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## NEWS IN BRIEF

### Kettering Library roof project

Following Council approval, a project to replace the 120-year-old roof on the heritage Grade II listed Kettering library building has now entered the 'delivery' phase.

At the December meeting of North Northamptonshire Council's Full Council, Members agreed to the funding allocation. Since then council officers have been working behind the scenes on the next steps to ensure the project runs smoothly and Cornerstone is able to fully open as soon as possible.

Residents may see preparation work and surveys starting on site, ahead of scaffolding and the tenting of the existing roof. Scaffolding will not proceed until the council has gone through a full procurement exercise, obtained the necessary approvals from Natural England of bat mitigation works and Historic England/ NNC approval for the plans.

Whilst the roof repair works are undertaken, the library has temporarily relocated into the upper floor of the modern extension of Cornerstone, adjacent to the existing library. NNC will keep under review moving the library services back into its permanent home to allow Cornerstone to open in full.

# NEW APP BRINGS PET CARE DIRECT TO YOUR HOME

Pet owners nationwide are being urged to download a new mobile app – called zumi – to help bring professional pet care into the comfort of your own home.

The free-to-download app is aimed at relieving stress for pets and owners, who can call on qualified Registered Veterinary Nurses (RVNs) to visit pets and carry out a huge variety of pet services including: drop-in visits, 1-1 muzzle training and XL Bully support, nail clipping, teeth brushing, pet arthritis management, weight control, help with animal behaviour, pet sitting, dog walking and end of life guidance and care, among many others.

Veterinary nurse Hannah Shepherd, who has worked in veterinary practice for 35 years, has developed and now launched zumi, to help provide

the best professional at-home care for pets.

Hannah, from Kettering, said: "I am thrilled at the response to zumi so far with more than 500 vet nurses having already downloaded the app in the first few weeks. I am now urging pet owners and RVNs across the country to download and use zumi to help change pet care for the better, together.

"Vet nurses are worth their weight in gold with a wealth of knowledge to share. The skills and experience they have working with animals in veterinary practices works brilliantly when taken into people's homes.

"Through zumi I am hoping that our community

of vet nurses can help more pet owners in our local neighbourhoods to guide them through their best pet care options, and also better identify any pets needing veterinary attention.


"Veterinary nurses can help care for pets in their own home after operations, for example, offering guidance and options to lessen stress for pets and owners. They can also carry out non-clinical services such as nutritional advice, pet physiotherapy, rehoming guidance, and pet bereavement, which frees up valuable time and resources for vet practices.

"This service is not to be used instead of going to the vets. We are working together by having vet nurses out in the community.

"We are experiencing an animal welfare crisis, largely because of the increase in the cost of living, a lot of medical pet issues are being left unseen which could be picked up by vet nurses when they visit people's homes."

zumi has been launched nationally and already hundreds of vet nurses from the south of England to Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland have joined the app, which is now available for pet owners to download to find their local vet nurse.

The app is free to download on iOS and Android and easy for everyone to use. Pet owners can create profiles for their pets including uploading photos and even writing a bio about their pets. They can click on a map on the app and search for a qualified and reliable vet nurse in their local area, use the in-app calendar to book an appointment with their local RVN, and even send a personal message to the vet nurse with any further questions or details.

Veterinary Surgeon, Dr Matt Flavell, Practice Principal and Lead Vet at The Kettering Vets in Barton Seagrave, said: "I think the zumi app is a

great idea. Having RVNs out in the community helping our pet owners and encouraging proactive healthcare is wonderful."

Deborah Simpson, from Burton Latimer, loves the zumi app and what it brings. She said: "I think zumi is a great idea. I'm not very tech savvy, but it was easy to set up a profile and click on the map to find local vets nurses.

"Having Hannah come to my house to look after my budgie and two guinea pigs has been a godsend. She not only clips their claws and gives the piggies a haircut, but she really cares about my little ones and is always there for advice."

Hannah has worked in veterinary practices in Kettering and London and alongside her practice work, she has been visiting pets in their homes for the past three years, where she quickly discovered the benefits of having vet nurses out and about, working together with local veterinary practices to support and promote animal health and welfare.

Whilst carrying out non-clinical care in pets' homes, Hannah regularly picks up on issues that need checking by a vet including skin complaints, mobility and dental issues, and directs them back to their own veterinary practices.

This led Hannah to explore the possibility of creating an app, accessible for everyone,




connecting pet owners with veterinary nurses. And so, after three years of development, zumi was born. The name zumi comes from zoomies, where dogs, such as Hannah's rescue terrier-cross Loula, race around excitedly in circles!

As well as being a mum to three grown-up children, Hannah is a pet parent to 13-year-old rescue dog Loula, rescue cat Toast, and Stinky the rescue Stinkpot turtle. With 34 million pets in the UK and more than 19,000 RVNs, Hannah hopes that zumi will help connect them all.

All RVNs are bound by the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons Code of Professional Conduct, and the zumi app, being a non-clinical service, is not intended to replace any veterinary surgeon's advice.

What sort of books do you have at home?

Mine are related to genealogy in some way or another. Mind you, even my collection of Agatha Christie books involves detective work, which is not a million miles away from the type of research that is involved in tracking down your family history!

One of the best reference books that I have is a copy of Ancestral Trails by Mark Herber. Published in association with the Society of Genealogists, this weighty tome will guide you through what to look for and point you in the direction of finding it. There is a copy to be seen in the reference section of Oundle Library and it is certainly worth a peek, the next time that you visit.

As well as books, I also have reference CDs adorning my bookshelves. These range from copies of Parish Registers to historical directories of where my family used to live, and even Tithe Maps of the areas. Okay, I know that they might be looked on now as a bit "old hat"

but they still work and the information has not changed. Not everything is on the interwebby! For Northamptonshire ancestors, have a look at <http://www.northants-fhs.org/> – there are lots of publications to put on your wish-lists!

When I started researching my family history, it involved a lot of footwork – travelling all over the place to research in Record Offices and County Archives. There was none of this internet malarkey. However, these days, the list of websites that hold genealogical information seems endless. With some, you have to pay for subscriptions, such as Ancestry and Find My Past, but many are free. However, visiting your local Library again, and using their computers, will enable you to use some of the subscription website for free (I like the word 'free'!).

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

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# KEY FINDINGS FROM SURVEY

In Autumn 2023, Northamptonshire Children's Trust conducted a survey seeking residents' views on a proposed new way of delivering activities and respite (short breaks) for disabled children in Northamptonshire. It was important that we gave as many people the opportunity to feedback via an electronic survey and through face-to-face sessions.

Conducted throughout October and November, the survey received an overwhelming response, with 150 individuals contributing their valuable insights and a further 134 attending the various workshops. We want to thank all those who took part and are immensely grateful for the enthusiastic participation of our community. These responses have proven instrumental in addressing key issues that currently exist.

Key Findings include:

- The idea of a single referral pathway is beneficial to help avoid families having to tell their stories repeatedly.
- Any assessment that is already in place should be used for access to the short breaks services. Some

respondents did want to keep self-referrals.

- Respondents agreed with the principle of reallocating funding, however, they did not agree with closing the residential short breaks unit one day a week.
- That daytime activities preferred included swimming, activities involving animals, cooking or musical activities.
- The need for better links with activities already taking place in communities and support for children and young people to access them.
- The need for 1:1 or 2:1 staffing, followed by secure environments and small groups to access services.
- The Sleep Service should not be added to the short breaks group of services.
- Sensory Impairment services should not be

added to the short breaks group of services.

- Adding personal care and support services to the short breaks group of services would be positive.
- That, in general, respondents agreed with some parts of the proposals but not all.

The survey covered a broad spectrum of topics allowing us to review the entire provision and receive appropriate feedback. Thanks to this, a new model of short breaks and respite will be implemented; this will consist of:

- A single referral route into the short breaks services.
- Existing assessments being used to access the short breaks services and allowing parents to self-refer.
- Residential short breaks unit reducing the bed

capacity rather than closing one night a week; analysis shows this will still enable the need to be met.

- The Sleep Service (and budget) will not be included in the Short Breaks group of services.
- The Sensory Impairment services will not be included in the short breaks group of service
- Consideration of adding PCaS services during the 2nd year of the contract after modelling the viability of this.

The next steps of the process are:

- Commissioning the new services to be in place by November 2024.
- Complete a whole service review of the Sleep Service and agree a joint plan to reduce the waiting list.
- Ensure the transition from the current services to



the new services are as smooth as possible to avoid any negative impact on children, young people and their families.

Today Calvert Lakes provides adventure breaks and holidays for people with disabilities. A not-for-profit based in the Lake District, they help children and adults with a range of disabilities overcome challenges and experience the benefit of the great outdoors.

From their specialist residential centre on the

outskirts of Keswick, they offer individuals, families and school groups the chance to experience everything the Lake District has to offer in a safe and supportive way.

At Calvert Lakes, they see the person, not the disability. Their highly-trained staff use their experience and empathy to break down barriers and truly connect with people, creating a fun, inclusive environment that gives them the confidence to try new things. Their breaks include everything their visitors need, including food, drink, accommodation and equipment. While the expert team carefully adapts the range of outdoor activities around the individual.

Their goal is to help more and more disabled people access the benefits of outdoor activity. By building on the committed support of their team, trustees and funders, they will continue to create connections and friendships and become a beacon at the

heart of the community.

Each year the Rushden Clubs organise two disabled young people to visit the Lake District Calvert Trust to enjoy the outdoor challenges.

## Artists present climate installation in local church

Pale Blue Dot Collective (artists Louise Beer and John Hooper) have spent the last four months in residency with Fermynwoods Contemporary Art, to create an immersive photographic and sound based installation that will be installed in All Saints Church, Aldwinckle from Sunday 24th March until Sunday 7th April 2024.

The artists use installation, film, photography and sound to examine our place within the universe, framing the impact of the climate emergency through the eyes of evolution and the immense time period it has taken for each form of life to arrive at this point.

The work, funded by Northamptonshire Community Foundation's Creative Climate Action Fund, combines images, sound and light to transport the viewer to an imagined forest environment. With the artists' interest in the deep time nature of our existence on the planet, they have developed an installation that explores both the fragility and the miraculous nature of Earth.

Sound recordings from Fermyn Woods, made with a variety of homemade and professional microphones, are combined with their own archive of field recordings collected from around the world. The final composition transports the audience to a forest outside of our experience. Images taken under moonlight during their residency are installed in the central body of the church, juxtaposed with astronomical imagery that prompts us to consider our own place in the wider cosmos.

Followed by a talk from local author, Kathryn Baird.



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## TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT MEASURES TO BE INTRODUCED ON GEORGE STREET, CORBY

From early March, enforcement measures will be introduced to deter drivers from using a section of George Street in Corby as a cut-through.

Following a consultation in late 2023, the traffic regulation order (TRO) will be replaced with one that will enable North Northamptonshire Council to enforce vehicle access restrictions, using automatic number plate recognition cameras (ANPR).

It is hoped that the move will improve safety for pedestrians crossing the road by allowing only taxis, buses and cyclists to enter the main crossing section between the hours of 8am-6pm, Monday to Saturday. These works will significantly improve the accessibility and mobility for pedestrians and cyclists moving between the town centre retail area and the leisure quarter, as well as improve the attractiveness of the public realm and reduce noise from road vehicles. It will encourage more independent movement and provide safety for shoppers on this section of George Street during busy times.

Anyone found to be breaching the order would face a fine of £70 (reduced to £35 if paid within 21 days). There will be a grace period in place for the next six months, in which anyone driving through the section of George Street will receive a warning letter but not be fined, on the first occasion only. If they continue to flout the rules, a fine will be issued. Once the six-month grace period has finished, anyone not permitted

to drive through the section will receive a letter and fine.

Cllr Matt Binley, the council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets, said: "We have had comments and concerns from residents about the safety of this particular stretch of road for pedestrians. Following this feedback, earlier in the year, Executive agreed to replacing the current TRO with one that would allow enforcement of vehicle access restrictions. This was followed up by a public consultation and measures will now be introduced from March.

"The introduction of enforcement measures is always a last resort, but we hope that by amending the TRO and using ANPR will help reduce the number of vehicles using George Street, making a significant improvement to the area."

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "Although we are introducing enforcement measures on this stretch of George Street, for the next six months there will be a grace period, with anyone driving unpermitted receiving a warning letter, which will give drivers time to adjust to the change.

"I would also like to mention that buses, taxis, private hire and cyclists will still be able access the section, so pedestrians should still be aware when using the crossing."

An exact go live date for the traffic enforcement measures will be published on NNC's channels in late February/early March.

After the litter pick volunteers will return to base to record everything recovered in the free Planet Patrol app.

Planet Patrol founder, Lizzie Carr MBE, said: "By combining people power with data collection we can build evidence about litter pollution on a mass scale that would otherwise be impossible to capture.

"We want to break the cycle by holding the offending brands to account and we can

only do that through robust evidence – which is what these clean up sessions help provide."

There will be further clean ups taking place, on paddleboards and yoga sessions in various locations across the UK.

## Your Health – Chairs

We often get asked what chair you should buy, particularly now when more of us are working from home and more employers are trying to make sure office chairs are comfortable.

What we normally see in the clinic is someone comes for treatment with back, shoulder, wrist or neck pain. They've had no accident or obvious trauma, and they say they have bad posture and a bad chair.

The posture part we'll come to another day, but one thing is very clear to me, and I need you to pay attention to this: you cannot rely on a 'good' chair to stop your pain.

The problem is that we are not designed to sit for hours on end. Our bodies want to move around. They want to walk, run, play and pootle. Some of them even want to walk up and down gardens pushing a lawnmower (personally I'd rather run a marathon in a daffodil costume while carrying three angry crocodiles on my back).

But, most of us do have to sit for part of the day. When we sit for long periods of time our postural muscles fatigue. And then we slouch in the chair. This is the time when a good chair is important: when you're tired of sitting still, but you're not prepared to get up and move. A good chair will support you when your

postural muscles have had enough.

You need a chair that is comfortable, the right height, adjustable and with short arm rests.

In my experience gym balls, knee chairs and other strange posture gadgets have their place, but none of them will support you when you're tired. If you're starting to fade then move to a proper chair.

Of course, the best thing to do is take a rest or Movement Snack. Get up, move around and then get back to work.

Top tip: a Movement Snack can be something as simple as rolling your shoulders around or standing up to wriggle a bit.

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# Nene Valley News RECIPES

If you're looking for meat free alternatives, these heartwarming vegan recipes from Denby are perfect for family and friends to enjoy.

**> VEGAN BEAN STEW**  
Serves 4 – Ready in approx 60 minutes

**INGREDIENTS:**

- 4 tbsp olive oil
- 2 onions, chopped
- 3 tbsp chilli paste
- 2 tins chopped tomatoes
- 4 garlic cloves, crushed
- 1 leek, cut into chunks
- 2 stock cubes
- 1 can butter beans
- 1 can pinto beans
- 1 can cannellini beans
- 1 tbsp balsamic vinegar
- 1 tsp salt
- 3 fresh rosemary stems
- 1 tbsp lemon juice
- 400ml water
- 2 peppers
- 1 green chilli

**METHOD:** Add 4 tablespoons of olive oil into the casserole dish and fry the onions over a low heat until soft. Stir in the chilli paste and cook for 1 minute.

Add in the remaining ingredients, give it a good stir. Bring to a boil, then cover with a lid and cook over low heat for around 45-60 minutes

Serve with rice, potatoes or on its own.

**> VEGAN SWEET POTATO AND BEAN CASSOULET**

A warming sweet potato and bean dish using vegan sausages by food blogger @imserenalee.

Serves 4 – Ready in approx 1 hour

**INGREDIENTS:**

- 1 sweet potato
- 3 small carrots
- 5 large cavolo nero leaves – de-stemmed
- 3 tins of organic cannellini beans
- 15 cherry tomatoes
- 2 onions
- 4 cloves of garlic
- 100ml red wine
- 1 stock cube
- 3 tablespoons of cooking olive oil
- 6 vegan sausages (we used Meatless Farm)
- 2 bay leaves
- 5 sprigs of oregano
- 1 stick of celery

**METHOD:**

Pour the olive oil into a large pan – we used the Denby Cast Iron Shallow Casserole. Let the oil warm up on a medium heat.

Add chopped onions and fry until they darken. Just before they get to this stage, add the sausages. Both the sausages and onions should be brown.

Remove sausages and put aside. Add garlic, chopped celery, chopped cavolo nero and let cook for a few minutes, stirring regularly.

Cut the tomatoes, splitting them, and add to pan. Press them while stirring, releasing juices. Continually stir.

Add the wine, chopped sweet potato, and chopped carrots and continue to mix. Don't let the mixture dry out. If it does, add a splash of water.

A few minutes later, add beans with the liquid from the tins. Add stock and salt.

Add bay leaves and oregano; the dish should have a sweet smell of wine. If not apparent, add more wine. Add boiling water to cover the ingredients in the pan. Cover and let it cook on a medium-high heat for 30-40 minutes, or until carrots are tender. Let some of the water boil off and evaporate.

You don't want a watery soup, but more of a stew-type consistency. If the water level is too high, remove some with a spoon. Once ready, add sausages from earlier, and serve alongside roasted vegetables, grains and a good loaf of bread.

**> CHICKPEA CURRY WITH ROASTED BUTTERNUT SQUASH**  
Serves 4-6

**INGREDIENTS: CURRY**

- 3 jars of butter curry sauce
- 2 medium onions, thinly sliced, plus extra for serving
- 1 small red pepper, thinly sliced
- 1 small red chilli, thinly sliced
- 3 x 400g cans of chickpeas
- 1 large butternut squash
- 1 teaspoon of chilli flakes
- A splash of extra virgin olive oil
- Freshly ground black pepper and salt to taste
- A good handful of fresh coriander leaves, chopped
- 1 pilau rice pouch, cook as

per packet instructions  
1 basmati rice pouch, cook as per packet instructions  
2 naan breads of your choice, cook as per packet instructions.

**INGREDIENTS: TOMATO SALAD**

A selection of seasonal cherry tomatoes, halved  
1 small red onion, finely sliced  
1 lime, halved and juiced  
A small handful of fresh coriander leaves, chopped  
A good splash of extra virgin olive oil  
Freshly ground black pepper and salt to taste

**METHOD CURRY:**

Heat the oven to 400°F / 200°C and prepare a Denby oval casserole dish with a splash of olive oil. Cut both ends of the butternut squash, remove the skin and cut lengthways. Scoop out the seeds with a spoon and cut into equal sized chunky pieces about 1.5cm thick.

Pop in a large Denby roasting tray, with a good glug of olive oil, chilli flakes, salt and pepper. Place in the oven for 25 to 30 minutes until softened and just starting to brown.

Whilst it's cooking, prep your curry. Place the Denby oval casserole dish over a medium heat on the hob and cook the chopped onions, red pepper and red chilli. Stir for a few minutes until nicely softened. Add the curry sauce and cook for 3 to 5 minutes. Bring to a gentle simmer and add the chickpeas and cook for a further 5 minutes.

Arrange the roasted butternut squash pieces half in and half out of the curry and place in the oven for 15 to 20 minutes.

Add the naan breads to the oven for the last 5 minutes. Remove the casserole and top with fresh coriander and red onion. Serve with a mix of pilau and basmati rice, naan breads and tomato salad. Enjoy!

**METHOD TOMATO SALAD:**

Layer the tomatoes and onion in a Denby serving dish. In a jar with a tight-fitting lid, combine the remaining ingredients and shake well. Drizzle over the salad and top with fresh coriander.
