Higham Ferrers Town Council opens **Community Library and Wellbeing Hub**

The Higham Ferrers Community Library and Wellbeing Hub was officially opened on the 5th of March by the Mayor of Higham Ferrers, Councillor Nigel Brown.

Since the library closure by the former County Council in December 2019 there has been no library provision in the town. The Town Council were advised early last summer that £22.310 of section 106 monies held for 'library provision in Higham Ferrers' by North Northamptonshire Council (NNC) were to be returned to the developer unless they could be used. The Town Council were invited by NNC to submit a plan for the development of library provision to allow the monies to be retained for the community.

With the plan submitted and approved, the Town Council is pleased to have been able to establish the small Community Library and Wellbeing Hub (The Hub), operating out of the room at the back of the old library building. now owned by Snowdon Homes.

The Hub is currently open Tue 2pm-4pm, Wed 10am-12noon and 2pm-4pm, and Thurs 10am-12noon. Opening times will change and increase in line with the demands of the community, and to allow delivery of wellbeing groups and sessions not currently available to residents.

The Mayor was joined at the opening by Town Councillors, staff of Snowdon Homes and the new Hub volunteers. He was delighted to open the Hub, saying: "A lot of hard work has gone on behind the scenes to get the Hub opened in such a short space of time.

"None more so than from our initial eight volunteers who have given their time to open the Hub for eight hours a week, alongside the preparation of the shelving and the sorting of the donated books.

Secondary school places successfully allocated in North Northamptonshire

A total of 4,292 secondary school places for this academic year have been allocated to pupils across North Northamptonshire.

.....

More applications were made online than in previous years – now at 99.4% and up from 99% in 2023.

We are pleased to announce that over 96% of applicants have received a place at one of their preference schools.

- The following figures apply to pupils' first, second and third preferences:
- 83.01% of applicants have been allocated a place at their first preference up 3% on last year.
- 10.51% of applicants have been allocated a place at their second preference – fewer applicants getting second preference compared to 2023 at 12.1%.
- 3.05% have been allocated a place at their third preference pretty consistent since 2022.

Families who applied for their secondary school place online before the closing date of 31st October 2023 are able to check their offer online.

Cllr Scott Edwards, North Northamptonshire Council's Executive Member for Children, Families, Education and Skills said: "I'm delighted that we are seeing more children getting a place at their first preference school and consistency in the number of children being allocated one of their preferred schools year on year.

"Meanwhile, we continue to work hard to create additional school places across North Northamptonshire to meet the demand caused by our growing population.

"New schools are being built and we are expanding existing sites across the area.

"I wish all the children well as they embark on this next stage of their education."

Any parent has the right to appeal (through the independent appeals process) against refusal of a place at any school for which they have applied. The next round of secondary school place

allocations (for late applicants) will take place in April. Primary and Junior school allocations will be announced on 16th April.

GENEALOGY JOTTINGS

Want to place an **advertisement**

My former mother-in-law was a witch. No, I am not being rude; she really was a witch – a white witch. This was brought to mind the other day when chatting with a friend and we were talking about notorious people in our ancestry. The mother-in-law had become quite excited when I told her that one of the folk in my ancestry was one of the last people to have been arrested as a witch. I took quite a liking to the judge at my ancestor's trial who, when an accusation of flying was made, remarked that flying, per se, was not a crime! Although sentenced to death, this ancestor was pardoned, but had to move out of her village for her own safety!

This made me wonder what other notorious folk there were in people's trees. My Great Grandfather, John Smith, was a ring leader in the North Essex Agricultural Labourers' Strike of 1914. Farm labourers were paid just 13 shillings a week and were amongst the lowest paid in the country. They went on strike, asking for 16 shillings a week and that their hours of work be changed to 6am to 5pm with a half day on Saturdays. To cut a long story short, I now have a copy of his prison record – he spent 2 weeks in Saffron Walden gaol – which tells me that he was 5'8" tall with fair hair and blue eyes, details that I would not have known without it. The prison record was found at the Essex Record Office, so if you have criminal ancestors, a trip to the local Record Office could reap you many rewards!

Some records are online as well. The Proceedings of the Old Bailey (oldbaileyonline. org/) may also show details of the court cases in which your ancestors were involved. Also, a good old rummage in the newspapers of the day can throw up so many details that you might not otherwise come across.

Crimestoppers launches Northamptonshire service station vehicle safety campaign

The charity Crimestoppers has launched a campaign to ensure steps are taken to keep vehicles safe when parking in Northamptonshire service stations.

Crimestoppers with the Northamptonshire Office of the Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner, Stephen Mold, are running this campaign using a grant awarded to the Commissioner by the Home Office, under the Safer Streets Round 5 scheme. This is intended to reduce thefts from HGVs and overall vehicle crime, both at Watford Gap and Northampton service stations. The Commissioner's office and Roadchef motorway services have matched this funding by 50%.

This money is being used to improve service station security, including installing new fencing, additional CCTV and improved lighting.

In the year ending June 2022, 1.65 billion tonnes of goods were carried by HGVs registered in Great Britain and operating in the UK. Thieves typically target HGVs parked at service stations overnight, most commonly breaking into trailers or slashing trailer curtains when drivers are resting and when the service stations are less busy.

Crimestoppers is also appealing for information to be given anonymously about those involved in service station vehicle crime.

To pass on information about service station vehicle crime 100% anonymously, visit the Crimestoppers charity's website



(Crimestoppers-uk.org). You can fill in a safe and secure form or call the 24/7 UK-based Contact Centre on 0800 555 111. Young people can also report crime via the charity's youth service website Fearless.org

Lydia Patsalides, Crimestoppers Regional Manager for the East Midlands, said: "Our charity knows that speaking up about crime is hard, especially if you're passing on information about those who are potentially dangerous. We take tip-offs every day from concerned individuals who tell us anonymously what they know. They share our belief in wanting to help keep people and our communities safe.

"If you know of anybody involved in service station vehicle crime, Crimestoppers – which is independent of the police – is here to take information from you 100% anonymously. We have no way of knowing who you are. We pass on what we are told to the authorities who decide how best to proceed. Whilst no one will ever know you contacted us, your information could help to keep people and their vehicles safe."

Northamptonshire Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner Stephen Mold, said: "Preventing crime is a central part of my Police, Fire and Crime Plan for Northamptonshire, and I am pleased to be working in partnership with Crimestoppers to make sure drivers know how to be safe and to encourage people who see something suspicious to report it quickly and easily."

Government funding boost for transport projects welcomed by **North Northamptonshire Council**

North Northamptonshire Council has welcomed an announcement from Government of a £149.208million funding injection over seven years from 2025/26 for significant improvements to the local transport network.

From 2025, the Local Transport Fund (LTF) will fund a wide range of projects to improve the local transport connections that people rely on every day, particularly across towns, villages and rural areas.

The funding for North Northamptonshire is part of a wider investment nationally of $\pounds 4.7$ billion – announced as part of Network North – with $\pounds 2.2$ billion allocated for the Midlands.

The Government will develop guidance to enable local authorities to invest in ambitious transport improvements from 2025 through to 2032, which will:

- drive better connectivity within towns and suburbs
- drive better connectivity between villages and towns

• improve everyday local journeys for people The money is additional to the funding which was recently announced for the A509 Isham

bypass and the A43 dualling between Kettering and Northampton. Jason Smithers, Leader of North

Northamptonshire Council said: "This is a very substantial allocation of funds to invest in our highway and transport networks. This money is very welcome indeed and I would like to extend my thanks to the Government.

"With previous funding announcements and assuming we continue to receive existing grants at current levels, this additional funding will bring the total that we will be investing in North Northamptonshire roads to about £418million up to 2034.

"Over the next decade this will allow us to tackle major infrastructure projects, complete more resurfacing of the existing network and develop better connectivity within our towns. "A robust and innovative transport

infrastructure is essential to unlock future economic growth and improve journey times for commuters as well as connecting communities and relieving congestion."

Cllr Matt Binley, the Council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets, said: "We wait to hear further details from Government about how funding will be allocated and the terms and conditions involved.

"However, the amounts involved suggest that this could allow us to implement many longdesired improvements to our road network, and to implement many of the walking and cycling improvements that we have set out in our Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plans."

The council will now start work on publishing plans on how the money will be spent, as is required. Details will appear on the North Northamptonshire Council website in due course.

Small or medium-sized businesses can now apply for grants up to £5,000 towards 50% of project costs, with the remaining amount to be match funded by the business.

- heat pumps

Executive Member for Growth and Regeneration, said: "Businesses have had a difficult time over the last couple of years and we are here to support them. The NNDecarb grant scheme is designed to help those who want to increase their energy efficiency and just need a financial boost to help make their

plans a reality."

Cllr Harriet Pentland, the council's Executive Member for Climate and the Green Environment, said: "This important grant scheme is now in its second round and will help many more businesses with the installation of low carbon and energy efficient measures including solar panels, heat pumps and insulation."

Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "This grant scheme has proved extremely popular, so I would encourage businesses looking to reduce their carbon footprint to apply as soon as possible. Every small change we can make as a community will help towards us becoming carbon neutral."

More information about eligibility and how to apply can be found on NNC's website and the deadline for applications is 15th April 2024.

ARTISTS PRESENT CLIMATE INSTALLATION IN LOCAL CHURCH

Pale Blue Dot Collective (artists Louise Beer and John Hooper) have spent the last four months in residency with Fermynwoods Contemporary Art, to create an immersive photographic and sound based installation that will be displayed in All Saints' Church, Aldwincle from Sunday 24th March until Sunday 7th April.

The artists use installation, film, photography and sound to examine our place within the universe, framing the impact of the climate emergency through the eyes of evolution and



the immense time period it has taken for each form of life to arrive at this point.

Of Immeasurable Consequence, funded by Northamptonshire Community Foundation's Creative Climate Action Fund, combines images, sound and light to transport the viewer to an imagined forest environment. With the artists' interest in the deep time nature of our existence on the planet, they have developed an installation that explores both the fragility and the miraculous nature of life on Earth.

Sound recordings from Fermyn Woods, made with a variety of homemade and professional microphones, are combined with their own archive of field recordings collected from around the world. The final composition transports the audience to a forest outside of our experience. Images taken under moonlight during their residency are installed in the central body of the church, juxtaposed with astronomical imagery that prompts us to consider our own place in the wider cosmos.

You are invited to the launch event from 6.30pm on Saturday 23rd March, featuring an insight into the work by the artists and an informal, interactive telescope viewing with an astronomer from 7.30pm. LOCAL ORGANISATIONS AWARDED £94,000 TO FIGHT CLIMATE CHANGE

Through Northamptonshire Community Foundation's Creative Climate Action Fund, two Northamptonshire-based organisations were awarded more than $\pounds47,000$ each for creative projects that build awareness around climate change and encourage local residents to make behavioural changes to protect the environment.

Climate change is a global issue. The Office for National Statistics' Opinions and Lifestyle Survey 2022 revealed three in four adults

reported feeling worried about climate change, and the United Nations are working to tackle climate issues through Sustainable Development Goal 13: Climate Action, Work funded by the Creative Climate Action Fund will encourage participants to think global and act local in their efforts to combat the climate crisis in Northamptonshire.

Grants from the Creative Climate Action Fund were awarded to Fermynwoods Contemporary Art and Sol Haven for projects run by creative professionals with



the aim of engaging local communities with climate issues


Fermynwoods, an innovative educational charity based in Thrapston but covering the county, are hosting four artist-led initiatives with the aim of helping the public to better understand the climate crisis and to imagine new possibilities for the future. These include a mobile art workshop built using waste materials from major art institutions, the creation of speculative maps to address intersectional environmentalism, solarpowered online artwork and an audio-visual installation matched with a series of talks with astronomers, geologists and biologists.

lames Steventon FRSA. Director of Fermynwoods Contemporary Art, said: "Our approach to our Creative Climate Action Fund projects was to engage families and the general public through working with young people in artistic activities. It's an emotive subject and we have been encouraged by how the arts can be uplifting and inspiring in the face of climate breakdown

Major investment in highways network agreed by Council

At two recent council meetings, North Northamptonshire Council agreed to significant funding to improve highways across the area.

At today's Full Council, Councillors agreed, as part of the Capital programme for 2024-2028, to spend approximately £49.1m over the next four financial years on highways projects, the largest investment the council has made towards highways to date. This allocation includes £16m on pothole repairs.

This money includes £9.768m, allocated for highways infrastructure improvements, received from the Department of Transport and agreed at a meeting of North Northamptonshire Council's Executive

The package of funding from DfT will support projects and help maintain the existing highways infrastructure assets, investing in and improving highways infrastructure, improving access by cycle and foot (including safety improvements) and

improving safety and traffic flows by upgrading traffic signals. Now the funding has been approved, the council will look to allocate the budget to specific highways schemes in line with the Northamptonshire Transportation Plan.

Cllr Matt Binley, the council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets, said: "We are looking to the future and have put a significant fund aside to invest further in our Highways network over the next four years. This is a huge investment in our highways, the largest to date, with large sums of money set aside for highways maintenance, including repairing potholes - something I know residents will be pleased to hear.

"But it's not just about the roads, we will also be looking at improvements to cycling and pedestrian networks, informed by our wider work on the Corby and Kettering Local Cycling and Walking infrastructure plans, and improving safety and

traffic flows."

Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "I am delighted that this council is investing in our highways network, improving our infrastructure and connecting communities. It has and always will be a priority for us.

"We recognise the importance of our highways network to residents and businesses across North Northamptonshire and by combining our investment alongside funds from the Department of Transport presents a huge opportunity to significantly improve our road network over the coming financial vears.

These recent funds are part of NNC's overall investment into North Northamptonshire's Highways network and will combine with the funding already received from the DfT as part of their recently announced investment using funding from the cancellation of the northern section of HS2.

Grants on offer to make energy saving home improvements for hundreds of residents using off-gas heating

North Northamptonshire Council is pleased to announce the availability of the Home Upgrade Grant Phase 2 (HUG2), a government-funded scheme aimed at providing energysaving upgrades to residents with off-gas heating systems.

The HUG2 program offers free-ofcharge energy-saving improvements that will not only keep homes warm but may also help residents manage their heating bills efficiently. Whether you own your home, privately rent, or are a private landlord with tenants, you may qualify to applv

The grant is available to households meeting specific criteria, including not being heated by mains gas, having a combined annual income of less than £31.000 (this will increase to £36.000 after 2nd April 2024), and having a home that an Energy Performance Certificate declares as 'hard to heat.' Landlords are also encouraged to apply, under conditions detailed further below.

The scheme aims to phase out the use of fossil fuel heating, supporting the UK's 2050 Net Zero commitment and promoting household health and well-being through the reduction of cold homes

Eligibility criteria:

The Home Upgrade Grant Phase 2 (HUG2) is open to homeowners and

private tenants in:

- Homes not heated by mains gas which includes oil, coal, LPG or only electric heating. AND
- Households with a combined annual income of less than £31,000 (£36,000 after 2nd April 2024) OR receiving certain income-related means-tested benefits such as Universal Credit OR you live in an Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD) area. You can check your postcode on the council website www.northnorthants.gov.uk/hug2or call 0800 107 8883 AND
- Hard to heat homes this is based on your home Energy Performance Certificate (EPC). You will be helped with this part of the assessment and receive a free EPC assessment if you do not have one already.

Landlords, who have four or fewer properties, will be able to apply and will be required to contribute at least one-third of the cost of the upgrades in addition to the funding provided. This will be agreed before work begins.

How will it help? You may be offered energy saving

- improvements to help cut your energy bills and reduce your carbon emissions. These could include:
- Insulation and ventilation upgrades (to

keep you warm in winter and cool in summer)

- A low carbon heating system such as an air source heat pump (which will mean upgrading any existing heating system).
- Heating controls which make sure you only use heat when you need it.
- An energy efficient hot water solution to keep your water warm for longer.
- Solar panels (PV) to generate electricity
- Energy-efficient lighting which is cheaper to run

A survey will identify what is suitable for your individual home and you'll get a free updated EPC assessment.

Councillor David Brackenbury, Executive member for Growth and Regeneration said: "This grant scheme addresses the pressing issue of fuel poverty, which has affected a significant percentage of households in North Northamptonshire.

"Hundreds of residents across the authority will receive a letter from the council in the coming days alerting them of their eligibility and we are urging them to apply.

Have your say on how to improve parks and green spaces in North Northamptonshire

People are being asked to have their say on how parks and green spaces in North Northamptonshire's urban areas can be improved.

The survey forms part of a wider strategy which aims to attract further funding to develop the natural environment in our towns.

Led by North Northamptonshire Council, the six urban areas identified are Corby, Desborough, Kettering, Wellingborough, Rushden and Higham Ferrers.

The Council is keen to hear from residents, local groups and organisations and businesses with their ideas.

Examples might include any of the following, or other suggestions:

- Developing or creating a new park
- Creation of a new community garden
- Tree planting within urban environments
- Improvements to existing parks or green
- spaces
- Improvements to accessibility Cllr David Brackenbury, the Council's

Executive Member for Growth and Regeneration, said: "Having quality parks and gardens is a vital component of development in our urban areas – achieving a good mix of green space with the built environment.

"This strategy will help inform that process and I would urge people to have their say to help shape plans going forward." Cllr Harriet Pentland, the Council's Executive Member for Climate and the Green Environment, said: "It is important to give consideration to our green spaces in our urban areas to create havens for nature and provide residents with spaces to enjoy and relax in.

"I look forward to seeing this strategy develop and for our residents of North Northamptonshire to have their say in how it progresses."

North Northamptonshire Council has secured more than £1.5million of the Government's UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) for the scheme. Delivery of individual projects is scheduled to be complete by March 2025.

The first part of the scheme includes undertaking an audit of urban green spaces within these towns, before then developing a strategy prioritising those spaces with plans for how the investment can improve the area and optimise its use for visitors.

It is also hoped to create a legacy strategy document that can be used to attract future funding bids building on the investment already secured through the UKSPF.

The council has secured specialist open space consultants in The Environment Partnership (TEP) and CFP Landscape & Heritage to carry out engagement on the project brief and prepare a strategy with prioritised schemes for delivery. People have until Monday, 18th March to

Your Health - Clicking hips

Does one of your hips pop when you move it? Have you been told that it will cause vou arthritis?

Does it worry you when you do pilates, gardening or sit down?

The good news is that the pop is probably just a tendon flicking over a knobbly bit on your thigh bone. It's very common and normally doesn't cause any problems at all. You might find that hard to believe as the pop can be very loud, but ves, it's perfectly normal. Even if you hear a really loud pop in pilates or yoga, it's fine!

The time when it's not normal is when it's painful. If the popping noise coincides with pain, or if you're getting regular pain in the hip then you need to get it looked at. Sometimes the problem is just an imbalance in the way your body is moving. This can be from tight or weak muscles

shortened tendons or stiff ioints

The pain can also be caused by osteoarthritis/ general wear and tear, so it's important to find out. Ceremony to remember wartime tragedy

A remembrance ceremony commemorating the lives of 17 American airmen killed in an air crash 80 years ago was held at Stanwick Lakes recently.

The ceremony - 80 years to the day – marked the anniversary of a mid-air collision that occurred between two B17 Flying Fortress aircraft on 22nd February 1944.

The aircraft – one from 303rd Bombardment Group at Molesworth and one from 384th Bombardment Group at Grafton Underwood – were forming in the skies above Irthlingborough in preparation for a bombing mission over Germany as part of 'Operation Argument' – an Allied Forces operation for bombing of targets in occupied Europe which included cities, factories, aircraft manufacturers, shipyards and military facilities.

Whilst getting into formation, the two aircraft collided mid-air, killing all but three airmen who parachuted to safety. Part of the crash site was in an area that is now part of Stanwick Lakes.

Stanwick Lakes volunteers

John Abbott and Andy Dyks have led the research into the incident, uncovering details of the crash and the airmen, as well as uncovering memories and recollections from local people of the collision.

The ceremony of remembrance was attended by 501st Combat Support Wing Commander Colonel Landon Phillips and local dignitaries from surrounding towns and villages, including Deputy Lieutenant of Northamptonshire Air Vice Marshall White, and Vice Lord Lieutenant of Cambridgeshire Brigadier Tim Seal.

Col. Landon Phillips expressed his thoughts on the event: "It's truly humbling to be here today to pay a very special tribute to those 17 American airmen who tragically lost their lives 80 years ago. I'm honoured to stand alongside our UK partners in remembrance and grateful for those who have been kind enough to

host us. Your commitment to cherishing the memory of our fallen wingmen is a testament to our two countries' longstanding special relationship and reinforces the bond between our great nations."

Attendees gathered for a short private service, and the reading of a poem originally written by a local young girl, present at the time of the incident. The Honour Guard were given the order to post colours, followed by Taps to accompany the laying of a memorial wreath and a salute. The Mayor of

Irthlingborough, Cllr Ethan Hopkinson, added: "It is an honour to remember the brave men of the 303rd and 384th Bombardment Groups of the United States Air Force who so tragically lost their lives on 22nd February 1944.

"On behalf of the people of Irthlingborough, I express our heartfelt gratitude to the men who lost their lives that day, and all our American

friends who sacrificed so much, arm in arm with our own countrymen, during World War 2 in pursuit of the freedom we enjoy today. In gracious, glorious, and eternal memory.'

The ceremony was a private service, and marked the start of an accompanying exhibit open to the public in the Visitor Centre at Stanwick Lakes.

The exhibition ran until 3rd March but Stanwick Lakes invites visitors to learn more about the longer-term heritage project, with plans to fundraise for a permanent memorial on site.

Nadia Norman, Heritage Coordinator at Stanwick Lakes, said: "The B-17 collision in 1944 is such a significant event in local history, and it was important to us that we were able to remember and commemorate the airmen

on the 80th anniversary of the crash. A permanent memorial here at Stanwick Lakes will help tell the story of self-sacrifice and bravery of our Allied Forces. It will be a lasting legacy that shows our communities had and still have a special relationship with US air bases in the local area."
