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PRECIOUS PEREGRINE PRINT

UNVEILED – AND A SMALLER VERSION IS ON THE CARDS

When members of Higham Ferrers Tourism Committee saw a painting featuring the town's famous peregrine falcons, they knew they had to have a copy.

The painting had been created by acclaimed artist Ophelia Redpath, who used to live in the town, and who had been invited back to give a talk at the recent Arts Weekend, which was organised by The Friends of St Mary's and Higham Ferrers Tourism.

Ophelia is the Sky Landscape Artist of the Year 2021 and she painted the peregrine falcons which had made a home in St Mary's Church spire as a tribute to the time she lived in the town. "We loved that painting from the moment it was unveiled at the Arts Weekend and we recently voted to get a print. I am thrilled to say that we got the first of 100 prints," said Liz Barnatt, Higham Tourism's chairperson.

The print was framed and displayed on an easel and unveiled at a special 'Thank You' evening for local gardeners who took part in the recent Secret Gardens of Higham Ferrers. Noted auctioneer Richard Barnwell, the guest speaker for the

evening, lent a hand unveiling the precious peregrine print.

The print has found a home in the town's historic Chichele College and it will be displayed at many future events in the venue.

"We are also planning to get small cards printed of the peregrine painting, the idea being to offer them as gifts or thank-you cards. Ophelia has given us permission to do this, and I am sure there are a lot of people who might want to buy a smaller version of this fabulous painting," Liz added.

More food for thought!

This summer term the pupils and teachers from Alfred Lord Tennyson School have been involved in The Rotary Club of Rushden's Young Horticulturist Project – and what a summer term they have had!

Their vegetable gardens were not ready to plant up until the end of March due to the inclement weather and so they began mid-April and have had amazing success.

On 2nd July, several Rotarians, with Linnet Smith from Encompass Foodbank, were invited to the school's first harvest and potatoes were on the agenda!

What the Rotarians found on their arrival was a thoroughly enthusiastic team of pupils and teachers (lead teacher Alison Pearson and school governor Carol Kirby) who have immersed themselves in their school garden project to produce a variety of vegetables such as carrots, cucumbers and onions.

In the next few weeks the pupils will harvest the rest and sell them at their summer fair to raise funds for the Encompass Foodbank in Rushden. This project will continue next year and has been supported with funding from NCC and ASDA.



Council re-signs Armed Forces Covenant

To coincide with Armed Forces Week, at the end of June, representatives from North Northamptonshire Council (NNC) alongside the Lord-Lieutenant of Northamptonshire resigned a nationally recognised document, the Armed Forces Covenant (AFC). This reaffirms the council's pledge to continue to support members of the Armed Forces across North Northamptonshire.

The AFC is a commitment that the council acknowledges and understands that those who serve, or have served, in the Armed Forces and their families should be treated with fairness and respect in all aspects of their life.

Recognising the unique obligations of, and sacrifices made by, the Armed Forces, its two principles are that:

 Those who serve in the Armed Forces, whether Regular or Reserve, those who have served in the past, and their families, should face no disadvantage compared to other citizens in the provision of public and commercial services.

Special consideration is appropriate in some cases, especially for those who have given most, such as the injured and the bereaved.
 Councillor Helen Howell, Deputy Leader of North Northamptonshire Council, re-signed the Covenant.

Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "Resigning the Covenant is more than just a piece of paper. Our actions speak for themselves and 365 days a year, teams across the council are supporting ex and current service personnel in any way we can.

"One example of this is the new housing development at Cheltenham Road, in Corby. It has 18 new homes that have been designed with members of the Armed Forces in mind and will be a great asset to the area, when complete."

"When you have eliminated the impossible, whatever remains, however improbable, must be the truth."

It is a good idea to remember this when trying to find some of our elusive ancestors. Whilst today's children often have their own rooms, back in the day – and even when I was a child – families were so large that many shared their room... if not the bed! In Lulworth in Dorset, the Dolls' House has 'timber-framed walls covered with plaster and a tiled roof. It consists of a front living room with two bedrooms above and a lean-to scullery behind.' It was home to a fisherman, his wife – and their 12 children! Little wonder that, in many cases, children left home as soon as they could! However, if you have been using the siblings in order to nail down an ancestor, this can be difficult if they have also decided to move on.

Your ancestor might be aged 8 in the 1851 census, living with their family and then you find them in 1871 aged 28, married, with a couple of children of their own. But where were they in 1861?

Recently, I was looking for an ancestor on behalf of someone. His parents knew where he had been born and so it was recorded in 1851 as the name of the village. However, in that census, the family had moved to a large nearby town. In subsequent censuses, the name of that town was given as the place of birth.

I have also seen an instance where someone was born in Castor but living in Durham and their place of birth recorded as Peterborough. In this case, there were several Peterborough possibilities that could have been our chap. But then came the elimination part. If you can find them in subsequent censuses and they turn out not to be the one that you are looking for, then the one that is left probably is – even as far away as Durham! People did move away sometimes, so it is always possible.

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Your Health – Scans and X-rays

MRI images! They're like the superhero X-ray vision we all dreamt of as kids. But, before you start imagining yourself as the next Doctor Strange, let's talk about why these high-tech pictures can sometimes be as misleading as a magician's trick

We often get patients at the clinic who arrive holding their MRI scans like frightening treasure maps, hoping they've found the "X marks the spot" of their discomfort. But, here's a little secret: MRI images don't always tell the full story.

Imagine looking at a photo of a cake. You might see layers of chocolate, creamy frosting, and sprinkles on top. Delicious, right? But, just from the photo, you can't tell if it's a mouthwatering masterpiece or if someone added salt instead of sugar! MRIs are a bit like that cake photo. They show us the structures inside your body in

incredible detail, but they can't always explain the taste — or in medical terms, the symptoms, as obviously we don't eat our patients.

That's where our expert osteopaths and ace cakemakers, Brooke and Ollie, come in. Brooke and Ollie know their way around a mixing bowl, but they're equally skilled at correlating symptoms with scan results, to find out what's really going on for you.

A therapist's job is to correlate the images with your symptoms, medical history, and physical examination to get the full picture. That minor disc bulge on your MRI? It might look scary, but it could be harmless. Meanwhile, the real culprit of your back pain could be tight muscles, poor movement, or even stress.

So, the next time you're puzzled by an MRI scan, don't panic: it's not the whole cake.

And remember not to put the lawnmower near an MRI scanner as the strong magnets will pull it to pieces. It's probably best not to feed it cake either. Have a cake-filled week!

The Green Flag Award scheme, managed by environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy under licence from the Ministry of Housing, Communities & Local Government, recognises and rewards well-managed parks and green spaces, setting the benchmark standard for the management of green spaces across the UK and around the world.

Expansion of North Northamptonshire SEND primary school agreed

Executive members at North Northamptonshire Council have agreed to expand Rowan Gate Primary School onto the former Wilby School CEVA Primary School site.

Rowan Gate Primary School is a community day special school for pupils from four years of age and accommodates children with:

- Cognition and Learning Needs (Severe Learning Disabilities)
- Communication and Interaction Needs (Autistic Spectrum Disorder)

Children may also have:

- Sensory and/or Physical Needs
- Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs (SLCN)
- Complex medical needs.

The school will initially accommodate up to 30 pupils in Reception to Year 1.

At an Executive Meeting on Thursday 11th July it was agreed that refurbishments of the Wilby School building, once vacated in July 2024, will progress so that the school can move in ready for the start of the school term in September 2024.

Cllr Scott Edwards, Executive Member for Children, Families, Education and Skills, said: "In November last year when the Executive approved Wilby School to relocate to the newly built school in Glenvale Park Estate, work was undertaken to

assess the options for the vacated Wilby School building to ensure its continued effective use with consideration.

"With the severe shortage of SEND school places in North Northants at the forefront of our minds, an assessment of the Wilby School building was undertaken to determine its suitability to occupy children with special educational needs.

"Now it has been given the go-ahead, the Council will acquire the freehold of the Wilby School site from the Archdeacon of Northampton who represents the Church of England Diocese and effectively swap the Glenvale and Wilby school sites.

Jason Smithers, Leader of North Northamptonshire Council, said: "Our vision for North Northamptonshire is to create a place where everyone has the best opportunities and quality of life and we are committed to delivering better and brighter futures for all of our children and young people. This means providing them with a high-quality education and opportunities to help them flourish.

"The expansion will provide an opportunity to support our children to access the special needs education and facilities that enable the achievement of the best outcomes, meaning that they can flourish.





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NEW ELECTRIC BIN LORRY TAKES TO THE STREETS OF NORTH NORTHANTS

A new electric-powered lorry will be used to collect waste in the local area as North Northamptonshire Council continues its work to become carbon neutral.

The all-electric vehicle has been tried and tested on routes and will carry out the same role as the previous diesel vehicle. Residents shouldn't see much difference, apart from a quieter vehicle doing the rounds.

Over the vehicle's lifetime, it will save 60,000 litres of diesel and £75,000 in fuel costs.

Cllr Matt Binley, the council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets, said: "The arrival of this new electric vehicle is a step towards a cleaner and quieter waste fleet and will help us become carbon neutral by 2030.

"Switching away from diesel is a great way to reduce our emissions, not to mention the cost savings across the vehicle's lifetime.

"During the vehicle's trial, I completed a shift with the waste team and can confirm that residents should not notice any difference, except the new vehicle is much quieter."

Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "Waste collection is one of our services that everyone uses and it's important that we look at how we can make it more environmentally-friendly.

"This new electric vehicle is part of our wider plans to be greener and meet our carbon neutral targets."

The new vehicle is part of a wider scheme to make the fleet more environmentally-friendly, with the council also trialling the use of hydrotreated vegetable oil (HVO) in some bin lorries that would have previously used diesel.

HVO is a fuel that can act as a direct drop-in replacement for diesel, meaning no modifications are required to the vehicles and it can offer up to a 90% reduction in greenhouse gas emissions.

Work to start on the Town Centre to Train Station Link Road – a Corby Towns Fund project

A project designed to provide an improved and safer route for pedestrians and cyclists between Corby train station and the town centre is due to start in August.

The Town Centre to Train Station link road is one of the projects which North Northamptonshire Council was awarded funding from Government to deliver. In September 2022, residents were asked for their views on a concept design. With the comments received, a revised plan was then consulted on in December 2023.

The new link road will look to improve the public realm and provide attractive and safe pedestrian/cycle connections.

Covering a route along Elizabeth Street, Oakley Road and Station Road, it will provide:

- Improved connectivity with new pedestrian crossing and upgrades to some existing crossings.
- Improved public areas
- Provision of segregated cycleway and footway facilities where possible
- Closure of existing underpass
- Resurfacing works to footways and carriageways within the scheme
- Highway drainage and street lighting improvements within the scheme Cllr David Brackenbury, the council's Executive Member for Growth and Regeneration, said:

"This has been a real listening project — we have undertaken two public engagement or consultation periods, taken on board feedback and tweaked the design to ensure it is the most fit for purpose it can be.

"In the short term, there may be some localised disruption, which we will do all we can to minimise, but I would ask that residents look at the long-term benefits and how much this project will benefit the local area."

Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "The funding awarded under the Towns Fund must be used on this project and once completed, it will really transform the area. I hope that, once finished, more people will be encouraged to travel on foot and cycle between the town centre and station, which not only improves people's health and wellbeing levels but has a positive impact on the environment."

Work is due to be completed by Spring 2025. During the works, there is likely to be some disruption and residents are asked to check before they travel and follow any signage on site.



HIGHAM HEROES AND A HEROINE **TO BE HONOURED**

The search is on to find living relatives of 11 Higham Ferrers-born WW1 servicemen who gave their lives for their country – and for those of a local imprisoned suffragette heroine.

Higham Ferrers Deputy Mayor, Councillor Gary Salmon, and local WW1 historian, Geoff Moore, are turning detectives to track down any family members of the 11 men and one woman

That is because the hero servicemen and the heroine Alice Maud Shipley, are being immortalised by having new roads named after them.

The roads will cater for the 330 new homes being built by HarperCrewe Developers that are going up between the back of the town's Ferrers School and the nearby A6 by-pass.

The Deputy Mayor is hoping to track down any relatives to invite them to a special exhibition that will pay tribute to the heroes and the heroine which will be launched in the run-up to Remembrance Day weekend.

Earlier this year, after Higham
Ferrers Town Council had
been asked to come up with
names for the new roads and
before he became the Deputy
Mayor, Councillor Gary Salmon
successfully suggested that
they be selected from the list of
servicemen on the market town's
war memorial

Twenty names were selected and submitted to North Northamptonshire Council and the Royal Mail for consideration.

"These are the two bodies that had to decide on the names of the roads. They had to ensure that there were no duplications or similar names in the area," Salmon explained.

Then, at a later council meeting – after Cllr Salmon became
Deputy Mayor – the council agreed to fund the plan for the exhibition.

"We want to track down any living relatives to tell them what we are doing and invite them to the exhibition, which will feature each of their stories and any photographs we can track down. We want the families to know that although it is 110 years since the start of WW1, these servicemen have not been forgotten and neither has suffragette Shipley," he said

"We have some information about them, but we are hoping that any families we can trace are able to provide us with more details. We are also searching for photographs."

THE ROAD NAMES

The main road in the new estate is Draper Road, which is being named after William Ernest Draper, who lived on Kimbolton Road and served with the Northamptonshire Regiment. He was killed on 27th September 1915, aged 31. His name is on the Loos Memorial in Belgium, which suggests that his remains were never found.

Gadsby Place honours Sidney
Gadsby, whose family lived
on Commercial Street. He
emigrated to Canada but found
his way to Brisbane, Australia
where he joined the Australian
Infantry. He died on 27th
September 1917, aged 25. His
name is on the Ypres (Menin
Gate) Memorial, where the Last
Post is played every evening and
has been since the end of the First
World War, apart from when the
Germans occupied Belgium in
the Second World War.

Litchfield Drive is being named after Reginald
Litchfield and his brother Thomas
Litchfield. Reginald lived on
Lancaster Street and Thomas on
Kimbolton Road. Both served
with the Canadian Army, Reginald
dying on 24th April 1915, aged
19, and Thomas on 27th August
1918, aged 21.

Reginald was laid to rest at Bedford House Cemetery, Belgium. Thomas is remembered on the Vimy Memorial, France, which suggests his body was never found.

Baxter Grove honours William Baxter, who served with the 1st Essex Regiment and was killed on 27th April 1917. William was laid to rest in Dury Crucifix Cemetery, France.

Wagstaff Court will pay tribute to William Wagstaff, who lived on Westfield Street and who served in the Black Watch Regiment. William died on 13th October 1915, aged 26.

Pashler Close honours Dennis Pashler and a likely relative Bertram Pashler. Dennis, who had lived on Thrift Street, was a sergeant in the Kings Royal Rifles. He died on 19th March 1918, aged 25 and was laid to rest in Tyne Cot Cemetery, Belgium.

Bertram, who had lived in North End, died the next month – 13th April 1918 – aged 37, while serving with the Hood Battalion, which means he had been in the Navy.

The two researchers say that it was not unusual for Navy personnel to fight in the trenches. It was simply a matter of there being more personnel than ships to serve on.

Bertram's name appears on the Pozieres Memorial, France, which also suggests his remains were never found.

The Deputy Mayor points out that it is not clear from the information currently available what the relationship was between the two Pashlers, but it is highly likely they were related.

Dawes Gardens is named after two brothers, Henry Dawes and Bert Dawes, who lived in Wellingborough Road. Henry served in the Bedfordshire Regiment and was killed on the first day of the Battle of the Somme – 1st July 1916 – and Bert, who served in the Bedfordshire Regiment, was killed a week before the battle ended on 10th November 1916. He was 19.

While the Commonwealth War Graves Commission records say that Henry was 19 when he was killed, a search of the 1911 census revealed that he was only 16. He is laid to rest in Dantzig Alley British Cemetery, France. Bert was laid to rest in Dernancourt Cemetery, France.

Caswell Drive honours Hugh
Caswell, who lived on High
Street. He served in the Hawke
Battalion, which again means he
was in the Navy. He died on 25th
August 1918, aged 19. His name
is on the Vis-Et-Artois Memorial,
France, indicating his remains
were never found. A local
newspaper article dated 20th
September 1918, suggested that
he was a prisoner of war and had
died in captivity.

And Shipley Close is being named after suffragette Alice Maud Shipley, who stood trial in London after a window-smashing campaign along with her sister suffragettes on 19th March 1912. At her trial, she spoke about the

plight of women and girls, which had motivated her to fight for women's rights.

When she refused to be bound over, she received a four-month prison sentence in Holloway prison, where she went on hunger strike and had to be forcefed. She died in 1951.

After joining the choir he quickly became a member of its Executive Committee and went on to serve 12 years as Chairman. After retiring from the committee in 2015 he continued to be responsible for procuring and distributing the choir's uniform clothing. John has become a legend at NMVC and will never be forgotten. Our sincere condolences go to his family."

NMVC Musical Director, Stephen Bell said: "John was a terrific supporter of the choir in many ways. Artist Deb Jones has used Nevaeh's design to inspire the creation of an incredible willow sculpture. She also taught the young artist, her friend and teacher how to create their own mini willow sculptures.

Save Peterborough Arch! Nene Park Trust launches public appeal

Peterborough Arch sculpture, which has stood at Thorpe Meadows overlooking the Longthorpe Parkway for over 35 years, was taken down last year as it was in urgent need of repair. Nene Park Trust is now launching a campaign to see it restored and returned to its rightful place and is asking for public support in the fundraising appeal.

The sculpture was commissioned by the Peterborough Development Corporation in the 1980s as part of Peterborough's expansion and was designed and created by renowned artist Lee Grandjean. It is an important part of Peterborough's modern history, the linchpin of the wider Sculpture Collection and was voted as Peterborough's favourite sculpture last year in an online poll. A condition inspection in 2022 showed that the sculpture, made of rare iroko



wood, had extensive damage and so it had to be removed for safety reasons.

With repair costs exceeding £50,000, Nene Park Trust is grateful for grant funding already received from The Henry Moore Foundation and The National Lottery Heritage Fund but is now in need of additional public support. The Fundraising team at Nene Park Trust is launching a public appeal, hoping to raise an additional

£3,000 towards repair costs and to go towards the ongoing restoration and the maintenance and development of the entire Sculpture Collection.

There are also two public art workshops being held in Ferry Meadows on 8th and 12th August, 10am-2pm, and a creative competition for 4-17 year olds running until 15th August.
