NEWS IN BRIEF

Fines for fly-tipping, littering and graffiti

North Northamptonshire Council is reminding residents across the area that those caught littering could face a fine of up to £500, whilst anyone caught fly-tipping could face a fine of up to £1000.

Fines for a variety of environmental crimes were increased at the end of 2024 as follows:

- Graffiti – from £150 to £500
- Flyposting – from £150 to £500
- Littering – from £150 to £500
- Household Waste Duty of Care – £300 to £600
- Fly-tipping – £400 to £1000

All are subject to a discount if the fine is paid within a stated time period.

Cllr Ken Harrington, the council's Executive Member for Assets, Waste and Environmental Services, said: "Higher fines like these, hopefully, act as deterrents and are part of a wider package of measures that our team can use to help keep North Northamptonshire clean and tidy."

North Northamptonshire Council are also reminding residents to use registered waste carriers or risk a fine. More details can be found on the Council website.

The Rose of Northamptonshire Award celebrates individuals who have gone above and beyond




in their voluntary service to improve lives and strengthen communities across the

North Northamptonshire Council secures over £55 million in Government funding for local transport infrastructure

North Northamptonshire Council has welcomed a major investment from the Department for Transport (DfT), securing £55.3 million in additional capital funding to enhance transport infrastructure, improve road safety, and expand walking, cycling, and bus networks.

This funding is in addition to the £15 million per year already allocated through the Council's General Fund Capital Programme.

The funding will be the subject of a report to the council's Executive.

The new funding includes:

- Active Travel Fund 5 – £0.191 million
- Consolidated Active Travel Fund – £0.508 million
- Local Transport Grant – £54.588 million

Cllr Chris McGiffen, Executive Member for Highways and Travel, said: "The scale of this funding allows us to deliver projects that will make our transport network safer and more accessible for everyone.

"This funding gives us the flexibility to address both immediate needs and long-term goals. We're

working to identify the most impactful projects and will phase approvals as we gain certainty on costs and deliverability.

"The Council remains committed to engaging with residents and stakeholders throughout the process to ensure the improvements reflect local needs and deliver lasting benefits."

> ACTIVE TRAVEL IMPROVEMENTS

The Council plans to use the Active Travel Fund 5 to deliver a contra-flow cycle lane on Montagu Street in Kettering, identified as the highest priority scheme in the Kettering Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan (LCWIP).

The Consolidated Active Travel Fund will support the development of further priority schemes in Corby, Kettering and Wellingborough, with public consultation planned later this year to help select the next project for delivery.

This marks the first time councils have received Active Travel funding on a formula basis, allowing for more strategic planning. The funding must

be committed by March 2026 and construction completed by March 2027.

> LOCAL TRANSPORT GRANT

The £7.728 million Local Transport Grant for 2025/26 – rising to over £54 million by 2029/30 – can be used for a wide range of transport schemes, including road maintenance, safety upgrades, and traffic signal improvements. However, it cannot be used for major new road or rail projects.

This grant replaces the previous Integrated Transport Block funding and enables the Council to

deliver schemes that were previously unaffordable. It also allows for a significant increase in highway maintenance investment.

> NEXT STEPS

- Public consultation on active travel schemes will begin later this year.
- A phased programme of Local Transport Grant projects will be developed and approved.
- A further report will be brought to the Executive in early 2026 to confirm the next priority scheme for delivery.

GENEALOGY JOTTINGS

It is very tempting to think that our ancestors did everything in the correct order – marriage first and then had the babies. But oh no.... nothing as simple as that!

My great grandmother was born six months before her parents wed. A good clue that it was her father that her mother married is the name with which she was baptised – her middle name was the surname of her father. A handy hint to remember if you discover ancestors with unusual middle names.

When searching for a marriage, we usually start with the birth of the eldest child and then have a rummage a couple of years either way of that date. Folk were usually married just before – or just after – that child's birth. However, how many times have you not been able to find a marriage at all around that time? This could be for a variety of reasons – a very real possibility being that one of the parties was still married to someone else! I have examples in my tree of where a couple were living together as married

but then a wedding suddenly happened many years later than they were first found together. Yes, one of them had been married before and the spouse had finally died! Bigamy – the 'Poor Man's Divorce'! This was fine as long as you didn't get caught – if you did, the penalties could be severe. Prison sentences were usually given for proven cases of bigamy – most often for the man, but sometimes for the woman.

Another reason for not marrying might be consanguinity – how close the couple were already related. It was illegal to marry your dead wife's sister – it took the Deceased Wife's Sister Act of 1907 to overturn this – but I still have a couple of those in my tree who managed to escape punishment! Also, you could not marry your dead brother's widow until 1921.

SINGLE PEOPLE AND FAMILIES ON A LOW INCOME URGED TO APPLY FOR SUPERMARKET VOUCHERS

Eligible individuals and families on a low income are being urged to apply for a one-off supermarket voucher via North Northamptonshire Council's website. The fund is open to a wide range of residents, including low-income families, pensioners and people with disabilities.

The vouchers are funded by the Department of Work and Pensions and are available due to the seventh tranche of the Household Support Fund (HSF) which totalled £4,345,356.

The amount of the voucher will depend on the size of the household. A single person can apply for a £150 voucher, a two-person household £260 and a three-person household or more £320.

To access HSF funding, applicants will need to fill in a simple online form and upload payslips and proof of identity, bank statements, ideally using a computer. Those who do not have access to a computer can visit a North Northamptonshire library where they are available for free public use.

Applications are expected to take two months to process and will be dealt with in the date order by which they are received. To help the council process applications efficiently and avoid delays,

the form will occasionally be closed for short periods.

Cllr Brian Benneworth, Executive member for Health and Leisure, said: "We are once again able to support households who are having difficulty managing due to the cost-of-living crisis through funding from UK Government's Household Support Fund (HSF).

"Funded by the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP), the scheme is designed to provide financial support to households most in need, helping them afford essentials such as food, energy, and essential household items, offering vital assistance to residents who are struggling with the rising cost of living."

James Bellamy, Trustee at Daylight Centre Fellowship, added: "The funding that North Northamptonshire Council has provided through HSF has had a significant impact over the last year in supporting those households or individuals who are directly affected by the cost-of-living crisis and the food poverty which results from it. We have noted the positive responses from the many organisations receiving this funding and the significant impact it is having in meeting the needs across town and rural communities in North Northamptonshire."

The latest phase of the scheme will run until the 31st of March 2026 or until all funds have been allocated.

To determine whether or not you meet the requirements to apply for the vouchers you will need to work out your household's income and

savings. Residents can find out if their financial situation means they are eligible.

Next steps

Information you provide, alongside the council and central government systems, will be used to assess your household's

income and savings.

If any more information is needed, you must provide this within seven days, otherwise your application will be declined. If approved, vouchers will only be issued directly to the email address of the main applicant.

APPLICATIONS INVITED FOR THE ROLE OF INDEPENDENT PERSON

North Northamptonshire Council actively promotes and maintains high standards of conduct for 68 unitary councillors and all town and parish councillors across North Northamptonshire.

The council is now looking to appoint up to three Independent Persons to help it continue this work.

The role of the Independent Person is interesting and varied and involves being consulted on action to be taken following receipt of new allegations of misconduct and before the council makes a decision following an investigation. Independent Persons

will also have a role if the council needs to consider dismissing one of its three statutory officers.

The Independent Person will:

- be a person in whose impartiality and integrity the public can have confidence
- understand and comply with confidentiality requirements
- be able to make reasoned judgements based on evidence
- have a demonstrable interest in local issues
- have an awareness of the importance of ethical behaviour
- be a good communicator

Applications are unable to be accepted from anyone who is currently, or has within the last five years been:

- A council member, a co-opted council member, or employee of North Northamptonshire Council (or a parish/town council in the area)
 - A relative or close friend of such a person; or
 - A member of a political party

STEAMING AHEAD AT WISTOW MAZE

To mark the 200th Anniversary of the modern railway, Leicestershire's famous Wistow Maze has been designed in the shape of a steam train.

"The maze is offering visitors an opportunity to celebrate this historic milestone, whilst exercising both mind and body along the way," says Diana Brooks, owner of Wistow Maze.

Visitors have to find 12 quiz boards hidden amongst the 3

miles of pathways, which will highlight how transport has evolved over the years.

A great family day out, visitors can pit their wits against the giant 8-acre maize maze with its high-level bridges and towers and also take part in a variety of mini mazes and games in the Activity Funyard, which includes a space-hopper track, hoopla and a football shooting game.

With the Wistow Rural Centre opposite, consisting of a café, garden centre, model village and numerous shops, there is something to satisfy all ages.

At the end of the season, the maze is harvested for cattle fodder and then redesigned the following Spring using GPS satellite technology.

Wistow Maze is a winner of Leicestershire's 'Best Visitor Attraction' and attracts over 20,000 visitors each year.



Vision for culture across the local area discussed

Residents and visitors will also be encouraged to take part and help drive cultural growth – this really is a very exciting time for culture in North Northamptonshire."

Cllr Martin Griffiths, Leader of the Council, said: "North Northamptonshire is a fabulous place to visit and has so much to offer from a cultural perspective

– rich in heritage, creativity and community spirit. This plan sets the stage for an exciting future for residents and visitors alike, and we are proud to champion culture as a key part of our identity and future growth."

Simon Fitch, Senior Relationship Manager at Arts Council England said: "North Northants has a creative sector which is producing work that is relevant to the people who live and work here now, and which reflects their lives and their stories. We are pleased to see in the cultural masterplan a collective commitment to support this sector into the future."

If approved, the masterplan will feed into the newly developed Northamptonshire Local Visitor Economy Partnership, Discover Northamptonshire, who will take the lead on driving forward the strategy.

MOULTON COLLEGE COLLABORATES WITH WELLINGBOROUGH TOWN FOOTBALL CLUB TO NURTURE NEW TALENT

Moulton College's Football Academy students are set to benefit from an exciting new partnership with Wellingborough Town Football Club. The collaboration underpins the College's aims to create a direct pathway for its Academy students into competitive non-league football.

The Football Academy currently has 115 students who combine vocational studies in subjects like Business, Sport, and Sports Massage with regular training, competitive matches, and opportunities to obtain nationally recognised coaching qualifications.

The collaboration will include shared use of facilities, joint training opportunities, and access to coaching staff and development resources across

both the club and the College to help improve player performance. Moulton College students are also set to benefit from work placement opportunities at the club itself, from matchday roles to providing massage, therapy and physiotherapy support.

Initially founded in 1867, Wellingborough Town FC has a long and rich history, having produced a host of footballing talent. Former players include Phil Neal, who later played for Liverpool and England; Frederick 'Fanny' Walden, who went on to play for Spurs and England, and Vic Watson, who joined West Ham United, becoming their all-time leading goal scorer.

Leigh Jones, Moulton College's Head of Sport says of the partnership: "We're delighted to be joining forces with Wellingborough Town FC. It is a well-established and popular club committed to the ongoing development of our students. Working with the club and its dedicated team of staff and coaches will enable our students to develop self-discipline, confidence, attitude, skills, and teamwork, access elite-level training, and experience the atmosphere of playing matches at the club's Dog and

Duck Stadium, with the potential for future progression into its senior squad.

"In conjunction with our own coaching and performance management programmes, our Academy students will benefit from well-rounded experiences that will improve every aspect of their game and career prospects on and off the pitch."

With the UEFA Women's Euro 2025 kicking off this month, the focus will also be firmly on the development of the Academy's female players, with Wellingborough Town FC home to two women's teams. Supporting the growth of and championing the women's game is a key priority for both Wellingborough Town FC and Moulton College.

Joe Pygall, Head of Football at Moulton College adds: "Forming strong partnerships with local football clubs is essential for the development of our players as it enables us to bridge the gap between education and elite sport and offers our students real-world opportunities to apply their skills while gaining qualifications.

"We're proud of the role the College plays as a hub for talent development, both on and off the pitch. By working closely with Wellingborough Town
