BABY CHARITY RECEIVES £3,000

Baby Basics Northampton has received a £3,000 donation from David Wilson Homes to assist with its work helping new mothers and their newborn babies.

NHS FUNDRAISER ATTENDS ROYAL GARDEN PARTY

During the Covid-19 pandemic, David H. Woods started growing plants to raise donations to help the NHS – and he is still doing it today. As of 20th May 2025, the total donated was £37,848.88

David's amazing plant stall, in the village of Woodford, is open every day of the year, including the day he and his wife Hilary Jane attended the Royal Garden Party at Buckingham Palace, hosted by the Prince and Princess of Wales on behalf of the King, plus other members of the Royal Family. David left his son Matthew, who lives nearby, in charge of the stall.

David couldn't believe how close to the Palace his reserved car parking space was. He said: "It was fun driving there, we felt like VIPs and had a wonderful afternoon."

David was named in the King's Birthday Honours list last year to be awarded the British Empire Medal (BEM) for 'services to the community in

Woodford, Northamptonshire and to Charitable Fundraising for the NHS'.

It's an amazing story, especially considering David fights the pain of MS every day, following his diagnosis back in 2005. Having retired early, in 2011, David now devotes almost all his time to growing plants to help the NHS, which in return helps him keep active and gives him so much satisfaction, helping others and encouraging people to love gardening.

David's plant stall and donations "just keep growing" and as he says, "enjoy your garden" and "make gardening fun".

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GRANTS ON OFFER TO HELP MAKE ENERGY-EFFICIENT HOME IMPROVEMENTS

Households across North Northamptonshire are being encouraged to apply for government funding designed to help improve the energy efficiency of their properties.

The Warm Homes: Local Grant is a government funded scheme delivered by North Northamptonshire Council.

It provides grants for energy performance and low carbon heating to low-income households living in privately owned homes, to help achieve

energy bill savings and carbon savings. Upgrades are open to all fuel types, including on gas households (those heated by mains gas) and off gas

households (those heated by electricity, oil, coal or liquid petroleum gas).

Energy performance upgrades and low carbon heating improvements could include insulation, air source heat pumps or solar panels.

To be eligible, homes must:

- Be privately owned (either by you or your landlord)
- Have an Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) of D, E, F or G – if you do not know your home's EPC, you can find out when you apply

Household income must usually be £36,000 a year or less. If you earn more than that, you might still be eligible if either:

- You live in a certain postcode area
 - Someone in your household is getting certain benefits
- George Candler, North Northamptonshire Council's

Executive Director for Place and Economy, said: "This government funded scheme has been designed to ensure that those on the lowest incomes can make changes to their homes and make them more energy efficient."

"Schemes like this not only benefit individual households but also help towards our collective

commitment to reduce carbon emissions across North Northamptonshire.

"We would encourage anyone who thinks they might be eligible to look at the information online and apply before the deadline."

GENEALOGY JOTTINGS

This week, I'm still staying in Scotland as I love their certificate information! Now we come to their marriage certificates. For both the bride and groom it will show:

- Name and surname
- Usual or present residence address
- Age
- Rank or profession
- Condition (bachelor, spinster, etc.)
- Birthplace and when/where it was registered
- Parents' names (including mother's maiden name) and their occupation
- If a Regular marriage, the signature of the minister and witnesses
- If an Irregular Marriage, the date of extract sentence of conviction or decree of declaration and in what court pronounced
- When and where registered and signature of registrar

The wonderful difference between the English/Welsh marriage certificates and those from Scotland is that they contain details of the happy couple's mothers – including the mother's maiden name. This helps considerably when trying to track down the correct birth certificates.

But, apparently, the certificate will also provide details of when and where the marriage took place, whether or not Banns were read, or if it was by licence.



A couple of notes: If the person was a widow or widower, it was also stated if this is their second or third marriage. A note of the number of children (living or dead) from any previous marriage was also recorded.

The term Irregular Marriage meant that it could result from mutual agreement, by a public promise followed by consummation, or by cohabitation. A few words about Irregular Marriages: Some people think that "Living in Sin" was invented in the 1960s, but it is an ages-old practice – especially before matrimonial laws made divorce more accessible. Remember: bigamy was known as the 'Poor man's divorce'!

A Regular Marriage meant that Banns were read on three consecutive Sundays in Church and then a licence was obtained. An Irregular Marriage was with a mutual agreement and couples presented themselves as husband and wife. They would just make a public promise.

New Leader and Executive confirmed for North Northamptonshire Council



The new Leader of North Northamptonshire Council has been formally announced as Cllr Martin Griffiths following the annual meeting of the authority.

The Leader of the Council leads the development of council strategy and priorities to meet community needs. The Leader works alongside council officers who are responsible for putting councillors' priorities and strategies into action.

This was the first time North Northamptonshire's newly elected councillors met in a formal setting since the elections which took place earlier in

May. The meeting, which was held on Thursday 22nd May at the Corby Cube, also saw Cllr Eddie McDonald declared as deputy leader of the council.

Cllr Griffiths has also selected the council's new Executive, who are responsible for setting the strategic and policy direction of the Council.

The council's Executive team is comprised of:

Leader of the Council – Cllr Martin Griffiths

- Alongside being Leader of the Council, Cllr Griffiths oversees areas of North Northamptonshire Council including Big50, housing, human resources and devolution.

Deputy Leader and Executive Member for Adults and Health Partnerships – Cllr Eddie McDonald

- Cllr McDonald is the Council's Deputy Leader and also oversees adult services, adults commissioning, health and social care integration and safeguarding of adults with care and support needs.

Executive Member for Finance, Efficiency and Change – Cllr Graham Cheatley

- Cllr Cheatley oversees areas including

finance, internal audit, revenue and benefits, IT and customer experience. Executive Member for Assets, Waste and Environmental Services – Cllr Ken Harrington

- Cllr Harrington oversees areas in the council including climate and environment, country parks, bin collections and household waste recycling centres, grounds maintenance and the council's assets

Executive Member for Children, Education and Families – Cllr Elizabeth Wright

- Cllr Wright oversees services including Northamptonshire Children's Trust, commissioning, education, SEND and Family Hubs.

Executive Member for Highways and Travel – Cllr Chris McGiffen

- Cllr McGiffen oversees areas including roads, transport and parking.

Executive Member for Planning and Economic Growth – Cllr Jan O'Hara

- Cllr O'Hara oversees services in the council including economic development, planning and planning policy and flood and water management.

Executive Member for Regulatory Services – Cllr Kirk Harrison

- Cllr Harrison oversees areas including licensing, environmental health, trading standards, registrations (births, deaths and marriages), building control and private sector housing.

Executive Member for Communities – Cllr Gregory Wilcox

- Cllr Wilcox oversees services including community safety, tourism and visitor economy, community services (including libraries) and adult learning.

Executive Member for Health and Leisure – Cllr Barry O'Brian

- Cllr O'Brian oversees areas including public health commissioning, leisure and health and safety.

Cllr Martin Griffiths, Leader of North Northamptonshire Council, said: "It is an honour and privilege to be the new Leader of North Northamptonshire Council.

"I am really looking forward to getting started, alongside a new Executive who bring with them a great deal of knowledge, and working cross party within the council, to drive real change

across North Northamptonshire in the best interest of all residents."

Also, during the meeting, the new Chair of North Northamptonshire Council was confirmed, with Cllr Helen Campbell taking on the role for the next civic year, with Cllr Maurice Elgin as Vice Chair. The chair is a largely ceremonial role including chairing full council meetings.

Cllr Helen Campbell, Chair of North Northamptonshire Council, said:

"I am truly honoured to have been chosen as the next Chair of North Northamptonshire Council. Over the next year, I look forward to getting out and meeting as many residents as possible, whilst representing North Northamptonshire further afield."

HIGHAM'S PEREGRINE CHICKS FLYING THE NEST

The three peregrine falcon chicks nesting in St Mary's Church, Higham Ferrers, are growing fast – and it won't be long before their parents have a very empty nest! Hundreds of people have been following their journey via the live stream from cameras mounted inside the nesting box.

The chicks hatched a few weeks ago under the watchful eyes of proud locals and keen birdwatchers from near and far. And this week they've transformed from fluffy white bundles into sleek, alert young falcons, now only sporting the odd downy feather.

Thanks to the cameras, viewers can watch their flight feathers developing in real time, and see how much more active they've become. They now regularly pace the nest, flap their wings, and peer curiously at the world outside. It won't be long before they take to the skies, following their parents in spectacular dives reaching over 200mph.

For now, Mum and Dad are still hard at work, bringing in

pigeons and smaller birds to feed their growing brood.

Your Health – Bed rest

My father-in-law has always been very active – in his late 80s he was still able to look after the garden and keep it looking beautiful. So when he broke his hip this year and ended up in hospital for three months, it was a big shock for his body.

He faced several complications after surgery, which meant he has been in bed for most of his hospital stay. Yes, for three months!

He's slowly getting back on his feet now, but being immobile for that long has definitely affected his body. It's a reminder of how important it is to stay active, to prepare for the times when your body might not be able to do as much, no matter how old you are.

Here's what we noticed:

- **Muscle weakening** – Without regular use, muscles start to waste away. It's made walking and even standing a real challenge for him.
- **Joint stiffness** – Lying in bed means joints aren't being moved much, leading to reduced flexibility and more aches.
- **Poor circulation** – Staying still can affect blood flow, increasing the risk of clots and making healing slower.
- **Bone thinning** – Lack of weight-bearing activity weakens bones further, not ideal after a fracture.
- **Mood and energy dips** – It's easy to feel low when you can't do what you used to.



So, keep moving while you can. Of course, the type of movement will depend on your age and your levels of activity or injury, but whether you're training for a competition, walking around the block, lifting a few weights or just doing balance exercises at home, every little helps. If you're worried about whether you're doing the right thing, there are lots of great clubs and trainers locally who will help, no matter what your age and ability.

Remember the motto: Move better, feel better, live better!

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Will butterfly populations “bounce back”?

Creating a wildlife haven in your garden could help

With lighter evenings and trees in full blossom, it's clear that spring has arrived – a perfect reminder to start getting your garden ready for Butterfly Conservation's Big Butterfly Count.

After the declaration of a Butterfly Emergency last year, it's more important than ever to create a wildlife-friendly garden.

The Big Butterfly Count, running from 18th July to 10th August, invites everyone in the UK, from countryside dwellers to city residents, to participate in counting butterflies.

Research shows that 80% of butterflies have declined since the 1970s and the Big Butterfly Count is a quick and easy way for people to take action for their survival.

Dr Richard Fox, Head of Science at Butterfly Conservation, said: “Following last summer's Big Butterfly Count results, which showed a significant

decline in the number of butterflies participants observed, we need everyone to get involved this year.

“Will butterflies bounce back or will their populations continue to decline following a terrible year in 2024?

“Your counts will help to give us a clear picture and anything you can do to make your garden more butterfly-friendly increases the chances of butterflies surviving, and your chances of seeing them in your garden.”

Creating a garden that supports wildlife doesn't have to mean a messy, overgrown space. By making mindful choices, you can create a beautiful garden, terrace or balcony, soak up some vitamin D, and make a positive impact on pollinators like butterflies and moths. Here are five simple ways to transform your garden into a wildlife haven:

1. BE A GROWER, NOT A MOWER

If you have a lawn, consider letting some of it grow wild! Long grass provides a rich habitat for insects and allows some species of butterflies and moths to complete their life-cycle by providing a place to lay eggs and food for caterpillars. It can also allow nectar-rich plants like clover, bluebells, and dandelions to bloom. If you're not keen on an unmown lawn, consider a more structured approach. Try mowing a curvy path through an area of long grass or sow a mini wildflower meadow to help boost butterfly populations through a designated patch that allows wildlife to flourish. Simple changes can

create a vibrant, wildlife-friendly space.

2. MAKE YOUR GARDEN A STEPPING STONE FOR WILDLIFE

Choose plants that attract wildlife and provide nectar and pollen for insects. Plants like buddleia, verbena, lavender, and marjoram provide nectar throughout the butterfly season. Colourful planted pots can look beautiful in patio gardens and on balconies as well as provide a resting place and sustenance for butterflies. With the right plants, butterflies might even make your garden their permanent home!

3. AVOID PESTICIDES AND INSECTICIDES

While pesticides may target unwanted pests, they also harm beneficial insects like bees, ladybirds and butterflies. Even “pollinator-friendly” products can contain pesticides, which are toxic to insects. Organic methods such as companion planting are a great alternative. For example, planting basil near tomatoes repels aphids, while nasturtiums attract beneficial insects and deter pests. By carefully selecting plants, you can create a healthy, chemical-free ecosystem in your garden.

4. DEADHEAD FLOWERS

By removing dead flowers, you encourage your plants to continue blooming, providing a longer food source for pollinators. Plants like buddleia, lavender, and cosmos benefit from regular deadheading and will keep your garden

alive with butterflies through the summer. Plus, spending time outside not only helps nature but helps reduce stress, improve mood, and improve sleep quality!

5. AVOID PEAT-BASED COMPOSTS

Peat bogs are critical habitats for many native species, including the Large Heath butterfly. The UK's peat bogs have formed over thousands of years but they aren't inexhaustible. Peat extraction is a major threat to these delicate ecosystems, so switching to peat-free composts – made from composted bark, coir, or wood fibre – can make a huge difference. If possible, consider making your own compost from vegetable scraps, grass clippings, and coffee grounds for an eco-friendly alternative.

With these simple, thoughtful actions, you can create a beautiful, butterfly-friendly garden that supports wildlife all year round. Whether you're a seasoned gardener or a beginner, these tips will help you contribute to the well-being of pollinators and enjoy the beauty of butterflies on your own doorstep.

MOULTON COLLEGE FLORISTRY STUDENT BLOOMS ON LOCAL FLOWER FARM

Moulton College student Rebecca Whitbread is set for a blossoming future in floral craft, thanks to a unique work experience stint on a local flower farm.

Rebecca, of Duston, Northamptonshire, is studying for a Level 2 qualification in Floristry at the land-based college. Its specialist facilities include floristry workshops fitted with industry-standard cold storage and display and photography areas, where students learn the industry-relevant knowledge and hands-on skills required to carve out a successful career in floristry.

To fulfil the required work experience element of her course, Rebecca contacted Flower & Farmer, a Northamptonshire-based cut-flower farm that provides a range of locally grown flowers and foliage, bouquets and wreaths for weddings and events and wholesale flowers for businesses.

She explains: "I came to floristry later on in my career, having decided to pursue my passion for flowers and the outdoors. As part of my course, I needed to gain some hands-on work experience and decided to contact Flower & Farmer, who I had come

across a few years ago when I took part in one of their flower design workshops.

"I messaged the owner, Milly, to ask if she had any opportunities and was delighted to be invited to help out one day a week on the farm, which I hope to increase over the coming months when the flowers are fully in bloom."

Rebecca's hands-on experience at Flower & Farmer has included learning the basics of cut-flower growing, from tending the soil over winter, mulching, and planting, to the fundamentals of running a floral-based business.

Run by aunt and niece, Jo de Nobrega and Milly Naden-Robinson, Flower & Farmer was set up in 2018 at their family farm in Guilsborough, where the pair have set aside five acres and two polytunnels devoted exclusively to growing flowers. From spring through to autumn, the farm is a riot of colour and scent, with the land bursting with

dahlias, foxgloves, peonies and other seasonal English garden flowers.

Flower & Farmer's ethos is built on sustainability, with the team utilising environmentally friendly farming practices to grow its blooms and maintain a balanced ecosystem on the farm. Customers range from florists to brides-to-be, with deliveries across the Midlands and as far afield as London.

Rebecca adds: "I have learned so much during my time here already. Being able to get hands-on experience on the flower farm has given me a real insight into every aspect of what it takes to grow flowers as well as the preparation required to prepare blooms for florist buckets and bridal bouquets."
