Moving on up!

Adults in North Northamptonshire are increasing the amount they exercise, with 6 in 10 now classed as 'active'.

The latest data from Sport England revealed that 2021-22 has seen an increase in the number of active adults in the Council area to 62.5% from 57.4% in 2020-21.

This equates to 181,200 adults meeting guidelines of doing more than 150 minutes of exercise each week, beating the East Midlands average of 61.1%.

North Northamptonshire in 2021-22 has also seen a decrease in the number of inactive adults to 24.5%, from 30.6% in 2020-21.

This is lower than the East Midlands average of 27.5% and the England average of 25.8%

North Northamptonshire results:

- Inactive exercising for less than 30 minutes each week – 24.5%
- Fairly active exercising for between 30 minutes and 149 minutes each week – 13%




Roy Wilfred Sinfield Burrell

I mentioned the website https://www. scotlandspeople.gov.uk/ to him with which, surprisingly as he had been trying to research for many years, he was not familiar. He was comfortable with using the internet, so we had a good discussion about how to use it and buying credits for it etc. Oh yes - since I last mentioned them a couple of years ago, they have uploaded details of the 1921 census. Very useful!

It can be difficult to research ancestors when they seem to have lived hundreds - if not thousands - of miles away. I keep telling myself that I need to get across to Ireland and visit the National Archives in Dublin, Perhaps I could

have another little holiday this year and explore the city as well as delve into the records. I have been looking for my elusive grandfather for vears, using every possible website available to me, but to no avail. There is only so much that you can do online without having "eyes on the ground", so to speak. That is where the good folk on my forum come in handy. Most – if not all – are prepared to visit their local graveyards to check out memorials and take photographs, visit nearby records offices and archives to photocopy the records held. I even have one member who became so engrossed in what had happened locally, that he has created his own website that people refer to when they are researching that area.

Expressions of interest invited from local schools to move to new primary school at Glenvale Park, Wellingborough

Local schools are being invited to submit 'expressions' of interest in relocating from their existing school into a new primary school at the Glenvale Park development to the north of Wellingborough.

The 'relocation of an existing school' opportunity has been launched following approval to go ahead at a meeting of North Northamptonshire Council's Executive recently.

Glenvale Park will provide an additional 3.000 new homes and in preparation for new families moving into the area, the school, which has been built by the developer Glenvale Park LLP, is due for completion this autumn.

As the estate grows and the need for school places arises, primary aged children from the Glenvale Park development will be able to apply for a school place as part of the normal admissions process for places for September 2024.

However, with an appropriate number of primary school places currently available in Wellingborough, it is not envisaged that demand to open a new school, and receive Department for Education funding, would be high enough until the start of the school year in September 2025.

This relocation opportunity will enable a local primary school which has poor or unsuitable accommodation to move to a purpose-built facility from September 2024 and the vacated smaller site could be re-purposed for other educational uses.

Cllr Scott Edwards the Council's Executive Member for Children, Families, Education and Skills, said: "I'm delighted that we are now moving forward with this process and are at the stage of inviting expressions of interest from schools.

"I'm very pleased that we can make use of this wonderful new school until the bulge of new demand comes through and offer some contemporary accommodation for an existing school which would face challenges with their

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "I'm delighted that we have found a clever solution so this wonderful new facility can be of use as quickly as is possible and that we are now moving forward at pace.

Expressions of interest are invited from local primary schools between now and 30th June before a shortlisting and interviewing stage takes place between 3rd and 14th July.

It is envisaged that a panel decision will take place during the week beginning 17th July, before returning to the Executive in September. The process is scheduled to be fully completed by

CLEAN AIR DAY IN NORTH NORTHANTS

North Northamptonshire Council supports Clean Air Day.

This national event, which was held on 15th June, focuses on raising awareness about the importance of clean air and encourages individuals, communities and organisations to take actions towards improving air quality.

Clean Air Day highlights the way we can all work together to clean up our air - something which has been shown to have benefits for our physical health and environment but can also protect our mental and brain health.

North Northamptonshire Council takes its responsibility of reducing emissions in the local area seriously, and we take care to ensure our impact on the environment is as little as possible, whilst monitoring nitrogen dioxide air pollution across the area.

Actions taken to reduce carbon emissions can also assist to improve local air quality. Since committing to being carbon neutral in July 2021,

Officers have been working on various initiatives and the council's Carbon Management Plan was approved in December 2022.

Initiatives currently being undertaken by NNC include the Voi e-scooter and e-bike hire scheme and the introduction of Starship Delivery robots in Wellingborough, Rushden and Higham Ferrers.

The Council have enabled the installation of on-street charging points at 12 locations across 6 towns as well as in some of its car parks. Further work is planned with an additional 18 locations scheduled to go ahead this year. Development of a strategy is underway which will set out plans for a step-change in charging infrastructure, to keep pace with expected growth in EV ownership.

The Council is also developing plans for improved walking and cycling facilities in our towns. Consultation



has recently taken place on a Local Cycling and Walking Improvement Plan for Kettering, with similar plans for Corby and Wellingborough following over the coming months.

But it is also about everyone working together and NNC are encouraging residents to get involved by learning more about the impact air pollution can have on our mental and physical health and taking

manageable steps to help improve air quality.

Cllr Harriet Pentland, the council's Executive Member for Climate and Green Environment, said: "Clean Air Day highlights the changes we can all make to improve the quality of the air we breathe, which as well as having benefits to the environment has been shown to improve mental and physical health.

"We understand that we have a direct responsibility to address climate change, and we know that each small change we make adds up. Everyone within the council is working to help improve air quality and achieve carbon neutrality, from personal steps like how they travel to work through to wider actions, such as factoring in carbon and air pollution reduction into service planning."

Voi are offering 30 minutes of free travel by e-scooters to users across the UK with code CLEANAIRDAY23 (Offer valid from Clean Air Day, 15th June, until 30th June). Also, central Government's £2 bus fare cap scheme has been extended until October 2023.

"Think before you bin your batteries," warns NNC

Following a fire at Wellingborough Household Waste Recycling Centre (HWRC) in May, North Northamptonshire Council is reminding residents to think before disposing of used batteries.

An investigation following the skip fire on 29th May revealed that the fire had been started by a battery in the general waste skip.

Batteries thrown into general rubbish or recycling bins, or left inside old electrical items, have caused several fires in bin lorries and at recycling centres locally and nationally, recently.

When waste and recycling bins are collected by crews, any batteries inside can be squashed, punctured or shredded, which could cause batteries to get very hot and ignite, resulting in a fire or explosion in the bin lorry or at the waste facility.

But batteries can be recycled, easily and safely for free – at places such as supermarkets and DIY stores which all have battery bins.
All North Northamptonshire

Household Waste Recycling Centres also have battery bins, where you can take your old batteries for recycling.

Cllr Graham Lawman, the council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets, said: "This is a very real reminder that batteries should be disposed of correctly. It might be easy to think that a battery will be okay to put in your general waste bin, but as this recent case shows – they can easily cause fires, which can have a wide impact. In the worst-case scenario, more than just the waste in the skip could have been set on fire and serious damage caused at the Wellingborough HWRC.

"On this occasion, we had to evacuate the site to keep the public safe and were advised by the Fire Service to close the site for the remainder of the day to ensure the fire had been completely extinguished, which inconvenienced people wanting to use the site that day.

"Fires on our bin lorries could also cause the loss of a vehicle entirely at a significant cost to the council."

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, added:
"Anywhere that sells batteries should have a battery bin, including all major supermarkets. So next time you are doing your weekly shop, please put your used batteries in one of these bins, rather than in your recycling or general waste bin at home."

Recycleyourelectricals.org. uk has a postcode checker where residents can find their nearest battery recycling point.

"The team, which is based at Patrick Road Resource Centre, Corby, helps people living in the North Northamptonshire area to remain living independently within their own homes for longer.

"It is no understatement to suggest that the dedicated staff in this team greatly enrich the lives of these young adults and help them to flourish. I'm extremely proud of the good work they do and would like to congratulate them on this achievement."

The CQC inspection ensures care providers are meeting the legal requirements and regulations of providing personal care to clients, assesses the quality of the service provided and awards an official rating.

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "Helping our vulnerable adults live active, independent lives is important to us as a Council and [we are] delighted that this team is delivering a quality service. I'd like to offer my congratulations for all their hard work and dedication."





Have your say on parking across North Northants

A new survey looking at parking habits and provision across North Northamptonshire has been launched.

The survey will be open for six weeks and asks a variety of questions on parking habits including parking in town centres, issues related to parking, on-street parking (not residential permit holders), electrical vehicle charging and thoughts on car parks in town centres across North Northamptonshire.
