## NEWS IN BRIEF

### Apply for rural business grants up to £50,000

Using monies received from the government's Rural England Prosperity Fund, North Northamptonshire Council has re-launched a grant scheme to support existing rural businesses, with applications now open for the final time.

Applications are now being accepted for capital projects that can start quickly and be delivered in full by 28th February 2025. A particular target for this round is rural diversification, including business diversification and projects which support the visitor economy.

Cllr David Brackenbury, the council's Executive Member for Growth and Regeneration, said: "This is the last chance for businesses to apply for grants of up to £50,000 - money which will make such a difference to rural businesses in North Northants."

Applications for this round of funding must be received by 16th December 2024 and interested rural businesses who wish to apply for funding in Round 5 (final round) should email [ukspf@northnorthants.gov.uk](mailto:ukspf@northnorthants.gov.uk) to request an application form, eligibility criteria and guidance notes.

# Green living roofs

initiative aligns with the Town Council's ongoing commitment to sustainability and nature conservation.

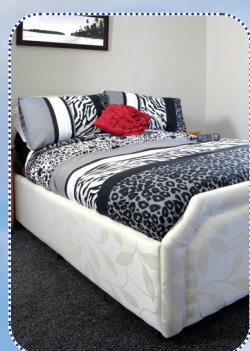

## Council Tax Support proposals in North Northamptonshire discussed at Executive

Assistance available to people paying their Council Tax in the North Northamptonshire Council area is set to remain unchanged from previous years.

A report before the authority's Executive on 14th November recommended that – under the Local Council Tax Support Scheme – help for the 2025-2026 financial year would stay at the same proportion as for 2024-2025.

This means that all eligible working age claimants would only have to pay a minimum of 25% towards their Council Tax liability.

Following approval by the Executive, the proposal will go before the authority's Council meeting on 5th December for final sign-off.

Cllr Lloyd Bunday, the Council's Executive Member for Finance and Transformation, said: "We're aware that some residents may be struggling to pay their bills, therefore I'm delighted that we're able to maintain the scheme at the same rate as for the previous few years.

"I would encourage Council Tax payers to apply

for Council Tax Support, more information can be found on how to apply and the qualifying criteria on the Council's website."

In addition to the Council Tax Support scheme, the Council has a scheme in place where people who are finding themselves in difficulties can apply for a Council Tax Discretionary Discount, which is used to mitigate any unforeseen or exceptional hardship circumstances that threaten taxpayers' ability to pay the Council Tax.

The Council's revenues and benefits social inclusion team is on hand to help customers apply for Council Tax support, Council Tax discretionary discounts and also other areas such as discretionary housing payment applications, personal independence payment applications, utilities and general money and debt advice.

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "I'm pleased to see this recommendation going before Executive for approval prior to going to Council, as it demonstrates our continuing support for our residents."

## GENEALOGY JOTTINGS

When I was a child, my parents spoke in 'backslang' if they wanted to talk about anything that they didn't want me to know. This could be anything from what to get me for my birthday, to subjects of a more delicate matter. What they didn't realise at the time was that children pick up languages very quickly. Sadly, I don't recall them talking about anything scandalous that happened in the family history.

However, it might be that you have stories in your families that have been a tad 'sanitised' – or even not mentioned at all. It might be that you are told about events that put ancestors in a better light than the truth would and events that have been glossed over or even lied about.

I was told that great uncle Walter fought in WW1 but, upon arriving back in Blighty, changed his name from Goldsmith to Smith and disappeared "up north". No-one knew the reason why – or they weren't saying. His brother Ernie tracked him down and my cousin Ray remembered meeting him in

Blackpool. But nobody knew – or was letting on – the reason behind the mystery. Years later, I tracked down Walter's army record. He had enlisted on 29th February 1916 but was discharged on 19th May, less than 3 months later, on medical grounds. He had epilepsy.

At this time, epilepsy was largely misunderstood and stigmatised. Employment prospects for people with the condition were virtually non-existent and many ended up in asylums. It is possible that this happened to Walter. However, he married in 1926 and was a master painter by the time of the 1939 Register. He and his wife also went on to run a boarding house. It could well be that his name change and move to Lancashire was as a result of the attitude to his epilepsy. Perhaps I will never know.

## Changes to burial policies and regulations on Executive agenda

A recent meeting of North Northamptonshire Council's Executive received two reports on proposed changes to cemeteries across the area.

Following on from a consultation earlier in 2024, Executive approved plans to harmonise burial reservation policies into one unified policy across North Northamptonshire. The proposals are intended to help bring consistency to the reserving of graves across the area.

Under the new policy, North Northamptonshire residents would have the option to pay a fee and reserve one plot at a time, before burial. A grave could also be reserved at the time of burial, for a partner or family member to be buried next to each other.

Executive also approved a report on proposals to apply lawn cemetery regulations to the new extension at the council's Shire Lodge Cemetery in Corby. In 2020, planning permission was obtained to extend the cemetery to create an additional

2,978 graves.

A lawn cemetery is a cemetery where only headstone memorials are installed by families in a defined headstone border, with no additions outside the headstone border. This means the cemetery has a formal, orderly and peaceful appearance. Currently a mix of memorial types are permitted across the existing cemetery.

The proposals will also help the site be better managed in the future and help with ensuring the site is available for the longest possible time.

The report also looked at other operational changes including simplifying the opening hours of the site to match the hours across other council-owned cemeteries in North Northants.

Cllr David Brackenbury, the council's Executive Member for Growth and Regeneration, said: "With a growing population across North Northants and an increased demand for cemetery places, it is important that we ensure that all cemeteries run by

the council are as future-proof as possible. This includes looking at our burial reservation policy and proposals to apply lawn cemetery regulations to the new extension at Shire Lodge.

"We know this is an emotive topic and residents should be assured the Executive will consider both reports very carefully before making any final decisions."

Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "As an authority, we have a responsibility to make sure that services are fair and equal across the area and introducing a new area-wide burial reservation policy would help us achieve this.

"But we also need to look locally and following the extension to Shire Lodge in Corby, it is important that we make sure this is available to use for many years to come, which the introduction of Lawn Cemetery Regulations would assist with."

The Executive met on Thursday 14th November at 10am at the Corby Cube.

# SIGNIFICANT PROGRESS MADE IN IMPROVEMENTS TO PLANNING SERVICES AT NORTH NORTHAMPTONSHIRE COUNCIL

Significant improvement has been made in bringing positive transformation to North Northamptonshire Council's planning department – according to a recent progress review of the service.

The peer team particularly noted the move to two planning committees and the updated scheme of delegation, demonstrating a proactive approach to streamlining the decision-making process.

The review team also noted the significant progress to coordinate data for developer contributions and providing greater transparency and accountability by publishing an infrastructure funding statement.

The review team was impressed by the culture of collaboration and mutual support demonstrated within the planning department and it was also lauded for establishing apprenticeship programmes to support the development of planning officers.

They also recognised the ongoing efforts to implement a new IT system intended to further enhance the efficiency of the planning service.

However, the update report also recognised that more work is still needed to be done and it was identified that the Council continued to face challenges regarding resource and recruitment, which is common across planning services nationally.

The need for good communication and timely correspondence between the planning service and its stakeholders was regarded as essential and whilst some improvements were noted, it was acknowledged that further improvement was required in this area.

Cllr David Brackenbury, the council's Executive Member for Growth and Regeneration, said: "After the initial visit by the Planning Advisory Service (PAS) we embarked upon our improvement journey as it was essential that we brought about rapid change.

"I welcome this progress report and we're very pleased that it shows real positive change in the department, which is excellent news. While we're moving in the right direction there is no room for complacency, and we're committed to continuing on the right trajectory.

"I would like to acknowledge the hard work of planning colleagues who have shown tremendous resilience and determination to bring about this improvement. Additionally, I would like to thank the Peer Review team for their expert analysis and would also like to thank everyone who engaged in this process."

Cllr Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "This progress report has highlighted widespread improvements that have been made – especially streamlining the decision-making process – and areas where we still need to make further changes.

"I'm grateful for everyone's hard work in bringing forward these changes and I would like to express my gratitude to the planning improvement board for their diligent efforts in identifying and addressing the challenges we have encountered.

"The original peer review was requested by myself back in 2022 as they are a great way of making sure services can transform in the right way. It's now essential we keep up the momentum to ensure the service is in the best possible shape for the residents of North Northamptonshire."

In September 2022, the initial peer review of the Council's Planning Service was undertaken by a PAS Peer Review Team. This included an extensive set of interviews and focus groups with a wide range of internal and external stakeholders.

Following an invitation by the Council, PAS made the second visit to the Council to conduct a progress review in May 2024, where they were also requested to undertake a desktop-based review of the Council's use of Extensions of Time (EOT) on planning applications.

PAS is part of the Local Government Association and is funded by government. Among other activities, PAS undertake peer reviews for local planning authorities.

Peer reviews can be done for any service and operate through a 'sector led' approach, where local authorities help each other to continuously improve.

## Creating a Dementia Community Centre of Excellence

Public Health in North Northamptonshire Council is working with Northamptonshire Dementia Research and Innovation Centre (NDRIC) at the University of Northampton (UON) with the aim of creating a Centre of Excellence for Dementia awareness, support and care offering high standard, quality provision.

The Orchard Project will look to align current dementia care provision in an existing local community centre, The Autumn Centre in Corby, with best contemporary dementia-friendly practices, as they work towards enhancing their Dementia Friendly status.

Lee McCormick, Centre Manager at The Autumn Centre said: "The Autumn Centre is thrilled to be involved with Public Health, North Northamptonshire Council and the University of Northampton in such an exciting project to become a Centre of Excellence. This will be a great opportunity to tackle the early onset of dementia with research and a proactive inclusive programme."

As part of the project there will be a series of specifically designed public awareness activities and events linked to both early identification of cognitive decline and maintenance of positive Brain Health. This 12-month programme of events and activities will be co-produced and co-designed with people with dementia and carers, staff and Trustees at the Centre, and the wider community.

The project also aims to create and develop a model of support and outreach that can be

potentially rolled out to other similar services, benefitting more North Northamptonshire residents. It will explore the barriers to access and engagement with local health care and related services in relation to support for those effected by a dementia diagnosis.

Councillor Gill Mercer, North Northamptonshire Council's Executive Member for Adults, Health and Wellbeing said: "I am delighted that we have recently appointed a PhD student who will be working with Professor Jacqueline Parkes and Dr Alison Ward from the university to plan, advertise, recruit, and deliver the activity/event programme. They will also be evaluating its effectiveness and impact, especially on how dementia can affect accessing healthcare."

"This is a project which I hope will have far reaching benefits for those of our North Northamptonshire residents in cognitive decline for years to come."

Project lead, Professor Jacqueline Parkes from the University of Northampton said: "This is a very exciting project which could provide a blueprint for a community-based pathway approach to dementia support and care."

Groups such as local schools, faith groups, voluntary, third sector, and community organisations will also be invited to attend sessions to embed dementia awareness into their work.

This work links into Integrated Care Northamptonshire's Dementia Strategy's ambition to raise awareness and reduce stigma in relation to Mild Cognitive Impairment and dementia.

## YOUR HEALTH – MAKING BACK PAIN WORSE

*A lot of things you've read in my articles have been about how to help your back pain, or how to prevent it. This week, let's take a look at five things that won't help your back pain – and might even make it worse.*

1. Lying in bed all day - It's so tempting to stay under the covers, but resting can actually do more harm than good. Gentle movement is key to getting your back feeling better.
2. Painkillers and pain-relieving gels - Pain relief medication can be very helpful as it can allow you to keep moving, but the recommendation is not to use it for long periods of time. Finding the right treatment and exercises for your injury should give you more long-term pain relief.
3. Self-diagnosing on the internet - As you already know, this is a rant of mine. An internet

- search can convince you that a twinge in your back is something catastrophic. Leave the diagnosing to the professionals and save yourself the stress (and a few sleepless nights).
4. Being hard on yourself - Stress is a major factor in making pain feel worse, so try to find ways to keep your stress levels down and not to beat yourself up for having pain. With all the help available to you, back pain shouldn't be long-lasting.
5. Ignoring the pain - I know, you're tough! But ignoring back pain can lead to bigger problems down the line. If you're feeling sharp or persistent pain when you're active (e.g. mowing the lawn), it's your body's way of telling you to be careful. Listen to it. I'll talk about more positive stuff next time!

# New bus services to help connect communities

More new and enhanced bus services are being introduced across the North Northamptonshire Council area.

The services have been subsidised by the council from its own budgets and through funding targeted from the previous Government's Bus Service Improvement Programme, as well as from developer contributions.

The move supports the council's own Bus Service Improvement Plan, which was approved by Executive this year, and is in addition to other service improvements announced in September.

Cllr Matt Binley, the Council's Executive Member for Highways, Travel and Assets, said: "I'm delighted to announce further improvements to bus services in the North Northamptonshire area – a welcome addition to our network and a great way for people to get to work, go shopping or just meet up with friends.

"There are so many advantages to people making journeys by bus. I hope that people will start using these new routes as that is essential if they are to continue and hopefully for many of the services to eventually become fully commercially viable."

Jason Smithers, Leader of the Council, said: "It's important that we do what we can to develop our well-connected communities and I'm pleased that we're able to strengthen our bus network.

"Buses play a major role in reducing congestion on our roads, reducing pollution and helping us meet our ambitious carbon reduction targets."

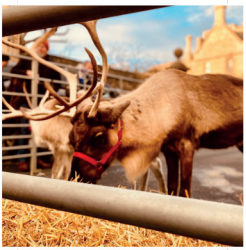

## Ajay Tegala – Wetland Diaries: Ranger Life and Rewilding on Wicken Fen

Tucked away in the flat lands of rural East Anglia lies Wicken Fen, loved for its big skies and tiny creatures, boasting over 9,000 recorded species. For 125 years, this wildlife sanctuary has been cared for by the National Trust.

A dedicated team look after this precious wetland of international importance, working with herds of free-roaming horses and cattle, weathering the elements to cope creatively with the dramas of a life outdoors at the cutting edge of conservation.

Wetland Diaries is a seasonal account of ranger life on Wicken Fen, restoring a once widespread landscape and the spectrum of emotions experienced. first on Blakeney Point, North Norfolk and then on Wicken Fen. Ajay is passionate about protecting wildlife and engaging people with nature.

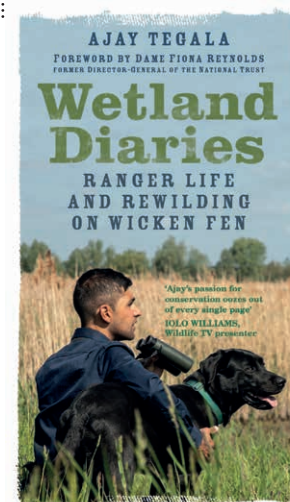

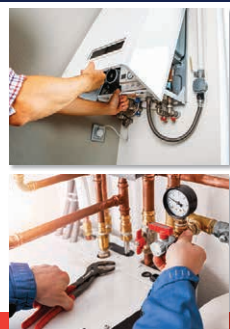
