NEW TOILET FACILITY OPENED AT **EAST CARLTON COUNTRYSIDE PARK**

Making public spaces inclusive for people with disabilities and their carers is the aim of the national Changing Places initiative which has seen North Northamptonshire Council open a brand-new, fully accessible toilet facility at East Carlton Countryside Park.

Powered by £330,000 of the Government's Levelling Up fund and further investment from the Council's capital programme, the new toilet facility helps people who are limited in their mobility and need equipment to assist with this.

It has modern features including a powered heightadjustable changing table, rising and lowering sink, movable ceiling hoist, grab rails, non-slip flooring, privacy screens, an alarm and a large clear space to accommodate wheelchair users and their carers.

Along with the new Changing Places toilet at East Carlton Countryside Park

and the recently opened facility at Corby Cube, further construction works to add more to the network will follow in other areas across North Northamptonshire. Councillor Matthew

Binley, Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets said: "I am delighted this crucial facility is now open at East Carlton Countryside Park. Changing Places toilets are potentially lifechanging large spaces and are accessible for people with limited mobility or specific disabilities and care needs. They make it possible for everyone to enjoy dayto-day activities that we can sometimes take for granted.

"Accessible toilets in public spaces means everyone can plan visits and enjoy days out without having to worry about toilet breaks and medical needs. Building these new Changing Places facilities at busy attractions across the area ensures people can enjoy their visits to this popular park without hindrance.

Councillor lason Smithers, Leader of North Northamptonshire Council said: "Thanks to our successful bid to secure funding, it is fantastic to see the completion of this project. With a diverse range of visitors to East Carlton Countryside Park travelling from a wide range of locations, it will make a huge



difference for many people. "More Changing Places facilities are being planned and will be installed at popular locations across the area in the coming months. This growing network of inclusive spaces ensures people can plan visits confidently, using toilets safely and with dignity.

Other locations in North Northamptonshire with

Changing Places facilities already in use are Corby Cube, Rushden Lakes, Wicksteed Park, Waendel Leisure Centre and Corby Swimming Pool. Once opened, Changing Places facilities are registered on the national website to help people locate them and plan

Nene Valley Crematorium donates £12,000 to Mind charity

The team at Nene Valley Crematorium have raised £12,000 for a local charity Mind. North Northamptonshire Council's company operated crematorium serves the community of Wellingborough, and beyond.

Mind provides frontline mental health and wellbeing services. The raised funds will be utilised to allow hundreds of people to access crucial support services that can be lifesaving, including, counselling, crisis support, one-to-one support, encompassing support groups and peer support. On behalf of the Company's Chair for the Board of Directors, Councillor Paul Bell, responsible for Wellingborough Bereavement Services, a cheque was presented on Tuesday 20th June 2023 by the Operations Director (and NNC's Assistant Director for Regulatory Services), lain Smith to Mind's Business Development Director, Dion Hunt.

GENEALOGY JOTTINGS

Last time I was talking about discovering that folk had not died – even though their former spouse had married again as a widow or widower. One thing to remember is that, as I have mentioned before, the vicar would only go by what the couple told him – no evidence was needed. This does not help the family historian!

One of the members of my forum had been hunting for the death of an ancestor over in Canada as his 'widow' had remarried. After a lot of digging around, he was found to have moved to America (the border crossing records were found) and appears on the various American censuses in San Francisco. Meanwhile, his 'widow' had married for the third time and so further research is now taking place on both sides of the Canadian/American border!

Divorce in England was rather expensive – to say the least! It was really only available to men and, because of the high cost and the rules surrounding it, bigamy was more common than

not always easy and was still very expensive but remained the status quo until 1923. A Private Members' Bill, which became part of the Matrimonial Causes Act, made adultery by either husband or wife the sole grounds for divorce, which meant that the wife no longer had to prove additional reasons against her husband, but both spouses still had to prove the adultery. A further amendment to the Matrimonial Causes Act came along in 1937 when, in addition to adultery, grounds could also be cruelty, desertion and incurable insanity. In the 19th century, even if a divorce was granted, chances are that if there were any young children, they would be sent to live with the father. The mother didn't count, thus reinforcing the lowly status that women had back in the day.

Genealogy Specialists, Tracing Our Past, Discovering Our Genes (TOP DOG) www.genealogy-specialists.com These funds are a result of the crematorium's membership with the Institute of Cemetery and Crematorium Management, who have adopted a recycling of metals policy via a European company, OrthoMetals. The scheme continues to grow because of the Institute's partnership with OrthoMetals, raising significant monetary contributions for a variety of charities, 648 in total. The partnership has donated £17,040,000 to date.

Metals recovered after cremation are recycled with the express consent of bereaved people, being the persons entitled and empowered to make this decision. For further information, please visit the Orthometals website and view the film of their process.

Since the opening of the crematorium on 19th September 2016, the team have nominated six local charities that have collectively benefitted from £77,000 because of this recycling scheme.

Councillor Paul Bell said: "It's an honour and pleasure to support Mind in their work with presentation of this cheque." Mind's Dion Hunt commented: "On

behalf of Mind in Wellingborough and Northamptonshire Mind, we would like to extend our heartfelt gratitude to Nene Valley Crematorium for their generous donation of £12,000. This remarkable contribution will go a long way in supporting individuals facing mental health challenges within our community. With their support, we will be able to provide essential services such as counselling sessions, 1-to-1 emotional support, peer support, education and training. Their kindness and commitment to mental health advocacy are truly commendable, and we are incredibly grateful. Together, we can make a positive difference in the lives of those who need it most."

This year follows a former recent donation from the crematorium scheme to the former 'We Mind & Kelly Matters' (now 'Kelly's Heroes') charity for £12,000.

Operations Director for the crematorium and Assistant Director for Regulatory Services at NNC, Iain Smith, said: "On behalf of the Nene Valley Crematorium staff and Board Members, I am proud to make this donation to MIND, as a local charity chosen by Crematorium staff, to further their valuable work in supporting and advising local people struggling with their mental health'.



ENGAGEMENT ON ELECTRIC Homes for Afghan refugees on **VEHICLE CHARGING** POINTS LAUNCHED

A survey has been launched on potential locations for on-street electric vehicle charging points in six towns across North Northamptonshire.

Nine sites are being considered in Corby, Earls Barton, Kettering, Oundle, Raunds and Wellingborough

and residents living nearby will receive a letter inviting them to have their say on the proposed sites. The letter will be from Believ (previously named Liberty Charge), who are running the project working with North Northamptonshire Council (NNC). All the sites are in locations with little or no off-road parking to support those residents who do not currently have the option of charging at home.

All feedback will be reviewed by NNC and before installation can go ahead, residents will have a further opportunity to comment on the designation and operation of the bays through the Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) process

Cllr Matt Binley, North Northamptonshire Council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets, said: "The number of people driving electric vehicles is continuing to grow and it is great that we are proposing further electric vehicle charging infrastructure in towns across North Northants.



"The sites that are being proposed are in areas with a high proportion of on-street parking or in town centres, which means if approved, more residents will have easier access to electric vehicle charging points. "The sites being consulted on have been identified following

recommendations to us by residents and suggestions by local Councillors. Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council,

said: "It is vital that we consider investment in charging points and if you live near to one of the proposed sites, or are an electric vehicle user, or are considering becoming one, l encourage you to have your say before 25th August."

If you would like to respond to the public consultation for the proposed electric vehicle charging points across North Northamptonshire, you can do so via the online form until 25th August 2023.

The surveys being conducted are separate to the engagement on six proposed sites which ran from 3rd December 2022 - 29th December 2022.

There are currently 12 on-street charging sites across North Northants, with two charging points at each site

A report at the meeting of North

Northamptonshire Council's Executive saw members discussing 11 homes for people and families who have settled in the area from Afghanistan and to help alleviate wider homelessness pressures.

North Northamptonshire Council has been allocated funding from the Department of Levelling Up Housing and Communities to deliver 11 houses during 2023/2024. Nine of the houses will be for Afghan families, with the remaining two homes purchased for temporary accommodation.

During the meeting on 17th August,

Councillors were asked to approve, to provide the required match funding against the central government grant.

It is proposed that the Council commits to the programme to alleviate increased demand on homelessness and temporary accommodation services and to assist refugees who have arrived in the area to move on from bridging hotels or sponsor placements.

Cllr Helen Harrison, the council's Executive Member for Adults, Health and Wellbeing, said: "Since the Afghan Resettlement Programme was launched in 2021, we, like many local authorities, have experienced challenges in supporting people to move into more permanent accommodation. This proposal will help those on the resettlement scheme build new lives in the UK, integrate into



communities and find employment - something which we know is extremely important to them.

Cllr Mark Rowley, the council's Executive Member for Housing, Communities and Levelling-Up, said: "If approved, this will help more Afghan families move from bridging hotels into homes they can call their own, whilst mitigating the expected increase on resources when current arrangements come to an end. Larger properties, which are typically required by Afghan families, are in short supply in the private sector, which is why we are looking to purchase four-bed plus properties – avoiding the need for larger families to move into unsuitable, temporary accommodation."

The Executive met on Thursday 17th August from 10am and the papers for the Local Authority Housing Fund are available online.



Roads benefit from 2023 micro-asphalt programme

North Northamptonshire Council, in partnership with Kier, kickstarted its microasphalting programme recently, improving the condition of 13 roads across the county.

The works will improve the condition of 5.8km of the county's roads, which is the size of nearly six football pitches.

Micro-asphalt schemes are a preventative form of maintenance, used to extend the life of the roads by up to 10 years. They also create fewer carbon emissions and cause less disruption when compared to resurfacing. This programme forms part of North Northamptonshire's £19.5M capital works programme to improve roads across the county this year.

Roads identified for the treatment have undergone a condition assessment and met the criteria for intervention at a critical point, before needing replacement.

Cllr Matt Binley, North Northamptonshire Council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets, said: "We're delighted to roll out this micro-asphalt scheme in partnership with Kier. We have balanced proactive and reactive road maintenance as part of our capital works programme, to include costeffective and long-lasting treatments – to provide a better experience for our residents and road users."

The process allows road users to be back on the treated roads within 30 minutes – with an improved surface texture.

Micro-asphalt treatments involve a two-phased process used to seal the existing road surface – which involves applying a levelling layer of materials, followed by a surface layer. Kier Highways will be returning to the roads at a later stage to install ironwork and road markings.

John Coombes, General Manager at Kier Transportation, said: "By using this preventative treatment on roads before they pass the point of repair, we can provide an efficient, cost-effective solution that extends the life of roads for years to come. We are pleased to be kickstarting our micro-asphalting programme, and seeing the benefits this important scheme will bring across North Northamptonshire."

At 62 years old, Diane used to run a gardening business but now enjoys time with her husband Steve and beloved dog Sidney, and just being in the Great Outdoors. That is where the pictures for the 2024 calendar have been taken – in the lush, pastoral scenery surrounding the village, featuring the village friends who are supporting the goal of raising at least \$5,000.

Pete "Moose" Jousiffe, also a resident of Titchmarsh, was the very patient photographer handed the task of coaxing these plucky poseurs into showing more than just their faces and a well-turned ankle behind greenery, holding a strategically placed lamb or other imaginative props. Finally, all 11 ladies come together for a Christmassy group toast in December to round off an often frivolous, full-colour but beautifully presented A3-sized calendar.

GALAPAGOS PHOTO COMPETITION WINNER!

Claire Waring from Little Addington has been announced as the overall winner of this year's Galapagos Conservation Trust Photography Competition with her photo of a juvenile great frigatebird attacking a swallow-tailed gull which was defending its chick. The photo also won the 'Animals in Action' category.

Claire explains: "We were on the last day of our wonderful expedition round the Galapagos Islands and had landed on North Seymour for a few hours before catching our plane home. The island is home to great frigatebirds and blue-footed boobies nesting near the path and Galapagos sea lions were basking on the rocks.

"A movement caught my eye and I saw this juvenile great frigatebird attacking a swallow-tailed gull, presumably with a view to taking the chick for a tasty meal. However, the parent was determined to defend the chick. It all happened too quickly for me to photograph it but, fortunately for me (but not the gull), the frigatebird came round for another go and I was able to capture this shot."

The Galapagos Islands are home to some unique wildlife and landscapes. The work of the Trust is vital in maintaining the environment against threats such as overfishing and plastics pollution. It carries out work including clearing islands of invasive species to allow the endemic populations to recover. Claire has supported the Trust since her first visit to Galapagos some 20 years ago.

Photography was a childhood interest when Claire and her father developed her black and white films at home. These were taken on a small folding bellows camera. The bellows had pinprick holes, which made for some interesting images! When Claire married, her husband taught her about macro photography which introduced her to the marvels of the small things in life. She finds the detail revealed in the macro world absolutely fascinating and is always looking for ways to improve her photographs.

In 2005, she won the gold medal for beekeeping photography at Apimondia, the biennial International Beekeeping Congress, followed by the silver medal in 2009. She has been successful in other competitions including the Wanderlust Travel Photo of the Year, the National Geographic Traveller (UK) Photography Competition and the North American Nature Photography Association Showcase.

Over the years, Claire's interests have expanded and her passion for wildlife

photography has grown. She loves visiting wild places to shoot the very special wildlife found there and has been privileged to travel to all seven continents. On her travels she has also become increasingly conscious of the danger that these special places are in. She hopes her photography will bring this message to a wider group of people who will be inspired to take action.




