WILDLIFE NEWS

Life in our countryside is not always quiet and calm. Some human activities conflict with wildlife: our houses, transport and manufacturing can damage the soil, where it all starts, yet they also do a pretty good 'hatchet job' (literally) on prey like insects, and usually the cause is found when defending food, shelter or a "desirable partner".

Many schemes are trying to improve areas where results should be possible; those overall operations are nowadays grouped under the heading 'rewilding', but it can easily put one species under pressure if the competitor takes over.

In our countryside we have an example of how invading species achieve their own version of genocide, a little more clearly now as this year's generation spreads out from their home area to establish their own food supply - squirrels, grey and

The greys species are not true natives, but so common that it is unlikely that any bushy-tailed animal leaping around in the trees will be anything other than a grey squirrel. The reds are overall more lightweight animals, though the diet for both

species is rather similar. Population pressure brings the problem of whether the greys can eat the reds "out of house and home", and in most areas the odds are clearly very much on the greys side. It would seem then that some areas where the reds have been driven out should provide ideal spots to recreate the population of reds – after all it was their 'patch' hundreds of years ago.

It is examples like this which lie behind the idea of rewilding. It is more than feeding the creatures during times of drought or thirst, vital though that is. It is not just a matter of bringing in plants or animals, and protecting them while they get rooted. What if they don't come? If they used to flourish there centuries ago there must have been a cause why they failed - disturbance, disease, changing climate condition, removal of dependent comparison of whatever origin. Until those conditions can be determined, some important factor will continue to be absent, however much effort is put in. Yet it is happening in our own country: consider how red kites have succeeded in Britain, or ospreys, or mammals like beavers, even squirrels

GENEALOGY **JOTTINGS**

British Summer Time ends this weekend, which means that the evenings will draw in more, heralding less time outside in the garden during the winter ahead. However, on the plus side, there should be more time for researching those family trees of ours - or even getting started on one if you have not already done so.

Don't worry if you don't know where to begin. Just start with yourself. One golden rule in genealogy is to start from the known and work backwards, trying to find documentary evidence to prove the link from one generation to the previous one. The first steps in this process are talking to relatives and gathering clues. A family bible, old photographs, birth, marriage and death (BMD) certificates, medals, birthday books, address books, letters... The more names, dates and places you have to get you started, the better

Old birthday books – do people still use them. I wonder – can be wonderful. One that belonged to a great aunt sorted out the names of her sisters: Aunt Nell was really Florence Mary Helen and Aunt

Ada was really Harriet Ada. Not everyone went by the name(s) that they had been given!

A lot of people have put family trees online but don't assume that these are correct! It is easy to make wrong assumptions, and the internet makes it very easy for people to copy each other's mistakes and multiply them. Good researchers should quote their sources, so you can tell where they found their information and can check it for yourself. One of my several times great grandmothers is in a tree on Ancestry. Not only do they have her father's details incorrect (I have the certificate so know that I have the right name) but they have her death with the wrong date. Further research shows that the person of the same name that the originator has recorded died at the age of 4! This mistake has been perpetuated as more people have just copied the information willy-nilly.

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Fly-tipping grant scheme extended into 2023

A scheme which helps victims of fly-tipping on private land in North Northamptonshire has been extended.

When waste is fly-tipped on private land, it falls to the landowner to arrange for the waste to be removed at their expense. However, since October 2021, a scheme launched by the Northamptonshire Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner (PFCC) and administered by North Northamptonshire Council (NNC) has supported those impacted by fly-tipping on private land.

Under the scheme, farmers and other private landowners can apply through NNC for a grant towards the cost of having the waste removed and putting preventative measures in place to make

the land less vulnerable to fly-tipping in the future.

Over the past year, preventative measures that have been put in place include gates at entrances to known fly-tipping hotspots and the installation of an earth bund on a lay-by near Lilford Woods along the A605.

Cllr Graham Lawman, the council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets, said: "Fly-tipped waste on private land falls to the landowner to remove and it can be costly, especially if the land is a hotspot for fly-tippers, as well as being anti-social and possibly dangerous to farm animals. In the last year, this scheme has

meant we have been able to help landowners and alleviate some of the cost, whilst also preventing future incidents.

"I can only reiterate that private waste can be taken to the Household Waste Recycling Centres and, if you have someone take your waste away for you, ensure that they have a Waste Carriers' Licence and you note it, because you could be liable should that waste be dumped."

Anyone struggling with illegal fly-tipping on their land can apply for a grant of up to £1,500 and more information, including how to apply, is available on the NNC

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Engagement with local residents on electric vehicle

charging points launched

A survey has been launched on potential locations for on-street electric vehicle charging points in seven towns across North Northamptonshire.

Twenty-one sites are being considered in Corby, Desborough, Higham Ferrers, Kettering, Rothwell, Rushden and Wellingborough and residents living nearby will receive a letter inviting them to have their say on the proposed sites. The letter will be from Liberty Charge, who are running the project with North Northamptonshire Council (NNC). All the sites are in locations with little or no off-road parking to support those residents who do not currently have the option of charging at home.

Cllr Graham Lawman, NNC's Executive Member for Highways, Travel & Assets, said: "As sales of electric vehicles continue to climb, it is vital that we plan investment in charging points for those who have no access to a private drive and need on-street facilities or wish to charge their vehicle whilst visiting our town centres.

"The sites being consulted on have been identified following recommendations to us by residents and suggestions by local councillors. If you have a location that you think we should be considering, please let us know through our dedicated website page.

"As a driver of an electric vehicle myself, I am

acutely aware of the need for more charging points and am delighted we are taking part in this scheme as we seek to become carbon neutral by

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, added: "Since January 2021, with Liberty Charge, we have installed 23 on-street charging points, each with two sockets, across North Northamptonshire in 12 locations. This consultation has been launched to, hopefully, increase the number of points available and we value residents' opinions. If you live near one of the proposed sites, or are an electric vehicle user, or considering becoming one, I encourage you to have your say.'

All feedback will be reviewed by NNC and before installation can go ahead residents will have a further opportunity to comment on the designation and operation of the bays through the Traffic Regulation Order process.



Iconic sculpture to be temporarily removed from Peterborough landscape

Nene Park Trust has confirmed that the Peterborough Arch sculpture located in Thorpe Meadows will be temporarily removed to allow conservators to inspect the sculpture. The impressive large-scale work by artist Lee Grandjean has been enjoyed by drivers along Longthorpe Parkway and visitors to Thorpe Meadows since 1988 and provides a unique landmark on the western approach to the city.

The work was carved from Iroko wood and pegged together. Unfortunately, after 34 years of exposure to the elements, the sculpture is in need of urgent attention. Once the extent of the works is known, Nene Park Trust will fundraise to ensure this wellknown sculpture is not lost from the city.

Matthew Bradbury, Chief Executive of Nene Park Trust said: "We are proud to host Peterborough Arch within Nene Park. The sculpture is an iconic landmark in Peterborough and represents the important role that the city and our beautiful greenspaces have played and continue to play in welcoming new communities to the city. We are hopeful that the sculpture can

be reinstated next year after some much-needed care and attention.

"As a charity we are anticipating that we will need significant public support to ensure this important landmark can be re-installed. Once we know the extent of the works required, we will be looking at how we can generate the funds needed to return this much loved sculpture

Lee Grandjean selected the site for the Peterborough Arch, aligning it with the city centre and the cathedral. The linear shapes represent the architecture of the city and the organic shapes represent the greenspace and landscape that residents enjoy

The sculpture is part of the Peterborough Sculpture Collection that was established by Peterborough Development Corporation during the development of Peterborough as a New Town. During the 1970s and 80s Peterborough Development Corporation bought and commissioned new artworks by some of the best British sculptors working at the time. They selected artworks that linked with the architectural style and planning of Peterborough and created a collection that reflected the diverse subject matter and practice of British sculptors creating new work at that time. The aim was to create a culturally rich city and a reference point in time for future generations. The collection currently comprises 30 sculptures including important

works by Antony Gormley and Anthony Caro.

Nene Park Trust took over the management of the Peterborough Sculpture Collection in December 2020 and has received funding from Arts Council England to carry out conservation works on the sculptures at Thorpe Meadows Sculpture Trail, install information and signage and

run creative workshops.

The artist Lee Grandiean was born in 1949. He grew up in Harlow, Essex and studied at the North East Polytechnic and Winchester School of Art. He was Deputy Head of Sculpture at the Royal College of Art, London and has exhibited nationally and internationally. He currently lives and works from his studio in Norfolk.

Choir celebrates Christmas



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

Celebrating improvement and looking forward to an even brighter future

Newton Road School in Rushden is celebrating after an Ofsted inspection showed that the school had turned a previous report that showed it to be inadequate into one that saw it graded Good in nearly all areas.

The school has gone from strength to strength since it joined Nene Education Trust in 2018 and the recent Ofsted inspection is testament to the improvements that have been made.

Principal Kerry Mills said that while there was still some way to go, the report showed up nothing the school is not already aware of and that staff, pupils and parents had worked together to bring about change, even through the disruption of the last couple

"It feels wonderful to know that the core strengths of early reading, early years and maths are all strong," said Kerry. "Since joining Nene Education Trust we have seen investment in infrastructure and support that has allowed us to develop the school.

"Prior to 2018, as Risdene Academy, we had had a very turbulent few years with a high turnover of staff but over the last four years we have been able to recruit and develop the leadership team and teaching staff, see them develop

and some become leaders themselves, promoting from within and coming together with a clear purpose and a clear vision."

Although the overall grade is Requires Improvement, the school was rated Good in leadership and management, behaviour and attitudes, personal development and Early Years Foundation Stage.

The school, which has a high proportion of SEND pupils, prides itself on its inclusive approach and the involvement of parents has increased considerably since lockdown, when home schooling led to parents becoming more involved in their children's education

Kerry added: "When you think that we have been through all that since the last inspection, it makes us even more proud of what we have achieved. We know there is more we can do, but we took the decision to strengthen certain areas and core subjects, more specifically early reading, early years

and maths, alongside inclusion, safeguarding and pastoral care. Time is still needed to get to where we want to be on other foundation subjects, they are not yet embedded, but they will

Chris Hill, CEO of Nene Education Trust, said: "Short of getting Good overall, this is the best outcome we could have hoped for. It certainly reflects perfectly our own self-evaluation and the lead inspector was very clear that to reach this point is an achievement everyone should be proud of, especially as the four years since 2018 have been rather disrupted.

"The grades achieved within the headline areas are remarkable and should be celebrated. To move a school up two Ofsted grades in the timeframe we have had is something to shout about."

During lockdown, Newton Road School stayed open to more than 100 children because of their additional needs. Staff went to extra lengths to



support those that couldn't access other services that temporarily weren't available. The school has also strengthened its speech and language provision recently, having seen the effect lockdown has had on the development of some children as a result of not being able to attend nursery as normal during Covid.

Kerry Mills added: "The report shows the progress we have made and it's a reflection on the staff – both the current team and all those who have helped get us to this point - the children and

the parents. We are all driving towards the same goals, and parents are buying into our vision, so it's lovely for us to be recognised for what we have done, and what we are confident we'll be able to continue to do "
