhelming that they significantly impact your day-to-day living
- cause an individual to experience symptoms including PTSD and /or severe depression If you or someone you

know is experiencing these symptoms, speak to your midwife, health visitor, GP or mental health service who can refer you to the Maternal mental health service. The service supports women who are experiencing mental health conditions arising from loss and referrals can be made up to 12 months after loss.

Fly tipping fines issued across North Northamptonshire

A business owner has been fined a total of £1,340 after he fly tipped on private land in Irthlingborough and evidence was found by North Northamptonshire Council (NNC)'s Waste team.

At Northampton Magistrates' Court in August 2022, Mr Phillips was convicted of a duty of care offence for not properly disposing of his waste.

As the waste was fly tipped on private land, it fell to the landowner to arrange for the fly tipping to be removed at her expense, but NNC and the Northamptonshire Office of Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner have stepped in and helped with the removal of the waste through a scheme to support landowners with the costs.

Under the scheme, farmers and other private landowners can apply through their local council for a grant from the Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner towards the cost of having the fly tipped waste removed and of putting prevention measures in place to make the land less vulnerable to fly tippers in the future.

A gate has also been installed at the entrance to the land to prevent unauthorised access and prevent future fly tipping. The Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner has contributed £1,500 towards the gate and removal of waste. Cllr Graham Lawman, the council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets, said: "Fly tipping is irresponsible and has a hugely negative impact on our local area and residents, not to mention the cost to landowners to clear up the dumped waste.

"The cost of clearing fly tipped waste on public land is picked up by the taxpayer, which is frustrating enough for residents. But when it is left on private land, the landowner has to cover the cost of having it removed. So, I am pleased we were able work with the OPFCC to help, and a solution was found so that another incident like this doesn't happen again on this particular land."

Northamptonshire's Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner Stephen Mold said: "Flytipping is an offence and is taken seriously in Northamptonshire as this latest conviction shows. It is also hugely detrimental to the environment, a fire hazard and can be costly to remove. I am committed to tackling this issue and have a grant scheme where private landowners can seek financial support to remove fly tipped waste and install deterrents to make their land less vulnerable.

"We are happy to work with partner organisations to stop this anti-social behaviour and ensure perpetrators are prosecuted. There is no excuse for fly-tipping as there are provisions around the county where waste can be taken, whether you are an individual or a business."

In a separate incident, a local business in Coffee Tavern Lane, Rushden had numerous bags of rubbish, a fish tank and cardboard left by their commercial bin in June 2021. Again, evidence was discovered by Officers which led back to an individual, who was fined a total of £949.50 for a duty of care offence.

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, added: "Unfortunately we have seen several cases of fly tipping across North Northamptonshire over the past few months resulting in prosecution and considerable fines being issued. We have a zero-tolerance policy on fly tipping and, although a last resort for Officers, we will send cases to court if necessary."
