ACTIVE PARKS PROJECT DELIVERS OVER 1,000 SESSIONS

The Active Parks Project has now delivered over 1,000 sessions to more than 13,000 participants since November 2019.

Now delivered by the North Northamptonshire Council Country Parks team and working in partnership with Northamptonshire Public Health and Northamptonshire Sport, the aim of the project is to help more residents to take part in activities to improve their physical and mental

Sessions have been held in country parks across North Northants, with sessions held across the county before the new council came into existence.

This is in addition to the curriculum school groups that have also been delivered during this period.

Cllr Harriet Pentland, the council's Executive Member for Climate and Environment, said: "Our parks are excellent places where residents can enjoy healthy outdoor activities, escape from stress and learn new things.

"The work of the Education Rangers not only helps with environmental education, but it inspires young people, improves mental and physical health, reducing social isolation and helping people do more than they thought possible.

"We have put together a range of programmes for young people, families and adults that include our popular Nature Tots and health walks and it is great



that we have had such high levels of participation, despite the pandemic."

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, added: "The benefits of getting outdoors is well known, so I am pleased that we have delivered so many sessions since the end of 2019. The team run regular sessions on a variety of themes, so do take a look and get involved."

As well as the public sessions, the team works with groups on bespoke sessions benefitting those with longterm health conditions or specific needs. NEWS IN BRIEF

A43 scheme

Building a dual carriageway the length of the A43 between Kettering and Northampton is set to move a step closer.

So far, the stretch of the A43 between the Round Spinney roundabout and the newly built Overstone Grange roundabout has been dualled.

A proposal before North Northamptonshire Council's Executive outlined how the next phase would see the dual carriageway continue from Overstone Grange to the Holcot/Sywell roundabout.

While the first phases are in the West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) area, this next stage crosses over the border from WNC into North Northamptonshire. It is proposed that it is jointly developed by the two councils and it is recommended that WNC is the lead authority.

As such, a report before the Council's Executive proposed the council signs a Memorandum of Understanding with neighbouring West Northamptonshire Council to develop this next phase.

Subject to gaining the necessary approvals and funding, it is anticipated that construction could begin in early 2026.



PLACES ALLOCATED FOR PRIMARY-AGED

PUPILS IN NORTH NORTHAMPTONSHIRE

A total of 3,793 reception places have been allocated to pupils across North Northamptonshire. 93.2% of applicants – 3,537 children – have been allocated a place at their first preference (compared with 92.7% for 2022).

4.3% of applicants have been allocated a place at their second preference (4.3% in 2022) while 1.1% have been allocated a place at their third preference (1.5% in 2022).

98.6% of applicants have been allocated one of their preferred schools (98.5% in 2022), while 99% of applications were made online (up from 98.8% in 2022)

Families who applied for their primary school place online and within the deadline are able to check their offer on the council's website.

Looking at the figures for Junior School applications (Year 3), where there were 981 applications, 99.9% of pupils were allocated a place at their first preference (99.8% for 2022)

while 100% were allocated one of their preferred schools (also 100% in 2022).

Cllr Scott Edwards, North Northamptonshire Council's Executive Member for Children, Families, Education and Skills, said: "I would like to pass on my best wishes to every pupil starting a new school in September and hope this is the start of an exciting new journey. Supporting all children in their education is a priority for the council.

"We have seen a slight increase in the number of pupils obtaining a place at the school of their choice which is a real step forward.

"We continue to work hard to create additional school places across North Northamptonshire to meet the demand caused by our growing population, through building new schools and expanding existing sites across the area."

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "Starting school is a huge step for all children to take and I wish them all the very best as they embark on their education."

GENEALOGY JOTTINGS

What never ceases to amaze me is how much there is to finding out about our ancestors. With many of the dates sorted and people identified, it doesn't stop there. One question that was asked on my forum recently was, "Can anyone tell me whether Catholics had to marry in the local C of E parish churches in 1827? What did most Catholics do?"

The answer according to the National Archives is: Between 1754 and 1837 it was a legal requirement to marry in the Church of England and though many Catholics were still married illegally according to Catholic rites, registers for these illegal marriages were not generally kept since it might have been dangerous to do so. Not just Catholics – any non-conformist, except Jews and Quakers!

Sometimes you might get a clue from your Catholic ancestors marrying by licence rather than having banns read, and there was nothing stopping them from baptising their children in a Catholic church. I've also seen baptisms recorded in non-Catholic registers with a note that they were 'Papist'. Depending upon the period in which you

are interested, there are also the Papist Returns, although individual names aren't often mentioned. Between 1680 and 1781, Parliament requested information about known or reputed Roman Catholics on several occasions. This information was laid before the House of Lords and survives in the Parliamentary Archives. The records are commonly known as the 'Papist Returns' and survive for 1680, 1706, 1767 and 1781.

A couple of the subscription websites, Ancestry and Find My Past, also have Irish Catholic Parish Registers from 1655-1915, which are worth a look. You don't have to pay to see them, though, if you visit the Library and use their computer! Some are also available for free at the Irish Genealogy website: www.irishgenealogy.ie/en/ and also at: www.registers.nli.ie/ If you are not familiar with the areas covered, just make sure that you have a map handy.



Consultation on the scope and options for the North Northamptonshire

Gypsy and Traveller Local Plan

North Northamptonshire Council has launched a consultation on the scope and options for a plan to address the accommodation needs of gypsies and travellers in the

The Gypsy and Traveller Local Plan will provide policies and site allocations and run until 2041. When finalised, the Plan will form part of the Development Plan for North Northamptonshire.

The current consultation is the first stage in preparing the Gypsy and Traveller Local Plan and focusses on providing information on key issues for the Plan, including:

- the vision and outcomes for the plan
- options for meeting future requirements
- size of sites
- geographical distribution
- allocation of reserve sites
- · assessment criteria for site allocation and determination

of planning applications

- provision of transit sites and temporary stopping places
- retention of sites

Cllr David Brackenbury, the council's Executive Member for Growth and Regeneration, said: "The purpose of the consultation is to gather the views of the public and stakeholders on the key issues to be addressed by the final Plan and on the scope and content of the Plan.

"Once completed, the Gypsy and Traveller Local Plan will cover the period until 2041, so we want to make sure everything is right and takes into account the views of all those affected by the issues raised in

"It is worth mentioning that at this stage, no decisions have been made on the content of the planning policies and we are very much still in the initial phase of putting together this

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, added: "Once completed, this will be a very important document and I would encourage everyone to get involved and give their feedback to help us shape the Plan – we want to work with stakeholders throughout this process."

Comments are also invited on a Sustainability Appraisal Scoping Report. The purpose of the Sustainability Appraisal is to appraise the social, environmental and economic effects of the plan from the outset of plan preparation.

The consultation will run until midnight on 31st May 2023. Further information is available on the Council's Consultation and Engagement hub.

Copies of the documents are also available for inspection at the main Council Offices and libraries during normal opening hours.

Traffic safety measures on Executive agenda

Measures to improve safety for pedestrians along George Street in Corby will be discussed at a meeting of North Northamptonshire Council's Executive.

Following a previous phase which looked at the safety of pedestrians across a section of George Street and saw the upgrade of an existing zebra crossing and the introduction of a tiger crossing, alongside other changes, a second phase is proposed to introduce enforcement cameras along a small section of George Street.

If approved, the works will improve the accessibility, mobility and safety for pedestrians and cyclists

If approved, the plans would see a decrease in the number of vehicles using this particular stretch of road, which would bring multiple benefits to the area including the safety enhancements, alongside improved air quality and environment for pedestrians, whilst still allowing vehicles to access Everest Lane and Cardigan Place."




Devika Day Centre launches at Hermitage House

IMPROVING SERVICES FOR HILDREN WITH DISABILITIE

Residents are being invited to have their say on the future shape of services providing 'short breaks' for children with disabilities in Northamptonshire.

Short breaks are breaks for children and young people with disabilities which give them rich opportunities while also allowing their carers to have a break from caring to carry out other vital activities they may not otherwise be able to do.

Currently Northamptonshire Children's Trust and the NHS Northamptonshire Integrated Care Board fund a range of different services from a number of different organisations to provide these breaks. ranging from residential and non-residential breaks, personal care and support, to holiday clubs, sensory impairment services and sleep support.

Having worked with parents and practitioners, the organisations have developed a potential new model for the services and are looking for feedback on this before going any further.

Julian Wooster, Chair of Northamptonshire Children's Trust said: "Previous engagement with parents and practitioners highlighted how critical short break services are and provided some key insights into how these could be improved. It was clear from the sessions held that there was a need for increased early help, a simpler way for families to access the services and for these services to be more flexible, better integrated with each other and provided in places closer to home.


"This feedback was critical in helping us design a potential new model, bringing everything together into a single service run and led by one organisation. Working with our partners, we are requesting feedback on this potential model."

The new proposed model would bring all current short break services into one offer, led by one organisation – as opposed to the current situation where services are provided across a range of different organisations. The aim is to ensure these services are better joined up to meet the needs of families.

Chief Executive of NHS Northamptonshire Integrated Care Board, Toby Sanders said: "It is really important to get feedback on the potential new model for these services we are exploring. By looking at doing things differently this may mean that current services need to change as we look to use resources more effectively and improve the support for families.

"All the feedback received from this engagement will be used to develop the new model which we are hoping to be in place from April 2024."





The group of mums, daughters and grandmothers, who have all been affected by breast cancer, were supporting fellow National Lottery winner Maxine Lloyd, who was compelled to give back to the charity Breast Friends Northamptonshire after it supported her when she had breast cancer.

Maxine, from Kettering, found out she had won £1M during her radiotherapy

treatment for breast cancer, and received a Breast Friends Northamptonshire treatment bag full of feel-good items like cosmetics, a blanket, a water bottle and even fluffy socks.

She said: "When I opened mine it was like a 'hug in a bag'. I had this support and kindness from people I had never met but knew exactly what I needed, and I will be forever grateful. They do an amazing job and it's now my turn to give back after my good fortune. With a little help from National Lottery friends who have themselves had a bit of lottery luck, but who have also been touched by breast cancer, we can help Breast Friends

continue to make a real difference to women with breast cancer."

Breast Friends Northamptonshire was started by founder Leonie Heard in 2017 after undergoing treatment for breast cancer. Leonie and her fellow volunteers continue to run workshops, organise day trips and various other events for this peer-to-peer support group during both treatment and aftercare.

The National Lottery winners provided the contents of the treatment bags and then packed them with Maxine and other volunteers from Breast Friends Northamptonshire. As a special thank you for all the amazing support given to women with breast cancer in the county, the winners hosted an afternoon tea for all the volunteers.

The National Lottery winners jumped at the chance to help Maxine, given that everyone in the group has been affected by breast cancer in some way.

Tracy Field from Essex has a similar story to Maxine, she too battled breast cancer before winning £2.5M on The National Lottery in 2008.

She said: "It was a very difficult time for

me. I had two operations and six months of chemotherapy and radiotherapy.

The support I received helped me get through the dark times.

"The work this charity and many others across the UK do every single day is amazing and I applaud each and every one of these amazing and caring volunteers."

Founder of Breast Friends
Northamptonshire, Leonie Heard said:
"Some of the winners have been on a
challenging journey themselves, others
have helped because they feel the need
to help. Whatever their circumstances, I
just want to thank them all.

"I can't thank this group enough. What they have achieved in a day would take us weeks and we now have at least six months' worth of bags to support women across the county.

"Finally, their gift of an afternoon tea for the volunteers has made this a very special day."

Maxine, an occupational therapist for the NHS, was diagnosed with breast cancer in November 2021 after she noticed a change in her skin texture. She had surgery in December and on Christmas Eve 2021 received the news that the lump had been successfully removed. Maxine continued to undergo chemotherapy and radiotherapy as there was a high chance the cancer could return, and it was during her radiotherapy treatment that she won £1M on The National Lottery's Mega Cash Showdown Instant Win Game in the summer of
