# Consultation on Rushden PSPO

North Northamptonshire Council has launched a consultation on a proposed Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) in Rushden town centre.

A PSPO is a power under the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 that allows a council to impose restrictions in particular areas to tackle nuisance or problem behaviour.

The proposed PSPO would cover Rushden town centre and the surrounding area. It has been designed to cover antisocial behaviour hotspots in the town centre and prevent it from moving from the town centre to nearby parks and public spaces.

All feedback will be reviewed and any proposed recommendations for a PSPO will be referred for approval by the Executive.

Consultation and engagement activities can be completed online via the Council's Consultation and Engagement Hub and the consultation will be open until 31st December.

# **£1.23 million funding** for social worker degree apprenticeships announced .....

Members of North Northamptonshire Council's (NNC) Executive are pleased to announce joint funding of social worker degree apprenticeships with West Northamptonshire Council and Northamptonshire Children's Trust.

At a cost of £1.23 million. the project will be led by NNC, and the money will be split three ways, coming from each organisation's Apprenticeship Levy fund.

Up to 55 members of staff could be enrolled onto the Social Worker Integrated Degree Apprenticeship

across Northamptonshire by 2026, with the first 15 apprentices starting training in September 2024.

The scheme offers people already working in social care the chance to embark on a new and rewarding career, make a difference to the lives of local children, and in the

longer term helps to retain employees within the county. The Council will aim to

open bid opportunities in time to award a contract in February 2024.

## GENEALOGY JOTTINGS

When searching for ancestors on the internet, you don't always have to go to the large commercial websites such as Ancestry and FindMyPast. Sometimes, it can be worthwhile just putting an ancestor's name into your computer search engine and see what pops up. However, beware of John Smith! I have a few of those and so also add their place of birth into the search bar! It helps if they have less common names.

One of mine was named Happy Sabina Bailey. If you put that name into a search engine with quote marks at the beginning and end of the name, she will pop up. Oh yes – if you don't put " at the beginning and end of the name, you will find lots of people called Sabina Bailey who are happy...

This reminds me – are you aware of the different commands that you can use? I have mentioned "" which makes Google search for examples with all those words together. The tilde sign (~) results in searches that include

synonyms so ~genealogy will not only bring up genealogy sites but also those with ancestry, family tree etc in their name. But a really useful one to use is asterisk (\*). If you are not sure of a spelling, such as Stewart or Steward, pop the search in as 'Stewar\*'. As spelling did not settle down until as late as the beginning of the 20th century, many people wrote what they heard. Actually, some still do - and spell check has a lot to answer for! I usually look for my maiden name of Milsted under 'Mil\*sted' and 'Milste\*d', so as to cover Millsted as well as Milstead. The thing to remember, though, is to stay focussed on what you were originally looking for. I have lost count of the number of times that I have ended up down a rabbit hole whilst following an interesting lead... Have a rummage – and good luck!

# Where to find 'Warm Spaces' in communities across North Northamptonshire

Heated, warm and welcoming public spaces are now open across North Northamptonshire and will remain so throughout the winter months.

North Northamptonshire Council recognises that it will be unaffordable for many residents to heat their homes for as long as they would do normally. That's why they are both running and supporting what is termed the Warm Spaces initiative.

Warm Spaces provide somewhere a person who needs to get warm can go to, for free, to enjoy warmth, have a hot drink and socialise if they choose to.

This year a total of 50 community organisations, volunteer groups and public bodies have opened their doors, to give their time, and share their resources with local residents to provide a safe, warm and welcome space. There are 12 in Wellingborough, 17 in Kettering, 14 in East Northants and 7 in Corby.

The council has added a map of Warm Spaces across North Northamptonshire to its website but needs your help in spreading the message. If you know someone who you think might benefit, but doesn't have access to the internet, please let them know about their nearby Warm Spaces.

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of

North Northamptonshire Council, said: "Supporting our communities is always our priority and that is why, during this cost of living crisis, we are taking urgent, and tangible action to ensure that our residents are supported.

"Residents can attend for activities at these locations without any need to discuss their personal circumstances, which will help reduce the stigma that often exists around poverty and asking for support.

"When people enter a warm space they do so with a guarantee they will be treated with respect and dignity, without judgement and in confidence."

Councillor Helen Harrison, Executive Member for Adults, Health and Wellbeing, said: "We have been delighted with the keen response we have had from our partners to continue and grow the Warm Space network for the winter ahead.

"This winter will be a difficult time for many, both in terms of physical health and mental health, which is why both North Northamptonshire Libraries and Community Libraries are being supported to signpost residents to Public Health's free health and wellbeing services. Health and wellbeing advisors will also be on hand at many of the library Warm Space sessions."



We're all at it, aren't we? Despite saying we never would...

Here's what I picture: you're sitting on the sofa with a machine in front of you. You're cricking your neck into strange positions and your arm is aching because you're holding your phone out in front of you. You're trying to concentrate on what the person on the video call is saying, but you're in pain and getting a bit grumpy about it.

In the back of your mind there's a niggling frustration that some people seem to do video calls all the time with no pain.

But video calls are here to stay, so how do you deal with them without injuring yourself?

Here are some tips, either for you, or for someone you know who only shows their chin or ear in the video calls:

• Buy a selfie stick. I know, I know, you've always scorned selfie sticks, but for a small amount of money you can stop the arm ache. All you

- do is put the phone on the stick and open the tripod legs. Then you can sit back and chat while the stick supports your phone.
- Rest your arm on something. The longer you hold it up in front of you, the more you'll hurt your shoulder and arm.
- After a call you'll probably find your head poking forwards and your shoulders hunching slightly. When this happens roll your shoulders backwards to help you get to a more upright position – it really works. Try it now and see!
- If you're starting to ache a bit during the call, have a wriggle in your seat. Or get up and MOVE.
- Remember, the selfie stick will make the most difference. Go and buy one, and USE it.

And no, it is not safe to use a selfie stick when pushing the lawnmower. Don't try it! Have comfortable week!

# NEW TAILORED TOILET FACILITIES AT TOURIST HOTSPOTS

Adults and children of all ages with profound and multiple learning disabilities and/or physical disabilities now have more choice when deciding which local nature reserves and country parks to visit.

North Northamptonshire Council has opened brand-new, fully accessible 'Changing Places Toilet' facilities at Stanwick Lakes and Barnwell Country Park. Everyone, regardless of their access needs or disability or reliance on the assistance of carers or specialist equipment, can use these toilet facilities with dignity and hygienically.

The 'Changing Places Toilets' are part of the government led initiative, designed to provide widespread accessibility and inclusivity. Unlike standard accessible toilets, 'Changing Places Toilets' also meet the requirements of people with a range of needs such as spinal injuries, muscle-wasting conditions and multiple sclerosis.

Each Changing Places Toilet provides: **The right equipment** 

- A powered height adjustable adult-sized changing bench
- A movable tracking ceiling hoist system

#### **Enough space**

 Adequate space in the changing area for the disabled person and up to two carers

- A centrally placed toilet with space either side for wheelchairs.
- A screen to allow for privacy
- A safe and clean environment
- A paper couch roll to cover the bench
- A large waste bin for disposable pads
- A non-slip floor

They also have features including a height adjustable sink, grab rails and alarms. Once installed, the Changing Places

Toilets are registered and approved by Muscular Dystrophy UK (MDUK) and added onto the national website to help people locate them and plan their visits.

A total of eight facilities across North Northants will be funded from £497,000 from the Council's Capital Programme, which includes a £330,000 contribution from the Department of Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC).

Other locations in North Northamptonshire with Changing Places facilities already in use are The Corby Cube, East Carlton Park, Rushden Lakes, Wicksteed Park, Waendel Leisure Centre and Corby Swimming Pool.

Further construction works to add more to the network at Irchester Country Park and Wellingborough Library is now underway. 

# North Northamptonshire Council commits further funding to developing Isham bypass plans

Preparation of plans for the A509 Isham bypass have taken a step forward after a decision by North Northamptonshire Council to commit further funding to the outline business case.

The decision was taken by Council Leader, ClIr Jason Smithers as an urgent decision, in accordance with the Council's decision-making rules, to ensure the project was not delayed. It will see the Council use an additional £790,000 of capital money to update traffic modelling for the outline business case for the scheme as well as for progressing work on obtaining planning permission.

Final approval to use the funds in this way will be sought at a meeting of Full Council on 7th December.

Funding for construction is currently being sought from the Government's Major Road Network initiative, which follows a number of key gateway stages:

- Strategic Outline Business Case
- Outline Business Case
- Full Business Case
- Construction

Cllr Matt Binley, the Council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets said: "The Isham Bypass is part of the Major Road Network and this scheme is a muchneeded project for the region.

"So we can progress the outline business case and planning application we have to provide additional information. We need to progress this as quickly as we can so it's essential that we allocate the money to make it happen."

The A509 Isham Bypass forms the first part of a strategy to dual the whole A509 between the A14 south of Kettering and the A45 at Wellingborough.

The Strategic Outline Business Case was prepared and submitted to the Department for Transport in November 2020.

As reported to Executive in November 2021, the Council secured £1.859m from

the Department for Transport (DfT) towards the development of the Outline Business Case (OBC) and planning application for the scheme.

It subsequently became clear that the work to prepare the Outline Business Case and planning application was more extensive than previously thought, so in March 2023 Full Council agreed additional funding of £1.573m.

The DfT has now requested that the traffic modelling for the scheme is updated to reflect the latest version of the National Trip End Model – a database maintained by the DfT that is used to estimate the future growth in travel.

This requires sections of both the Outline Business Case and planning application to be updated, causing a delay in the timescale for submission of the planning application and Outline Business Case to May 2024, and at additional cost.

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "We welcome the recent confirmation from the Government that the construction of the Isham bypass will be fully funded by the Department for Transport.

"In order to secure the funding, the Council needs to obtain planning permission and submit the necessary business cases to the Department for Transport. We're committed to this scheme, which is a top priority for the council as the route would not only help boost the local economy, enabling growth of both our housing and commercial sectors but also alleviate traffic pressures and air quality in the village of Isham, for whom this has been a long campaign.

"It's important that we do everything we can to progress it as quickly as possible."



# **TREE TO MARK THE KING'S CORONATION** PLANTED IN CORBY

The Lord-Lieutenant of Northamptonshire and representatives from North Northamptonshire Council, local volunteers and pupils from Studfall Junior School have come together to celebrate and plant an official Coronation tree in Hazel and Thoroughsale Woods.

The planting coincided with National Tree Week and Hazel and Thoroughsale Woods was chosen by NNC as the location for the official tree in North Northants because of its history – both in age and royal connections.

The woods are a 75ha complex of Ancient Woodland, woodland, scrub and grassland located in the centre of Corby and surrounded completely by built development including Corby town centre and the Corby Parkland Gateway civic quarter. It is estimated to date back to around 800AD and the woodland is largely composed of ash and oak trees, although conifers are also present.

In 2022, the woods were chosen to be part of a nationwide network of 70 Ancient Woodlands to be dedicated to the late Queen Elizabeth II in celebration of her Platinum Jubilee and this royal connection now continues, with the planting of the new tree.

The Lord-Lieutenant, James Saunders Watson said: "I am extremely grateful to the Queen's Green Canopy team who have

donated the funds for this oak tree and the accompanying plaque to mark the coronation of His Majesty King Charles III. It is a great honour to plant this important oak in Hazel and Thoroughsale Woods, which had the honour of being one of the large areas of woodland dedicated to Her Late Majesty to mark her Platinum Jubilee."

Cllr Harriet Pentland, the council's Executive Member for Climate and Green Environment, said: "It was an honour to assist the Lord-Lieutenant in the planting of this very important tree in Hazel and Thoroughsale woods to commemorate His Majesty's coronation. As well as the history the tree symbolises, it is part of an extensive tree planting scheme North Northamptonshire Council undertakes and every single tree planted helps make a positive difference to our natural environment."

This woodland is actively managed by NNC through the Woodland Project with support from the Friends of Thoroughsale and Hazel Woods. Much of the practical management work is undertaken by the Woodland Manager, two Parks and Woodland Rangers and regular volunteers.

There are six Friends Of groups in Corby with the Friends Of Hazel and Thoroughsale being the largest group, offering daily activities throughout the week for volunteers.

# Future plans for North Northamptonshire recycling centres **discussed by Executive**

Plans for the future running of North Northamptonshire Council's household waste recycling centres (HWRCs) have been discussed by the authority's Executive.

The Council currently runs four HWRCs: Corby, Kettering, Rushden and Wellingborough, which are operated on a legacy former county council contract due to expire in March 2025.

Recommendations before Executive were to start the procurement of a contract to run all four of the HWRCs from April 2025 for up to a period of 15 years.

The approach is the most cost-effective solution, which provides a continuation of a muchneeded service to residents.

Cllr Matt Binley, North Northamptonshire Council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets, said: "Our HWRCs are greatly valued by our residents and what we're proposing offers a great medium to long-term provision, which also is the most cost-effective for the tax-payer. "This will be the first time that the contract is up for renewal since the formation of our Council, so this is a great opportunity for us to move forward with securing a contract that is fit for purpose."

The council has undertaken an analysis of its current service to better understand the future needs of HWRC's and the outcomes of this will form the development of a longer-term strategy to improve the current services across the area and will be consulted upon next year.

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "Our HWRCs play an important role in helping our residents manage the waste they produce as well as helping to boost recycling. I'm delighted that we're looking to continue to serve our main population centres in North Northants."




