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THE MAYOR, THE MYSTERY AND A TOWN STEEPED IN HISTORY

Pupils from Higham Ferrers Junior School created a fascinating picture of the town and uncovered links to their houses at four recent assemblies, with special guests.

Fascinating facts, an unsolved mystery and a club-shaped ceremonial mace intended to attack anyone attempting to harm the Mayor... these and precious Roman artefacts, plus a model of Higham Ferrers' most famous son, Archbishop of Canterbury, Henry Chichele, helped build a picture of the town's unique heritage which unfolded at four weekly assemblies at Higham Ferrers Junior School recently.

Higham's history was linked to the school's four houses – Lancaster, Wykeham, Ferrers and Chichele – and aligned to their individual values. Headteacher, Vicky Bull said the sessions had given pupils a greater understanding of the town,

resulting in them taking more pride in their houses.

The assemblies were led by Carol Fitzgerald, on behalf of the Higham Ferrers Tourism Committee in partnership with the Trustees of the Friends of St Mary's. Local historian Brenda Lofthouse contributed to the research, with medieval history expert, Professor Peregrine Horden, of All Souls College, Oxford (founded by Henry Chichele), approving the content and providing advice along the way.

Dressed in his full ceremonial robes and chain, the Mayor, Councillor Nigel Brown was the VIP guest at the first session for the Ferrers house. Mayor Brown was accompanied by the Mayor's sergeant, David Wickes,

who has to be present whenever the mayor is dressed in his full regalia, pupils were told.

The Mayor's sergeant, who carried a unique centuries-old and valuable mace, explained that if anyone attacked the mayor, his job was to "bash them on the head with the mace." Apparently it could break through armour!

Later, at the assembly for pupils in the Chichele house, one of the town's dozen cloaked Bedesman, Chris O'Rourke, told how the landmark Bede House in Higham Ferrers was built by Henry Chichele for 12 poor local men to be looked after by one Bedeswoman.

Despite intensive research, no one knows why the Bedesmen have a red star on their robes

 the centuries-old mystery continues to this day.

As well as being one of the longest serving Archbishops of Canterbury, Chichele had earlier been sent as an ambassador to Europe by Henry IV. After the English won at Agincourt in 1415, it was Archbishop Chichele who decreed that St George should be the patron saint and that St

George's feast day should be on 23rd April

Other fascinating facts that pupils learned were:

- Higham means "settlement on a hill."
- The town's history begins with the Romans and there is archaeological evidence of 12 dwellings in the Kings Meadow Lane area.

NEWS IN BRIEF

Final budget for 2023-2024 approved

Final budget proposals for North Northamptonshire Council for the next financial year (2023/24) have been approved at the meeting of Full Council on 23rd February.

The net revenue budget for 2023/24 is £336.59 million.

The Council is proposing savings of nearly £15m this year, building on previous savings plans of £27m since the Council was created two years ago.

The Council approved an increase in Council Tax of 4.99%, which includes the 2% adult social care precept and is the maximum increase permitted by Government.

This increase will contribute about an additional £9m per year and represents a Band D level of Council Tax for North Northamptonshire Council of £1,657.51 for 2023/24.

This Band D figure does not include the Council Tax for individual Town and Parish Councils or the Council Tax set for Fire and Police by the Northamptonshire Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner.

WILDLIFE NEWS

Many animals and plants in our countryside are quietly coloured, which may simply be a purely defensive measure against predators - selfpreservation. When colours are important (as in most flowers) some shades seem to group together, like the vellows of early and mid spring.

Many mammals do not like to show themselves readily for whatever reason – think of the various small creatures dressed in what can best be described as 'brown'. Would it be sensible to make them a colour which is easily seen? Perhaps we do not understand the art of wildlife design

It is a little surprising that one colour group seems to offer some advantage in the animal

kinadom – red. We miaht imagine that a strong colour might be a disadvantage to both predator and prey, making creatures too easily spotted, but there are examples where the creatures have been named partly with their colour in mind.

Some are much brighter than others, like the robin, or bullfinch, though they do not match the brilliance of many tropical species. The shade of red found in mammals, however, is generally a duller shade, and examples can include red kite, red deer, red squirrel and, probably best-known of all, the red fox – said to be the most widespread carnivore in the world.

This is explained at least partially by the change in

their eating habits. Calling it a 'carnivore' does not credit how this dog-like animal has adapted to a changing environment in our towns and cities opening up new hunting grounds with a wide menu of what are attractive alternatives.

It has a reputation of being sneaky and therefore unreliable, which may be one reason for it becoming a fashionable prey for hunting as a "country sport" - though the fox (or its partner 'vixen') might not feel too happy about that. Nowadays those eating habits and the improved food supply come from our human rubbish. There are almost certainly more foxes in our towns and cities than in the countryside. hence the nickname of 'urban fox' - whatever colour it is!

GENEALOGY JOTTINGS

With the release of the 1921 census on the Find My Past (FMP) website last year, I bit the bullet and added access to it onto my annual subscription instead of paying out for each entry. This has worked out to be a lot better value for money and I have been having a wonderful time rootling round for my elderly great aunts and uncles whom I remember (just!) from when I was a child.

However, I have found a great deal of transcription errors, which I have been notifying to FMP as I find them. Hopefully, as they are corrected, it will save others time and effort in tracing these folk. In one case, a lodger and her three children had been transcribed as having the same surname as the Head of the house. It was completely different! I only found the family as I searched by using the first name and county of birth of one of the children and worked my way through the "hits" that came up. It pays to use a variety of search tools and techniques if you cannot find someone in the censuses - not just the 1921 – as that way you may well find them Remember also, that handwriting is not always that easy to read – remember GP prescriptions before printed ones took over? The letter 'S' can look like an 'L' and the other day I even discovered the surname Fyfe transcribed as Type! Lesson learned!

As prior to the 1921 census being released the most recent census was that of 1911, it left a hefty gap of 28 years between that and the 1939 Register in which to search for people. Also, during this time World War One took place and men may have died in battle and their widows remarried, thus changing their surname. Having a gap of 18 years, although not ideal, has certainly helped me.

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New primary school opening in Rushden – 1st September 2023

Following the formal approval to amalgamate Tennyson Road Infant School and Alfred Street Junior School, a new primary school will open in Rushden in time for the new school year, to meet the needs of pupils and the wider community.

The two school sites will open on 1st September as a new primary school operating on both sites. Any proposed change to this arrangement will be led by the governing body of the new school and be subject to a further consultation process.

North Northamptonshire Council is currently working with the Shadow Governing Board and the school community on the processes required to achieve a smooth opening at the start of the 2023/2024 academic year, including choosing a name for the new school and creating a new school website

Staff, pupils, parents, carers and the wider school community will be kept informed as milestones are achieved on this exciting journey.

Initially to address several financial and operational challenges at Alfred Street and Tennyson Road schools, the council was approached by the governing bodies from both schools to support an amalgamation.

Council officers supported the request of the governing bodies and agreed that the proposed amalgamation would be to the benefit of children in the local area and would continue to ensure the best outcomes for children at the schools

For the amalgamation to progress, one of the schools had to 'technically' close – in this case by the formal closure of Tennyson Road Infant School and by expanding the age range of Alfred Street Junior School to provide education for children aged 3 (Nursery) to aged 11 (Year 6).

An initial consultation took place which showed majority support for amalgamation of the schools with a further consultation proposing the 'technical' closure of the Tennyson Road Infant School.

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Affordable housing scheme discussed at Executive

North Northamptonshire Council's Executive has approved resources to help deliver an important affordable housing scheme in Kettering.

If the scheme receives planning consent, it will deliver a number of benefits to the area including:

- The construction of eight affordable homes
- An increase in the supply of affordable rented housing available in North Northamptonshire
- Increased provision of housing suitable for disabled people
- Development of a currently redundant brownfield site in a residential area
- A reduction in the likelihood of future vandalism and anti-social behaviour often associated with disused buildings.

Importantly, the project will be good for the Avondale Grange ward within which the proposed development is located. This area has been designated as "left behind" and in need of additional investment under the Government's levelling up agenda.

At its meeting, the Executive agreed to amend the budget for the project following a redesign of the site. This will ensure the finished homes meet the target EPC rating. A revised budget is also needed to cover increased costs, due to the globally driven price rises.

The scheme will now go to the relevant Planning committee for discussion and it is

anticipated a decision will be made on whether the scheme can go ahead in the coming months.

If approved by the Planning committee, the proposed scheme will see the construction of eight new, affordable rented homes on Stamford Road.

Cllr Matt Binley, the council's Executive Member for Housing, Communities and Levelling Up, said: "This is an exciting project. Six of the eight homes have been designed to be accessible for disabled people in the form of four bungalows and two specially designed houses. This is particularly important, as there are a growing number of households on the housing register who require adapted homes.

"We now await the decision by the Planning committee and will take the necessary steps once a decision has been made."

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, added: "This is an important project for this local community. It will help bring a currently disused site back into use, providing more affordable housing to the area. The revised budget will help make this project a reality and it is good that the costs of building this important project will be covered by long-term rental income of these new homes"

If approved, the properties will be owned, managed and maintained by North Northamptonshire Council.

The Council submitted the ENLPP2 for Examination in March 2021 and public hearings were held during April-May 2022. Following the Examination hearing sessions, a schedule of changes are proposed to the Publication Draft of the ENLPP2, which are necessary to make the Plan sound. These are proposed without prejudice to the Inspector's final conclusions which will take account of all the representations submitted in response to this consultation.

This consultation is only about the Main Modifications and changes to the Policies Map. It is not an opportunity to make comments on other aspects of the Plan or to reiterate previous representations, as these have already been considered as part of the Examination process.

The ENLPP2 will allocate non-strategic sites to meet requirements in the North Northamptonshire Joint Core Strategy, which is the strategic Part 1 Local Plan, and will provide detailed policies for those parishes that comprise the former East Northamptonshire area within North Northamptonshire.

The consultation runs for six weeks from Friday 10th March 2023 to midnight on Friday 21st April 2023.

The Schedule of proposed Main Modifications and Schedule of proposed changes to the Policies Map are accompanied by the Sustainability Appraisal Report Addendum, Habitat Regulations Assessment Addendum and a schedule of Additional Modifications which are minor corrections which do not materially affect the soundness of the plan.
