Call for patient transport drivers

A publicity campaign aimed at recruiting volunteers from all age groups as patient transport drivers has been launched across North Northamptonshire.

Volunteers aged 18-80 are sought. They must hold a full driving licence and have the use of their own car. Volunteers are asked to make a regular commitment to the role, which is flexible. They can offer as many as 39 hours a week or as little as one hour.

A DBS check will be required and paid for, and training will be given. For volunteers who are already qualified to drive a minibus, a Cat D Minibus licence will be required. Volunteers will be paid 45p in expenses for every mile driven for the scheme.

It certainly made me think how lucky I have been compared with my ancestors. I have a couple who died from pneumonia and l certainly know first-hand the suffering that they experienced.

My great grandfather, John Smith, was a farm labourer. I have mentioned him before as being a ringleader of the North Essex Agricultural Labourers' Strike of 1914. As well as being a horse-keeper on the farm, he also spent time working the fields. One day, he was scything, lost concentration and managed to scythe through his boot and his big toe. Ouch! What did he do? He tore off a piece of his shirt, wrapped it round his foot and carried on working. No anti-tetanus shots in those days – another one introduced in the 1950s, which seems to have been a highlight decade for medicine. Oh yes, he was known as 'Toe-Rag' Smith after that!



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ENGAGEMENT LAUNCHED ON RAPID ELECTRIC CHARGING POINTS

A survey has been launched on potential locations for rapid on-street charging points in six towns across North Northamptonshire.

Seven sites are being considered in Burton Latimer, Corby, Kettering, Raunds, Thrapston and Wellingborough. The potential sites would have rapid chargers, meaning users could charge their electric vehicle to 80% in 20-40 minutes depending on the model's battery capacity and starting state of charge.

Properties near the proposed sites will receive a letter with more detail and how to complete the survey. The letter will be from Believ, who are running the project working with North Northamptonshire Council and the project is privately funded.

Cllr Matt Binley, the council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets, said: "With a rise in users of electric vehicles, it is important that we continue to look at charging points in locations that are easy for residents to access and use.

"These proposed locations are close to local facilities which is why rapid chargers have been chosen - meaning more drivers can make use of the points and charge their electric vehicle guicker.

"As with previous sites identified, those currently being looked at have been selected following detailed analysis and recommendations."

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "More and more people are turning to electric vehicles for their environmental benefits and it is important that we reflect this by improving the



number of charging points across the area.

"As we look to be more carbon neutral in all we do, having the right infrastructure in place is a key priority for us and we are always trying to find ways to make it easier for residents to access an electric vehicle charging point.

"But we also listen to residents and businesses and want to make sure points are where they are needed and will be used, which will hopefully in turn encourage more residents to consider an electric vehicle as a more sustainable mode of transport. I would encourage people to have their say and complete the survey."

All feedback will be reviewed by NNC and before installation can go ahead, residents and businesses will have a further opportunity to comment on the designation and operation of the bays through the Traffic Regulation Order process.



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date of wellingborough **BY-ELECTION ANNOUNCED**

The by-election for the parliamentary constituency of Wellingborough will take place on 15th February following the result of the recall petition in December.

Residents living in the Wellingborough constituency, who are registered to vote, will start to receive their poll cards around 19th January.

The poll cards include information on how to arrange a postal or proxy vote for those who cannot make it to their polling station on 15th February.

The deadline for eligible residents who are not registered to vote, but wish to vote in the Wellingborough constituency byelection is 30th January and information about how to register to vote is on the North Northamptonshire Council website.

Photo ID to vote

Following new legislation introduced in May 2023, all residents voting in person must remember to bring a form of photo ID with them.

Accepted forms of ID include a current or expired UK passport or photo card driving licence, including a provisional one. Expired IDs are acceptable, as long as the photo still bears a true resemblance. Only original documents are

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accepted, photos of your ID, copies of digital versions or digital versions saved on phones and smart devices will not be accepted.

The list of all forms of approved photo ID is shown on the poll cards. Further details are also available on the Elections pages of the NNC website.

If you don't have any form of photo ID from the accepted list, or your ID no longer looks like you, you can apply for a Voter Authority Certificate. Applicants must already be registered to vote. The deadline to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate for the up-coming by-election is 5pm on 7th February.

You can apply online for a Voter Authority Certificate via the Government website.

The county's leading independent grant-making charity has started the year with the announcement of new funds and new challenges.

Northamptonshire Community Foundation has also announced that over £1.8 million has already been awarded to groups across Northamptonshire since April 2023, and it is on target to award at least £2.5 million by April this year in grants to small, local charities, volunteer-led organisations and community groups.

Rachel McGrath, CEO of Northamptonshire Community Foundation, said: "Our exciting 2024 plans starts with the launch of our new Corporate Giving Network, which will enable local businesses to collaborate in supporting vital projects across the county.

PUBLIC SPACE PROTECTION ORDER FOR RUSHDEN RECOMMENDED FOR INTRODUCTION

North Northamptonshire Council's Executive was asked to approve the introduction of measures to tackle anti-social behaviour in Rushden town centre at a meeting held at Corby Cube on 18th January. Following a consultation in

late 2023, a report recommends that a new Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) is brought in. Of those who completed the consultation, 84% agreed or strongly agreed with a PSPO being introduced in Rushden.

A PSPO is a power under the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 that allows a council to impose restrictions in particular areas to tackle nuisance or problem behaviour. For this PSPO, it would include areas such as alcohol consumption, rowdy or inconsiderate behaviour and begging.

It would cover Rushden town centre and the surrounding area and has been designed to cover antisocial behaviour hotspots in the town centre, preventing it from moving from the town centre to nearby parks and public spaces.

If the PSPO is approved for introduction, NNC will work with the Police to make sure people are aware of the order and the area it covers, so it is clear which behaviours and activities are not allowed in the area and individuals who carry on committing anti-social behaviour could be fined through a Fixed Penalty Notice.

extending to other areas of the town centre. "PSPOs are widely regarded as useful tools in the prevention

of anti-social behaviour in public


spaces, including town centres.

"If approved, this new PSPO will give authorised officers the ability to use enforcement powers to respond to anti-social behaviour within Rushden town centre, which in serious cases could result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued."

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "In 2023, I met, alongside council officers, with the Police and Fire Crime Commissioner, Northants Police and Rushden Town Council to look at problems with anti-social behaviour.

"It was agreed that that the possibility of creating a PSPO for the town centre would be looked at, as part of our commitment to make communities across North Northants safer.

"Following a public consultation, I am pleased we are now in a position to discuss the proposed PSPO further and, hopefully, introduce it as soon as possible."
