# SCHOOLCHILDREN LEAVE A LOVELY LEGACY

*The Friends of St Mary's, Higham Ferrers have a long-term management plan for wildlife in the churchyard which involves developing appropriate habitats for the flora and fauna, and involving members of the community.*

Recently four very enthusiastic pupils from Higham Ferrers Junior School, accompanied by teachers Lara Maple and Neil Smith, swapped their

maths lesson for a fascinating tour of the grounds and some expert advice about insects, flowers and small mammals. The Friends, whose

management plan is now in its fifth year, invited the pupils along "to encourage them to start to care about the environment," explained

Brenda Lofthouse, the new chair of The Friends, volunteers dedicated to supporting the maintenance of the exterior of the Grade I listed buildings in Higham Ferrers.

"If the children have access to flora and fauna, they may well go on to look after things in their own garden as every little bit helps," Brenda noted.

The pupils (Alfie, Olivia, Lucy and Miley) may also help The Friends in their ambition to achieve a gold award from the Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire and Northamptonshire Wildlife Trust – responsible for conservation in churchyards for work that has been undertaken.

The pupils left a legacy of their visit, planting sunflower seedlings – and other plants – in the Bedes Woman's Garden,

an important source of seeds for birds.

Carol explained how The Friends would continue to develop opportunities for wildlife, including improving butterfly and moth habitats. "We even have a dead hedge where lots of things are rotting in there and that's good for wildlife too," she said, telling the pupils that The Friends would also continue carrying out surveys on the various types of insects, mammals and flower populations.

"Did you know, we also have a white flower in the churchyard, which has never been here before?" she asked, explaining that it was a Common Cornsalad. "However, it is very small, so it is easy to miss."

## GRANTS OF UP TO £50,000 FOR RURAL BUSINESSES AVAILABLE - APPLY BY 26TH JULY

Grants of £5,000 and £50,000 are now available for rural businesses across North Northamptonshire.

Using monies received from the Rural England Prosperity Fund, North Northamptonshire Council has re-launched a grant scheme to support existing rural businesses, with applications now open.

Following on from earlier rounds of the grant schemes, applications are now being accepted for projects that can be delivered in full by 28th February 2025. A particular target for this round is rural diversification, including business diversification and projects which support the visitor economy.

Examples of projects supported in earlier rounds include:

- New Lodge Farm in Bulwick, who extended their café and farm shop
- Austin Davis Biologics, who have been able to move into a larger, refurbished facility in Islip

- Measures Farm in Hemington, who developed a new dog field
- We Don't Do Ordinary who invested in tourist accommodation at Wallis Mill, Brigstock.

Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "The previous three rounds of this grant scheme have made such a difference to a variety of rural business, including farms being able to diversify their offering to appeal to a wider range of customers. With this fourth round, more and more businesses should benefit."

Applications must be received by 26th July 2024 and rural businesses who wish to apply for funding in Round 4 should email [ukspf@northnorthants.gov.uk](mailto:ukspf@northnorthants.gov.uk) to request an application form.

## GENEALOGY JOTTINGS

**You find the census with your ancestor's wife and children, but the husband is nowhere to be seen. Why? What has happened to them? Are they still alive? Of course they are as they show up 10 years later back with the wife!**

There are many reasons for not being at home on the night of the census as the person in question might be in the workhouse hospital, prison, lunatic asylum or working away. I have seen censuses where a policeman was on duty that night and so has been enumerated at the Police Station rather than at home. Mind you, I have also seen people counted twice – once at home and again with the person who they are visiting!

People sometimes also give false information on census forms, either for personal or political reasons. There are some very interesting entries on the 1911 census. "If women don't count, neither shall they be counted," was the rallying call for suffragettes on the night of the 1911 census in the UK. Therefore, if you cannot find your

ancestor in that census, maybe they were one of the suffragettes who went out for the night. The form stated that it should contain the names etc of those who spent the night at that address. If they were not there, then they should not have been counted... It was not until 1928 that women in England, Wales and Scotland received the vote on the same terms as men – that is, over the age of 21 and without property requirements.

Mind you, names also changed – they could become anglicised if the person came from abroad and they felt that they could be "discovered" if they gave their true name. People have gone into hiding for many reasons. Emmerich could become Eric, Petrus could become Peter, not to mention Scottish names dropping the Mc or Mac. Quite a minefield, eh?

## Carbon reduction measures for three council owned facilities on Executive agenda

North Northamptonshire Council's Executive received a report on a decarbonisation project that will help contribute towards the council's green targets.

Three facilities – Corby Cube, Corby Swimming Pool and Desborough Leisure Centre – are all set to have works completed to help the sites reduce carbon levels and be more energy-efficient.

Following the completion of energy surveys of council buildings, the authority made a grant bid under the Public Services Decarbonisation Scheme (PSDS) for energy improvement works at the three properties.

The council has been awarded a grant of £3,858,419 against a total project cost of £4,384,568.08 under the Government-run scheme.

Now, Executive has been asked to approve the project and allocate £601,000, alongside the grant funds, to the project budget.

If approved, the project will be another step towards the delivery of the council's Carbon Management Plan. It is estimated that, once the decarbonisation project is complete across the three sites, 690 tonnes of carbon would be removed annually, a 3% reduction of the council's carbon footprint for its operations of 20,084 tonnes.

The project will see fossil fuel boilers replaced with air source heat pumps and the installation of photovoltaic panels at the facilities, alongside other energy efficiency

measures. This project is a key part of the council's commitment to becoming a carbon neutral council by 2030. It developed its carbon management plan, which was published in December 2022 and set out intentions to tackle climate change and reduce CO2 emissions.

Clr Harriet Pentland, the council's Executive Member for Climate and the Green Environment, said: "Since we declared a climate and environment emergency in 2021, we have been working hard on various projects to help reduce our carbon emission levels in North Northants."

"This includes looking at our facilities and the changes we can make to them – this project is a great example of this and will make a considerable contribution to reducing our annual carbon emissions."

Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "Buildings like the ones included in this project are massive assets to our communities, but they also produce a huge amount of carbon and it is vital that we look at ways to mitigate this – not just for residents now, but for future generations."

If the report is approved, the project team will go out to procurement for a contractor for the whole project, with works needing to be completed by March 2026. The project team will be working with operators and users of these buildings to minimise the impact wherever possible.

# Strategy for improved North Northamptonshire bus services discussed by Executive

A vision for a green, reliable, integrated bus network in the North Northamptonshire Council area was discussed at the authority's Executive recently.

The Bus Service Improvement Plan 2024 sets out how services can be improved to keep communities connected and bring environmental benefits. The strategy proposes new service routes with an increase in frequency on some existing routes. It builds on an improvement plan which was developed in 2021 and recent funding allocations for bus services, which saw the council receive £2.045m of funding in 2024/25 (in addition to previous allocations of £569,412 for both 2023/24 and 2024/25).

This money will be targeted towards actions which will deliver the best overall outcomes for bus services across North Northamptonshire.

The funding will allow for a significant programme of bus service improvements across North Northamptonshire including:

- To continue to fund existing bus services where they represent value for money or maintain essential connectivity for local communities
- To increase service frequency or restore services withdrawn since the start of the Covid-19 pandemic where there is a reasonable prospect of the service becoming commercially viable
- To forward fund improvements where S106

developer funding is due before the end of the funding period to increase the time for the service to achieve commercial viability.

Cllr Matt Binley, the council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets, said: "An effective local bus network can have massive benefits for residents and local communities – particularly the vulnerable and in areas seeing more deprivation – and this strategy helps pave the way for some significant improvements.

"Well-connected communities help develop social cohesion and are a vital component in assisting economic growth and workforce mobility.

"While this public funding is a great catalyst to enhance bus travel, ultimately services are run by private companies who rely on patronage to make them sustainable in the long-term."

Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "I welcome this strategy as a blueprint to develop improved bus services in our area.

"Buses play a major role in reducing congestion on our roads, reducing pollution and helping us meet our ambitious carbon reduction targets.

"I'm delighted that we are setting the bar high with our ambitions and working hard to make sure they become a reality."

The Executive met on Thursday 11th July at 10am in the Corby Cube and the papers are now available online.

# New taxi zone proposals under consideration

North Northamptonshire Council's Executive discussed the results of a consultation on changes to taxi zones across the area before deciding how taxi zones should operate going forward.

In late 2023/early 2024, the council consulted on whether the four current zones should be retained or replaced with one zone covering the whole of North Northamptonshire.

Executive were asked to consider the consultation responses received, alongside the recommendations of the Licensing and Appeals Committee and the Place and Environment Scrutiny Committee.

It is proposed that the four zones are replaced with one zone from 1st April 2025.

It also recommended that NNC will consult on a revised geographical/knowledge test for drivers before the single zone is introduced. Consideration will also be given to the trade's representation regarding the age of vehicles.

Currently, for the purposes of taxi licensing, the previous former authority area zones have been retained: Corby, East Northamptonshire, Kettering and Wellingborough.

Each zone continues to license its own taxis and drivers as well as operate to the byelaws currently in existence for that former area. It also means that a driver and vehicle wishing to operate across the whole of North Northamptonshire currently would need to

obtain four separate licenses.

Cllr David Brackenbury, the council's Executive Member for Growth and Regeneration, said: "To get to this point, we have gone through a rigorous consultation process and engaged directly with taxi drivers across North Northamptonshire, followed by discussions at all of the necessary committees.

"I would like to thank everyone who has taken the time to have their say. Following the consultation and discussions, we are now at the point where a final decision can be made and should the report's recommendations be agreed, we would look to implement the new zone from 1st April 2025."

Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "We have been one council for three years now and work has been ongoing to align services and ensure consistency across the local area. With this in mind, I am pleased we are now in the position to discuss the potential move to one zone and make a decision on how taxi zones will operate going forward."

# MOULTON COLLEGE STUDENTS SHINE AT PRESTIGIOUS SKILLBUILD COMPETITION

Two hardworking students from Moulton College have been praised for their talents after successfully competing in this year's SkillBuild competition. Furniture Studies student Matt Denton came first in the regional Furniture and Cabinet Making heat while Kaius Hoskins-Mason placed third in Stonemasonry. Matt, who is in his first year of studies at the College, is now set to take part in the National Final later this year.

The pair were competing in the regional heats of the annual UK-wide Construction Industry Training Board (CITB) event, which tests trainees and apprentices across ten different trades such as bricklaying, plastering, furniture and cabinet making, stonemasonry and joinery. The largest and longest-running construction skills competition

## FINAL STEPS BEING TAKEN FOR NEW PROVIDER TO RUN W8 BUS ROUTE IN NORTH NORTHAMPTONSHIRE

Moves are being made to guarantee that a bus service connecting the towns of Wellingborough and Bozeat will continue to operate uninterrupted.

North Northamptonshire Council is making final arrangements to secure an operator for the W8 service – which also runs through Wollaston – after the previous provider gave notice on running the route.
