FIRM FRIENDSHIPS FORGED BETWEEN HIGHAM FERRERS AND OXFORD

Two medieval colleges which were both founded by Higham Ferrers's most famous son, Henry Chichele, have come together for the first time in decades.

It is 60 years since there was a relationship between people involved in the two colleges: Chichele College in Higham Ferrers and All Souls College in Oxford.

Now however, following recent historical milestones in Higham Ferrers, that old friendship has been resurrected.

Chichele College, which recently celebrated its 600th anniversary, had invited Professor Peregrine Horden, the Fellow Librarian at All Souls College, across to Chichele College to witness the planting of a special tree.

The hazel tree had formed part of the Tree of Trees sculpture outside Buckingham Palace during the Queen's Jubilee celebrations. And Chichele College was one of just three sites in the county to receive a tree – part of the Queen's Green Canopy – as a lasting legacy to Her Majesty.

Professor Horden readily accepted

his invitation to the tree-planting ceremony – then returned the favour by inviting his hosts to visit All Souls College.

And just a few weeks later, they did just that.

The trip was organised by Chichele College Management Committee, a sub-committee of Higham Ferrers Tourism, which looks after the day-to-day management of the Chichele College building and site, including the neighbouring Duchy Barn Garden, on behalf of English Heritage.

The professor had coffee and cakes waiting for his guests and the leader of the local party, Carol Fitzgerald, chair of the Chichele Management Committee, told how a party from All Souls College had visited Higham back in 1962, presenting Chichele College with the oak gates which face College Street.

The professor said that All Souls



still has a lot of woodland, which had always been part of the college income.

Higham Ferrers-born Chichele, a long-serving Archbishop of Canterbury, founded All Souls College in the centre of Oxford 16 years after he founded Chichele College.

But whereas just 18 had a home at Chichele College – it was partly destroyed during the Reformation – the local guests were amazed by the size of All Souls, which has developed over the centuries and today boasts almost 70 Fellows with 24 visiting Fellows as well as some 36 Emeritus (retired academics) Fellows. In keeping with long tradition, it is a centre for postgraduate work and research and does not take in undergraduates like other Oxford colleges.

WILDLIFE NEWS

"The month of the berry" might turn out some day to be a headline for an up-and-coming writer. but the phrase is an effective description of what is going on in the natural world. The limited time available during daylight hours means that outside exercise is restricted and the low temperatues add little to any urge to go out and face winter's armoury of wind, rain, fog and ice. This is made even less tempting by the lack of light and colour - these are literally the "dark months", when even nature's delights are hiding for the season.

But of course for many animals and plants life continues. Some species, like insects, will have been hidden away as eggs, waiting for temperatures to fall, though they will have to wait for that time is still months away; a few lucky ones will have the ability to hibernate in suitable shelter. Many of the bird species use their mobililty to travel to warmer enivironments but remember that there is also the chance for others to make the journey in an alternative direction, and our country becomes a winter target.

Perhaps, though, we should consider how plants contribute essential and unique services to the

countryside. It does not require much observational skill to see that the berries which can be found on many types of plants, from low-growing or softstemmed climbers to the solidity of oak or ash, will make for collections of food to be taken (sometimes to store) rather like the mixture of foods (and other items) which we see every day in our supermarket trollies

Their variety of colour means they can either hide (camouflage) or show themselves (advertising), and it does not take extensive searching to find examples of the two extremes in our fields and hedges. Take the vew tree. Over the years this evergreen shrub has become associated with churches, so much so that many churchyards, especially those which have been around for a hundred or more years, are likely to have one or more somewhere in the grounds. The covering tint of red berries against the dark green is a reminder of the attractive fruit that can be found in our hedges. But the yew, once used for old-time bows and arrows, also reminds us what damage can be done, especially if we are silly enough to eat its berries, which are just as dangerous - the wrong sort

Mixing with like-minded people can be very rewarding and two brains are often better than one. Many a time I have been in a record office, and either I or another person has had difficulty in reading old handwriting. It is so good to be able to get a second

When talk turned to the life of Henry Chichele, Carol Fitzgerald explained that she was due to give talks to Higham Ferrers Junior School about the lives of Chichele, Wykeham, Ferrers and Lancaster – the names of the various houses - aligning them to curriculum values.

The professor said that both Chichele and Wykeham (who became Clerk of Works to Edward III) were local boys from humble circumstances who had made good, with the support of patrons.

Chichele had been a champion of the poor. He "wanted an educated priesthood and founded All Souls for the training of poor scholars who would become priests and lawyers.

One visitor, Rachel Smyth, was in for a surprise when the tour reached the reference library which boasts 180,000 books and is one of the longest libraries in the UK.

Rachel was responsible for the design of a local history book, Higham Ferrers 1251-1914, which was written by

Brenda Lofthouse, with the picture research done by Gwen Tobin.

Professor Horden had the book open on display and presented Rachel with a "thank you" card for having earlier presented the book to the library. She will be passing on similar cards to Brenda and Gwen, who are due to make the trip to Oxford themselves soon. along with Liz Barnatt, Chair of Higham Ferrers Tourism and Jenny Burt, the instigator of the medieval style garden at Chichele College.

With North Northamptonshire Council on standby to deal with wintry weather over the coming months, the authority is giving people the chance to name 10 gritting lorries that will be keeping our roads safe, with winning entries printed on the front of the trucks.

The competition runs until Wednesday 25th January and is open to schools, classes or individuals. The winning entries will have the name painted onto a gritter.

In North Northamptonshire a total of 821 miles of road receives precautionary gritting – almost

the same distance as between London and Dundee and back. This service is carried out by highways service provider Kier Highways.

Enhanced weather forecasting and temperature readings are taken via weather stations and sensors set out along North

Northamptonshire's roads, with updates sent every 15 minutes.


Through route-based forecasting, routes will be treated if the temperatures are forecasted to drop below 0.5C. with advanced GPS technology which requires only one person to operate the vehicle in clear conditions, by accumulating route data and reporting back to the office to ensure that works are safely delivered.





Your Health – **Marathon training**

It's that time of year. If you're not training for the London Marathon you probably know someone who is. Right now local marathon runners are getting into their stride with running technique, good nutrition and special training routines. And they're out there in the dark, running, when most people are asleep.

The incredible thing about marathons is that people who have never seen themselves as a runner sign up and push themselves to achieve their goal. It's inspirational.

Of course, there are often injuries along the way. We see a lot of tendon and ligament problems in February and March, and the knee pains usually start around the same time, but they're almost always fixable. I think our new laser machine is going to be working its socks off in February this year!

One of the problems with running is that there are so many approaches to technique. From mid-foot running to expensive support trainers; from arch supports to barefoot.

Jay Sheridan, Higham's Sports Therapy &

Strength and Conditioning specialist, says: "Every person has different foot mechanics. Many marathon runners have gait analysis with us to find out what technique will work best for them and to find out whether their gait is causing the shin splints, Achilles strains or plantar fasciitis. The machine assesses the individual's biomechanics of the foot in motion and shows up all manner of unusual mechanics!"

Top tips for marathon runners:

- Loosen up before you run jog, jiggle or dance. Free things up gently before you start, then stretch afterwards.
- Choose running shoes and technique to suit YOU Don't follow someone else as their feet might be completely different to yours.

If you're not training for a marathon, do support the people who are. With the right support, training regime and injury management most get through the arduous training and complete the race.

Just to clarify – pushing the lawnmower doesn't count as marathon training, and anyway it's too wet. Leave the nasty machine in the shed.

GETTING YOUR AFFAIRS IN ORDER WITH A WILL

RESIDENTS CAN NOW SIGN UP TO NEW **GARDEN WASTE COLLECTION SERVICE**

Residents across North Northamptonshire can now sign up for the new optional, chargeable 12-month garden waste collection service.

The annual subscription charge for the fortnightly service, with collections starting on 3rd April, is £40 per bin and can be paid online via debit or credit card. More details about the service and how to sign up are available in the garden waste section of the council's website. People can sign up any time and, once payment is processed, will receive a new garden waste permit for sticking onto their bin so collection crews know to collect it.

Alternatives

As part of the refreshed service, the council will also be offering an enhancement to the subsidised compost bin scheme, where residents can buy a home compost bin for £5 plus delivery. The authority will also be offering an ad hoc sack collection system, at £16.50 for 10 compostable sacks, for those not needing or wanting a bin. Residents can also take green waste to their nearest household waste recycling centre in the NNC area

Those living in the former East Northants area

Up until now, people living in the former East Northants district area have had to pay an

annual charge of £55 for their collections, while the remainder of the council area have not. To acknowledge the historic disparity in charging for green waste collections, the council has decided that existing subscribers will be offered a first year £20 discount at their next renewal meaning they will pay just £20 for their first full year under the new scheme. This discount will be for the first year of the

After this the annual cost will align with the rest of the North Northants area at £40 a year. The new charge for any new subscribers in East Northants is already in place and they will pay the new charge

I live in the former Wellingborough area – what do I do?

The normal winter pause has applied this year in the former Borough Council of Wellingborough area with garden waste collections having stopped in November and due to restart in spring 2023. Garden waste collections – under the existing scheme - are due to start again in the weeks commencing Monday 13th March and 20th March.

When the existing scheme starts again, residents should put their garden waste bin out on the same day as their recycling bin. Residents will have to subscribe to the new paid-for service to be eligible

Residents unable to go online can subscribe to the service by Calling Customer Services on 0300 126 3000. Lines are open Monday to Friday, 9am to 5pm.

for collections from 3rd April.

The service will then run all year round in line with the rest of the NNC area.



Cobblers players help highlight suicide prevention

Players from Northampton Town Football Club had a new goal to aim for recently highlighting suicide prevention and how to look out for those at risk.

The squad took time out of their busy schedule to team up with Lisa Pearson and Andy Willis from Northamptonshire Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust (NHFT) for Suicide **Prevention and Awareness** Training at their practice ground.

The session kicked off with discussions about the importance of good conversations around suicide, as well as where people can go to get help if they need it. It also looked at some of the myths surrounding suicide, as well as who might be at risk and how best to intervene.

Northampton Town's first team players, and support staff (pictured with Andy and Lisa) took part in the training with many saying how useful it had been

Cobblers winger Mitch Pinnock said: "I thought the session was good, it opens

everyone's mind up really just to make sure people are okay and, even if you're worried about asking them the question, because it might be a bit personal, it's going to benefit them and benefit you

Last year, a similar session was held with the football club's Academy players, and following on from this latest session, the League Two club, which is currently chasing promotion, is encouraging other sports clubs to take part in Suicide Awareness Training.

Lisa Pearson, who runs the training, said: "It's been an excellent session, they've been really engaged. We're really pleased with the opportunity, and are keen to start engaging with as many community and sports clubs as we can. We know that vou're more at risk of suicide if you're male, so we just

want people to reach out and access our free training.

Suicide is one of the biggest killers of men, with males making up approximately 78 per cent of all suicide deaths, compared to 22 per cent for women.

It's also over 11 years since high-profile Welsh footballer Gary Speed took his own life. His close friend, and TV presenter. Dan Walker recently spoke candidly about the impact it had on him and the importance of seeking help if anyone has suicidal thoughts.

Andy Willis, former service user and trained peer supporter worker, who shared some of his personal experiences with the players, said: "It's been a really positive session, the attention of the players and the staff was magnificent and the contributions were really appreciated. It's such an important topic, mental health, and openly sharing and giving support particularly in the area of self-harm and suicide, whilst a complex topic, is one that has to be embraced."
