NEWS IN BRIEF

RAYNAUD'S AWARENESS MONTH

This February, the charity Scleroderma and Raynaud's UK (SRUK) will be raising awareness of the potentially devastating impact the UK's cost of living crisis is having on people with Raynaud's.

For people with Raynaud's, cold temperatures and stress trigger painful attacks. This is when the blood temporarily stops flowing to the body's extremities, most commonly the hands and feet.

These attacks can happen without warning and affect fine motor skills, making simple everyday tasks almost impossible. In more severe cases, they can affect a person's independence and leave them in immense pain.

Raynaud's cannot be cured, but the risk of attacks can be minimised. One of the best ways to prevent them is to keep your body warm, but SRUK warns that many are struggling because of high energy prices.

A survey by the charity towards the end of last year found that some are even choosing to buy less food to prioritise their energy bills.

During February, the charity will be encouraging people with Raynaud's to write to their MPs and share their stories to raise awareness of the issue.

GENEALOGY JOTTINGS

I was watching a television programme the other day where Jane McDonald visited Argentina whilst on a cruise. She visited the Recoleta Cemetery in Buenos Aires, to see the grave of Eva Perón – she who was the inspiration for 'Evita' – and was stunned by the monuments that were there. Nothing like our graveyards, but she compared it to "streets of houses for the dead". Have a rummage on the internet for pictures and you will see what she means.

As I said, it was not like our cemeteries – apart from Highgate, perhaps – but have you ever wandered round a cemetery and looked at the beautiful carvings on some of the graves? Many of them can provide clues to the lives of our ancestors.

For example, a beehive carved into the memorial was often used by the Freemasons and the Independent Order of Odd Fellows. It symbolises human industry, faith, education and domestic virtues. I have seen graves where theatre masks have been carved to denote that the 'resident' worked

in the entertainment industry. The village in which I used to live – in a completely landlocked county, by the way – has a churchyard where you can see the memorial to one chap as some rocks with an anchor embedded therein. Yes, he was a sailor.

Not all carvings refer to the previous lives of those buried. There can be other symbolism, chosen either by the deceased and recorded in their will, or by those grieving relatives left behind. One of the most popular is that of a dove, representing the Holy Spirit. Another is a heart – symbolising love. A friend of mine, who died almost five years ago, has her name on her headstone, with space beside it for her husband's. Above them is a pair of hands holding each other. They were very much in love.

So, the next time that you have the chance to visit a graveyard in search of your ancestors, take a moment to take in the surrounding monuments.

Avian flu detected in North Northants

North Northamptonshire Council is warning bird keepers and members of the public to be aware after a case of avian (or bird) flu was detected in dead mute swans in Kettering.

The swans were tested as part of the Animal and Plant Health Agency (APHA) Wild Surveillance programme, which has been set up to detect the spread of avian influenzas in the UK.

All bird keepers (whether you have pet birds, commercial flocks or just a few birds in a backyard flock) must always keep a close watch on them for signs of disease and maintain good biosecurity.

Anyone who suspects any type of bird flu in poultry or captive birds must report it immediately by calling the Defra Rural Services Helpline on 03000 200 301.

For all the latest information in relation to the spread of avian flu, including the housing measures which have now been brought in across the country, and also for information on how you can help to protect your birds, please refer to central Government's avian flu information: www.gov.uk/guidance/avian-influenza-bird-

People are being asked to register poultry, even if pets, so Defra can contact them during an outbreak. This is a legal requirement for 50 or more birds. Includes chickens, ducks, turkeys, geese, pigeon, partridge, quail, guinea fowl

WORK STARTS ON NEW DISCOVER **NORTHAMPTONSHIRE HUB**

Using funds from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund, work is now well underway, with the new Discover Northamptonshire hub expected to be open in time for English Tourism Week in March and the Easter holidays. The hub will be open 7 days a week and is located next to the entrance to the cinema at the Rushden Lakes Centre.

A dedicated Discover Northamptonshire team will work at the centre to capitalise on the 6 million visitors who visit Rushden Lakes annually and encourage them to stay longer in the area, visiting other attractions in the county and supporting local tourism, including our high streets, accommodation providers and transport.

The Discover Northamptonshire hub will be a fully interactive space, promoting all things Northamptonshire and the surrounding areas, including days out, attractions, walks, town and village offerings, places to eat, sustainable transport, heritage.

A retail space will promote small and local business, rotating stock on a regular basis to give a variety of businesses the chance to showcase their products at Rushden Lakes and reach a large audience, whilst a flexible events and conferencing space will mean workshops, talks and events can be held.

Once open, staff will work with partners including local schools, colleges and universities to provide learning and volunteering opportunities for those interested in working in the tourism sector, as well as working with local businesses to promote the area and encourage visitors to 'Discover Northamptonshire', asking the question where next to visit in Northamptonshire?

Cllr Helen Howell North Northamptonshire Council's Deputy Leader and Executive Member for Sport, Leisure. Culture and Tourism said: "It is great that work has started on the new Discover Northamptonshire hub and I look forward to it opening in March. There will be a dedicated team on site ready to help and advise visitors on all the wonderful attractions we have across the local area and further afield – from local walks along the Greenway and Nene Valley to Chester House Estate, through to our lovely high streets, villages, culture and

heritage venues and the larger visitor attractions

Final call to come forward for people in Northamptonshire for Covid-19 booster

Eligible people in Northamptonshire yet to come forward for their Covid-19 booster are being urged to do so before the end of the campaign.

The Government has accepted the JCVI advice, which recommends that the booster offer for all 16 to 49-yearolds who are not considered at risk should end at the same time as the current autumn campaign.

This means that Sunday 12th February will be the last chance for anyone who has been invited for a Covid-19

booster to take up their offer, until future campaigns are agreed by the JCVI and Government.

The evergreen offer of first and second doses will still be available after 12th February for those eligible and they are encouraged to come forward to get the protection they need.

It comes as the JCVI is recommending



moving to a more targeted offer to those considered to be at risk of serious

While more than 1.8 million Covid-19 vaccinations have been delivered in Northamptonshire, including over 240.000 seasonal boosters, there are still a number of eligible people who are yet to take up their winter vaccinations and are therefore at increased risk of serious illness

Chris Pallot, Director of the Northamptonshire Covid-19 Vaccination Programme, said: "I would urge everyone who is eligible and not benefited from the seasonal Covid booster to come forward and get protected ahead of the 12th February deadline. We have plenty of bookable appointments, as well as walk-in clinics offering Covid-19 jabs across the county.

'Covid-19 remains very dangerous and even life threatening for some, especially older people and younger people with long-term health conditions






