## Peregrine falcons in Higham Ferrers livestream from the nest

The domestic life of Higham Ferrers' peregrine falcons is now visible to anyone with access to the internet.

The Ashgrove Clinic in Higham is sponsoring a livestream direct from the nesting box in the bell tower of St Mary's Church.

This is an exciting opportunity for 'twitchers' and other wildlife lovers to watch these magnificent birds up close and personal. The live feed is available 24/7, with infra-red coverage during the night. It offers a rare glimpse into the daily lives of the peregrine falcons, including courtship displays, egg laying, and chick rearing.

The birds have already been seen in the box, but nesting proper is likely to begin this month. Now is a great time to monitor their progress! One caution, however: this is true 'reality TV'. Falcons prey on live birds, and some of the footage will show the male delivering dinner to his mate. Some people might find this upsetting.

The live feed can be wound back by up to 12 hours, so even during this build-up stage, it will always be possible to see one or both of the birds in and around the nesting box.

#### Battle of the Brampton Valley Way

Race Harborough has recently opened entries for its unique Leicestershire vs. Northamptonshire running event on Sunday 4th June, which sees participants travel along 14 miles of the traffic-free Brampton Valley Way – and back again!

The super flat route includes the famous Kelmarsh and Oxendon tunnels and cuts through the heart of rural Northamptonshire.

The event sees runners declare themselves as either Team Leicestershire (starting from the Market Harborough end of the route) or Team Northamptonshire (starting from the Northampton end of the route), and with such fierce rivalry between both counties on the rugby pitch, the battle at this running event is always a hard fought one.

Based on the cumulative elapsed time for an equal number of finishers from both sides, a victor will prevail.

Entries are priced at £28 – that's great value at only £1 a mile – and there's an event medal for every finisher too.

#### GARDEN WASTE SUBSCRIPTION SERVICE

#### - COLLECTIONS TO START SOON

Residents who want to use North Northamptonshire Council's new garden waste subscription service – and who have not already signed up – are reminded that collections will start soon.

From Monday 3rd April only those who have subscribed to the scheme will have their garden waste bin collected. The annual subscription charge for the fortnightly service is £40 per bin and can be paid online via debit or credit card. Subscriptions will last 12 months from the point of purchase. If people sign up early ready for the change, it will run from April to April. More details about the service and how to sign up are available on the garden waste section of the council's website. People can sign up any time and, once payment is processed, will receive a new garden waste permit for sticking onto their bin, so collection crews know to collect it.

Up until now, people living in the former East Northants district area have had to pay an annual charge of £55 for their collections, while the remainder of the council area have not. To acknowledge the historic disparity in charging for

green waste collections, the council has decided that existing subscribers will be offered a first year £20 discount at their next renewal. This discount will be for the first year of the scheme only. After this the annual cost will align with the rest of the North Northants area at £40 a year. The new charge for any new subscribers in East Northants is already in place and they will pay the new charge of £40.

As part of the refreshed service, the council will also be offering an enhancement to the subsidised compost bin scheme, where residents can buy a home compost bin for £5 plus delivery. The authority will also be offering an ad hoc sack collection system, at £16.50 for 10 compostable sacks, for those not needing or wanting a bin. Residents can also take green waste to their nearest household waste recycling centre in the NNC area for free disposal.

Details on all the garden waste services are available on the council's website. Residents unable to go online can subscribe to the service by calling customer services on 0300 126 3000. Lines are open Monday to Friday, 9am to 5pm.

## GENEALOGY **JOTTINGS**

Last time, I mentioned that I had discovered rather a lot of transcription errors in the 1921 census and had been notifying Find My Past accordingly. They are probably getting rather fed up with me, but could always offer me a job...

Sometimes, you can search for someone, find their details in a couple of censuses but then there is no trace of their birth or death. Or maybe you have their birth record but then there is no trace of them until 30 years later! I think that some of them have been set down on this earth by aliens – and then abducted back into space years later!

As well as transcription errors, something to bear in mind is the spelling of names. Spelling did not really settle down until the beginning of the 20th century – yes, as late as that – so please don't be offended if you find your name misspelt and think to yourself, "They got that wrong!". Names were recorded as the person who was doing the recording heard them. An example is the name

Alice. I have seen that as Elys, Alys, Ayls—you get the idea? Recently, I was searching for a family by the name of Forster. Of the 7 censuses in which they were recorded, 4 of them had the surname as Foster—missing out the letter R. What helped me to find them was that the mother was born in an unusual sounding place, so I used that as a key in my search. It pays sometimes to think laterally.

Also, think to yourself how similar some letters can be. I have the name Bailey in my tree. When I was looking through the parish records, I thought that there were rather a lot of people with that surname in the village – until it dawned on me that there was another family there whose surname was Barley. I was missing and gaining the dot over the 'i'.

# Secondary school places allocated in North Northamptonshire

A total of 4,225 secondary school places have been allocated to pupils across North Northamptonshire.

More people than ever before make their applications online – now at 99% and up from 98.8% in 2022.

95.2% of applicants have been allocated one of their preferred schools – the same percentage as the number of children getting a place at a preference school in 2022.

80.05% of applicants – 3,382 children – have been allocated a place at their first preference – a slightly lower percentage than last year (81.7 % in 2022).

12.1% of applicants have been allocated a place at their second preference (10.2% in 2022), while 3.05% have been allocated a place at their third preference (3.3% in 2022).

Families who applied for their secondary school place online and within the deadline are able to check their offer on the council's website at https://www.northnorthants.gov.uk/school-admissions

Cllr Scott Edwards, North Northamptonshire Council's executive member for Children, Families, Education and Skills, said: "I'm delighted that we are seeing consistency in the number of children being allocated one of their preferred schools.

"Meanwhile, we continue to work hard to create additional school places across North Northamptonshire to meet the demand caused by our growing population.

"New schools are being built and we are expanding existing sites across the area."

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "I wish all the children well as they embark on this next stage of their education.

"Supporting children in their education is a priority for the council and moving up to secondary school is a big step on this journey."

Any parent has the right to appeal (through the independent appeals process) against refusal of a place at any school for which they have applied.

The next round of secondary school place allocations (for late applicants) will take place in April.

Primary school allocations will be announced on Monday 17th April.

## Your names chosen for NNC's gritters

North Northamptonshire Council has given its fleet of gritters amusing names as suggested by local residents and school classes.

On the frontline of the winter service is the fleet of gritters that operates out of Wellingborough, with the gritting season running from October until mid-April.

Since October last year, the Kier Highways fleet has been out 39 times, treating 821 miles of roads every time,

to keep them open and safe for all.

The fleet has been updated with new vehicles that are powered by sustainably sourced Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil (HVO), which reduces the carbon produced by combustion engines by up to 90%. They also have new technology to ensure routes are

treated on time and that salt is used where it is needed most, reducing costs.

Cllr Graham Lawman, North Northamptonshire Council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets, said: "Gritting to keep our network open is a serious business.

but the dedicated winter team want to bring a smile to people's faces and what better way than naming their gritters?

"These new vehicles have been nameless for the last few months, so it is about time they were named. I am particularly pleased to see many schools entering and we have chosen as many of them as possible.

Throughout January, the online competition attracted hundreds of suggestions. This month, the fleet of 10 vehicles will have names as suggested by residents and school classes from across North Northants.

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "We would like to say a massive thank you to everyone who got involved and sent in their funny, imaginative and just plain odd names. It was such a hard decision but we're delighted that the fleet will no longer



We're very lucky in this area as there is a lot of support available for runners and people with gait problems:

Irchester Park – a free, weekly, timed 5k walk/jog/run at 9am every Saturday. Open to all ages and abilities.

Running Buddies – high quality coaching for new, intermediate and advanced runners through qualified coaches.

**Ashgrove Active** – a Facebook group providing support to runners, in particular to those currently training for marathons.

**Diamond Runners** – sessions are devised and led by an England Athletics qualified coach and leaders to be varied, fun and challenging. All abilities are welcome

For injuries there are a lot of sports therapists in the area, plus osteopaths and chiropractors. You've also got K-Laser therapy and gait analysis in Higham to help you get better faster. Make sure the person you see has



good credentials and is able to offer you the treatment you need – if you need help with running technique see a practitioner who runs. If you need post surgical rehab, see a rehab specialist – you don't have to always see the same therapist. Pick the expert for your current

And please don't get your gait analysis done by eye on a treadmill. Get a proper scan done to assess dynamic movement of your foot. You have access to high-tech science these days,

And stay focused! One of the things that comes across in the Ashgrove Active FB group is that increasing your distance means staying focused, not just on the training, but on the brilliance of what you're achieving.

## BAND QUALIFIES FOR NATIONAL FINALS

Thrapston Town Band recently won the Midlands Brass Band Championships and now qualify for the National Finals.

Thrapston Town Band is celebrating its 165th year in style, by qualifying for the National Finals of the Brass Band Championships in Cheltenham later this year

On Saturday 4th March the Midlands Regional Brass Band Championship (Fourth Section) was held at The Cube in Corby, Northamptonshire. Fifteen bands took part, with all bands playing the same "test piece" – Hungerford Town, by Darrol Barry.

The contest is judged "blind" by two independent adjudicators who sit in a "tent" in the auditorium – purely judging each band on their sound and musicianship.

The standard was high, with some great performances. But Thrapston's interpretation of the piece shone through, and they were

placed 1st by the judges in the Fourth Section competition.

Although it's an old band (considered to be the oldest brass band in Northamptonshire), they haven't entered competitions for many years. In fact, they only re-joined contesting in 2020, placing 13th. There was no contest in 2021 (due to Covid), then in 2022 they came a highly credible 3rd place, and obviously topped it all this year by being crowned Fourth Section Champion Band.

In fact, the success doesn't stop there! Thrapston's steady improvement across the three contests has meant that in January 2024, they will be promoted to the next tier of brass banding – known as the Third Section.

Band Chairman, Rob Johnson said: "To win this year's competition, qualify for the National

Finals, and gain promotion is an incredible achievement for the band. It's testament to the skill, hard work and dedication of every single one of our players that we have achieved this.

"Three years ago, when we decided to start contesting again our objective was to improve both as players, and as a band – and do our very best to represent ourselves and the town of Thrapston as well as we could. And it's fair to say that we've exceeded all our expectations.

"So, it's really important to recognise the incredible impact our Musical Director, Nathan Waterman, has had on our success. The band simply wouldn't have achieved this without his skills, knowledge and leadership, for which we're all very grateful."

The band's Musical Director, Nathan Waterman added: "I'm so pleased for the band to be crowned Midland Area Champions 2023 and to gain promotion to the Third Section. It's an amazing achievement. We

have worked very hard to improve over the last few years, and it is extremely satisfying to have this recognition. I can't wait for us to represent the Midlands at the National Finals in September."

At its heart, Thrapston Town Band is a community band. They provide lessons to children (and adults), which also includes free use of an instrument. In fact, several of the current band members started as "learners" at Thrapston, including Nathan, who went on to achieve success playing at the highest level in brass banding, the Championship Section.

Before all the excitement of the National Finals in September, Thrapston Town Band has a busy schedule of concerts and events to perform in the coming months, throughout Northamptonshire and beyond.

But it's fair to say that everyone in the band is already getting excited at the prospect of representing the Midlands in Cheltenham later this year.

For this award, the judging panel assesses NLIS Hub data collected between 1st October 2021 and 30th September 2022 on electronic turnaround times, the level of overdue searches, search accuracy and volumes, which are weighted against transactional volumes for the authority's area. The results are combined and ranked to create the shortlist.

The awards for Best Performing Local Land Charges Department, Levels 2 and 3, will be presented as part of the Local Land Charges Training & Development event on 28th and 29th March. Other award categories include Customer Satisfaction, Local Authority Searches Team of the Year, Best Newcomer, Best Performing Migrated Local Authority and the Unsung Hero Award.

Since their launch in 2008, the annual Local Land Charges Awards for Excellence remain the only national awards celebrating the achievements and successes of local authority local land charges departments across England and Wales.

## **Adverse Possession** – What is it and how can you claim?

Adverse possession, or more colloquially known as "squatters' rights" is the process by which someone who is not the registered owner of a piece of land can have the land transferred to them following a period of 10 or 12 years of exclusive possession.

The period of time for occupation required is dependent upon whether the land is registered, unregistered, or is dependent upon the date when the land was first registered. Other time periods may apply for more obscure situations, where the land may be held within a Trust, or 'Bona Vacantia'.

#### When does adverse possession begin?

Adverse possession will begin as soon as an individual takes over the full and exclusive occupation and control of the land in question without permission or consent. It is important to remember however that the land must have been occupied for 12 years if unregistered, and 10 years for registered land prior to the application being made. If the land was occupied by somebody prior to your occupation, a predecessor can be used to make up the necessary time period.




#### What are the requirements?

Unfortunately, it is not sufficient to show that the land has been occupied for a certain period of time. You need to exhibit exclusive occupation with an intention to exclude anyone else other than your invited visitors for the required period

The land registry case workers have discretion when looking at applications, and therefore it is vital to show a use of the land as if it were already owned. For example, merely taking care of the land by mowing or tidying may not be sufficient. For that reason, the evidence in support of individual applications needs to be very carefully drafted to comply with the requirements of the Land Registry.


"We have had a great response from schools and groups so far, and there is opportunity for more people to join in and contribute their own flowers through our workshops and over the Festival weekend.



David's Facebook group now has over 1,200 members and David posts photos every day showing what is on the stall. He does weekend garden photo challenges, tips and advice videos, and sometimes 'live' broadcasts from the stall. Each day

Currently on stall he has a wide range of bulbs such as hyacinths, narcissus, crocus, alliums and iris. It has become a real community venture. People have been very generous, for example by supplying apples to the stall in the autumn. A friend in the next village makes and supplies bird nesting boxes and bug hotels, while David's sister makes Christmas wreaths each year, which boosts donations.
