## **Prince William School achieves** prestigious mental health award

The Oundle school has been hailed a 'shining light' for its mental health support for both students and staff.

Part of East Midlands Academy Trust, Prince William School has received the prestigious LightBulb award from St Andrew's Healthcare for demonstrating its commitment to wellbeing.

The certificate of mental health excellence was after a thorough assessment process

Among its strengths are The Hub, a safe space for pupils struggling with anxiety; Time-Out Cards permitting students a brief respite to regather and refocus: and Pupil Passports, concise one-page profiles detailing a student's areas of need and recommended strategies to support them.

The school was also praised for its school counselling service, staff training, family engagement work and staff wellbeing sessions and activities.

Headteacher Elizabeth Dormor said: "Mental health and wellbeing has never been more important and, as a school, providing that support to both our students and our staff is a key priority.

"I'm delighted that our commitment to positive mental health has been recognised with this certificate of excellence and we can now continue to develop and improve the services available to our young people."

Prince William School is the fourth school within East Midlands Academy Trust to receive the LightBulb award for mental health provision

Cheryl Smith, LightBulb Founder and Headteacher of the St Andrew's Children and Adolescent Mental Health Service (CAMHS) College, said: "There can be many different reasons why a child can start to develop poor mental health. Poverty, parental separation or financial crisis have previously been identified as factors which can impact young people. In recent years, we've battled the pandemic and lockdown, but now we're facing the cost of living crisis which can be equally worrying for children.

"Sometimes there may not even be a contributing factor,



but what is vital is that adults who are responsible for that child are able to spot the signs early and take appropriate action. We firmly believe that prevention is power, which is why we launched LightBulb. as we want to help young people better understand the way their mind works, so they

can reach out and ask for help when they need it.

## **DISCUSSIONS HELD WITH** NATIONAL AUTISTIC SOCIE

Representatives from North Northamptonshire Council (NNC) met with the National Autistic Society on 19th October to discuss the future of support services in the local area.

have agreed to a 6-month extension to the services provided in the area. allowing for all parties to find a more permanent, long-term solution for support services in North Northamptonshire.

This extension will allow NNC to work with service users and their families to identify the most suitable route forward.

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of North Northamptonshire Council, said: "Following a meeting this week with senior

staff from the National Autistic Society. I am pleased that we have been able to reach an agreement where the National Autistic Society will extend the services they provide across North Northamptonshire for 6

"Both organisations remain committed to working together to identify a more permanent, long-term solution for service users.

"Our priority has always been those who use these services and their families and to ensure they are receiving the right care in the appropriate setting. So, I am pleased that we will be working closely with those impacted to identify the most suitable route forward and that the process is a positive and smooth one."

Steven Rose, Managing Director, Adult Services, at the National Autistic Society. said: "We are delighted that we have reached an agreement with North Northamptonshire Council (NNC) to continue to deliver care for the people we support for another six months This means that our Northants

services will not close at the end of this year

"This is excellent news for the continuity of care for all the people we support who use our services. In the coming months we will continue to work with NNC to find a more permanent solution for these services.

"We remain sorry that the people we support, their families and our staff had to go through the process of cancelling contracts and issuing notice to close the services, but sadly we had been left with no choice. We do not underestimate the distress this has caused the people we support and their families. We would like to thank North Northamptonshire Council for working with us to ensure we can continue to provide care in our muchneeded services for the next six

The National Autistic Society delivers services to 25 adults in North Northants, providing residential care, supported living, and living and learning arrangements.

Further updates will be provided in due course.

If you have started your family history, see if you can set it out into a tree so that people can see who was related to whom - that might also trigger memories. You may find that people lived in different towns or villages in addition to where you thought, or you might get an




insight into their schooldays - very different to nowadays! I created a family tree for someone complete with narrative and supporting documents. As he was reading it, he would suddenly look up and say, "Oh – that reminds me of when..." and more stories would follow.

Oh yes – before you meet up, it is also worth asking if there are any old photographs that you could see that they have squirreled away. Then, as you sit over a cup of tea/glass of wine, the pictures will evoke a time gone by and help those recollections take on more meaning. Get talking! And listening!

## Grants of up to £15,000 for rural businesses available

Grants of between £5,000 and £15,000 are now available for rural businesses across North Northamptonshire.

Using monies received from the Rural England Prosperity Fund, North Northamptonshire Council has re-launched a grant scheme to support existing rural businesses, with applications

Following on from Round 1 earlier in 2023. Round 2 applications are invited from projects that can start quickly and be delivered with all spend claimed by 28th February 2024. Capital Grants of between £5,000 and £15,000 are available in Round 2.

The grant scheme is intended to help rural businesses become more resilient and support growth. A particular target for Round 2 is rural diversification, including farm diversification and projects which support the visitor economy. The awarding of capital grants will enable rural businesses to invest

in equipment or building extensions and alterations.

Applications for this funding must be received by 5pm on Friday 24th November.

Cllr David Howes, the council's Executive Member for Rural Communities and Localism, said: "I am pleased that following on from Round 1 earlier in the year, we are now launching a new round of capital grant funding for rural businesses across North Northamptonshire.

"Rural businesses face a unique set of challenges and this grant scheme is designed of help them grow and develop."

Cllr David Brackenbury, the council's Executive Member for Growth and Regeneration, said: "This latest round of funding is designed to help rural businesses become more resilient and support growth, specifically around diversifying businesses. I would urge any rural businesses in North Northants to get in touch, take a read through the criteria and

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "As a council, we are always looking at ways to ensure funds get to those who most need it and these grants will make a real difference. If you are not eligible for funding this time, there will be a further round of funding opening later in 2023."

Interested rural businesses who wish to apply for funding in Round 2 are invited to send a request for an application form. eligibility criteria and guidance notes to ukspf@northnorthants.

Further information on this round of business grants is available on the NNC website.

Rural businesses should also be aware that there will be an additional opportunity to apply for funding in Round 3. This will be for projects that will start in or after April 2024 and can be delivered with all spend claimed by 28th February

Businesses are able to apply to more than one round for different projects.

## Gritting crews ready to respond

North Northamptonshire Council is getting ready for harsher weather conditions as Kier Transportation, the council's highways provider, has its fleet of gritters ready to take on precautionary routes.

Last year the authority invited school pupils and residents to help name the fleet with 'Sir Grit A Lot', 'Grumpy Gritter' and 'Wicky Gritty' being just some of the trucks joining the ranks for the winter season.

The gritting season runs from mid-October to mid-April next year with gritters covering 821 miles (1,841km) of the council's road network on precautionary routes - which is the equivalent of driving from Northamptonshire to Dundee and

In adverse weather conditions, an additional 234 miles would receive a gritting treatment.

The Council has reserves of 4,000 tonnes of salt, with 651 grit bins across the region filled for use on public roads and footpaths.

Cllr Matt Binley, the Council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets, said: "Preparing for winter is an all-year-round task and requires extensive analysis of previous weather conditions to make informed decisions about priority gritting routes. We're working hard to ensure minimal disruption to road-users throughout the autumn/

winter period. After considerable preparation, we are now in a strong position to grit the roads as soon as forecasts predict temperatures to drop.

Enhanced weather forecasting and temperature readings will be taken via weather stations and sensors set out along North Northamptonshire's roads, with updates sent every 15 minutes.

Through route-based forecasting, roads will be treated if the temperatures are forecasted to drop

The gritters are also fitted with advanced GPS technology, which requires only one person to operate the vehicle in clear conditions, by accumulating route data and reporting back to the office to ensure that works are safely delivered.

John Coombes, General Manager at Kier Transportation, calls for drivers to be careful on the roads: "The UK faces increasingly unpredictable weather year-on-year. Even once a road has received a gritting treatment, the salt requires activation from the movement of vehicles – so road users should remain vigilant.

"We are proactively planning for the predicted weather conditions this winter. Our crews are on standby 24/7 during the winter months, as we work to keep road conditions safe and quickly respond to any changing weather conditions.

# BOWLED OVER BY THE "BEAUTIFUL TAPESTRY" THAT IS HIGHAM FERRERS

Higham Ferrers might well be a beautiful medieval market town steeped in history, but there is always something new going on.

Hailed as "one of the gems of Northamptonshire" by Morcea Walker MBE, the Vice Lord-Lieutenant of the County, some of the town's activities are now on show at the Discover Northamptonshire shop at Rushden Lakes, which focuses on regional culture, tourism and heritage.

A new display by Higham Ferrers Tourism, outlining the recent work of local volunteers, has just been unveiled and makes for fascinating viewing.

The showcase display tells how the Tourism Committee has just released a guide to the town's Blue Plaque sites, how it involved children in King Charles' Coronation celebrations and traces activities at the medieval Duchy Barn Garden in the heart of the town.

Two Heritage Forum
Awards are also on display,
one awarded to Higham
Ferrers Tourism and the other
to the Friends of St Mary's,
which is dedicated to the
preservation of the Grade I
Listed buildings in the town.

A mitre headdress on the top shelf is a reminder that the town's most famous son was Henry Chichele, who became Archbishop of Canterbury (1414-1443). Chichele founded the local Chichele College, the Bede House as well as the world-famous All Souls College, Oxford.

Two replica Roman Samian ware bowls, which were personally commissioned by Olwen Mayes, chair of the Higham Ferrers Archaeology and Research Society (HiFars), also take pride of place.

As Olwen explains in the story about the Dragendorff Form 37 Samian bowls, they represent a journey of a lifetime for her.

The project from start to finish took nine years. She says: "I'm so happy and proud to be able to share it with our local community."

She explains that the decoration is based on original decorated sherds uncovered by the Oxford



Archaeology Unit and a local resident at the Roman excavation in Kings Meadow Lane in Higham Ferrers.

"I spent many happy hours researching who might have designed the wonderful decoration... and had the incredible talent to transfer that skill to making the bowl and how it was done."

Inspired by her findings, she travelled to Lezoux in central France, where Gerard Moria was making various styles of Samian pots. Gerard's apprentice, Dr Arnau Trullen Fernandez, drew the decoration into software on his laptop.

Then, earlier this year,
Olwen returned to France
where she commissioned
Arnau to create the replicas.
She was able to film the whole
process of the bowls being
made on the wheel. Now a
talk which will include the
film footage and her personal
experiences about her trip
to Lezoux is being drafted
and information on the date
and venue will appear on the
HiFARS website.

In a quote by the Vice Lord-Lieutenant of Northamptonshire, Morcea Walker, which is on display, she notes: "The presence of its most famous son Henry Chichele, Archbishop of Canterbury and an Advisor to King Henry V... the buildings, shops, sites of interest – including the market square, events all year round – helps to create a beautiful tapestry that is Higham Ferrers. I learn something new every time I go there and that is the joy of this town."

Meanwhile, Sarah Scott, Professor of Archaeology at the School of Archaeology and Ancient History at the University of Leicester, refers to "special people and places revealed through a heritage trail, fascinating connections with continental potters past and present...Compelling stories of curiosity, kindness and collaboration which are having a profound impact on people of all ages... So inspiring!"

Professor Peregrine
Horden of All Souls College,
Oxford, also says he is
always "so impressed by all
the educational work being
done in Chichele College
and the warmth of the local
community."


